As Philippine civil ans, we were never told why we had been imprisoned. . . . We just disappeared. Prisoners were allowed no visitors, no children to give them a "cheery greeting." As for playing mahjong, we were tied together on long bench and not allowed to stretch for hours. How many ever knew the "luxury of a hath" except by their own sweat in those dark unsanitary dungeons? We wore the same clothes for weeks, months, in some unfortunate cases for years. We certainly stank. Our food was not fit for pigs.

Those who died had no minister and did their own praying in the midst of torture . . . too sordid to reval.

Though the hoard's supporters did include some left-wing groups. it also included the League of Women Voters, church organizations, the P.T.A.-ED.

Ugo Mochi is an Italian-born artist who started cutting paper dolls at the age of 4 and has been doing cutouts in one shape or another ever since. Today, at 63, he is the world's greatest exponent of the little known but difficult art of outline. On these pages are samples of his extremely delicate work, published this month in Hoofed Mammals of the World, written by T. Donald Carter (Scribner's, \$15).

To make his cutouts, Mochi takes a black piece of paper and with a lithographer's knife painstakingly cuts out the areas which appear as white in the finished work. Bach design, including animals and background, is cut from a single sheet of paper. Mochi's work has a lifelike feeling of depth and movement, but the most remarkable thing is that the 298 different animals in the book are accurate in every detail of outline.

SHADOW OF FEAR FALLS ON BERLIN
}
"At night the streets that mark the frontier between East and West Berlin become an ecrie no man's land," Lire's Roy Rowan cabled last week as he and Photographer Ralph Crane completed a week's inspection of the former German capital, once again threatened by the Communists. "Walking down deserted border streets, we felt that Berlin had suddenly lost every inhabitant. Even the policemen seemed barely more than shadows."
The Communists, who had left the halves of the divided city open to one another even during the Berlin Blockade in 1948, were now physically sealing West Berlin from the East. The barriers grew to the accompaniment of Communist threats that West Berlin could expect "further isolation, impoverishment and danger." It was not yet clear just what East Germany's Russian masters had in mind. They may have nerved themselves to try another blockade before West Germany ratifies the Bonn peace treaties with the West. They may feel they have to act before

President Eisenhower's administration is ready to implement its determination, stated by U.S. High Commissioner James B. Conant, "to see to it that this city continues as an unshaken outpost of the Western world."
Rowan described the barricades-"An ugly rash of steel rail, wood and barbed wire blossoming like sinister spring flowers all along the border dividing East and West Berlin. Where Reds had not yet erected street barriers wary pedestrians suddenly became acutely conscious of where they stepped. For an hour we watched people leaving a subway exit in Potsdamer Platz, where British, American and Soviet sectors join. Reaching the street, people started to walk casually away, then froze in their tracks, refusing to move until a policeman pointed where they could and could not walk to stay safely in the West. 'Each day it gets a little worse,' a young woman said. 'A little worse, what does that matter?' an old man muttered. 'Do the Russians come or don't they? That is all that matters.'"

\section*{MORE TENSION, MORE REFUGEES}

West Berlin's already grievous problems were immensely complicated by East Germans scampering to get through that remaining gateway to freedom while there was still time. Forty-one thousand have flocked across the lorder in the last month, 3,500 in one record day. Each refugee from Communism was another mouth to feed, another body to shelter, another need for work where 260,000 were already jobless.

The routes by which the refugees could come grew slimmer, fewer and more dangerous as the Communists systematically went about tightening their grip. The best way still open was the Berlin elevated railway, but the Reds were busy shifting tracks and switches around Friedrichstrasse, a large East Berlin station, a portent that this route might be cut soon. Tram lines were already torn up or barricaded with steel and streets were blocked by felled trees, "triple-ripple" bumps to break the springs of speeding autos, and zealous, hard-eyed guards. Sometimes the Communists did things which were merely ridiculous or spiteful: they sent out women conductors on all intersector streetcar lines, knowing that West Berlin has an ordinance against women crews.

Berlin is guarded by two police forces which are as much enemies as North and South Koreans. West Berlin's police chief runs his outfit like an army, with maps showing disposition of Communist police force. He also has prisoners of the cold war-over 600 members of the Red force who fled the East zone for refuge in West Berlin's police headquarters.

\section*{a BESIEGED CITY's WILL to CARRY ON}

In the crisis Mayor Ernst Reuter prepared for a trip to Washington to seek more help to back up America's pledge to West Berlin. But al ready Reuter and his administration, wise in the ways of Red blockades and determined to survive, had done a lot to help themselves "Great mountains of coal, grain and dehydrated vegetables-enough to keep West Berlin alive for a year-are pouring into city lots and warehouses," Reporter Rowan cabled. "The city has stockpiled 350 million marks ( \(\$ 82,300,000\) ) worth of critical supplies.

Meanwhile, West Berlin's two million people did whatever they could to make living seem usual. Barred from normal movement to and fro across the city and with even intersec tor telephones cut off by the Reds, they still gathered at the barricades to meet and talk with their relatives and friends through the barbed wire. And when the weather turned unseasonably warm last week, Rowan found them crowding the sidewalk cafes to drink a Ber liner's traditional toast to spring in bock beer.

The congressional investigation of Communism on the campus is accompanied by the usual cries of "witch hunt," only louder and more premature. The uproar bespeaks the special sensitivity of college teachers on academic freedom; but it also beclouds the civic issues involved. Here are facts to keep in mind before deciding whether this is a witch hunt or not:
1) There are almost certainly some Communist teachers in some U.S. universities. Whether they should be allowed to teach has been the subject of furious academic debate for several years. A few universities have made a decision and conscientiously fired their presumed Communists. A smaller number, who may evidently look for support from Senator Taft, will perhaps defend their Communist teachers. Either of these stands is honorable. But most universities have just argued themselves into an agony of doubt.
2) Congress has a right to find out practically anything it can. As President Eisenhower said last week, it would be most unwise to circumscribe this power. The way it is used depends on the good sense and manners of congressmen.
3) It is too bad that Congressman Velde and Senators Jenner and McCarthy are not men of better sense and manners. A leading Unitarian, the Rev. A. Powell Davics of Washington, D.C., raised a novel point-one well within his religious jurisdiction-when he called them "morally unfitted for such an undertaking. . . What will be the effect upon young people . . . when they sce their teachers 'investigated' by men who are reckless with accusations and careless with truth?"
4) From the effect on youth feared by the Rev. Dr. Davies, the silent plea to avoid questions on the grounds of selfincrimination affords no escape. The Fifth Amendment is for the protection of witnesses who have reason to fear a criminal indictment. It is not a crime to avow Communism; the crime is conspiracy. Teachers who quote the amendment, however quixotic their motives, are therefore logically suspect of criminal behavior. Said President Lewis Webster Jones of

Rutgers, "For members of a university faculty to refuse to give a rational account of their position on vital community issues not only cannot he defended by an appeal to academic freedom, hut in fact cuts the ground out from under academic frcedom itself."
5) The purpose of the investigation is to expose Communists, not to hound "unpopular views." If the congressmen exceed this limited purpose, they can and should be denounced and so should trustees who are cowed by them. But so far it is the teachers who seem cowed. The nervous flap among faculties and students is perhaps the most disgraceful aspect of the investigation to date. The atmosphere will not be de-poisoned by blaming it on Velde \(\&\) Co., but by exercising academic freedom with confidence and courage.

