References:

- a. Your Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request of March 29, 2001, for records concerning various dossiers. Your request was received in this office on April 18, 2001.
- b. Our letter of April 20, 2001, informing you that we were unable to comply with the 20-day statutory time limit.

We have conducted checks of the automated Defense Clearance and Investigations Index and a search of the Investigative Records Repository to determine the existence of Army intelligence investigative records responsive to your request.

We have located records pertaining to your request on Poland Intelligence Services MO, ZF400226W. We have completed a mandatory declassification review in accordance with Executive Order (EO) 12958. As a result of our review, information has been sanitized and 66 pages of records are denied in their entirety as the information is currently and properly classified SECRET and CONFIDENTIAL according to Sections 1.3(a)(2), 1.3(a)(3), 1.5(c) and 1.5(d) of EO 12958. This information is exempt from the public disclosure provisions of the FOIA pursuant to Title 5 U.S. Code 552(b)(1). It is not possible to reasonably segregate meaningful portions of the withheld pages for release. On March 9, 1999, the President exempted the file series in which these records are maintained from the automatic declassification provisions of EO 12958, Section 3.4, pertaining to classified records more than 25 years old. The records are enclosed for your use. A brief explanation of the applicable sections follows:

Section 1.3(a)(2) of EO 12958 provides that information shall be classified SECRET it is unauthorized disclosure reasonably could be expected to cause serious damage to the national security.

Section 1.3(a)(3) of EO 12958 provides that information shall be classified CONFIDENTIAL if its unauthorized disclosure reasonably could be expected to cause damage to the national security.

Section 1.5(c) of EO 12958 provides that information pertaining to intelligence activities, intelligence sources or methods, and cryptologic information shall be considered for classification protection.

Section 1.5(d) of EO 12958 provides that information pertaining to foreign relations or foreign activities of the United States, including confidential sources shall be considered for classification protection.

Since the release of the information deleted from the records would result in an unwarranted invasion of the privacy rights of the individual concerned, this information is exempt from the public disclosure provisions of the FOIA pursuant to Title 5 U.S. Code 552 (b)(6).

Information has been sanitized and 121 pages are denied in their entirety as disclosure of the information would reveal the identity of confidential sources. This information is exempt from public disclosure pursuant to Title 5 U.S. Code 552 (b)(7)(D) of the FOIA. It is not possible to reasonably segregate meaningful portions of the withheld pages for release. The significant and legitimate governmental purpose to be served by withholding is that a viable and effective intelligence investigative capability is dependent upon protection of confidential sources.

This material has been sanitized to remove reference to sensitive investigative methodology. The sanitized information is exempt from the public disclosure provision of the FOIA pursuant to Title 5 U.S. Code 552 (b)(7)(E). The protection of sensitive investigative techniques is necessary for the maintenance of a viable and effective intelligence investigative capability.

In summary, we have denied a total of 187 pages, because of one or more exemptions.

The withholding of the information described above is a partial denial of your request. This denial is made on behalf of Major General Keith B. Alexander, the Commanding General, U.S. Army Intelligence and Security Command, who is the Initial Denial Authority for Army intelligence investigative and security records under the FOIA. You have the right to appeal this decision to the Secretary of the Army. If you wish to file an appeal, you should forward it to this office. Your appeal must be postmarked no later than 60 calendar days from the date of this letter. After the 60-day period, the case may be considered closed; however, such closure does not preclude you from filing litigation in the courts.

Coordination has been completed and we have been informed by the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) that information has been sanitized pursuant to Title 5 U.S. Code 552 (b)(1) and (b)(3) of the FOIA. To aid you in identifying the CIA exempted information we have bracketed it in black.

The withholding of the information by the CIA constitutes a partial denial of your request and you have the right to appeal this decision to the Agency Release Panel within 45 days from the date of this letter. If you decide to file an appeal, it should be forwarded to the following: Ms. Kathryn I. Dyer, Information & Privacy Coordinator, Central Intelligence Agency, Washington, DC 20505. Please explain the basis of your appeal. Cite CIA #F-1998-02508 assigned to your request so that it may be easily identified.

During the processing of your request, information was disclosed which is under the purview of other government agencies. This office has no authority to release these records and they are being referred, along with your request, for appropriate action under the FOIA, and direct reply to you.

We are coordinating with other government agencies concerning the releasability of their information contained in the records. We will inform you as to the releasability of the information upon completion of our coordination.

Fees for processing this request are waived.







SUMMARY OF INFORMATION

Source stated on 18 March 1953, that information has been received that there has been smuggling of Communists into the United States by a Polish agent, through Miami, Florida, with connecting links in all large cities in the United States, including Ios Angeles, California. The above information was published in the Daily News, Miami, Florida, dated 24 February 1953. The Daily News based its report on an article in the Intelligence Digest, which is published in London, England. Source stated the above Digest scooped the entire world in announcing that the Soviet Union exploded the atom bomb. (B-6)

Information derived from sources other than Army sources is included in this Summary. The information will not be passed to any agency outside of the Army Establishment or the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

During the German occupation of Poland, was imprisoned by German authorities on the 12th December 1944 and then after a month sent to Natzweiler concentration campin Germany.— On the 12th April 1945 he was transferred to Dachau.— After the occupation of Bavaria by the U.S.Army, joined Guard Training Groups as a driver.—

After a short time, he made up his mind to return to Poland and received all necessary documents from the chief of Polish Repatriation Mission, Mjr. Chmura-Lazarski in Munich. On the 13th November 1945 he left Munich with some other Poles for Poland.

