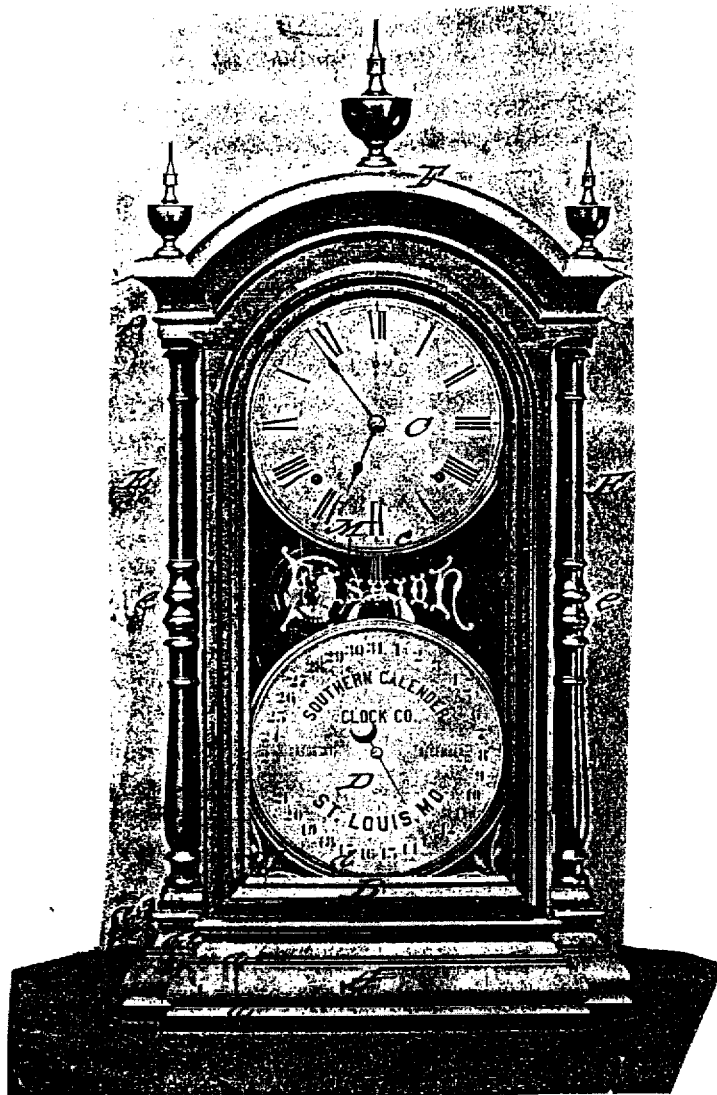

DESIGN FOR CLOCK-CASE.

Specification forming part of Design No. **11,073**, dated March 18, 1879; application filed February 17, 1879.
[Term of patent $3\frac{1}{2}$ years.]

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, LUCIUS L. CULVER, of the city and county of St. Louis, in the State of Missouri, have originated a certain ornamental Design for Clock-Cases, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying photographic illustration, making part of this specification, in which the nature of the design is fully represented.

The general contour is similar to that set forth in the patent dated July 4, 1876, No. 9,362; but within the outline the design differs greatly.

Referring to the illustration, and the letters of reference marked thereon, the ogce base-molding A is enriched with a plurality of beads and grooves, *a a' a² a³*.

F is the main bead of a pediment, sharp-edged in front, swelled on the top, and concave below. It is arched in the middle. At the springing of the arch on each side a similar molding extends out a little horizontally beyond the general side of the clock-case, as indicated by *f'*. A narrow sharply-defined bead, *f*, runs parallel to this below. This part is similar to No. 9,362.

A rich molding of many flutes surrounds the

two dials, and the dividing-space has a rounded top and a square base, as indicated by B. A series of decorations are produced at the mid-height of each of the side columns, E, as indicated by *e*.

The equal-sized time-face C and calendar-face D fill the full width of the space within the molding B, and are separated by a wide space, equal to about one-third of the diameter. Each is surrounded by a narrow bead or series of beads, *e d*.

The door is of glass, and presents conspicuously between the dials the name or title in ornamental lettering, as indicated by M. Partially concealed thereby, the works of the clock, including the bright pendulum and gong, are conspicuously visible. The corners below present decorative devices, as indicated by *m*. The general effect is rich and elaborate.

I claim as my invention—

The design for clock-case, as herein described, and set forth in the accompanying illustration.
