## DESIGN FOR CARPET.

Specification forming part of Design No. **11,060**, dated March 11, 1879; application filed February 12, 1879.  
[Term of patent 3½ years.]

*To all whom it may concern:*

Be it known that I, HENRY HORAN, of East Orange, in the county of Essex and State of New Jersey, have originated and designed a Pattern for Carpets and other Fabrics, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying photographic illustration, making part of this specification.

This invention relates to a new and original design for carpets, oil-cloths, and similar fabrics.

It consists of the new ornamentation and arrangement of figures hereinafter more fully pointed out.

The accompanying photographic illustration represents a face view of my new design.

Upon the background A of the carpet is represented a large and rich bouquet, *a*, of flowers and leaves. Below this bouquet is a snail-shaped scroll, *b*, from which a garland, *d*, extends to a second group of flowers, *e*, that rests upon a vase-shaped pedestal, *f*.

The carpet is furthermore ornamented by two additional floral groups, *g* and *h*. A second garland, *i*, is interposed between the groups *h* and *a* of flowers.

In addition to these figures the carpet is

embellished by the representation of numerous flowers, leaves, and smaller fanciful figures, all as shown. A prominent, nearly continuous stem, *j*, extends from the snail-shaped scroll *b*, nearly parallel to the garland *d*, and beneath the vase-shaped pedestal *f*.

I claim—

1. The design for a carpet, consisting of the bouquet *a*, snail-like ornament *b*, and stem *j*, substantially as shown.
2. The design for a carpet, consisting of the bouquet *a*, scroll *b*, garland *d*, and group of flowers *e*, the garland *d* connecting the scroll *b* with the group *e*, substantially as shown.
3. The design for a carpet, consisting of the scroll *b*, garland *d*, group *e*, and pedestal *f*, substantially as shown.
4. The design for a carpet, consisting of the floral groups *g* and *h* and of the garland *i*, substantially as shown.
5. The design for a carpet, consisting of the figures *a*, *b*, *d*, *e*, *f*, *g*, *h*, *i*, and *j*, substantially as shown.