In Warsaw he looked after a suitable job and then he was sudden ly arrested on the street under the suspicion of spying for foreign country.— For lo days he was locked in a jail of Public Security Office.—

The room he occupied was small, filthy, dark and full of rats mice and all kind of insects.— An uncovered hole served for W.C. purposes. One blanket and two benches were brought in as sleeping accommodation for seven persons.—

The prisoners were deprived of water and all necessary hygienic implements. With was imprisoned also an American sergeant who was after few days transferred to another place.-

During lo days of imprisonment, was asked for what purpose he came to Poland. He answered that every Pole's duty is to return home and to work for his country. He was told to be a liar and was beaten with wooden flogs. The heard in prison about a man whose penis was crushed with a warden's shoe.

After 10 daxys was transferred to another prison "Mokotow The food here was very bad. - The daily rations consisted of 400 gr. bread and 1/2 ltr brown-colored water without sugar - for breakfast, 1/2 ltr water with some cabbage leaves and one potato for dinner, white carrots for supper. For Xmas dinner the prisoners received 1 hering, 3 potatoes, 20 dkg cabbage and 1/2 ltr water. - For 24

hours they receive alv 1 ltr. water to drink.-

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After seven days begun the first investigations hours, day and night. All prisoners were questioned by Russinas in Russian and German. As a rule 20 % of questions are formal such as: by whom and for what purpose he was sent to Poland, what he knows about the U.S.Army in Germany and other Poles living in U.S.zone, and 80% are abstract questions such as: do you like candy?

The frequently applied method consists of leaving the prisoner in his room where on the table remains a pistol and then observing prisoner's move.

If a prisoner answers all questions right and they cannot get out of him all they want, the Russians change the method and began to beat the investigated person.

For this purpose they employ Germans, a good many of whom are former Gestapo men. The prison physician is a German officer, but as a rule he has no medicine at his disposal and it is very difficult to get a cure permit.

Concrete cages which are to be found in this prison are often filled with water and people locked there remain for few days. In winter they take off clothes, open the windows and compel the peole to remain on concrete floor, sometimes for the whole night.

The executions are held in prison cellars. The prisoners are taken out of their rooms and put into cellars where a shot behind the neck ends the prisoner's investigation.

The prisoners who are not to be put to death are sent to other concentration camps /majdanek/ 5USC 552 (b) (6)

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


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

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(Dow'd Osobyste). Foreign guests had to show their passports at the reception desk. Source was not familiar with the formalities of registration. There were two differently colored registration forms for Poles and foreigners, (colors unknown). These forms were given to the police three times a week. At the personal request of the police, the reception desk was directed to ask in a "police and inconspicuous manner" for particular guests to hand over their passports. The receptionist was supposed to say that the registration form had been lost, and that he needed the passport again. The hotel guest was told that he was known and could therefore move about freely outside the hotel without his passport. Source knew no details about the further handling of the passports. Telephone calls to foreign countries were monitored by the post office (Source heard this many times from hotel employees). As far as Source knew, no conversations could be monitored in the hotel. In-country calls were only monitored by order of the police when they had reason to be suspicious. Monthly salaries of Hotel Personnel were as follows:

3000 Zlotys gross (was to have been increased by 300 Zlotys on 1 Jan 73)

2400 Zlotys gross minus 200 Zlotys monthly deductions -2200

For being able only to speak a foreign language, 65 Zlotys a month extra were paid; for also having written knowledge of the foreign language, 125 Zlotys a month were paid. (v)

Exchange Rates

At the General Savings Bank ("PKO" or Powszechna Kasa Oszczednosci), one Dollar could be exchanged for 72 Zlotys. At the Polish National Bank, one Dollar could be exchanged for 24. Zlotys. One Dollar on the black market is worth from 100 to 105 Zlotys. One DMW is exchanged for 18 to 20 Zlotys at the PKO, about seven at the National Bank, and about 30 Zlotys on the black market. One DME is worth five Zlotys at the PKO; One Ruble at the National Bank equals 15.60 Zlotys, or 20 Zlotys on the black market.

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
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
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
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

Individual asked ARMA to aid him in an Illegal crossing of the Polish barder into Germany, stating that he thought ARMA would know how to get across the barder Illegally. The second individual handed AARMA a letter in Polish concerning the alleged formation of a "Central Committee of the Polish Armed Organization for Freedom," which is to fight "appression by the Communist regime and lack of true freedom for the Polish people." Attached to the letter was a note giving procedures for a clandestine contact between AARMA and members of the alleged resistance arganization. The third individual claimed to be a construction worker, and affored to furnish the ARMA with plans of 138 concrete bunkers around Warsaw If they could meet in a "safer place" outside the Embassy. In each case ARMA refused to make any commitments or further contacts and the individuals departed. ARMA immediately reported the approaches to the U.S. Ambasador, who recommended that ARMA refuse to see any such visitars for a period of several days.