To all college officials we recommend a memorandum which President George Shuster of Hunter College sent to his faculty last fall.
"When I hear that younger members of the staff, particularly those without tenure, are warned not to act as faculty advisers to student clubs having a political character. I am decply shocked. No victory the Communist party could possibly win in this country would be more decisive than would be success in depriving younger instructors of an opportunity to give the leadership which only they can provide. . . .
"Far from gazing upon willingness to share in student enthusiasn:s and even in sludent mistakes as an indication of brashness, I am hereby inssting to all chairmen and administrative officers of the college that they look with special benerolence on those members of the staff who do not succumb to current fears but who roll up their slecves and go to work. Suppose the situation does involve certain dangers. If we can ask a Marine to go up a Korean hill with a grenade in each hand, we can surely expect an instructor in Hunter College not to tremble for the safety of his wife and children if he sits down an evening and listens to students discuss General Eisenhower or the size of the New York City welfare budget."

\section*{A COUPLE OF WELCOME UPSETS}

Political dogma-like war, sport and love-is subject to startling reversals of form. A couple of surprises last week were not only interesting but, for a change, pleasant.

For more than half a century now, a huge amount of this country's liberal and leftist thought has been devoted to attacking and regulating U.S. business. Republican liberals like Theodore Roosevelt were in this movement, but its high priest was Louis D. Brandeis, a Boston Mugwump-Democrat (later a Supreme Court justice) whose slogan, "the curse of bigness," was the movement's shibboleth. The New Deal, while in two minds about the antitrust laws, inherited all the passion of this trust-busting, big-business-baiting tradition. During the New and Fair Deals any outfit-no matter how exemplary-that was really big could count on having trouble from Washington. The government's attempt to dissolve the A \& P chain was a case in point.

All the more surprising, then, was the publication last week of Big Business: A New Era, written by David E. Lilienthal, a New Deal charter member, former chairman of the TVA and also of the Atomic Energy Commission. Mr. Lilienthal can't see anything to be ashamed of in the bigness of our Big Business and comes right out and says so: "Size is our greatest single functional asset." He calls for a complete
"change in feeling" toward Big Business, such as he himself has experienced. Clouds of black, crackling smoke must be billowing out of the late Justice Brandeis' grave.

Lilienthal deserves a reasoned argument from some modern Brandeis; for in calling off the business-baiters, he falls into the opposite error of wanting to "subordinate" competition and antitrust policy to vaguer criteria of "the public interest." Bigness, competition and the antitrust laws are not incompatible, and we hope all are here to stay.

Last week's second political surprise was in a pamphlet, Democratic Socialism by Norman Thomas, the veteran Socialist who has run six times for president. Although still critical of our political and economic setup, Thomas has now abandoned virtually all of his early collectivism. He sees no relevance in the class struggle, thinks government ownership is far from being a panacea, is against an omnipotent state and an omnipotent working class. Such belieis run counter to the classic dogmas of Socialism, but Norman Thomas, a great dissenter and a good American, always calls 'em as he sees 'em.

We haven't been so pleasantly surprised since the time, a couple of years ago, when that old agnostic, Bertrand Russell, declared himself unreservedly in favor of Christian !ove.

Even when he went home for the last time from the U.S. Senate 27 years ago, Fighting Bob La Follette was saluted affectionately by thousands who turned out for the old Progressive's funeral. Last week Fighting Bob's son, Young Bob, returned in death to Madison. The setting was the same,

Young Bob had grown up in politics. He was

5 when his father was governor, 10 when Old Bob went to the U.S. Senate. Appointed as his father's successor in the Senate, Young Bob batted Republicans and Democrats alike when they opposed his social reforms. Both as a parliamentarian and as chairman of a Senate committee which exposed frightful working conditions in industry he even earned the respect of his opponents. Three times he was

\section*{A lawyer plays in Rio while his creditors worry}

Maurice Weinzelbaum was often called Chicago's "Million Dullar Kid.." A 44-year-old lawyer with mysterious sources of income and a taste for rich living, he had 200 pairs of shoes, an expensive electrically operated desk, an attractive blond wife in his Lake Shore Drive apartment and dozens of wealthy creditors willing to lend large sums for his investment schemes. He rarely paid off principal on these loans. But he gave \(10 \%\) interest and his investors felt sure their fortunes were mounting.
Six weeks ago the Million Dollar Kid suddenly dropped Irom sight after a warrant was issued charging him with passing a check for \(\$ 10,000\) which bounced. When this news got out droves of Weinzellaum's unpaid creditors started turning up all over the country and there were dozens of others, the stories went, who were keeping quiet. A bankruptey suit was launched involving 48 people and charging that Weinzelbaum owed them more than \(\$ 400,000\) on bad checks, forgotten loans, nonexistent "get-rich-quick" schemes.
Soon Maurice reappeared. But not in Chicago. He was in Rio de Janciro -"for his health." Most runaways try to hide. Not Maurice. He was out dancing in the street (opposite page) and posing for fumby pictures (above). He was not even running away, he explained, and all his hulhut, was merely the malicious work of his wife.
In Chicago, as Mrs. Weinzelhaum gasped at pictures of Weinzulbaum dancing in Rio, she was suing for divorce. "He loved to buy things and he had wonderful taste," she recalled, "but he broke two of my fingers when I asked him about all these people calling about checks and thing."

The administration was busy with its B's. Butter, it cost too much. Beef, there was too much of it. \section*{Chinese Reds arrange a reunion in Lhasa for the two Tibetan deities}

In the land of Tibet the mecting of the two youths above should have been a holv, historic event. One youlh is the 17 -year-old Dalai Lama (Life, April \(23,19.51\) ), the other the 15 -vear-old Panchen Lama. Booh are regarded as living gods and reincarnations of Buddha. Theoretically the Dalai Lama is the temporal leader of Tibet and the Panchen Lama is the spiritual leader. But in 1923, after one of their squabbles, the Panchen Lama of that time fled to China, leaving the Dalai Lama in control. In the years since, hoth lamas died, but their successors
still did not meet until this conference at Lhasa. The Tibetans might have been overjoyed at the get-together except that it was arranged by the Chi nese Communists who had taken over their country in 1951. After 42 days at Lhasa, during which he discussed metaphysics and Marxism with the Dalai Lama, the Panchen Iama left for Shigatse in western Tibet, where he will live in a "Palace of the Western Paradise." But he planned to return to Lhasa to work out a joint administration of Tibet, presumably after details have been worked out by Red advisers.

\section*{Dulles doodles an anti-Dulles thought and Magsaysay becomes available}

Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, a confirmed doodler, was whiling away the time as usual at a meting of the House Foreign Affairs Committee. A reporter studying the doodle was astonished to see

a violently anti-Dulles sentiment among the other scribblings. But the Secretary explained that he had merely been copying the Communist Daily \(H\) orker slogan, not making a statement of policy.

Pointing up the glohal nature of Communism, the Hungarian government last week offered the British Forcign Office an unusual trade: Hungary would release Edgar Saunders, a British businessman serving a 13year prison term as a "spy" if lbritain would release Lec Ten Tai, alias Lee Meng, Chinese Commonist guerrilla girl who is to be executed in Malaya.

\section*{Quirino loses a cabinet minister}

Ramon Magsaysay, Philippine defense secretary who has led the fight against the Hukbalahap Communists (Life, Feb. 10. 1951), resigned last week from the cahinet of President Elpidio Quirino. He found it difficult, Magsaysay declared, to remain in an administration that tolerated conditions favorable to Communism. The resignation cleared the way for Magsiaysay to become a candidate for the presidency. He did not say whether he would stay with the liberals and light Quirino for the nomination, or join the Nacionalista party of former puppet president Jose Laurel, or form his own party.

The Ciril Aeronautics Administration has been keeping track of the different uses Americuns find for their planes. The CAA figures that last vear planes flew 6.320 hours delivering chichs, 2.618 hours making rain, 5.387 hours chasing birds from rice fields and pecan orchards. 2.868 hours baiting grasshoppers and 90 hours "agitating cherry trees."

