

NEW YORK Bob Stahl reports:

Former President HARRY S. TRUMAN may follow ex-Veep ALBEN BARKLEY into TV. All four networks are bidding for Mr. Truman to do a commentary-interview program but reportedly fear he's too controversial a personality.

Folding of NBC's All Star Revue after the April 18 telecast will strengthen <u>Colgate Comedy Hour</u> next Fall. Both MARTHA RAYE and JIMMY DURANTE are joining the Comedy Hour lineup. PERRY COMO, permitted four shows each year besides his CBS series, will do all of these for the Comedy Hour.

BOB HOPE, now a Colgate headliner, seeking a half-hour panel show for next season . . . Look for DANNY THOMAS and RAY BOLGER to alternate weekly on their own half-hour shows in the fall BING CROSBY, apparently resigned to making the TV plunge, tapped to emcee Ford's two-hour super-variety show June 15. be aired on both NBC and CBS.

TV networks slowly rounding the Summer replacement programs into shape. Young comedian-dancer JOEL GREY looks set as sub for JACKIE GLEASON. <u>Juvenile Jury</u> will probably fill in for half-an-hour of MILTON BERLE'S time while the latter vacations . . . Despite Texaco droping Uncle Miltie's show because of increased costs, NBC promises Star Theatre will return in the Fall, probably with two or three sponsors sharing the costs.

ALFRED HITCHCOCK, standout director of suspense movies, being sought to produce and direct an hour-long drama series, titled The Hitchcock Hand. Another drama series will feature the Actors Co., including the FREDERIC MARCHES (FLORENCE ELDREDGE), REX HARRISON and LILLI PALMER, HELEN HAYES and others. These are all for a Fall launching.

PAUL DOUGLAS, BRANDON DE WILDE, DONALD COOK and WALTER SLEZAK signed by ABC to rotate in its new Sunday night ABC Album. Program, which starts April 12 with BARRY SULLIVAN as emcee, will showcase new program ideas for possible commercial sponsorship.

New shows being auditioned by CBS for a probable Fall start: My Favorite Husband, co-starring JOAN CAULFIELD and BARRY NELSON; That's My Boy, starring EDDIE WAYEHOFF; Professional Father, a situation comedy not yet cast, Beat Your Wife, with ROGER PRICE as emcee, and Annie Oakley, with GAIL DAVIS starred.

HOLLYWOOD

Arthur Engel reports:

You'll see better telefilms from Hollywood, come autumn: While frantic movie studios are re-tooling for 3-dimensional pictures, their top craftsmen are shifting to more stable TV jobs . . . About 20 stations will begin telecasting GLORIA SWANSON'S Crown Theatre films in next fortnight.

BING CROSBY is slated for six TV shows between October and June, but his agreement reserves him right to beg off if he wishes . . . That's JOAN BLONDELL'S kid sister, GLORIA, as Gillis' wife now in Life of Riley . . . If Dixie Dugan and Blondie are your favorite comics, watch for them on TV next Fall.

Don't expect 3-D telefilms soon, too costly and technically troublesome. For example, MARTIN AND LEWIS' last picture made with Third D, was beset by such mechanical delays as 45 minutes simply for calibrating cameras. Telefilm budgets are far too low to absorb these extra charges . . . RCA Chairman DAVID SARNOFF widened the opening for major picture studios to produce telefilm by his recent announcement here that NBC wants only to syndicate, not make, them. Current forecast is the big studios will be filming for TV within a year.

MGM's LESLIE CARON appeared on KEN MURRAY'S last show as a result of bawling-out studio gave him for incidentally showing some of its other stars in a previous program. Murray had run off some filmed scenes of the recent Call Me Madam premiere, revealing a few Metro contract players. Studio called him to fuss about doing this without permission, but he talked them into okaying Miss Caron for a television guest visit.