2. In these contacts appear to be a rather clumsy attempt on the part of the Polish Intelligence Services to entrap AFMA and provide the basis for a possible PNG action in retail-ation for the neutralization of Irvin C. Scarbeck, former Second Secretary of the U.S. Embassy in Warsaw (who was furnishing information to Polish Intelligence) and the defection in January 1961 of MAEKSMAN, a former UB staff afficer.

In response to the request of the NATO Office of Security NOS(71)192 dated March 15, 1971, there are listed various non-diplomatic agencies and firms of the Warsaw Pact countries giving their addresses and the number of nationals of the country concerned who are employed at their establishments in the United States. 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

Subject: POLISH INTELLIGENCE ACTIVITIES IN THE LITTED STATES INTERNAL SECURITY - R AND PO

Recently a reliable informant furnished the Bureau with detailed instructions, which have been issued by the Polish Government to the Polish diplomatic astablishments, regarding the handling of secret and confidential papers and information to prevent such information from penetrating to centers inimical to "People's Poland." The confidential informant of known reliability also furnished instructions governing the behavior of personnel of Polish diplomatic outposts in the case of arrest, search end interrogation.

There is attached a copy of each of the following documents:

- 1. Regulations. (These regulations ment into effect in May, 1949.)
- 2. Directive. (This directive amends the regulations and went into effect in November, 1949.)
- 3. Decree. (This decree went into effect in October, 1949.)

4. An Inspection Report from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Warsaw. (This report was made early in 1951 and refers to the regulations of May, 1949.)

REGULATIONS

In the matter of handling secret and confidential papers.

- 1. (1) The secret papers are those which contain information of such a nature that they ought to be kept secret in the interest of the State. The documents classified as confidential are those which should be kept secret for reasons of the Service.
 - (2) The preservation of secrecy of the contents of documents classified as secret or confidential, is binding upon both parties, and third persons, as well as on all those who are not handling such documents directly. This applies to the personnel in the Central Office of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs as well as the Offices representing it abroad.
- 2. Every employee of the Central, as well as of the Offices abroad of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, is bound on personal responsibility to keep secret the contents of the secret or confidential papers and to see that none of the unauthorized individuals have the access to, or the possession of, or a possibility of obtaining information about the contents of such documents.
- 3. (1) In classifying a document as to its secrecy or confidentiality (for the purpose of preserving its content secret), the party handling it shall be guided by the definition contained in the point #1 of these regulations.
 - (2) The secrecy or confidentiality of a document shall be determined by the party charged with its handling; final responsibility as to its proper classification shall rest with the party signing such a document.
 - (3) If the nature of the incoming correspondence should warrant, it can be declared secret.

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PERMANENT RECORD COPY SURVEY SECTION

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Incoming foreign language correspondence, bearing no classification, as to its secrecy or confidentiality, shall be examined by the chief of the organizational unit, or by an employee designated by him, for the purpose of determining its secret or confidential portent. Correspondence received as secret, or confidential, cannot be considered as public without the consent of the sender.

- The handling of secret and confidential documents in the Ministry's Central Offices, as well as in the offices of its representative units abroad, is conducted according to general instructions on handling of the (paragraphs 2 and 3) general public records, with the following exceptions:
 - (1) The secret and confidential documents shall be registered in a specially designated Record book; the deliveries of such documents shall be made by a person specially authorized for that function.
 - (2) Secret and confidential documents shall be kept in a light pink folder, to differentiate them from the general documents.
 - (3) Internal circulation of the secret and confidential papers small be conducted in sealed envelopes, and may be delivered only upon the signature of the receiving party.
 - (4) The secret, or confidential documents may be transmitted to other organizational units within the Central Office of the Ministry, or other offices, upon the exclusive, written recommendation from the chief of the unit, to whose custody such documents were entrusted. The secret, or confidential documents sent out, or transmitted to other organizational unit, shall be addressed to the chief of that unit, and shall bear distinct indication that it is: "to be delivered in person." The chief of the organizational unit decides who of the employees in his unit shall have access to the secret and confidential documents. Releasing of secret, or confidential documents by the archives of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, is governed by special regulations.
 - (5) The Office of the Ministry shall release the secret and confidential documents to any official authorized by the chief of a Department, or an independent section, upon recording the date and the name of the authorized official to whom such documents were released.

(6) Every employee who has read the secret or confidential document, shall note thereon the date of reading, and his, or her name.

CONTRACTOR CONTRACTOR

- The preparation of the originals of the secret and confidential documents, as a rule, should not be typed in the general typing room. Upon the recommendation of the chief of the organizational unit, secret or confidential documents shall be written personally by the employee handling the matter, rather than by a typist. In cases when such confidential or secret documents must be typed, they shall be turned over to the typist without the precis. If the secret document is to be mimeographed, the responsible party must be present during the time of such an operation.
 - (1) The originals and copies of the secret and confidential papers are prepared only in such quantity, as is indicated by the distribution list noted on the rough copy of the document. The distribution list shall be limited to the absolute minimum, and each copy shall be individually numbered.
 - (2) The originals and copies of secret documents, shall be marked "Secret," or "Confidential" in the right corner, over the text.
 - (3) Throwing into waste basket of rough copies of confidential or secret documents, or of carbon paper, or notes used in connection with the preparation of such documents, is specifically forbidden. There shall be one specially designated employee in every organizational unit (or more, in larger units), of the Central Office of the Ministry, and its posts abroad, who shall collect at the end of each day all the discarded material having connection with the secret and confidential papers. The material thus collected shall be burned each day by said special employees (in the furnaces of the Central Office); Offices abroad shall use such means of burning said waste papers, as will be determined by the chief of the individual Office, depending on the local conditions.
- 6. (1) All secret and confidential papers marked for courier mail delivery, shall be contained in one envelope stamped "Secret," or "Confidential."
 - (2) Secret and confidential papers sent outside by ordinary mail, or by messengers, shall be put in two envelopes. The inside envelope sealed and stamped "Secret" or "Confidential." The outside envelope shall bear no marks of secrecy.

