THTELLIGENCE MEMORANDUM

Judged: The Situation in Czechoslovakia (As of 4:00 P.M. EDT)

The confrontation between Czechoslovak and Soviet leaders opened this morning at nino (Czech time) in Cierna nad Tisou (which centrary to AP does not mean "Glassboro") in southeastern Slovakia, just inside the border. All but two of the Soviet politbure—Kirilenko and Polyansky, who are tending the store in Moscow—are participating.

The Czechoslovak delegation includes all the presidium members, plus President Svobeds There has been no word from the meeting, and the Czechoslovak News Agency does not expect any until late tenight or temerrow merning.

Although polemics on both sides were toned down somewhat for the occasion, the Czechoslovaks are under immense Soviet psychological-military pressure.