\section*{Yugoslavia veers Westward}

Yugoslavia, Europe's only Communist country not dominated by Russia, swung sharply toward the West last week. It indicated that it had abandoned attempts to collectivize land in the Russian manner and would henceforth model its land reform on

Western cooperatives. Then Yugoslav Vice President Edvard Kradelj said his country was willing \(t o\) join a collective security organization such as NATO, and two days later Yugoslavia agreed with the NATO nations of Crecce and Turkey on the terms of a friendship and collaboration treaty to maintain peace. Other Balkan countries, the three nations suggested hopefully, would be welcome additions to the pact.

The vice trial of Mickey Jelke (Lafe, Feb. 23, March 2) ended when the jury found Jelke guiliy on two counts of compulsory prostitution hut recommended mercy.

\section*{Lodge dodges Russian handshake}

As the U.N. General Assembly convened in New York, Korea was still the main problem and the subject of the same old arguments. The only noticeable change in the U.S. position was that chief delegate Henry Cabot Ladge refused to pose shaking hands with Russian delegate Andrei Vishinsky. Secretary of State Dulles said there was no policy directise on the matter and that he himself would not be willing to shake-unless Vishinsky extended his hand lirst.

Last month, to the amazement and inexpressible delight of museum officials, an art dealer brought in the missing section to ask the museum experts to evaluate it. When it was identilied, the dealer donated it to the museum and Thutmose III (or Amenophis II) was put together again.

Too ill to face trial after the war, he lived on for eight more years, dying last week at 77 .

But notably. as a Republican, he was one of the first of his party to gauge the long road the nation has come as a responsible international power since the first days of the republic when a total of six personnel including: the Secertary was all that was necessary for the conduct of foreign affairs.

From "Foggy Bottom," the cleared swamp supporting the main State Department building ( \(p .60\) ), Dulles directs an organization which has grown to 10,806 domestic employes and 20,719 in the foreign service. Overseas the careermen continue State's ancient chores of negotiating treaties, helping U.S. businessmen, issuing visas, hailing out U.S. citizens who get involved with local constabularies and recording the births of U.S. infants born abroad.

But with the coming of the cold war new urgencies and new tasks have been added. One of these is in the area of propaganda, which was once a dirty word. Today, to spread U.S. propaganda, State maintains 196 information centers and 34 binational cultural centers in 64 nations and over the controversial Voice of America beams in 46 languages to the
earth's far corners. It is the cold war's urgency that has outdated the striped-pants diplomat. Today State also means a young girl from Charleston feeding pamphlets about the U.S. to the citizens of Baghdad.

With the same cold war in mind Dulles has moved fast to inject a new "aggressive psychology" into U.S. foreign affairs. His prodding of the French for delays in implementing the European Defense Community, which critics first called heavy-handed, now appears to have been both adroit and effective. But at home State's chiefs faced another enormously complicated-if inherited-problem: how to revitalize the almost battle-shocked morale of department personnel, make certain there's loyalty among all hands and still handle the onslaughts of Senator Joe McCarthy which apparently have only just begun.

\section*{AN ANCIENT COUNTRY'S FIVE YEAR PLAN SETS OUT TO INDUSTRIALIZE A SOCIETY AND EDUCATE A PEOPLE}

Like generations of their ancestors, the villagers of Saptur in the south Indian state of Madras have always toiled away their days in the rice fields. But now when night comes they depart from the paths their fathers knew. Each with his lantern, they assemble on the clean sand of a dry river bed, set to work learning to read, write and do arithmetic. They are putting in double time to help effect an orderly revolution.

In this revolution they are seeking to reverse the cruel paradox once voiced by a U.S. ambassador, Chester Bowles: "India is not a poor country, but it is full of poor people." India is straining for new skills and tools to bring long overdue industrial and economic maturity to the ancient land. The effort to pull itself out of the past began with independence in 1947, but it was not until two years ago that it was formalized, and laid out on a huge scale, in a Five Year Plan. Immensely complex, the plan aims fundamentally at producing a food surplus by 1956, thus releasing foreign exchange of \(\$ 500\) million a year, spent on food imports, to build up a modern industrial complex. Because everything must be done at once where so much has remained so long undone, the plan
embraces a bewildering array of simultaneous activities: gigantic river developments and heavy industry side by side with education of the illiterate, malaria control, jungle clearance and the teaching of crop rotation.

In conception the plan is Indian, and the Indian state and central governments have dedicated themselves to raising fully two thirds of its cost, estimated well above \(\$ 4\) billion. But substantial help is coming from outside, principally from the U.S. Loans and grants, including those from Point Four and the Ford Foundation, from U.N. agencies and from individual countries, will ultimately total around \(\$ 1.4\) billion.

If the plan fails, the Communists, who polled \(4.5 \%\) of the vote last year, will have a dangerous political weapon in the general election which takes place shortly after the five years are up. Even if it succeeds there will be a long way to go before much of India's ancient landscape is dotted with such modern vistas as the Tata steel plant (above). But success will at least set India on the road to industrial equality with other nations and improve its chance of remaining what it is today-the largest nonCommunist nation in the world and still democracy's best hope in Asia.

\section*{DAMS AND MACHINES TAP ITS RESOURCES}

India has plenty of natural resources, and one of the mightiest is hydroelectric power. But water, springing from the wild monsoons which spill as much as 500 inches of rain in four montlis and leave the country a desert the rest of the year. can be more curse than blessing. In undertakings rivaling the monsoons in scale, India is working 10 dam and store her untamed water and convert it into useful energy.

At Bhakra in the foothills of the Himalayas. 8162 million is being spent on an American-engineered conerete dam 680 feet high, second in height only to the Iloover Dam. Bhakrat begun in \(19: 16\), will be in partial operation when the Five Year Plan conds, irrigating I,360,000 acres. When completed in 1960, the dam will produce 1.2 million kilowatts, almost as much as the country's motire present supply of power. (On the border between Madras and Hyderabad, India is building Tungabhadra Dam by using the primitive skills of massed manpower. Thousands of laborers are fitting together, stone by stone, a granite dam a mile and a half long which will be irrigating 700,000 acres by 1957.
Indian industry is expanding to absorb the vast new power potential. Tata, alrady one of the world's largest self-contained steel and iron plants, is increasing its production by 25 品. At Sindri in Bihar State, a new \(\$ 18\) million plant has been built by the government to exploit the country's rich resources of coal and gypsum in the production of ammonium sulfate. Sindri is already producing 1.000 tons a day of chemical fertilizer, desperately needed to boost India's agricultural production.

\section*{OLD LIVES ON WITH THE NEW}

In India's belated rush to grow up industrially, the new is not trampling over the old but finding a way to live with it comfortably. Bullocks still can take the right of way over Vampire jets where the animals are being used in operations to expand the facilities of the Hindustan Aircraft factory at Bangalore in Mysore State. Women are working side by side with men in modern industry, but they have not yielded the exotic, colorful and voluminous sari as a working garment. And the leisurely morning and afternoon British tea break persists as a habit of industry.
Still, the new is ever more present. Hindustan Aircraft, an enterprise which is jointly owned by the central and state governments, is now assembling ready-to-lly Vampires for the Indian air force. The company fabricates
nearly every component of the aircraft except for the imported landing gear and engines. Lately the company has begun production of a trainer of its own design.

Indian railroads, the world's fourth largest and probably most heavily laden rail system (in 1952 they carried 1.3 billion passengers), are now getting their new rolling stock right at home. Tata Locomotive and Engineering Company, begun in 1945, is in production and will be completing four locomotives a month by 1954 , as well as car frames and steam boilers. Another locomotive works at Chittaranjan, built and owned by the government, was completed in 1950 and is already in production. Geared into the Five Year Plan, Chittaranjan will be producing 120 broad-gauge locomotives and 50 boilers yearly by 1956.