- 7. (1) The secret and confidential documents shall be sealed with a wax seal, or with the ink stamp, as follows:
 - (a) Mail sent by courier shall bear one wax seal in the center of the envelope, and one ink seal in its upper right corner, over the signature of the person sealing the envelope.
 - (b) Inside envelopes of correspondence sent outside, via postal service or messenger, shall bear five wax seals of the dispatching office; moreover, the contents of said envelope shall be laced together with the envelope, the ends of the lacing cord shall be fastened to the center of the envelope, with the wax seal.
 - (2) Care shall be taken not to injure the contents of the envelope when the wax seals are affixed thereon.
- 8. The secret and confidential documents circulated internally between the organizational units of the Ministry, shall be handled in sealed envelopes marked "Secret" or "Confidential," with the seal of the dispatching organizational unit impressed at the sealing point of the envelope.
- 9. (1) All secret and confidential papers shall be filed away in the steel, or armored cabinets exclusively, which shall be sealed at the end of each office day.
 - (2) The seals used for envelopes, and metal seals, shall be put away in the steel cabinets.
 - (3) The keeping of secret or confidential documents on the desk, with exception of those currently handled, is specifically forbidden.

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Warsaw

DIRECTIVE

Regulations pertaining to the handling of secret and confidential papers, have been amended and supplemented, as follows:

- 1. Article 3, Section (2), has been amended to read: "The secrecy or confidentiality of a document shall be determined by the party charged with its handling; final responsibility as to its proper classification, shall rest with the party signing such a document."
- 2. Article 3, Section (3), after the words: ".... can be declared secret," is amplified by the following sentence: "Incoming foreign language correspondence, bearing no classification, as to its secrecy or confidentiality, shall be examined by the chief of the organizational unit, or by an employee designated by him, for the purpose of determining its secret or confidential portent."
- 3. In Article 4, new Section is added. It is numbered (2). Sections (2), (3), (4) are changed to read (3), (4) and (5). The new Section (2) reads as follows: "The secret and confidential documents shall be kept in a light pink folder, to differentiate them from the general documents."
- In Article 4, (presently Section (4), after the words ".... to whose custody such documents were entrusted," new sentence is added, which reads as follows: "The secret, or confidential documents sent out, or transmitted to other organizational unit, shall be addressed to the chief of that unit, and shall bear distinct indication that it is: "to be delivered in person." The chief of the organizational unit decides who of the employees in his unit shall have access to the secret and confidential documents."

- New Section, (6) is added to Article 4. It reads as follows:
 "Every employee who has read the secret or confidential document, shall note thereon the date of reading, and his, or her name."
- 6. In Article 5, after the words, " as a rule should not be typed in the general typing room," this new sentence was added: "Upon the recommendation of the chief of the organizational unit, secret or confidential documents shall be written personally by the employee handling the matter, rather than by a typist. In cases when such confidential or secret documents must be typed, they shall be turned over to typist without the precis."
- 7. In Article 5 (1) following the words: ".... noted on the rough copy of the document," the remaining wording up to (2), shall be crossed out. It shall be substituted with the following: "The distribution list shall be limited to the absolute minimum, and each copy shall be individually numbered."
- 8. New Section, numbered (3), added to Article 5, reads as follows:
 "Throwing into waste baskets of rough copies of confidential
 or secret documents, or of carbon paper, or notes used in connection with the preparation of such documents, is specifically
 forbidden. There shall be one specially designated employee in
 every organizational unit (or more, in larger units), of the
 Central Office of the Ministry, and its posts abroad, who shall
 collect at the end of each day all the discarded material having
 connection with the secret and confidential papers. The material
 thus collected shall be burned each day by said special employees
 (in the furnaces of the Central Office); Offices abroad shall use
 such means of burning said waste papers as will be determined by
 the chief of the individual office, depending on the local
 conditions."
- 9. Article 6, (2), following the words: "Secret and confidential papers sent," is amplified by the word: "outside."
- 10. Article 7, Section (1), letter (b), following the words: "inside envelopes of correspondence sent," is amplified by adding the word: "Outside."
- 11. New Article is added. It is numbered 8; the Article now bearing No. 8, will be numbered 9. The new Article 8 reads as follows:

 "The secret and confidential documents circulated internally between the organizational units of the Ministry, shall be handled

in sealed envelopes marked "Secret" or "Confidential," with the seal of the dispatching organizational unit impressed at the sealing point of the envelope."

