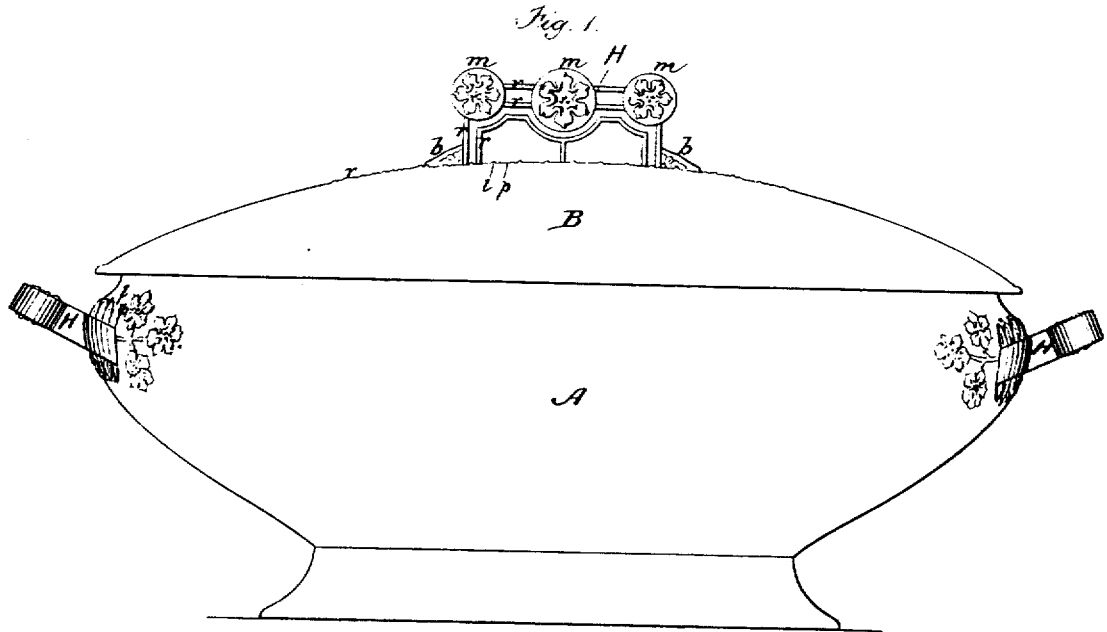
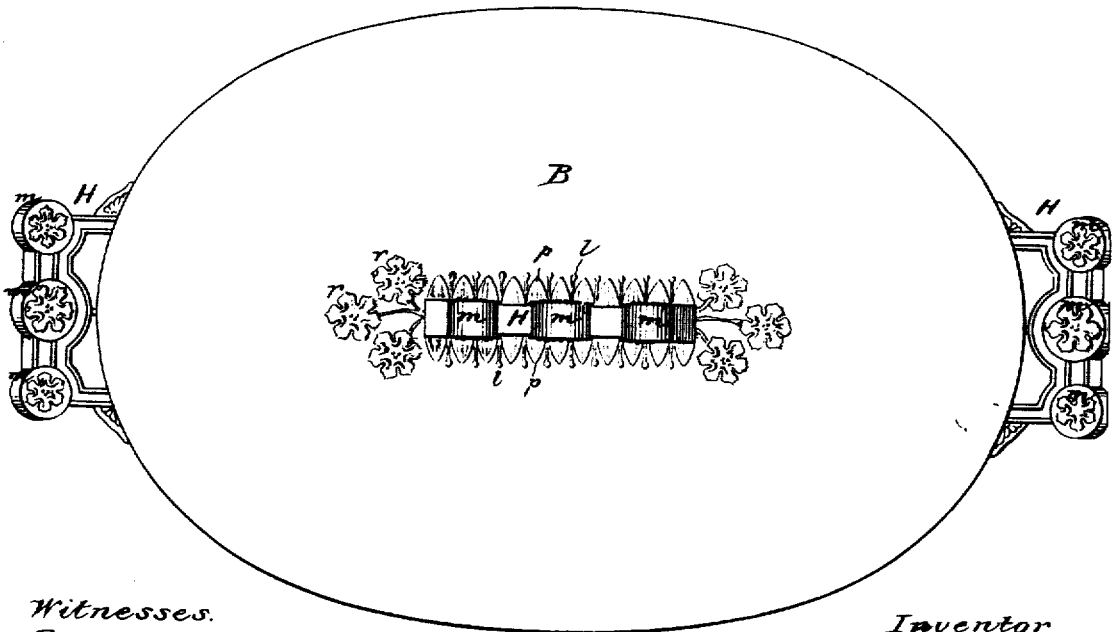

DESIGN FOR HANDLED DISHES.

Specification forming part of Design No. **10,911**, dated November 19, 1873; application filed November 2, 1873.
[Term of patent 3½ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, CHARLES A. ROGERS, of Boston, in the county of Suffolk and State of Massachusetts, have invented a Design for Handled Dishes, of which the following is a specification:

Of the accompanying drawings, forming a part of this specification, Figure 1 represents a side view of a covered dish embodying my design. Fig. 2 represents a top view of the same.

In the drawings, A represents the body, and B the cover, of an ordinary oval dish. The general form of these parts constitutes no part of my design, and they may be made in any other suitable form; or the design hereinafter described may be applied to either or both of said parts.

H represents the handle, which constitutes a portion of my design. This handle is composed of a solid flat piece of a generally oblong rectangular shape, and is provided on its upper portion with medallions *m*, on which are formed rosettes or other suitable ornaments. The sides of the handle between and below the medallions are preferably provided with ribs or projecting lines *r*, which subdivide the sides into panels.

If desired, however, the panels may be omitted, and the medallions may be extended to

the surface to which the handle is attached, the essential features of this part of my design being the flat solid piece and the medallions thereon. At the ends of the handle are brackets or braces *b*, formed to bear upon the handle and the surface to which it is attached.

My design also consists in the ornamentation of the surface to which the handle is attached, as shown in Fig. 2, such ornamentation being in relief and consisting of a series of leaf-like projections, *p*, extending along the surfaces of the dish and cover by the sides of the handles H, projecting lines *l*, with rounded ends between the projections *p* and rosettes *r* at the ends of the handle.

I claim—

1. The design for dish-handles, as set forth.
2. The design for surface ornamentation around dish-handles, as set forth.
3. The design for handled dishes consisting of the handles and surface ornamentation, as set forth.
