## DESIGN FOR GROUP OF STATUARY.

Specification forming part of Design No. **10,869**, dated October 15, 1878; application filed October 17, 1878.  
[Term of patent 14 years.]

*To all whom it may concern:*

Be it known that I, JOHN ROGERS, of New Canaan, in the county of Fairfield and State of Connecticut, have originated and designed a Group of Statuary, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying photographic illustration, making part of this specification.

The group is detached, and consists of two separate parts, but dependent on each other, as one represents a mother supporting her child, which is seated on a table while it is having its photograph taken. The mother has her head slightly turned to her left, and is watching the photographer. The child is partly nude, and is frightened at the preparations of the photographer, and is clinging to its mother. The table has a round top and triangular pedestal, ornamented with carvings. The other part represents the photographer standing behind his camera and looking

toward the child at his right hand. He has hold of the cap over the glass of the instrument with his right hand, and is waiting to remove it till he can attract the child's attention by a jumping-jack, which he holds up in his left hand. The camera stands on a round pedestal, and is mostly covered with a cloth.

What I claim as my invention is—

The design for a group of statuary in two detached parts, representing a mother supporting her child on a table to have its photograph taken in one part, and the photographer standing behind his camera and trying to attract the child's attention by a jumping-jack in the other part, substantially as described in the foregoing specification and shown in the accompanying illustration.