- 12. Article 9, Section (1), has been amended as follows: After the words ".... steel, or armored cabinets exclusively," this statement was added: "which shall be sealed at the end of each office day."
- 13. Article 9 was further amended by adding Section No. (3), which reads as follows: "The keeping of secret or confidential documents on the desk, with exception of those currently handled, is specifically forbidden."

DECREE

In order to prevent the spreading of information, which for the good of the People's Poland should be kept secret and, to prevent such information from penetrating to centers inimical to People's Poland, the Council of Ministers has resolved the following decree, which was duly ratified by the Council of State:

CHAPTER I

General Regulations

Article I,

- a) Secrets of the State are, all such information, documents, or objects, which by reasons of the defense, security or important economic or political interest to Poland, or the countries friendly to her, cannot be accessible to other than the exclusively authorized persons.
- b) The Council of Ministers can define in detail the extent of information, documents, or other objects which may constitute the State secrets, by adopting a resolution to that effect.

Article II,

Secrets of the Service are, such information, documents or other objects, which by reason of the good of the service, cannot be made accessible to other than the exclusively authorized persons.

CHAPTER II

Penal Regulations

Article III,

Any unauthorized person who gathers, keeps, transmits, discloses or publicizes the information, document, or other objects constituting the State secret, is subject to penalty of 10 years in prison.

- a) Any functionary who in the course of his service, commits the crime, as defined in Article I, with reference to secret information, documents, or other objects, will be subject to prison penalty.
- b) If the perpetrator of the crime as defined in Articles I and II, acted unintentionally, such person will be subject to prison penalty up to 3 years, or an arrest.

Article IV,

- a) Any unauthorized person who gathers, keeps, transmits, discloses, or publicizes the information, documents or other objects constituting the State secrets, affecting the defense, or the security of the State, is subject to prison penalty.
- b) If the crime, as defined in Article I, concerning the information, documents, or other objects, is committed by a clerk (functionary, official) having the access to such State secrets in connection with his service, such person is subject to prison penalty of not less than 3 years.
- c) If the perpetrator of the crime, as defined in Articles I and II, acted unintentionally, such person shall be subject to prison penalty up to five years.

Article V.

a) Offenders against the orders issued by authorities for the protection of State secrets, shall be punishable by one year of prison, or an arrest.

- b) If due to an action, as defined in Article I, State secret was disclosed, or could have been disclosed, the offender shall be subject to prison penalty up to 3 years, or an arrest.
- c) If the culprit acted unintentionally in committing the offense defined in Article II, such person shall be subject to prison penalty up to 1 year, or an arrest.
- d) If the crime, as defined in Articles I, II or III, is committed by an official while in the service, the court may impose a penalty half again as high as the maximum penalty provided for a given crime.

Article VI,

- a) Offenses against the orders issued by authorities for the protection of State secrets affecting the defense, or the security of the State, are punishable by prison penalty up to three years, or an arrest.
- b) If due to an action defined in Article I, a State secret is disclosed, or could have been disclosed, the offender shall be subject to prison penalty up to five years.
- c) If the offender, as defined in Article II, acted unintentionally, such person is subject to prison sentence up to two years, or an arrest.
- d) If the crime defined in Articles I, II and III, is committed by an official while in service, the court may impose a penalty half again as high as the maximum penalty provided for a given crime.

Article VII,

- a) An official (clerk, functionary) who suffers the documents or other objects constituting the State secrets entrusted to him, to become lost, and if such act caused, or would have caused disclosure of the State secret, shall be subject to prison sentence of 10 years.
- b) If the offender acted unintentionally, the penalty shall be up to three years in prison, or an arrest.

Article VIII,

- a) An official(clerk, functionary) who suffers the documents, or other objects constituting the State secrets affecting the defense or the security of the State to become lost, while said documents are in his custody; and if such act caused, or would have caused the disclosure of such State secret, shall be subject to a prison sentence.
- b) If the offender acted unintentionally, the prison penalty shall be up to five years.

Article IX.

- a) Any unauthorized person who transmits, divulges, or makes publicly known the secrets of the Service, shall be liable to prison penalty up to three years, or arrest up to 3 years.
- b) If the crime defined in Article I, is committed by an official (clerk, functionary) who has access to secrets of the Service by reason of his connection with it, such person is liable to prison penalty up to five years.
- c) If the offender, as defined in Article I or II, acted unintentionally he shall be subject to prison penalty up to two years.

Article X,

- a) Any official (clerk, functionary) acting against the directives issued by authorities for the protection of Service secrets, shall be subject to a penalty up to one year arrest.
- b) If due to an action, as defined in Article I, a Service secret is disclosed, or would have been disclosed, the offender shall be liable to an imprisonment up to 3 years, or an arrest up to three years.
- c) If the act, as defined in Article II, is committed unintentionally, the culprit shall be liable to an arrest up to one year.

Article XI,

In cases of a lesser import, the court may administer extraordinary mitigation of the penalty.

Article XII,

Penal liability affecting officials (clerks, functionaries) extends also to members of the collegiate bodies of publicly legal character, trade union bodies, as well as social and political organizations. This is in addition to persons mentioned in Article 292 of the Penal Code, and Article 46 of the Decree, on the particularly dangerous crimes during the period of reconstruction of the State.