\section*{TO DEFEAT FAMINE}

The grimmest fact India faces is that it is a famine country where, in a single dry season, three million people can starve as in 19.43. In 19.51 India had to borrow wheat worth \(\$ 19\) ) million from the U.S. Nearly everything in the Five Year Plan, and forcign aid programs integrated with in, is aimed at increasing food production. The primary purpose of India's great river-control developments is to increase acreage under irrigated cultivation by more than a third to 76 million acres, three times the irrigated acreage of the U.S. Great dams alone, however, are not rnough to supply lndia's thirst for water. In arid sections thousands of deep tube wells are being sunk to tap subsurface water. All over India old reservoirs are being enlarged to hold the precious water. This preocecupation with water also helps fishermen-and the food supply-by providing more places to fish. They too are getting special help; Point Four is buying diesel engines for 1.40 fishing boats and a dredge to deepen their harbors.

\section*{WORK IS AIM FOR MILLIONS}

The ultimate success of the Five Year Plan will depend not only on wholesale food production and projects conceived on a majestic scale, but even more on finding enough useful things for 361 million people to do.
In Bombay State the search is carried on by Atul Products Ltd. whose laboratories are deciding which drugs and chemicals can be made in India. Atul, owned mostly by Indians but \(10 \%\) by American Cyanamid, is only a year old but plans to produce all the dye India can use.

Perhaps the most significant aspect of India's regeneration is that, rating technological progress high, it rates people higher. While expanding, industry has remembered modern facilities for working mothers. And, because the Five Year Plan recognizes that full industrialization is far in the future, it emphasizes selfsufficiency on a village level. In rural areas the Community Projects Program organizes firkas (groups of villages) to teach, and subsidize, such skills as hand-looming (opposite page) on which the average Indian will still have to rely for his clothing for many years to come.

\section*{BASKETBALL'S COURT JESTER}

A year-around, world-around player, Goose Tatum has left people laughing from Berlin to Malaya

IHE cruiser-sized feet of Reece ("Goose") Tatum skidded out from under as he cut for the basket. His egg-shaped head hit the floor and the thump could be heard up in the last row of seats. A hush fell over the house in Provo, Utah as the star of the Harlem Globetrotters basketball team lay still like a flattened gingerbread boy in his red-white-and-blue uniform.

There was a flurry on the players' bench. The public address system crackled out a call for a doctor as a solemn-faced group of the Globetrotters and their opponents gathered around the fallen star. It was difficult to tell whether he was dead or alive. Neither ice water nor smelling salts produced a stir. Then one of Goose's teammates indelicately removed one of his own shoes with great
deliberation and flourished it in the vicinity of Tatum's nose.

Goose Tatum vaulted three feet in the air from a flat-on-his-back start. He came up as though by levitation, his teeth and the whites of his eyes flashing. His teammates, playing the straight men, fell back in amazement and stood around scratching their heads as Tatum, enormously pleased with

himsell. cakewalked around the floor. The spectators, after a few unecrtain gigyles. let go with a roar of belly laughs.

It was low comedy. improvised on the spur of the moment. but nevertheless a sample of what makes Gonse Tatum a national clown. A true pantomime artist. he expresses himself not in speech hut in movement. With a few simple chanues in techniques and trappings he could take his place among the fumymen in the Ringling hig top and find himself plaving to an "easy-langhing house."

A grotesque appearance. for which most clowns need elaborately incongruous clothes and make-up, is Tatum's natural hirthright. He comes equipped with tenuous. apelike arms which. by actual measurement. give him the longest hoarding-house reach known in the world. Ilis lands are so enormous that when rupped they hold the equivalent of a ten-gallon hat. Ther dangle lonsely in the neighthorthond of his knees and when he walks with the peculiar. gooselike shuffle for which he is named, they swing fore and aft. People laugh at him on sight.

At the admitted age of 33 (or \(4: 3\). depending on how old he feels that day) Goose Tatum's rhythm and body control are far beyond a good baskethall player's requirements. He palms the ball, spins it on one finger. rolls it down an arm and arrests it with his long lingers in time to let a confused opponent dive helplessly for where it should be but isn \(t\).
The team of barnstorming professionals he plays with is capable of beating about any team on earth. But winning is only an incidental means to an end. They establish superiority over the opposition, usually a group of white stooges hired by the

Globetrotters, to set the stage for capers and razzle-dazzle. Then they proceed to spellbind crowds who neither know nor ever will care anything about basketball. They have played this American game all over the world, from the wreckage of Berlin to the jungles of Malaya. In the past year they have performed before three and a half million spectators, more than Notre Dame or the Yankees. Since 1942 Gonse Tatum has probably been their biggest attraction.

As pivot man under the basket he occasionally stops the action to play an impish game of hide-and-seek. With the casual air of a banker occupied by only a minor loan, he fakes a pass, rolls his eyes. hides the ball under his shirt and pretends to pull it out of a bewildered opponent's ear. Then, seemingly bored with tomfoolery, he hooks the ball lazily over his head, never looking at the basket, and waits expectantly for the roar that signifies it has swished through the hoop.

Tatum's expression is constantly changing from hambone pomposity to outraged innocence. He is forever snatching things from spectators in the first and second rows-hats for his head, glasses

Once each game he fakes a shoulder injury after being fouled and limps to the bench: While there he switches basketballs and comes out for the free throw looking grim. When he makes his shot the ball goes halfway to the basket and then, to everybody's amazement, comes right hack to Tatum. This trick, made possible by a ball with rubber bands attached to it, never fails to bring down the house and sometimes leaves even Tatum sitting on the floor with an attack of giggles.

But once the show is over and he departs for the wings a change envelops Goose Tatum. It is a cliche of show business that deep melancholy lies behind the laughing mask of the clown. Goose Tatum is no exception. Off the court he shuns human companionship, sharing the outlook of the great clown Grock, who once remarked, "Life is lousy. People are eating each other up. Everything has gone to hell." 'Tatum's fellow Globetrotters, who respect his desire to be left alone, see little more of him than the spectators.

Tatum hates travel, an unfortunate quirk in a man who last year was forced to travel 75,000 miles to play basketball. When the team is moving by bus, Tatum digs into his own pocket and goes by plane or train, and even then he is assailed by fits of restlessness and claustrophohia. On one trip from St. Louis to Scattle, he stepped off the train without baggage when it stopped in Omaha and was not seen again by his teammates for a week.

Tatum explains his dislike of traveling in a terse sentence: "I been around too much."

Tatum indulges a mordant humor in his lonely wanderings about the cities the Globetrotters visit. In the U.S. he occasionally enters a clothing shop to ask if they have a suit in his size. When the clerk says "Sure," Tatum asks earnestly, "Wanna bet?" His pleasure comes when the salesman discovers Tatum has a 40 inch arm, and no sleeve will reach much below his elbow.
In Algiers Tatum once disappeared completely. After a desperate two-day search for his star, Manager Abe Saperstein heard a soft voice ask, "Want a taxi, mister?" He found 'Tatum sitting behind the wheel of an Arab cab he had borrowed from its owner in exchange for tickets to a Globetrotter game.

Saperstein fined Tatum \(\$ 50\) for missing a game, and Goose promptly borrowed back the \(\$ 50\) plus \(\$ 50\) more. Although Saperstein pays him more money (about \(\$ 40,000\) a year) than any other clown or basketball player, Tatum is always broke and borrowing. Some of his money goes for jazz records, one of his few enthusiasms, especially for recordings by Pianist Art Tatum (no kin). A good deal of it goes to his wife, presumably in compensation for the fact that she sees Goose only about four weeks a year.

