## DESIGN FOR A CUFF.

Specification forming part of Design No. **11,019**, dated February 11, 1879; application filed January 3, 1879.  
[Term of patent 7 years.]

*To all whom it may concern:*

Be it known that I, JAMES M. IDE, of the city of Troy, in the county of Rensselaer and State of New York, have invented and produced a new and original Design for Cuffs for Ladies' and Gentlemen's Wear, of which the following is a specification, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, in which—

Figure 1 is a plan of a cuff which embodies this new ornamental design; and Fig. 2 is a section at the line  $z z$ , and Fig. 3 a section at the line  $y y$ , of the same cuff.

This invention consists in the design for a cuff composed of the plain surfaces  $A A'$ , bordered along their inner edges by the straight inclined ribs or ledges  $B B$  and  $B' B'$ , forming the obtuse angles  $C C'$  and the intervening depressed surface  $D D$ , which flares outward in acute angular form in opposite directions from the middle, all so as to present substantially the same tasty appearance as is represented

in the aforesaid drawings, the outer edges of the cuff being of the usual or any suitable shapes, and the ribs or ledges  $B B$   $B' B'$  and the outer edges of the cuff being with or without apparent rows of stitching.

What I claim as my invention is—

The design for a cuff, consisting of the plain surfaces  $A A'$ , bordered along their inner edges by the straight inclined ribs or ledges  $B B$  and  $B' B'$ , forming the obtuse angles  $C C'$  and the intervening depressed surface  $D D$ , substantially as described, and shown in the accompanying illustration.
