DESIGN FOR POCKET-LAMP.

Specification forming part of Design No. 10,773, dated August 6, 1878; application filed June 15, 1878. [Term of patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, Charles S. Tall-Madge, of Cincinnati, Hamilton county, and State of Ohio, have invented and produced a new and original Design for a Pocket-Lamp; and I do hereby declare the following to be a full, clear, and exact description of the same, reference being had to the accompanying drawing, forming part of this specification, which is a perspective view of the lamp.

My design consists in a cylindrical or ovalshaped body or oil-reservoir provided with a

top carrying a wick-tube.

In the accompanying drawing, A represents the oil-reservoir of the lamp, which is made in cylindrical form about one inch in diameter and three or four inches long, more or less. The top of the body is contracted at B to receive a cap, D, provided with a bell-shaped overhanging flange, d, carrying the conical wick-tube E, as shown in the drawing.

The oil-reservoir is preferably cylindrical in form, although it may be oval, if desired; but the top must be cylindrical in order to receive the screw-cap. The bottom of the body is made flat, so that the lamp can stand in an upright position. The whole lamp may be nickel-plated, to give a neat appearance and adapt it to be readily cleaned.

Having thus described my invention, what

I claim is—

A design for lamps consisting of a cylindrical or oval-shaped body or oil-reservoir with a contracted top, B, cap D, provided with a bell-shaped overhanging flange, d, and a conical wick-tube, E, substantially as described.
