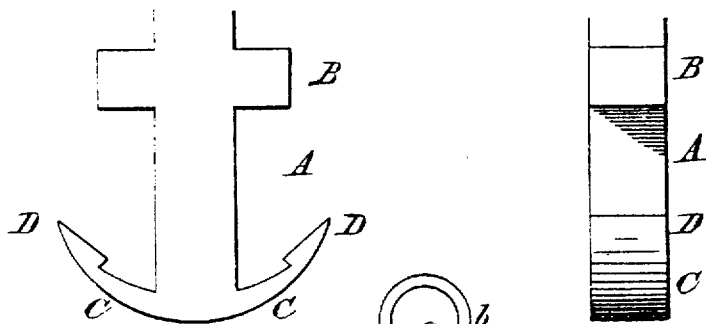
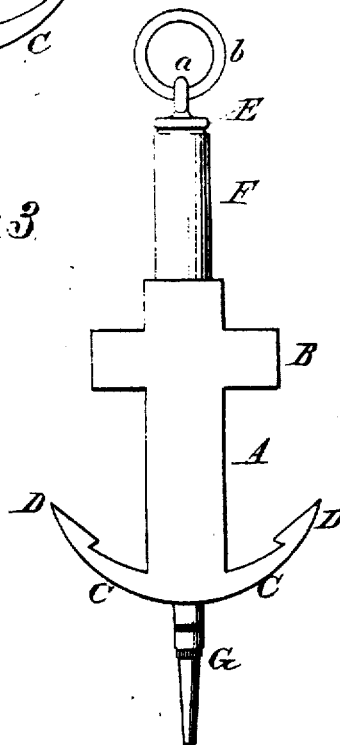

CHARLES L. DOWNES, OF JERSEY CITY, NEW JERSEY.

DESIGN FOR PENCIL-CASES.

Specification forming part of Design No. **11,065**, dated March 11, 1879; application filed January 14, 1879.

[Term of patent 7 years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, CHARLES L. DOWNES, of Jersey City, in the county of Hudson and State of New Jersey, have originated and designed a Pencil-Case, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying drawing, making part of this specification, in which—

Figure 1 is a face view of the new design with the pencil entirely inclosed. Fig. 2 is a side view of Fig. 1. Fig. 3 is a face view with the pencil exposed.

Similar letters of reference indicate corresponding parts.

My design consists of an anchor and cross pencil-case, the case or ornament representing an anchor, and the stock B of the anchor forming with the shank A across.

C C are the arms of the anchor-stock, and D D the flukes.

The head of the shank A is a circular bead, E, surmounted by an eye, *a*, and a ring, *b*.

Fig. 3 shows the design when the pencil-nib G and barrel F are exposed.

The parts above described may be ornamented with any figures that may be selected.

The drawing represents the several parts of the design as being made rectangular in cross-section; but they may be made annular or of any other suitable shape.

The design may be made of metal, mineral, or of a composition, or of any other material.

It will be seen from the above description that I combine in a single design pencil-case a cross, emblematical of "Faith," and an anchor emblematical of "Hope."

It is obvious that a watch-key or tooth-pick may be substituted for the pencil-nib G.

Having described my new design, what I claim as my invention is—

The design for a combined anchor and cross-pencil case, consisting of the shank A, stock B, arms C, and flukes D, nib G, barrel F, eye *a*, and ring *b*, as shown.