Tatum came to basketball late in his sports career. The son of an itinerant Methodist preacher and day laborer in the canebrake country of Arkansas. he was a skinny. Ionse-jointed kid who played for sandlot baseball teams and semi-pros. For a few years he spent a good deal of time "riding the rods" to Memphis and Birmingham trying out with professional Negro ball clubs. One summer he worked for a sawmill in the Ozarks and plaved for the mill's baseball team. It was there that Tatum first discovered his clowning talent. "It came naturally," he recalls. By 1942 he had become Clown No. 1 of the bigtime Cincinnati Clowns. His long arm looked like an educated blacksnake whip when it circled behind his back to take balls on the wrong side. By doing things the wrong wayand having them come out right-he was by instinct emulating the circus clown who smokes the lighted end of his cigar and plays the violin upside down.

When his team was ahead and he got a hit Tatum would occasionally run like mad for third base. If the opposing pitcher began to blow up, Tatum would sometimes solicitously lead a little child out of the stands toward the mound. Often at home plate he would kneel and pray, and at least once thereafter whacked out a home run.

Abe Saperstein saw Tatum play in 1941. For nearly 20 years he had been searching for a sure-fire star for his Globetrotters and he thought he recognized the makings of one in the preposterous first baseman. The next winter Tatum put on a Clobetrotter uniform and his basketball education began.

Shortly the Army intervened, hut only in a sense. As an Air Force draftee at Lincoln, Neb., Tatum came under the tutelage of one of Saperstein's scouts, who was basketball coach on the base. It was there that he really learned the game, and developed his famous fadeaway hook shot. In 1951 Tatum said goodby to baseball forever and became a year-around basketball player.
Tatum is entirely serious about his clowning. He is constantly scouting the trade for ideas he can use or adapt. He picked one of his gags from an English circus, another from a European ice revue. One day in Chicago Stadium he began tearing strips off the ball and, to the amazement of the crowd, eating them. The spectators never learned that Tatum had succeeded in having a loaf of pumpernickel bread baked to resemble a basketball.

Despite such improvisation, the Goose is haunted by the notion that his career may not outlive his reflexes-that, unlike Baggeson, the great Danish clown who went on breaking 100,000 plates a year until he retired, he may fade and vanish when he is too old to play basketball. Recently, however, he had a reassuring experience. Browsing through a hardware store in Ogden, Utah, 'Tatum glanced up to find a woman pointing at him, her mouth open and an incredulous look on her face. She began to laugh, and she laughed until tears came to her eyes. Other customers, looking at Tatum, began to laugh too, and finally Goose himself began laughing. It made him happy to realize that his future as a laugh-provoker depends less on his reflexes than on the fact that he was just born funny.

Everywhere hundreds of people wanted to sign up for an identical house on the spot.

The construction of the house, which will sell most places for \(\$ 15,(000\) exclusive of land, is based on the shared secrets of mass builders. Adroitly engineered, it can be built economically, providing savings which are passed on to the buyer in the form of more space and more flexible living quarters. Builder Johnson plans to revamp his production setup, build 3,000 Trade Secrets houses this year. He can build one in 30 days- 60 days quicker than he built his former houses. Frank Zuzak is now building 37 others. The public response to the Trade Secrets house has given builders a joll. Reluctant to pioneer, most of them have been building the same house for years with the excuse that the average home buyer does not wam anything new-fangled. Now increasing numbers of them agree with the builder in Oklahoma who visited the Trade Secrets house and said "I guess I will have to build modern houses or go out of business."

of some 20 ministers who. knowing that their action might be held up to ridicule, made their questions harder than usual. Lasserre had never studied theology formally but he answered questions about the Bible and Baptist doctrine without a llaw and was promptly ordained.
Today, the Rev. Mr. Bradley, only 17 and still in high school, is pastor of the large New Testament Baptist church in Cincinnati. He drives there each weekend to preach, baptize and conduct funerals and weddings.

On a glazed stairway, bent against the gale and clinging to a railing thick with ice. the man above is working his way to the very top of the windiest spot in the U.S. - the peah of Mt. Wa-hington in New Hampshire's White Mountains. He is part of a military and civilian team which, in winter, turns the 6,288 -foot mountain into a gigantic laboratory for Delense De partment experiments into jet age techniques of warfare and survival. Standing at the focal point of a natural wind tumel, Mt. Washington
is continuously ripped by shrieking winds-the record blow of 231 mph makes the average \(\overline{6}\)-mile gale seem mild. The winds and ice conditions they help create make. Wt. Washington a perleet place for tir Force and Navy jet engine testing (pp. 128, 129). Not until after World War 11 did the military put Mt. Washington's weather to work for them. The extent to which it has paid of was made clear last week when the Pentagon disclosed it is going ahead with plans for a permanent laboratory at the top.

The research team: find Mt. Washington's brutal weather delightful for their scientific purposes. It can cause a jet engine to ice up in 20 seconds. It builds up rime ice so quickly the process can almost be seen by the naked eye (top, left), in effect reproducing a problem of
jet flying: the tendency of razor-sharp airfoils to build up death-dealing ice on the leading edge quicker than old-fashioned blunt wings.

The rule impressed on all personnel is: if you're lost, stop immediately and wait until help comes. Inside their hut, out of the wind's
fury, the men live a lonely but not unpleasant life. There is running water, a high fidelity phonograph, television sets which pick up Boston and Montreal, and a small library. Even so, to keep tensions from huilding up, everyone goes down below at least once every 30 days.

\section*{HOW TO BE MISERABLE AND LIVE}

As a military proving ground Mt. Washington is busy from top to bottom. About three miles down from the summit is a small Signal Corps station which tests corps' housing. A bit farther, headquartered at a 100 -year-old wooden structure called Halfway House, which is chained to the rock to keep it from blowing away, a Navy crew tests special cold weather gear for the men at sea. Occasionally an air rescue group in training from Westover Field pitches camp on the mountain (opposite page), building a shelter out of tree poles and parachute cloth. Down below on Glen Flats are 196 men of the Army Quartermaster Corps, water-soaked guinea pigs for all the new pieces of olive-drab designed to protect and comfort the American combat soldier who must fight in winter. Every other night they sleep out in the
open snow. They walk 500 miles through the drifts to test their shoes and carry 30 -pound oil cans filled with sand to test new packboards. Sometimes, like the men above, they chop through the ice of Peabody Creek to try experimental clothes.

Every boot and shoelace and cap and glove is numbered, so that complete records can be kept. Most of the men manage to preserve their good humor, despite the seeming lack of purpose in being ordered first to run for an hour up the ice-glazed rocks and then to lie motionless for three hours. Most of the quartermaster troops at Mt. Washington are old hands at this kind of experimentation and know how to laugh off their misery. Many of them spent last summer in equipment tests at Yuma, Ariz. test base, one of the hottest areas in the world.

Vittorio De Sica became a great man in movies because he took plain people off the streets of Italy and shot them in simple tales of daily life (The Bicycle Thief). David Selznick achieved his fame by making films with the biggest stars in the most colossal settings Hollywood could afford (Gone with the Wind, Duel in the Sun). Last year the two men agreed to combine their contrasting talents on Terminal Station, a film named after the main railway station in Rome. The stars were Selznick's: Jennifer Jones, who is Mrs. Selznick, and Montgomery Clift. The story was right up De Sica's alley: a simple tale of two tormented lovers meeting and parting
forever. The setting was a compromise: being the genuine Rome railway station, an imposing new \(\$ 35\) million edifice, it was real enough for De Sica and grand enough for Selznick.

But there were troubles. The film had to be shot between midnight and dawn, when the station would be fairly empty. De Sica couldn't speak enough English to explain himself. Used to amateur actors whom he could shape as he pleased, he clashed steadily with Clift and Jones, who had their own ideas about acting. But in the end Latin good sense made peace with Anglo-Saxon temperament and the movie was finished within budget and on schedule.

You re traveling all over the country by plane or a bedroom on the Tiwentieth Century and you're staying in nothing but the best hotels. You rent an automobile or sometimes even a limousine with a chauffeur. In other words you're living like a queen-all on the expense account. What happens now if you fall in love, get married and try to live on just some average fellow's salary?"
The publicity woman replied without hesitation. "There's only one answer. I have to marry a man with an expense account."