CHAPTER III

Concluding provisions.

Article XIII.

- a) Proper judicial institutions to handle cases resultant from the commission of crimes, as defined in Articles III to VIII, are the Military Courts.
- b) Military Courts can impose prison sentences for terms up to 15 years.
- c) Provisions in Article 54 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, and Article 55 of the Decree on crimes, (particularly dangerous during the period of country's reconstruction, shall be comformably applied.

Article XIV.

Proper juridical institutions to handle matters arising from crimes defined in Articles IX and X, are the Apellate Courts.

Article XV.

State supreme authorities shall issue directives to secure the protection of State secret.

Article XVI.

The force of Articles 289 of Penal Code, and 159 and 160 of Polish Army Penal Code, shall terminate, to be superseded by this

Decree, on the day when this Decree comes into force.

Article XVII,

Charged with the execution of this Decree are: president of the Council of Ministers, Chairman of the State Economic Flanning Commission, and Ministers of, Public Security, National Defense, Justice and other Ministers.

Article XVIII,

This Decree comes into force after 10 days from the day of its publication.

Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Warsaw

(Confidential.)

- (1) To Citizen chiefs of Organizational cells of the Ministry's Central Office.
- (2) Chiefs of Poland's posts abroad.

The inspections carried out in the Central Office of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, and in some of its offices abroad, revealed several cases of laxity in the enforcement of secrecy regulations in connection with the handling of secret and confidential documents.

For an example, such cases, as keeping secret and confidential documents in the desks, sometimes even unlocked, in violation of point #9 of the promulgated regulations. Seel and armored cabinets not sealed, as required by point 4, Section 6; not every employee observed the rule of noting his, or her name, and the date, after reading the secret, or confidential paper, etc. At the same time it was noted, that offices and desks of the employees, often showed lack of sense of order and elementary personal culture.

In connection with the above, and independently of the sanctions applied to the offenders, it is hereby enjoined:

- 1. All chiefs of organizational cells in the Central Offices of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, and all chiefs of its offices abroad, are charged with personal responsibility for the strict observance of regulations pertaining to handling of secret and confidential documents, in units under their supervision.
- 2. All chiefs of organizational cells in the Ministry, and chiefs of its offices abroad, are bound to carry out without delay, the briefing of the personnel in their charge, at which time all shall be reminded of the far reaching political importance of the Decree covering the protection of the State and Service secrets; also to take up at that time, the matter of

handling secret and confidential papers, having in mind especially, the importance of the problems of work in the Foreign Affairs Department.

The substance of pertinent regulations shall be discussed in detail at such briefings, calling particular attention to the specific duty of keeping the secret and confidential documents in steel and armored cabinets. Other important documents should be kept under lock in file cabinets or desks, but only in cases of lack of room for them in the steel or armored cabinets. It is also necessary to discuss the matter of culture in the places of work (about the care and regard for the property of the State; keeping the files in exemplary order, office supplies, etc.). Copies of the minutes of such briefings, should be sent to the Independent Organizational Section in the Central office of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

3. Chiefs of the organizational cells and chiefs of the posts abroad, shall maintain systematic control over units under their supervision, with regard to individual performances in connection with the regulations on handling secret and confidential documents. Any infractions in this connection shall be promptly reported to the Bureau of Personnel in the Central office of the Ministry. In exercising such control, attention should be given also to the neatness in places of work (see Point 2).

Warsaw

Instructions Governing the Behavior of Personnel of the Diplomatic Outposts in Case of Arrest, Search and Interrogation.

Diplomatic Personnel

The diplomatic personnel registered on the diplomatic list is entitled to full privileges and immunities as set forth by international law. A diplomat cannot be arrested, or searched, or interrogated as a witness.

In connection with the above principle, the following rules should be observed:

- 1. The arrest actually is unlawful, however, it is possible to detain a diplomat if such action is necessary for public safety or the maintenance of public order. After establishing the cause of the incident, he should be immediately released. It is obvious that a diplomat should never, through his own conduct, create such a situation.
- 2. It is unlawful to search diplomatic personnel or items in their possessions, either official or personal.
- 3. It should especially be emphasized that the privileged situation of diplomats has for its purpose not so much the creation of personal privileges as the assurance of independence from local authorities, necessary for the proper discharge of functions. A diplomat is not permitted to abuse his privileges for personal gains and thus he should be very cautious so as not to expose himself to charges of abusing these privileges. However, it is possible that the search, although illegal, leads to the acquirement of evidence of unlawful activity which consequently justifies the original unlawful act.
- 4. In case of arrest, search or interrogation, one should, above all, show his diplomatic credentials which should always be carried on the person, and protest against the action. If the protest is ineffective, the member of the diplomatic corps should demand that he be permitted to communicate with the one in charge of the outpost. When informing him of the action, one should do it by telephone; simultaneously, he should demand that the representatives of the authorities immediately communicate with their Ministry of Foreign Affairs to inform them that he is invoking the use of legitimate privileges and immunities. One should explain the illegality of the procedure. One should not, however, confess in the manner of an accused and should refuse to sign any submitted documents, stating that a member of the diplomatic corps is not subject to the jurisdiction of the local authorities. Notwithstanding provocative misconduct of these authorities, the diplomat is obliged to retain his composure and avoid all words as well as actions not conforming with the dignity of his position.

