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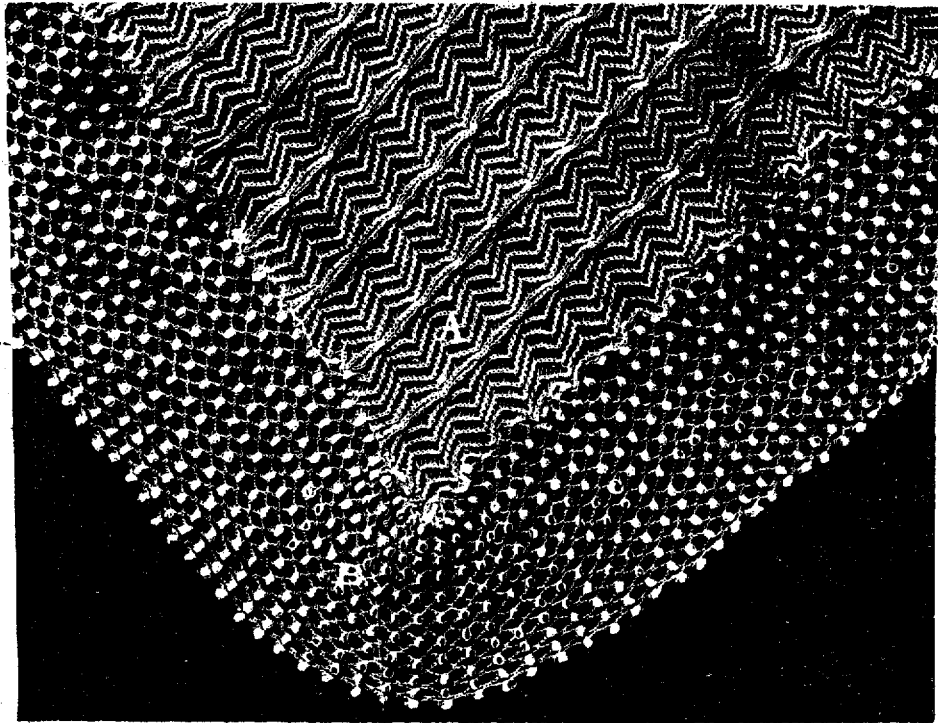

DESIGN FOR A SHAWL-TRIMMING.

Specification forming part of Design No. **11,010**, dated February 4, 1879; application filed December 20, 1878.
[Term of patent $3\frac{1}{2}$ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, WALTER WILKINSON, of Beeston, in the county of Nottingham, England, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in a Design for a Shawl-Trimming; and I do hereby declare that the following is a full, clear, and exact description thereof, which will enable others skilled in the art to which it appertains to make and use the same, reference being had to the accompanying photographic illustration, and to letters of reference marked thereon, which form a part of this specification.

A represents the body of the shawl, which may be ornamented or plain. B is the trimming, which consists of squares or meshes *c*, formed of link or chain work, in two diagonal corners of which are tufts *d*, concave on one side and convex on the other or opposite

side, so that each tuft resembles a miniature bird's-nest. The trimming B may be made of any desirable material or color, and may form an integral part of the body of the shawl; or the said trimming may be made separately and sold by the yard.

What I claim is—

The design for a shawl-trimming composed of squares or meshes *c*, formed of link or chain work, with tufts *d*, having recesses on one side thereof, substantially as described, and shown in the accompanying illustration.