ROD CAMERON is starting a new telefilm series, City Detective . . . PETER LAWFORD breaks into TV in the 33rd Ford Theatre film, The Son-in-Law . . . MICKEY ROONEY isn't happy about his sample telefilm and may remake it . . . Raves over CHARLES LAUGHTON'S television readings assures renewal of his first series . . . As well as numerous imitators . . . ROY ROGERS will get a Doctor of Business Administration Degree from Rio Grande College in Ohio on May 3rd: Following month his wife, DALE EVANS, and the five kids will trailer vacation with him along the West Coast fishing and boating . . . Representative of MILTON BERLE'S sponsor is combing Hollywood for a filmed replacement . . . A GROUCHO MARX fan told him he is replacing WILL ROGERS as the Nation's wittiest commentator. "Oh," he rebuked, "You mean I'm dead, too?"

Booming to left in production here is causing scarcity of studio space. Ceneral Service Studios, site of <u>I Love</u> Lucy and other to king programs, is increasing its facilities from eight to eleven studios.



Lucy's \$50,000,000 Baby

A Whole New Industry

A GOLDEN flood has been touched off at the California home of Lucille Ball and Desi Arnaz by the arrival of little Desiderio Alberto Arnaz, IV.

Although both Lucy and Desi have announced publicly that the new baby will not be exploited—and Hollywood friends say they are absolutely sincere in this wish—the results just can't be helped.

The arrival of little Desi sent the popularity of their "I Love Lucy" show to an all-time high and opened the door to merchandising programs that well may dwarf their income from films and television.

The merchandising furore has New York and Hollywood experts referring to him admiringly as "Lucy's \$50,000,-000 Baby," because revenue from present commitments is expected to top that mark. And there are indications that the final total may be closer to a \$100,000,000 figure.

It's an amazing total for a field in which Hopalong Cassidy promotions were considered a smashing success when they passed the \$3,000,000-a-year mark.

Home is Still Quiet

The echoes of this campaign haven't reached the quiet home on a seven-acre estate in suburban Northridge, 30 miles from Hollywood in the fashionable San Fernando Valley, where Lucy and Desi live.

After the first rush of reporters and photographers, their lives and those of their children returned very nearly to normal. The first color photographs of the new baby, one of which was obtained by TV Guide and is reproduced in the current issue, made a gala occasion.

According to Ed Sedgwick, the baby's godfather, this air of normality is aided by the fact that little Desi is a model infant. Sedgwick, while an MGM director, discovered Lucille Ball and virtually has been a member of the family ever since.

"His nurse, Mrs. Hart, says Baby Desi is the most perfect infant to come under her care," Sedgwick relates. "He is very healthy and cries only for his bottle, and then usually for seconds."

Weighing 8 pounds, 9 ounces at birth on January 19, the baby is growing



rapidly. He's the special pet of his baby sister, Desiree Lucie.

Own Wing

Neither Lucy nor Desi want fame to interfere with their children's lives. The two Arnaz youngsters have their own nursery wing with a separate patio adjoining the main house. Their rooms and the rooms and baths of Desi's nurse and Lucie's governess are there.

The nursery is a sea of toys, many of them the gifts of television viewers, who sent 10,000 letters and 500 packages in the first few days after little Desi's birth.

Lucy and Desi spend as much time with the children as possible, including 6:30 A.M. breakfast times. This is in spite of their busy schedule of rehearsing, filming and editing the *I Love Lucy* program.

"There's no point in having children, if you can't be with them," Lucy says. "They are wonderful to watch. They change so fast."

The show schedule starts with first reading of the script on Tuesday. On Wednesday, lighting is arranged. Camera rehearsals on Thursday lead up to the dress rehearsal Thursday night. Network officials and writers sit in on this trial run.

in this schedule to enjoy the company of their children.

Security and Love

Beyond that, it's an effort to give the children the security of parental care. Both children will be brought up to speak Spanish and English. Desi, Sr., already has dreams of sending his new son to law school, probably to Notre Dame. But both Lucy and Desi are now concerned more with the intervening years.

This is why they want to shield little Desi from the effects of too much publicity. It's the reason Desi, Sr., said the baby would not be exploited "in any way except to help other children less fortunate."