You are not permitted to use abusive language, attempt to flee or resort to force, and one should limit himself to legitimate protests covered by the law and should conduct himself satisfactorily, which action will merit more respect.

- 5. The head of the diplomatic outpost, on being notified of the injustice to the person of one of his co-workers, should protest immediately to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the country in question, demanding the punishment of the guilty and complete satisfaction, which varies depending on the incident, but which always requires a public apology for the perpetrated injury and punishment of the guilty. One should also notify immediately one's Central Office of the facts, giving a report of the incident for the purpose of obtaining further instructions. If the incident has not been satisfactorily handled, it should then be submitted to the Dean of the Diplomatic Corps for his intervention in the incident. One should only do this if the head of the outpost, taking into consideration local circumstances, deems such action necessary and appropriate.
- 6. At no time are you permitted to give statements or explanations beyond those which concern routine matters connected with the incident. One should categorically decline making any statements of a personal and official nature.
- 7. If it concerns testifying in the manner of a witness or other capacity before the court, or some local authority to which the member of the diplomatic corps has been summoned to appear, one should before-hand obtain permission of the Central Office, which in certain instances may permit the member of the outpost to waive his immunity. In principle, the diplomat can be interrogated only in the office of the outpost and only by a representative of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the country and not by a judge or police officer.
- 8. The living quarters of members of the diplomatic corps are immune. Therefore, one should categorically protest against any attempted search. If the local authorities do not withdraw, one should, immediately inform the head of the outpost who will take proper steps with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the country.

Non - Diplomatic Personnel

The legal situation and the rights of administrative and official employees of outposts, who are citizens of foreign countries, are not uniformly regulated. Some countries grant them the same rights as those granted diplomatic personnel, others deny these rights. In connection with the latter:

- 1. Those employees, not registered on the diplomatic list should, in principle, conduct themselves in a manner identical with the members of the diplomatic corps. However, if local practices or customs do not grant them privileges, they should comply with the rules set forth hereinafter:
- 2. They should not enter into agreements or incur obligations of such a nature which could, in the event of failure to live up to such obligations, serve as a pretext for action by local administrative and judicial authorities.
- 3. They should always be aware of the risk of being searched or detained by the police and for this reason, should exercise caution in connection with the performance of their functions.
- 4. In case of detainment, arrest or appearance at police headquarters for the purpose of being searched, they should demand that their superior be notified immediately.
- 5. In an attempted search, if there are on the person official documents, notes, or some other materials connected with their work, they should immediately advise the representatives of the local authorities about the nature of these documents and refuse consent to be searched, demand the presence of the proper member of the diplomatic outpost, who, on his arrival, will confirm the official nature of the documents. You are also not permitted to consent to the search of private documents until the representative of the outpost arrives. A representative, who is to take care of such matters, should be appointed permanently by the head of the outpost. If none exists, the head of the outpost should appoint an employee for specific incidents.
- 6. Upon arrival of the representative of the outpost, the employee should give him an explanation of the matter, and if the local authorities continue to demand the documents or official notes, he should categorically refuse them. The representative of the outpost should, in this case, immediately communicate with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the country and demand protection for the official documents.

The representative of the outpost should, moreover, secure all letters and official correspondence found in the quarters of the said employee and transfer them to the outpost headquarters.

7. In case of a trial, the employee should avoid making any statements without the presence of a representative of the diplomatic outpost. And even after his arrival and in his presence, the investigated employee should not, in any case, give information concerning matters with which he is acquainted in view of his position. He can agree to further interrogation in unofficial matters, only after the appointment of a defense attorney, and if the local laws permit, he should demand his attorney's presence at the trial.

- 8. In case of arrest or search of the employee, the chief of the outpost should immediately submit a protest to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the country in question asserting that the authorities should have informed him beforehand and request an explanation. He should demand the immediate release of the arrested party unless the presented evidence convinces him that the party is involved in an offense or act not connected with the execution of official duties.
- 9. During the period of detainment, the arrested employee is obliged to refuse to give any statements in matters connected with his official duties or give information about the office and its employees.
- 10. The above observations relate also to the office of Ambassador or Envoy, if it concerns Polish citizens.

During his stay at this camp at the time from 12 to 18 October 1957, the accused was submitted to am interrogation at the Clayalles, and in the vicinity of the Olympic Stadium by agents of the American and British secret service about his personal data, family status, the way he came to West Berlin, problems of places of employment, where the accused was appointed in Poland, finication of military units at Zgierz, army airports and aircrafts. The accused gave to the secret service agents detailed information, except information about airports and radar stations. As experse the dislocation of military units at Zgierz, he said at which streets they were located.

On Oct.18,1957 the accused with his wife together was directed to the building situated at 115 Kurfurstendams at seat Berlin, where he lived up to Nov.1957, and then he was transported to Frankfurt on Main, and afterwards to the DP camp called "Valka "/?/ near Narnberg.

