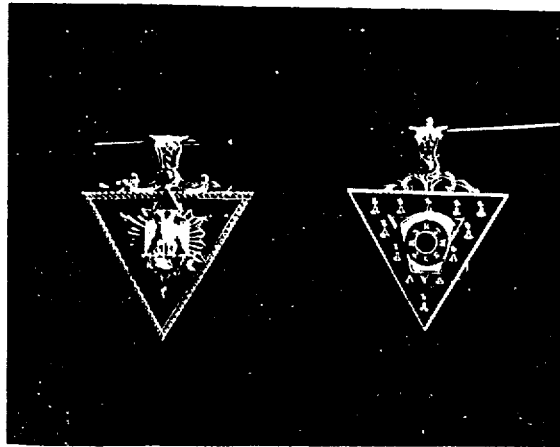

DESIGN FOR A BADGE.

Specification forming part of Design No. **10,711**, dated June 4, 1878; application filed May 22, 1878.
[Term of patent $3\frac{1}{2}$ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, EDWARD WILLIAMS, of New York, in the county of New York and State of New York, have originated and designed a Badge for Knights Templar; and I do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description thereof, reference being had to the accompanying photographs, (drawings,) which form a part of this specification.

Figure A is a representation of the front and face of a badge, consisting of peculiar and appropriate emblems, and pertaining to the Masonic Order of Knights Templar.

This badge is constructed in a triangular form, and on the face of which are devices emblematical of the order, consisting of the double-headed eagle, with feet resting upon a bar, from which a banner is pendent. Crossed at the back of the eagle is a sword, and the eagle surrounded with rays of the sun, the top being surmounted by a configured scroll, with cap or loop for attaching or holding the charm or badge to the person.

Fig. B is a reverse view of Fig. A, showing the devices in Masonry—the key-stone of the arch resting upon a smaller triangle. On the face of the key-stone are inscribed the letters

H T W S S T H S, the whole surrounded by twelve (12) lights regularly arranged within the perimeter of the triangle.

I claim as my invention—

1. The design for a badge of triangular form, and having on the obverse side a representation of a double-headed eagle, with feet resting upon a bar, from which bar a banner is pendent, a sword crossing the back of the eagle, and the rays of the sun, substantially as described, and shown in the accompanying photograph.

2. The design for a badge of triangular form, and having on the reverse side a representation of the key-stone of the arch, resting upon a smaller triangle, and on the key-stone the letters H T W S S T H S, the whole surrounded with lights arranged regularly within the perimeter of the triangle, as described, and shown by the accompanying photograph.
