Without the U.S. Coast Guard. That's a lot of money. And a lot of drugs. Drugs that will never reach our shores. Or our neighborhoods. Or our children. In fact, since 1997, the U.S. Coast Guard has seized over 540,476 pounds of cocaine and over 270,060 pounds of marijuana. But there are more drugs where those came from. That's why the U.S. Coast Guard works tirelessly to reduce the supply of drugs from the source. Denying smugglers the use of air and maritime routes in the Transit Zone — a six million square mile area — including the Caribbean, the Gulf of Mexico and the Eastern Pacific. The mission doesn't end there. It's only the beginning. There's also homeland security, search and rescue, migrant interdiction, maritime mobility, and environmental protection. The Deepwater program

will provide the Coast Guard with the tools they need to detect, classify, identify, and prosecute any threat. Keeping drugs out of the hands of dealers. And smugglers where they belong — behind bars.