For this reason, baby promotions are centered around the fictional baby, Ricky, Jr., the child of the characters played by Lucy and Desi on the television show. The newest doll introduced is "Ricky, Jr.," to follow up the Christmas success of the *I Love Lucy* doll.

Yet the new baby, by spurring interest in the television show, has created a multi-million-dollar market for "I Love Lucy" articles. A "Lucy" bedroom suite was introduced in January and the second million of these sets is

now being manufactured. It's being followed by a "Lucy" living room suite, modeled on the TV furniture.

Everything Under Sun

Other promotions include everything from "Lucy" sweaters, lingerie and dresses to "Desi" dressing gowns. There are nursery sets, baby layettes, toys and games, including a three-dimensional book to be viewed through polaroid glasses.

Little known to the public, the key man in the multi-million-dollar I Love Lucy merchandising is A. E. Hamilton, tall, heavy-set, smartly-tail-ored head of the New York office of

Desilu Productions, Inc.

His comparatively small office, consisting of a conference room and a desk for a receptionist, is in the Fred F. French building at 551 Fifth Ave. From these quarters, Hamilton handles the royalty arrangements on promotions which will reach into every corner of the country.

The I Love Lucy comic strip is appearing in 132 newspapers. Desi's song "Brand New Baby" is climbing in popularity. Film contracts have been signed for a new movie, plus a release made up by combining three of the TV film shows.


Then there's the new \$8,000,000 contract signed with Philip Morris & Co., Ltd., Inc., sponsor of the *I Love Lucy* show and CBS Television, about half of which covers the cost of air time.


It's all a part of a golden flood which follows the birth of little Desi. But both Lucy and Desi have known hard times during their climb to success.

Lucille had disappointments as a Broadway show girl and movie bit player before she clicked in "Roberta." Desi was the son of a wealthy Cuban family whose fortune was swept away in the 1933 Revolution when they fled to Florida.

Money or no money, they want little Desi to grow up able to stand on his own two feet.


FACES THE

WALTER Winchell talks to more of his fellow-Americans every week than any other columnist. His daily and Sunday columns are carried in more than 400 newspapers. His Sunday night radio program is broadcast on more than 230 ABC stations. His Sunday night television show is aired on an average of 30 ABC-TV stations.

Yet Winchell always has insisted on privacy for his telecasts and broadcasts. His studio is out-of-bounds to network executives, agency men and even sponsors. Pictures of Winchell at work are practically non-existent.

For TV Guide, Winchell agreed to let a cameraman and reporter into the studio. The picture series of WW's staccato delivery is the result. In addition, he posed for color photographs alone and with his lovely daughter, Walda.

From world politics to the latest Broadway gossip, Winchell covers the news in a manner all his own. Television, for the first time, gives him maximum impact as his expressive face and gestures underline the drama of the news.

OUPPOSE you were a television producer and one of your leading actors became ill just a few hours before air time. There are no understudies in TV so you are faced with the problem of finding a reliable last-minute replacement. Whom would you call?

Fred Coe, producer of NBC's Philco Playhouse, put in a frantic message for Vinton Hayworth, actor, at 3:30 on a Sunday afternoon. One of the leads in Philco's The Last Hour, scheduled for broadcast at 9 that evening, had taken ill. Hayworth rushed to the studio from his home, arriving at 4:55.

In Four Hours

Within four hours he had memorized the entire role and walked through several rehearsals. Without benefit of cue sheets or prompters, he turned in a near-perfect job.


A group of about 10 actors and actresses receive the brunt of such lastminute assignments. Naturally, these
are the ones who have been in TV
almost from the start. They've learned
from the most exacting tutor—experience—the intricacies of TV acting. As
Coe put it, "These are the people who
probably know more about the medium than most producers and directors

today. Besides being 'quick studies,' they know without being told such things as how to cross in front of a camera without getting in range of the lens and how to handle a close-up position."

Everyone Knows Them

While only a few of these performers have achieved star billing, the others have appeared on so many programs that they're recognized by viewers both on screen and in the streets. These actors, in addition to Hayworth, include Vaughn Taylor, John Newland, Charlton Heston, John Baragrey and John McQuade. On the distaff side are Felicia Montealegre, Maria Riva, Neva Patterson and Grace Kelly.