In this camp the accused remained up to 10th or 11th December 1957, and was again interrogated by the American and German secret service, with analogical questions as

that in West Berlin, Later the accused was at the camp at Zindorf near Murnberg, where he worked as automobile mechanic, at the repair shop of the American Army, Warth, Semmany, near Zirndorf. 1192

In January 1958 the accused became acquainted with two agents of the American secret service, namedDudek and Sekuna. At the first meetings they presented they self

as members of charitative organizations, and proposed to help him in his stops, he made for getting a permit to enter the United States, where lived his uncle.

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During the followin, meetings Dudek and Sekuna informed the accused that they were agents of the American secret service, and proposed him a cooperation with the secret service; the accused accepted this proposal in April 1988. In this connection the accused signed an obligation to return by illegal way to Poland, for recruiting for espionage his brother-in-law Franciszek Suszek, residing at Lubsk. The accused was then transported to Hanan, 55 Ertzbergerstr., where he lived with his wife.

During april and May 1958 the accused underwent under the direction of Dudek a training in espionage, especially as concerns the passing of the frontier, and means of recruitment of new agents for espionage.

After having passed the training in espionage the accused was transported by a plane again to Wist-Berlin, where he was submitted to a supplementary training in espionage by an agent of the American secret service named Taller concerning means for passing the frontier, and he were received the order to enter in contact with this agent after his returning back from Poland, what was planned for the beginning of June 1958. The accused received false/documents issued to the name of Jozef Stark, and Polish documents to the name Merian Stopczyk, and after having met his guide, he betook himself in the direction of the Polish Erontier. The task of the accused was to go to Poland and to recruit for esplonage his brother-in-law Franciszek Suszek. to let him sign an obligation about his cooperation, and to buy three new badges of military formations and service hidges/ On May 29,1958 at about 1 oblock the accused was arrested at the frontier zone by the frontier police of the German Democr. Rep., and on July 18,1958 transmitted to Polish authorities.

The accused of all law suit that he re whed information eccus militer units at Zgierz, known to him, and that he agreed to so parate with the American secrets service, and in result of this he undertook the obligation to return in an illegal manner to Poland, and to recruit for cooperation Franciszek Suszek, and to buy several badges of army formations.

The accused added that when leaving to Poland in May 1958 he had the intention, after having passed the frontier, to present himself at the Polish authorities, and to report about his activities, and therefore he found it useful to let the frontier service of the G.D.R. to arrest him, in spite of the order given by his guide to accelerate the crossing of the frontier. The accused explained that he does not gave detailed information to the American secret service about the location of military units at Zgierz; and that he aggreed to cooperate in aspionage because of difficult financial conditions into which he fell in Germany.

On ground of deposition of witnesses Maksimilian Wojciahowaki and Antoni Ziolkowski, who were at the same samps
in the Germ. Fed. Rep., as the accused, it results that
agents of the American, British and German sewret service
interrogated persons living in that camps, trying to get
from them interesting information. The witness sojciechowski said that he met the accused end 1957 at one of these
eamps, and that the accused was interested in the possibility to return to Poland.

From the seized documents at the moment when the secured was arrested /card 115,117 and 119, val.1st/ it results that the accused was arrested in the course of earrying-out his task of apy.

From letters written by the accused to Wladyslaw Smels of May 4,1958/card 154-II/ and to Izabela Klempka of July 14, 1957/card 159-I/ it results that he had the intention to escape to the G.F.R. much earlier, as he reported it

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to the dours, saided that this occured suddenly on Ost.12, 1957 during his visit at west Berlin.

The accused changed in law suit his explanations given in inquiry/Card <4)-II/, stating that he does not cited the names of streets, where military units were located at Zgierz, explaining that such discrepancy occured because he was tired in inquiry. The Court found that this statement was made by the accused with the intention to diminish his guilt, as it is logical that anyone who is tired, omitts some details, but it seems not probable that he cites such details which really do not occured, therefore the Court accepted as trustwork that information which was given on card 24j-II in inquiry.

As it results from the official writ of the Armed Forces Staff no 0116//I of Oct.27,1958, information given to a foreign secret service about location of military units at Zgierz is qualified as a revealment of military secrets. The accused who was interrogated at camps at the German Fed.Rep. was aware that he gives such information to agents of a foreign secret service.

The accused inspite of explanations given in inquiry, reported in law suit a circumstance till now not mentioned, namely that although he signed the obligation to ecoperate with the American secret service, he was not intended to put into effect such obligation, because he wished, instead to go to Poland, to remain for a certain time at his sister in the Germ. Dem. Rep., but this became impossible because of the presence of the guide attached to him in west Berlin. All the explanations given by the accused do not blot-out his penal responsability, because his agreement to cooperate with the American secret service, and steps made by him in order to put into effect this cooperation give the proof of his real criminal activity.

Witnesses Gibek and Suszek, relatives of the accused, revealed nothin directly about his activity, as their depositions related to their correspondence with the accused only.


Stanislawa (stella) USTROASKA

Mrs. Ostrowska's son, Andrzej Ostrowski, born February 7, 1544 in Warsaw has been arrested by Polish counterintelligence and accused of spying for the United States. She realizes that little can be done for him, but she fears for herself since she has pending an application for an American passport. A special military prosecutor called on her and interrugated her. (She did not give a mame, but referred to him as "the Colonel".) She says that her son left Poland for Nestern Europe three years ago. He was to go to Switzerland. She had not heard from his since and did not know that he was in Poland until told of his arrest.