Thus has taxation-in a very peculiar, devious and unplanned waychanged even the language and philosophy of romance, not to mention the nation's spending habits.
This is the Age of the Expense Account, an institution which taxation has inflated into almost appalling importance. The Bureau of Internal Revenue recognizes that travel and a "reasonable" amount of entertaining are necessary in the ordinary course of business; all these expenses can he deducted from a company's taxable profits. To a company which pays the current \(52 \%\) corporate income tax plus an additional \(30 \%\) under the excess profits tax, as a lot of them have been doing, a dollar spent on entertainment thus saves 82 c in taxes and costs only 18 d in real money. (The publicity woman's \(\$ 40\) lunch, for example, cost her company only \(\$ 7.20\) net.) Giving an employe the privilege of entertaining business associates on an expense account is practically painless to the corporation and at the same time is a sort of windfall to the employe. If a salesman gets a \(\$ 1,000\) raise, for example, he can spend only what is left of it after the extra personal income tax that it costs him. But if he draws \(\$ 1,000\) on an expense account, he pays no extra taxes and can spend every cent having fun with his business friends

In cities like New York. Washington and Chicago it is safe to say that at any given moment well over half of all the people in the best hotels, the best nightclubs and the best restaurants are charging the bill as an expense account item to their companies, which in turn are charging it to the government in the form of tax deductions. Even a

smaller city like Seattle reflects the phenomenon. Peter Canlis, whose expensive Canlis Restaurant features the most luscious of Japanese waitresses bearing the most luscious of viands, says frankly, "I came to Seattle, saw that a lot of good expense account money wasn't being spent because there was no place fancy enough to gobble it up-and I was happy to fill the gap."

Canlis had the right idea and is prospering, for the expense account dollar usually seeks out the most expensive pleasures and accommodations on the theory that since it is free you may as well have the best. The expense account spenders are nur new U.S. aristocracyjust about the only people left who can blithely throw around big tips, order the works at Chicago's Pump Room or Washington's Carlton, pay a scalper \(\$ 50\) for a ticket to a hit show or a World Series game, pre-empt the drawing rooms on trains and the suites in the big hotels and in general inflate the whole cost of travel, food and entertainment for the poor suckers who have to spend their own money.

Although we have been in the Age of the Expense Account for only a few years-roughly since the World War II boom-the expense account itself is nothing new. There is reason to believe that in ancient Egypt the overseers of work gangs on the Pyramids kept a kind of expense account of food and supplies for the workers. Certainly in ancient Rome the top slaves, entrusted to do a certain amount of commercial work, had their expenses paid. In the U.S. the expense account probably goes back to the day the very first traveling salesman saddled up his horse.

There is every likelihood that the first American to operate on an expense account was also the first man to pad one, for there is something about an expense account that brings out the latent rascality, rapacity and mendacity in even the otherwise most honorable man. Expense account forms have long been known affectionately by their fond possessors as "swindle sheets." Filling out an expense account itemization has been regarded as a kind of conlest of wits with the company auditor, in which it is perfectly justifiable to use the most outragenus half-truths, little white lies and outright fantasies, anything at all which the auditor, regardless of how outraged he might be, cannot absolutely prove to be false.

\section*{How to make money loy losing it}

The high-bracket taxpayer can even make money by losing it. Suppose we have a Mr. Y who is in the \(75 \%\) bracket as a married man whose income, after exemptions and deductions, is more than \(\$ 88,000\) a year. He gets into the cattle-breeding business, which is very pop. ular these days as an escape from high taxes. Disregarding the complicated details of how much his stock costs him and how it grows over the years, we can take the case of just one calf born to the herd. Our
 Mr. Y can spend \(\$ 300\) to raise the animal for breeding purposes, finally sell it for \(\$ 200\)-and yet make \(\$ 73\) ! It works this way:
The \(\$ 300\) that it costs to raise the animal is an ordinary business expense and tax-deductible. At the \(75 \%\) tax rate, which is the bracket his income puts him into, Mr. Y saves \(\$ 225\) in taxes, making his net cost only \(\$ 75\). When he sells the animal, his \(\$ 200\) return is taxed as a long-term capital gain, at \(26 \%\). He thus pays \(\$ 52\) in taxes and has \(\$ 148\) left. His profit is \(\$ 148\) minus the \(\$ 75\) in real money that it cost him to raise the animal, or \(\$ 73\).

You say you spent it. The auditor can only take your word for it or get you fired, and the amount is rarely enough for any punishment quite that drastic.
Jokes about expense account cheating are legion. Possibly the most famous of all concerns Author Gene Fowler, in the days when he was a New York newspaperman. According to legend, he was sent to Northern Canada to find some lost aviators, and in the process he spent some \(\$ 3.000\). Back in his office, hard put to account for it all, he invented the purchase of a mythical dog team, then the mythical illness of a dog requiring expensive medical care, and finally the death and funeral of the dog. Finding himself still short at this point, Fowler finally made up the difference by entering the item: "Flowers for bereft bitch, \(\$ 60\)."
'There is also the story of the World War II correspondent who, flushed by his success and the scarcity of good men at that time, sent in a monthly statement reporting \(\$ 150\) for taxicab fares. This was extremely annoying to his buss. especially since the boss happened to know that he bad spent the entire month as guest of the Navy aboard an aircraft carrier. The boss therefore cabled angrily, "How can you spend cab money on a carrier?" The correspondent cabled back with magnificent insolence: "Big carrier."
Such legends contain a good core of truth. Any bigtime salesman, advertising man or press agent operating on an expense account soon develops a kind of sixth sense for what the traffic will bear. He knows how much seniority he has in the company, how much work he has been turning out and how he stands with his boss at the moment. On this basis, and depending on how cocky and inventive he is by nature, he makes out his monthly account. Records of this sort are hard to keep anyway; if a man starts out to cocktails with a couple of customers and winds up buying them scrambled eggs at 4 o'clock the next morning, he has a hard time remembering every single drink, tip, taxi fare, cigaret pack and quarter for the keeper of the men's room. So he makes some approximation of what he has spent on company business, adds whatever else he thinks he can get away with and proceeds to list some ways in which he might logically have got rid of the money.

There is one New York radio man who puts down dinners every month for four prominent people who have recently died; so long as this obvious prevarication is not challenged, he feels he is in solid with his network. There is another New York executive who has worked up a highly entertaining and almost poetic five-minute speech about how he makes out his account. He can do it. he claims, only by locking his office door, shutting off all phone calls and turning on some soft music, because, as he says, the preparation of an expense account is a highly creative art, far too delicate for the usual hurly-burly of the business office. As one cynical executive has said. "(Our men give their talent to the company and their genius to their expense accounts."