Hayworth is the real pioneer in the group. He says he produced and acted in TV's first dramatic program, back in 1930 when he was TV program manager of Chicago's experimental W9XAP. Since then he has appeared in some 425 shows. Taylor and McQuade both have acted in more than 250 and Miss Patterson has done about 200. Heston and Miss Montealegre rose to fame as discoveries of producer Worthington L. Miner on CBS' Studio One, with Heston later becoming a full-fledged movie

star. Miss Riva was one of the first actresses to be signed by CBS to a long-term contract and McQuade, Newland and Baragrey have appeared in scores of TV productions. Miss Kelly is now in M-G-M's Mogambo with Clark Gable and Ava Gardner.

Always Welcome

The question most asked of these performers is whether they believe such constant exposure in the Nation's living-rooms might lead viewers to tire of them. Baragrey recently received a letter from his mother, who watches TV at her home in Alabama. She warned her son that he was "wearing

corns on the eyeballs of the public." Most fan mail, however, indicates that the often-seens do not overstay their welcomes so long as they vary sufficiently the roles they play.

The rise in TV's financial status is reflected in their pay scales. Miss Patterson received \$25 for her first role, as one of the leads in DuMont's Captain Video in 1947. She now averages \$750 to \$1000 per performance. Baragrey received \$75 as star of the first Kraft Theater presentation in 1947 and now makes as much as \$1000 a program.

Their early struggles with low pay and a new medium are finally paying off, then, for these veterans.

A MERICAN Broadcasting - United Paramount has shown first signs that it means to make it a three-network competition in staging TV entertainment. George Jessel was swiped away from NBC; reported terms being \$100,000 a year for two years. Other important negotiations this week resulted in wrapping up a contract for Eddie Fisher, who'll be seen in a weekly 15-minute segment sponsored by Coca Cola. Time and network are not yet known.

Sign of the times in a Chicago furniture store: "We Love Lucy—which calls for new store hours. Open Tuesday evenings instead of Mondays."

Arthur Godfrey scheduled for a hip operation. The surgical repair to hip injuries resulting from an auto accident of 20 years ago will keep him off evening TV for four months.

Gotham is readying an answer to TV Hollywood in the form of Tele-City, Inc., a proposed multi-million-dollar project for all-purpose live and film

TV production. Plans for the gigantic development at Flushing Meadows to be unveiled shortly.

This Sunday's Easter Parade on TV will prove viewers hold a hefty power of veto over the quality of programming. The howl that went up following last year's Easter commercial circus is still being heard. This time the networks plan programs conducted with dignity and in keeping with the religious significance of the day.

UHF—the new "upstairs TV"—has proven itself practical from nearly every standpoint. Most of the uncertainty about its effectiveness has been eliminated and more than 200,000 U. S. families are enjoying TV in the ultra high frequency range.

Marian and Jim Jordan, stars of Fibber McGee and Molly this week notified NBC they will not be available for the projected video version of their radio show. Failing health and high taxes entered into their decision.

Danny Thomas and Ray Bolger are the latest recruits added to its roster. Both stars will head their shows out of Hollywood, with dancer Bolger's on the docket to be filmed. . . . NBC is enthusiastic about Ezio Pinza's projected new program, "Enchanted Isle," but the net is waiting for a suitable time period to open up.

Wally Cox of "Mr. Peepers" fame is being swamped with invitations from New York high schools to speak at their assemblies. Although PTA groups would hardly endorse the bungling Mr. Peepers as an example of pedagogical perfection, the kids nevertheless think he's pretty wonderful. . . . Viewers are awaiting critically to see how the networks cover the Easter Parade this Sunday. There were loud protests last year over TV's "lack of good taste" in handling the famous Fifth Avenue tradition.

