

JOHN DAWSON, OF WILLIAMSBURG, NEW YORK.

DESIGN FOR BEDSTEADS.

Specification forming part of Design No. 10,936, dated December 3, 1878; application filed September 30, 1878. [Term of patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, John Dawson, of Williamsburg, in the county of Kings and State of New York, have originated a Design for Bedsteads, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying drawing, making part of this specification.

The drawing, in which similar letters of reference indicate like parts, represents the head of a bedstead made according to my design.

A are the bed-posts, and B the horizontal

boards connecting them, and which constitute the closed portion of the said head of the bedstead. The said closed portion may be plain, or provided with beads \hat{b} or other ornaments. At the upper edge of the closed portion B are horizontal bars C, and a distance above the latter are other horizontal bars, D. Two of these bars C D, on each side, connect each of the posts A with the vertical portion or col-umn of the raised margin E of a central sunk panel, F, suitable to receive some painting or other ornament, the said margin E forming an arch, e, over the central panel-opening, and being lined with a broader portion, f, sunk a little deeper than the margin E and bordering the panel-opening in the manner of a picturemat. The lower edge of the panel is horizontal or parallel with the bars C. Between the bars C and D are inserted at intervals plain or ornamental vertical rounds d, thus forming

an imitation balustrade on both sides of the central arch or sunk panel. At the junction between the latter and the bars CD are square or oblong blocks G, beveled on their face-surfaces. The two lower blocks G are provided with pendants a. The central panel is headed by the capital H, somewhat similar to that of a Doric column, and which may be provided with leaves or other ornaments h i j on top, bottom, and at its sides. A small arch, K, is placed to join on each side the bar D and the arch e of the raised margin E in the angle between them. Leaves or other ornaments k lmay be arranged, as shown, at the end of the arch K. The top of each post A is adorned by an urn, M.

Having thus described my hivention, I claim as now and desire to secure by Letters Patent-

1. The design composed of the central arched panel, with the capital H, the side balustrades D C d, and the side arches K, sub-

stantially as specified.

2. The stign composed of the central arch, capital, balustrade, and side arches, and the urns or vases M upon the posts A, substantially as specified.