What the smaller operators can do by indirection, the boss of the firm can do without any heating around the bush at all. In fact the expense account is a recognized way of rewarding executives who, in all truth, have little enough incentive to reach the top, considering what the income tax does to executive salaries nowadays. A company dedicated to keeping its officers happy can with all propriety have a company airplane for business trips and a yacht and a hunting-fishing lodge in the north woods to entertain its biggest customers. It can also arrange to hold its conventions in Miami in midwinter. The effect. as far as company executives go, is to provide wonderful travel and vacation facilities without cost. The company officers go south in the winter and north by summer; take along enough work or enough customers to justify the trip, and proceed to have a sery pleasant time of it. (If you telephone an absent executive, his secretary almost never says, "Mr. Blank is on vacation." A good secretary soon learns to say, "Mr. Blank is on a combination business and vacation trip.') At home the executives can also ride around in company-owned and chauffeured automobiles. Naturally the rompany is happy to pay their dues at the best a a ailable country club, for the purpose of entertaining customers on the golf course, and at the best town club, for intimate lunches and dinners.
It is this sort of executive who really profits from the Age of the Expense Account, probably by a strange kind of economic inevitability. U.S. industry is in iransition from a period when men like Ford and Rockefeller owned and ran their own empires to a time when corporations are generally run by managers who are simply hired for the job and have very little if any money of their own. It is by no means unusual today for the president and all the vice presidents to own less than \(1 / 2\) of \(1 \%\) of the company's stock. Yet they have to keep up a front, they have to meet the remaining tycoons on an equal hasis. And since they cannot themselves afford the airplane, the hunting lodge or the yacht, the company almost has to provide these things.
The boss actually does profit from the expense account and probably deserves it. The lesser members of the expense account society, however, usually find it a dubious blessing. True, they get their lunches, dinners. shows and hangovers free. But a good

many of them have reached the conclusion that no matter how artfully they pad their monthly statements the company is getting the best of the deal.
"Put it like this," said one salesman. "Our secretaries put in their \(37!2\)-hour week and that's that. But we work right on through the lunch hour, making or keeping our "contacts." And at 5:30 a lot of times the business day is just starting. We re taking a customer to cocktails, probably also to dinner, as likely as not to a show we've already seen a couple of times. Eren on the weekend we usually work for the company, at a Saturday night or Sunday afternoon party we throw at the house. That way we even get our wives to work a couple of hours for the company. Just by giving me an expense account. the company gets me to work 70 hours a week."
Certainly not all the so-called entertainment that goes on the account is actually entertaining to a man who has to do it practically every night of the week, often with people he secretly wishes would drop dead. One young publicity man said, "I enjoy drinking -at my own pace and with companions of my own choosing. But this business of holding up a bar until \(4 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}\). with a couple of strangers who are not only bores but also three-quarters loaded, and then trying to do my job the next morning with a terrible hang. over. that s something else again."

There is an even greater irony in this connection, which is the fact that of all the badly busted members of the middle class. the expense account hoys are often the flattest of all. As one of them said. "We hang around " \(2 l^{\circ}\) all the time and sooner or later we get to thinking that we helong there." In other words. it is almost impossible to throw the boss's money around five davs a week without getting a little careless about your own on weekends. Moreover, it hardly seems appropriate for a man to walk into " 21 ", hand the captain a \(\$ 10\) tip and order caviar all around if he is wearing frayed trousers and shoes run down at the heels. Most of the men on expense accounts begin spending too much on clothes, and if they are called upon to do much entertaining at home they also spend too much for their houses, their furniture and their wives \({ }^{\circ}\) clothes. Thus the spending gets to be a kind of vicious circle. and the money goes out a lot faster than the expense account, no matter how contrived, can possibly bring it in.

\section*{Perils of the expense account}

TTHERE are a lot of expenses which can hardly be put on the account in any guise whatever. One executive who has watched a lot of salesmen come and go puts it: "Here you've got a young salesman who's already spent \(\$ 350\) of the company's money this month. On the 28 th he hears that a prospective customer is coming to town with his wife, his brother-in-law and his sister-in-law. He figures he just has to entertain the whole retinue for two days or lose any rhance to do business with that particular man. But he doesn't dare go any deeper into company funds because he's pegged at just about a \(\$ 350\) a month maximum. There's only one thing to do. He entertains the customer anyway and digs into his own pocket for the couple of hundred dollars that it costs him.
-()r here you've got a salesman who's entertaining a customer at his country club. They finish their 18 holes of golf and in the locker room afterward they find a high-stakes poker game going among some of the richer members. The customer, who happens to be rich himself. says he'd like to stay and get in the game. What should the salesman do? I can tell you what he does do. He sits in the game with his customer, nervous as the devil because of the stakes. and because he's nervous he invariably loses.'

The expense account also puts some queer strains on a marriage. What olten happens is that the young man in business suddenly finds himself elevated into the bigtime expense account league. In the words of one supervisor of salesmen, "Now all of a sudden he's having lunch at '2l' and looking at Lana Turner. After work he goes somewhere with soft lights for a couple of drinks and the free caviar canapés. Then he goes home. It's just a plain average homebecause this fellow is just a middle-classer when he's spending his own money-and it doesn't have six-inch carpets and an orchestra hidden behind the potted palms. There are no servants; Mama has had a rough day with the kids and with the washing, and she certainly doesn't look like Lana Turner at the moment. Besides she doesn't cook nearly so well as a chef who's paid \(\$ 20.000\) a year for what he knows about cooking. I've seen it break up marriages in the past and I know it"s going to break up marriages in the future."
Or what can also happen, and frequently does, is something like this: The young man runs into a customer or client who really does have a Iot of money, an older man who made it before taxes got so heary, or who has had some capital gains. They become good

friends over the lunches, the drinks and the dinners; and all of a sudden the older man says, "We've got a little winter place down in Palm Beach. Why don't you spend your vacation with us, and bring the wife along?" If the young husband doesn t have sense enough to say no immediately-and he frequently doesn't-the wife is in real trouble now. She has only three choices, all of which are miserable. She can flatly refuse to go, and run the risk of having her husband regard her as a business liability. She can go-with her one black dress and her bargain-basement sports clothes-and try to be comfortable around women who buy their clothes from Hattie Carnegie. Or she too can succumb to the expense account fantasy and start driving the family deeper in debt as she joins the race to keep up with the real rich.

Some of the people in the high-paid but also high-spending professions find themselves in a most fantastic position. One \(\$ 30,(1)(0)\) a-year New Yorker has a problem which must seem ludicrous to most people. but is a genuine first-class worry to him. "I can't really hope to move anywhere else," he says. "If some other firm offers me \(\$ 5.000\) a year more, in my tax bracket that means less than \(\$ 45\) a week extra in my pocket. I wouldn't take the risk of pulling up stakes for less than \(\$ 50,000\) a year. But the horrible thing is that just to hold my present job-to buy the clothes and keep up the right kind of house and drive the right automobile and everything-I'm going in the hole by \(\$ 2,000\) a year. If my wife weren t working, and in a position to supply the \(\$ 2,(000\), I'd have to quit." Numerous movie, radio and television stars, who impress the average citizen as leading terribly glamorous and wealthy lives, are in just about the same fix.
The Age of the Expense Account is an especially dubious bless. ing. aside from all financial or marital considerations, to the salesman or advertising man whose business career depends solely on his personal charm, and whose personal charm rests largely on his ability to remain quite rational, gay, pleasant and amusing through a day and a night of heavy drinking. The casualty rate among such men is frighteningly high.

One salesman describes it in these words: "Something just seems to click in the fellow's head. One week he can sit up drinking with you all night and you love him-and the next week he's getting obnoxious and telling his customer to go to hell." A lot of young salesmen who build their careers around the bar are bound to be retired-quite tragically-long before they expect it.

Watching all the conspicuous expense account spending, one is bound to wonder whether it accomplishes anything. Many people take for granted that it does. One salesman pretty well summed up the arguments like this: "Supposing you're selling carpet tacks. Three other fellows from three other companics are trying to sell carpet tacks to the same customer. The price is about the same and the quality is certainly the same. After all, how much difference can there he between carpet tacks? So which brand is the customer going to buy? The chances are that he Il buy from the salesman who puts him in the best frame of mind. If he likes you

How to make money ly giving it away
The crowning irony of the present tax laws is that it is sometimes possible to make money by giving some of it away. Suppose a man in the \(90 \%\) income tax bracket owns some stock for which he paid \(\$ 3,000\) years ago. It is now worth \(\$ 10,000\).