Televiewers are talking about Arthur Godfrey's impending hip operation which will take the Redhead away from his radio-TV chores May 4. Robert Q. Lewis is already slated for his umpteenth replacement chore for Artha'... The teen-agers are still moaning over the departure of Bill Hayes from "Show of Shows." The collar-ad crooner figures to be away for a long time, too, since he has hooked up with the always sure-fire Rodgers and Hammerstein in the Broadway musical, "Me & Juliet."



Everybody's

By ten o'clock at night, Chicago's rackety loop has undergone a fantastic change. The cliff-dwellers have returned to their diggings and a comparative stillness settles down, broken only by a car horn or an occasional rumbling "EL." On the hour, NBC's famous three chimes will float out across the Chicago River from that fortress on the river, the Merchandise Mart. Up on the 19th floor at the Mart, the red light on a TV camera will flash on and weatherman Clint Youle will look out at a million or so people and say, "Hi."

As unpretentious as it all sounds, this casual greeting has made Clint one of the favorite TV characters in town. Those NBC chimes, supposedly symbolizing "Quality," mean just that on the Chicago end of the network operation. From early in the morning till late at night, anything coming out of WNBQ locally rings with quality. Clint's sign-on is a good tipoff why.

A few years back, TV Row buzzed with a new cliché, "The Chicago Touch." Actually it was just a few




shows at WNBQ that were responsible for the new found respect for Chicago. Dave Garroway led the way, but Studs Terkel and Ransom Sherman also had shows on channel 5 which advocated taste and an easy natural approach to this business of TV. It's interesting to note that all three of those gentlemen lost their shows, by Gresham's Law of TV shows, which says that bad shows drive out good shows. But Clint Youle is still defying Gresham. In fact, he's getting so popular that maybe Gresham's Law ain't a law.

It's hard to imagine why people would want to sit and watch a man talk about the weather for ten minutes every night. More aware of this than anybody else is, of course, Clint Youle. So what he has instead of just a weather report is a nightly visit with Farmer Youle, a friendly man talking about things that neighbors have talked about through the ages. And certainly one of the favorite topics of the day is the weather. All of a sudden it seems that you don't get to spend enough time with Clint. Only ten minutes.

Clint has been Weatherman at WNBQ ever since the coaxial cable first reached Chicago, back in January of 1949. How he got the job is another demonstration of that famous expression, "an act of God."

In 1948, Clint was one of the top news editors at the station, but wanted to take a year's leave of absence in order to write a book. Clint made his request to Bill Ray, local news chief, who forwarded it through the chain of command to staff headquarters in New York. After some delay, the word came back. No. Clint then decided to work only six months more and then resign. Here God stepped in. Before the six months were up, his wife Jean informed him that she was expecting

their second child. This changed the pitching considerably. Clint decided to stay on for awhile.

Then came the second twist. They decided to have a weatherman show on TV at ten o'clock to precede Clifton Utley and the News. After some searching, they found Clint. He had been trained as a meteorologist by the Army Air Corps during World War II although he had never had a chance to practice his new found craft. The Air Corps found that he was officer material and put him into Intelligence. But WNBQ stepped in where the Air Corps feared to tread. With Clint's experience as a newsman, plus his weather training, he was the most logical man to tell folks about the weather. He's been doing it ever since.

Although Clint is a native of Chicago and lives with his wife and two kids in Wheaton at present, there is a slight twang to his voice that betrays his upbringing. His ancestors settled in the Northwest part of the state in Jo Daviess County and the family's roots have been there ever since.

A graduate of Oak Park High (1933), Clint had to delay his entrance into college for a couple of years in

order to build up his finances. He finally entered Wheaton College in 1935 and graduated in 1939. Wheaton is primarily a college for people going into the missionary field or the ministry, but Clint won his degree in English Literature. After school he travelled out to Elizabeth, Ill., a powerful little hamlet in Jo Daviess County with a population of 600. There he started a country newspaper that came out weekly. This work took only part of his time. Clint had purchased a farm out there and settled down to become a farmer.

In 1940 he was overcome with ambition and went to Chicago to see what he could see and found a job at WMAQ. He stayed there until he went into the Air Corps so that when he was discharged he was one of the two oldest newsmen at the station.

