

DESIGN FOR WALL-PAPERS.

Specification forming part of Design No. 11,067, dated March 11, 1879; application filed February 14, 1879. [Term of patent 3½ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, FRIEDRICH MENCKE, of the city, county, and State of New York, have invented a new and original Design for Wall-Papers, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying photographic illustration, making part of this specification, in which—

A represents the dado, B the dado-border, C the body or filling, and D the frieze, of my

improved design for wall-papers.

The dado Λ is formed of rectangular panels a, of equal size, which are inclosed by studded ornamental borders a^1 . Each panel a is divided, by a horizontal band, a^2 , into a lower smaller and an upper larger panel, of which the lower panel is filled by a series of ornamented Japanese vases or urns, while the upper panel has a stippled background and a filling of symmetrically-arranged flowers, leaves, and scroll-ornaments, as shown.

The dado-border B is composed of two outer parallel and ornamental bands, b, and of an intermediate stippled portion, on which are arranged, at proper distances from each other, scroll-shaped ornaments b^i , that are placed alternately in upright and inverted positions. A meandering wreath, b^2 , of leaves and berries, growing out from a common vine, twines from the lower part of one ornament b^i to the upper part of the next adjoining ornament b^i , and fills thus the space between the same.

The body or filling C of the wall-paper has a stippled ground, on which a rectangular trellis, d, is arranged. Conventional flowers and fan-shaped leaves that branch out from winding stems d' twine in irregular manner

over the trellis.

The frieze D is composed of a series of oblong panels of equal size, which are divided by vertical bands e and inclosed by ornamental borders e'. The upper parts of the panels are

of semicircular shape, the ground of the panels stippled and filled up with flowers, leaves, and buds, issuing from a common stalk.

Having thus described my invention, I claim as new, and desire to secure by Letters Patent—

1. The design for a dado for wall-papers, composed of oblong panels inclosed by ornamental borders, and divided by horizontal bands into an upper larger and a lower smaller panel, as shown and described.

2. The design for a dado for wall-papers, formed of oblong panels, inclosed by ornamental borders, and divided by horizontal bands into two smaller panels, of which the lower panel is filled by a row of vases, the upper by symmetrically-arranged scrolls, flowers, and leaves, as shown and described.

3. The design for a dado-border for wall-papers, composed of parallel outer bands, and of a filling of scroll-shaped ornaments, and a twining wreath that passes alternately above and below the ornaments, as shown and described.

4. The design for the body or filling of wallpapers, composed of a trellis and twining vines, as shown and described.

5. The design for the body or filling of wallpapers, composed of stippled background, of a trellis, and of twining vines with flowers and fan-shaped leaves, as shown and described.

6. The design for a frieze for wall-papers, composed of oblong panels, divided by ornamental bands, inclosed by ornamental borders, and provided with a filling of conventional flowers, as shown and described.