Of course he can postpone the day of reckoning by just keeping it, but if he sells he must pay a long-term capital gains tax of \(26 \%\) on his \(\$ 7,000\) profit. Into his pocket will go \(\$ 10,000\) minus \(\$ 1,820\) tax, or \(\$ 8,180\). But if he gives the stock away he can list its full \(\$ 10,000\) value as a charity deduction and in his \(90 \%\) bracket this saves him \(\$ 9,000\) in income taxes. Thus he makes \(\$ 820(\$ 9,000\) minus \(\$ 8,180\) ) by giving the stock away instead of cashing it in.
businessman can sit in his office and buy his advertising by the slide rule. This is the scientific age in business. If three salesmen approach you with three different brands of burglar alarms, you can send them to your research laboratory and find out in a hurry which one is the best. You can do practically the same thing even with such intangibles as advertising or public relations.
"In an age like this, how can any responsible businessman be influenced by just one lunch? Or even by a weekend of golf and miscellaneous revelry in Miami?"

One salesman has figured it out this way: "The expense account probably helps a lot more in dealing with the little fellows-who can't give you much business anyway-than with the big men who can really help you. The big man is on an expense account himself and he's used to champagne and \(\$ 20\) dinners. You're not going to impress him much by taking him to '2l' and then setting him down in a third row theater seat. But with the little fellow it's different. This is a nation of social climbers and the man who isn't used to it gets a hell of a thrill out of meeting Mac Kriendler or Sherman Billingsley and eating dinner in a room where he can watch a half dozen movie stars and a couple of columnists and some of the people he's seen on TV. He winds up the evening thinking that you're a hig shot and that it's a privilege to do business with you."

Or does he? Not everybody thinks so. "You have to be careful," another salesman said. "A lot of businessmen got where they are by pinching pennies. They're cost accountants at heart. Moreover, a lot of them don't know exactly which fork to use or what to say if you introduce them to a celebrity. If you take a fellow like that out for too big an evening, he's liable to wind up thinking you're a snob and a wastrel."

Nobody is ever likely to find out the absolute truth on just what, if anything, the expense account buys-for the fact is that it would hardly pay to find out. For all the ostentation of the expense society, all its lavishness and conspicuous waste, the money involved is small change in the corporate sense. Take for example just a good substantial steel company spending around \(\$ 400\) million a year for ore, coal, machinery, buildings, labor, salaries and miscellaneous. If the firm has 200 officers and salesmen on expense accounts, which would be about standard, and they spend an average of \(\$ 5,000\) a year each, the expense accounts would all mount up to just one-quarter of \(1 \%\) of the company's total outlay. In most businesses the expense account amounts to hardly more than a fly speck on the corporate books. As long as there is any chance whatever that it is helping business-or even as long as competitors think it helps business-the expense account will be with us.

A lot of companies do worry about the psychological effect of entertainment spending. As one marketing man put it, "Let's say there's a hardware convention out in the Midwest somewhere. And to the convention go four companies that make hammers. Three of them are big, rich and in the excess profits bracket. They can well afford to set up hotel suites with food and drink served by pretty hostesses, and limousine service to and from the door. The fourth company is new, small and just struggling along, without a spare nickel to spend for that sort of thing. Naturally the fourth company figures it's under a terrible handicap. But the funny thing is that the three big companies are equally worried. How far can they go without seeming vulgarly ostentatious? At what point do their customers start deserting them out of sympathy for the little fellow?"

One executive for a very wealthy corporation said, "Naturally we worry about seeming too lavish. You have to he careful about spending so big and seeming such hotshots that all the little fellows start hating you." Another corporation man said, "The companies that are really on the ball in New York are always careful to deploy their executives. They check on how many are going to have dinner in town, and where. They don't want to take a customer into "21' or a place like that and have him see eight or ten of their other executives also entertaining customers there. He's liable to get the idea that they're pretty careless with their money -which in the long run is his money. So the idea is to spread around and have everybody stay out of everybody else's way.'

Some businessmen think that the Age of the Expense Account is as much a matter of prosperity as of peculiar taxes. "Sure it makes it easier when you can pay out the money with 18 dollars," one of them says, "but business has been booming and expanding for so long that nobody really gives a damn about money any more. Back in the ' 30 s , when practically everybody was riding that thin line between red ink and black, you didn't see this sort of thing. Every businessman thought twice before okaying a voucher for anything - even a new typewriter ribbon. Now who cares? Take the matter of salesmen. Say you've got a fellow who's bringing in \(\$ 100 .(0) 0\) a year worth of business. Allowing \(10 \%\) for sales expenses on your budget, which is maybe even too high, that fellow shouldn't cost you more than \(\$ 10,000\) a year-for everything. The \(\$ 10,000\) should cover his salary, his expenses, the overhead of his office, his supplies, his phone calls and his secretary, if he's got one. But that's a rule of thumb that's been forgotten. If he spends a couple of thousand a year just taking customers out to lunch and dinner, so what? 'The company's got so much money in the bank that nobody's going to worry.
"In the '30s no company would spend a penny on anything that wasn't of absolutely \(100 \%\) proven use. Nowadays we're in a frame of mind where we won't turn down anything that isn't absolutely \(100 \%\) proven useless. If the excess profits tax expires in June, I don't think it will make a bit of difference to expense accounts. But give us six months of business recession and an awful lot of people are going to have to start buying their own drinks and meals again."

The strange thing is that so many people would apparently prefer to buy their own-if only the economy and the tax structure left them any money to do it with.

\section*{FrENCH PHYSICIAN TREATS UNSEEN PATIENTS}

In 1931, after having served as doctor for ten years in the village of Chelles, outside Paris, Albert-Andrē Nast became blind and resigned himself to giving up his practice. But a patient came in for treatment and Dr. Nast found that even without eyesight he was able to diagnose the case. He decided not to quit. For 22 years now he has maintained the demanding routine of a country doctor, and the people of Chelles have never stopped trusting him.

Dr. Nast has had the help of four women: his wife, his secretary Suzanne Hutin, a midwife
and a nurse who has been with him for 25 years. Mme. Nast and Mlle. Hutin accompany him on his calls and help in the consulting room where they guide his hand, give him instruments, describe the patient's visible symptoms. The nurse and midwife are so adept at "seeing" for Dr. Nast that he can do everything another doctor could do except surgery. Although he is a general practitioner, his first love is "La Nativitê," the combined clinic and maternity home he created from a hunting lodge where he and his staff have delivered 4,000 babies.

When I was a child, in Columbia. Missouri, I can remember a favorite game-"What would you do if-?" You know . . . What would you do if you found a hundred dollars? What would you do if you didn't have to go to school?
And up until not long ago, I'd still look dreamily at my endless calendar of rehearsals, benefits, recording dates and wonder "What would I do-if suddenly all this stopped?"

The question was answered for me, in 1943, when the transport plane I was on crashed in the Azores. From then on, for five years, I spent most of my time flat on my back, in more hospital beds than 1 care to count.
Fortunately, while the rest of the world spun on, my friends kept me up on show business and current events. But the friend I'm most grateful to is the one who gave me a subscription to life.

Now, 1 had always read LIFE like everybody elseI thought. But if your world has ever consisted mainly of four whitewashed walls and little clse. you'll know what I mean when I say that I had never really read life before.
With more time (and 1 had plenty to spare!) I found myself actually reading the pictures, not merely looking at them. It's an exciting little shock, when all of a sudden you get so you can discover for yourself exactly what the photographer is trying to tell you that he saw. I also found that every week there was so much more to LIFE than I had ever seen-far-away parts of the world, people in laboratories making strange discoveries, people with unusual lives to tell about.
For nowadays, show business is less and less of a world apart. Not only in your social life. but even in doing your regular job, you get thrown together with all sorts of interesting people-research chemists; modernixt sculptors: big-time politicians; surgeons and lawyers and labor leaders. Hobbyists, of all description. Reading life won't make you an expert in any of their fields, of course. But it certainly can help you lead "the fuller life", shall we say-if you don't have to sit there like a bump on a log. but actually talk to people like these, and add to your own knowledge and experience.
