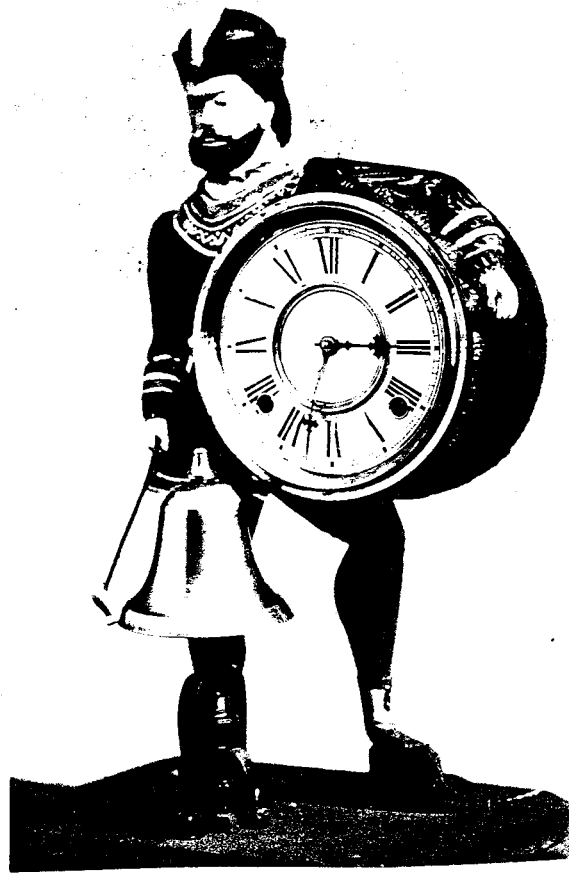

DESIGN FOR CLOCK AND BELL.

Specification forming part of Design No. **11,048**, dated March 4, 1879; application filed February 7, 1879.
[Term of patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, J. ANDREAS LINDEMANN, of Brooklyn, in the State of New York, have originated and designed a Clock and Bell, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying photographic illustration, making part of this specification.

I arrange a figure of a man, A, holding under one arm the clock B. Before this figure a bell, C, is placed, supported on a suitable stand, D. The hand of the other arm of the figure has the hammer E attached, and, being made movable and connected to the strik-

ing mechanism of the clock-work, strikes the hour upon the bell C. The figure A and the stand D are arranged on a base-plate, F.

What I claim as my invention is—

A design for a clock, consisting of a man holding under one arm a clock, and in the hand of the other arm the hammer, and a bell in front of the figure, substantially in the manner above described.
