References:

a. Your Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request of March 29, 2001, for records concerning various dossiers. Your request was received in this office on May 8, 2001.

b. Our letter of April 20, 2001, informing you that additional time was needed to review the records and we were unable to comply with the 20-day statutory time limit in processing your request.

We have conducted checks of the automated Defense Clearance and Investigations Index and a search of the Investigative Records Repository to determine the existence of Army intelligence investigative records responsive to Possible Arms Cache in Grenada West Indies, ZF011647W.

We have located the enclosed records pertaining to your request. As a result of our review, it has been determined that the information contained in the records is partially releasable to you. The records are enclosed for your use. Fees for processing this request are waived.

Information has been sanitized from these records which would result in an unwarranted invasion of the personal privacy rights of the individuals concerned. This information is exempt from the public disclosure provisions of the FOIA pursuant to Title 5 U.S. Code 552 (b)(6) and (b)(7)(C).


The withholding of information by this office is a partial denial of your request. This denial is made on behalf of Brigadier General Keith B. Alexander, the Commanding General, U.S. Army Intelligence and Security Command, who is the Initial Denial Authority for Army intelligence investigative and security records under the FOIA. You may appeal this decision to the

Secretary of the Army. If you wish to file an appeal, you should forward it to this office. Your appeal must be postmarked no later than 60 calendar days from the date of this letter. After the 60 day period, the case may be considered closed; however, such closure does not preclude you filing litigation in the courts.

We are continuing to review records regarding other titles you have requested and will respond to you by separate correspondence when our review is complete.



SYNOPSIS (U) On 9 July 1984, a memorandum for the record was received from the Resident Office, 902d Military Intelligence Group, Fort Hamilton, NY, in which an unidentified Grenadian National stated that he and some colleagues had buried some weapons both US and Soviet make in the rural mountain area on the outskirts of St George's, Grenada (1). On 17 July 1984, Brooklyn, NY was interviewed concerning a former employee believed to be a Grenadain citizen. ( ) provided the name of ( ) who resided at ( ) Brooklyn, NY (2). On 19 July 1984, a check of the residence ( ) revealed that ( ) had resided there with his aunt, ( ) but he had since returned to Grenada to live with his father, ( ) who resides at Mount Parnasas, St George's, Grenada (3). On 23 July 1984, results of the investigation were passed to the INSCOM Counterintelligence Detachment, Grenada (ICDG) for further action (4).					
COMMENTS: ( ) was interviewed by members of the ICDG on 30 or 31 July 1984. It was revealed in the interview that ( ) had stated that he had buried the weapons but that he was trying to build an image to an interested American. It was further revealed that ( ) had never been in the Army or militia and had never traveled to Cuba and in fact never owned the weapons or personally reported.

REPORT OF FINDINGS</p> <p>(U) On 9 July 1984, the US Army Special Operations Detachment, INSCOM, Fort Meade, MD, was in receipt of a memorandum for the record, dated 31 May 1984, subject as above. In the memorandum, it was related that ( ) civilian, who resides at ( ) Brooklyn, NY, had had contact with a Grenadian Emigre who may have information of interest to US Army Intelligence. ( ) was interviewed on 26 May 1984 and provided substantially the following information:</p> <p>(U) ( ) related that on 30 January 1984, while attending a religious fund raising event, he met a Grenadian National Emigre (GE) who had related that he been a member of the Marxist Regular Grenadian Army. GE further told Source that he was in self imposed exile for political reasons but that he wanted to return to Grenada because he did not feel comfortable in the United States. GE related that he and some colleagues had buried some weapons both US and Soviet made, in the rural mountainous ares on the outskirts of St George's, Grenada, and that the weapons were well preserved. 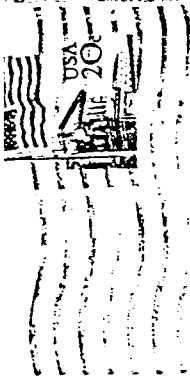

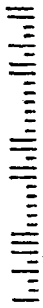

To Whom it May Concern:

On January 30, 1984 I met a young man (about 24 years of age) of Grenadan origin, who claimed to know of existing stocks of arms shipments buried throughout that island. He was catering an unrelated volunteer fund raising drive in Brooklyn, N.Y.

The young man said he was a sergeant in the "Marxist" regular Grenada Army, assigned to drilling militia units, mostly youth. The former sergeant (whose name I never received) claims to have legally immigrated to the United States with his family in 1983, to seek better economic opportunities.

Though this gentleman claims to have personally opposed the regime of Maurice Bishop (and in effect hails United States intervention in his homeland), he told me, nonetheless, that he (and many fellow colleagues in the regular army), buried moderate sized caches of arms and ammunition throughout the Grenada. He claimed that these weapons were hidden for future personal use, mostly for hunting and fireworks displays. He also claimed that most of these "burials" were located outside the St. Georges city limits, and often included: RPG missiles and other anti-armor missiles, and assorted automatic weapons found on the international market.

Though I don't know whether or not this information is still relative at this late date, this former sergeant claimed that these stocks were well preserved and quite difficult to locate. The sergeant volunteered this information (though he didn't request the writing of this letter), and appeared quite honest, with no likely reason for wanting to disseminate false information.

1. On 26 May 1984, ( ) was interviewed at his residence at ( ) Brooklyn, NY, ( ) concerning a Grenadian Emigre (GE) who claimed to have knowledge of an arms cache in Grenada.
2. ( ) provided the following information: On 29 January 1984, ( ) attended a fund raiser called, Super Sunday for the United Jewish Appeal and the Greater New York Area, Brooklyn, NY. At the Jewish Fund Raiser, ( ) met a GE who was employed as a waiter with the ( ) Catering Service, Brooklyn College, Brooklyn, NY. ( ) provided the following description: Name: Unknown; Age: 24; Nationality: Grenadian; Height: 5'9" to 5'11"; Weight: Unknown; Build: Slender; Hair Style: Groomed Afro; Facial Hair: Thin dark mustache.
3. ( ) stated that the GE did not have his US citizenship at the time of their conversation. The GE told ( ) he was in self imposed exile for political reasons from Grenada, but wanted to go back there because he did not feel comfortable in the US. The GE came to the US with his parents and siblings. GE's military colleagues did not emigrate to the US.
4. The GE stated that he was a Sergeant in the Marxist Regular Grenadian Army. The GE claimed that he and his military colleagues buried an arms cache of Soviet, and American weapons, including assorted automatic weapons (AK-47's), RPG missiles, and other anti-armor missiles in rural mountainous terrain on the outskirts of St. Georges, Grenada without his supervisor's knowledge. GE stated that the weapons were well preserved and well marked. GE gave no pin-point location nor did he give the number of weapons buried. GE claimed to have buried the weapons for hunting and firework displays. GE stated that he was in Cuba for one to two weeks for military instruction on American made weapons. Part of the GE military duties consisted of instructing/training elementary school children in the use of ordinance and automatic weapons. Source could provide no further information.
