At the meeting of the Special Group on July 27, Nr. Delice mentioned that a STA yeaper cetlining various covert actions that might be taken in commection with Berlin had been prepared. He distributed copies of this paper; which was dated July 10 and entitled "Covert Actions Annex on the Berlin Centingency Flam," and also copies of a related paper entitled "Questions regarding the Scope and Direction of CS Operations in Support of S.S. Government Actions in the Berlin Crisis," dated July 26. The Group felt that an appropriate municipal of the Berlin Tack Force should study those papers and schult recommendations on them for consideration by the Group.

The "appropriate mealess" of the Berlin Task Force has not yet met to consider the two GTA papers. HER has, however, considered them and its prolinizary views regarding these are attached. I believe it would be seeful at this stage to convey these preliminary views bilaterally to the Agency as HER enginetic.

What is mended our is a set of joint recommendations, propared by an appropriate mealons of the Berlin Task Perce, regarding both GLA papers for medicalism to the Special Droop.

BACKGROUND

NSC Directive No. 58 of June 30, 1961, said, "The Secretary of State and the Director of Central Intelligence should submit joint recommendations as to the timing and nature of the preparations to be taken to create a capability for inciting progressively increasing instability in East Germany and Eastern Europe, at such time after October 15 as it may be ordered. Recommendations should also be submitted as to the timing and nature of the steps to be taken to bring this capability to the attention of the Soviets before they make their critical decisions about Berlin."

As a result of this directive, CIA submitted to Mr. Kohler a paper titled "Covert Action Annex, Berlin Contingency Plan," which became Annex % of A Study Regarding Berlin, dated July 12, 1961 (TAB A) In view of the time limit on preparation of this paper, CIA did not clear it with the field. Although the paper was based on a format prepared in GER and GER commented on the paper in draft, there was not time to clear it formally in the Department.

When, fellowing the discussion of <u>A Study Remarding Revise</u> in the MSC, MSC Action Memorandum No. 59 of July 14, 1961, was issued, no reference was made to the covert annex. No further work was, therefore, done on the annex, and it was not included in the <u>Bocuments</u>

<u>Prepared in Response to MSC Action Hemorandum No. 59 of July 14, 1961</u>, dated July 18, 1961.

Following the MSC meeting of July 19, Dr. Henry Kissinger asked representatives of CIA what decisions they required to proceed with the covert program on Serlin. In response to this, CIA prepared a memorandum titled, "Questions Regarding the Scope and Direction of CS Operations in Support of H.S. Government Actions in the Berlin Crisis." (TAB B) CIA gave this memorandum to Dr. Kissinger on July 26 and sent a copy to the Department.

In this memorandum, CIA posed two basic questions: (1) did
the proposals in the Covert action annex represent a useful and
purposeful contribution to overall government planning? and (2) what
procedures is CIA to follow in guidance and clearances for propaganda
and covert action operations?

FOLICY

EUR believes that, in general, CIA's Covert Action Annex provides a good basis for a covert program in connection with Berlin planning.

Its only serious micgivings are connected with paragraph 17.c., which provides for the greation of a paramilitary support force in West Germany.

EVR questions whether this is either desirable or presticable. It would need, however, to examine the proposal in more detail before it could arrive at a definite epinion.

EUR approves in principle of the other actions recommended for Phase I (July through September 17), which include:

- 1. Expension of intelligence collection,
- 2. Preparations for covert action mission?
- 3. Creation of black and gray radio facilities,
- 4. Generalization with West German government and political parties, and
- 5. Coordination with British, French, and German intelligence corvices.

PROCEDURES

The Department of State approves in principle the proposals made in the Covert Action Annex, submitted to Mr. Kohler by Mr. Helms, which became Annex E of A Study Regarding Berlin Prepared in Response to NSC Directive No. 58 of June 30, 1961, dated July 12, 1961.

We have reservations, however, concerning paragraph 17.c., which relates to the formation of a paramilitary support force in West Germany. I understand that members of your staff are cooperating with the Defense Department in preparing a study of this proposal. We would like to examine this study and discuss it with your staff before reaching a final conclusion.

With regard to the other proposals listed under Phase I (July through September 17, 1961), we suggest that you develop detailed plans. Because of the inter-relationship which exists between your proposals and the other activities related to Berlin which will be moving forward at the same time, we will want to work very closely with you and your staff on matters of timing and mode of implementation.

When you have prepared a plan for carrying out one of these proposals, I suggest you submit it to me (via INR/DDC) for study by the Department of State with a view to its subsequent consideration by the Special Group, if the Department of State believes this necessary. I would think the Group in each such case would decide whether higher approval was necessary.