Although Clint started out on his weather show as a comparative rookie, he is now a member in good standing with the American Meteorological Society, a learned group, and Clint knows as much about his subject as most of them. He's worked hard at the subject and is quite proud of his membership in the society. He's been asked to make speeches at their annual conventions, a tipoff that he has won a great deal of respect from the people who know his business best.

Recently, a disaster of sorts hit the Youle show. Clint has more or less shared the spotlight with his wife Jean, who did most of the commercials and had informal chats with Clint. This folksy bantering between the two helped to cement their relationship with the audiences who loved their nightly visit with those friendly Youle people.

Jean was not one to memorize commercials, but rather worked from an outline which gave her a chance to sell the product in her own natural way. Once in a while this would lead to a muffed line, but in general was effective selling. But someone at the advertising agency that handles the show decided that a home economist would be willing to deliver the commercials in the exact way they wanted them and ergo they'd sell more of their product. So Jean was replaced. Clint,

BOB ATCHER

THE Midwest can't boast of cowboys like Kit Carson, Wild Bill Hickok or Hopalong Cassidy. That's probably because all the cattle rustlers and claim jumpers went west, as per Horace Greeley's advice. And the cowboys followed right after, to preserve law and order.

So when a misplaced cowpoke like Bob Atcher finds himself roaming the central prairies, all he can do is strum a guitar and sing about the life other cowboys live. Of course, this isn't so bad when he does his singing on TV and gets paid for it, as Bob does.

During the week, Bob yodels his western melodies between reels of "Adventure Time." On Sundays, he sings a few tunes between his twin tasks of running the "Meadow Gold" ranch and giving commercials. Chicago's singing cowboy has the added job on Sundays of supervising the "Short Stump" ranch-within-a-ranch which has puppets for its tenants. There's foreman Sammy Squirrel, cook Billy Bull, timid ranch-hand Sylvester

Skunk and conceited jazz vocalist Willie Worm. The "Short Stump" residents have thrived during their 4½ years on TV, thanks to Cowboy Atch-

er's fond parental interest.

Ever since he was knee high to a holstein cow, Bob has been a red hot fan of Western songs and customs. When he was four, he accompanied his Dad and brothers on the guitar at Hardin County, Ky., square dances. After his folks sold their Kentucky land to the government (for Fort Knox), the family moved to a ranch in North Dakota where Bob learned the ways and songs of cattlemen.

Back in the late 20's, Bob wanted to learn medicine, but found out his songs healed more aches and pains than his prescriptions did. After leaving the University of Kentucky in 1931, Bob and his brother, Randy, came to Chicago where they found a market for their singing talents. In the mid-30's, Bob began recording solo-fashion while Randy carved a radio-TV career for himself in Ky.

In addition to his recording and TV work, Bob has also appeared in a few western films including "Hail To The Rangers," "West Of The Sunset" and "Panhandle Trail." After serving three years in the South Pacific during World War II, he decided to give up movies and settle for the Midwest entertainment scene.

Here he has found plenty of Western roles on early morning radio shows and in 1948 he was picked as singer-emcee for WLS' Barn Dance.


Some cowboys might think Bob's life is a sissy version of the rugged Western life. But not so with Bob. He's saving his funds for the day he can retire to a real ranch in Arizona. He even has the name picked out—the "Swinging A," which now identifies the Atcher home out in Palatine, Ill. Bob's living there with his wife and two youngsters, son Robin, 2, and daughter Mary Christopher, 3 months. And who would argue with Bob when he says his cowboy life is better than chasing varmints any day?

THE BIG PITCHMAN



WHO is Chicago's biggest TV money-maker?

It probably won't soil anybody's reputation if the word got out that a comparative unknown, Bill O'Connor, topped the earning list at the end of this year. Bill wraps up somewhere around 48 hours a week as announcer on radio and TV and these chores net him an income that has soared over the \$100 grand mark. Which is by way of proving that the ways of a commercial pitchman are just as profitable as ever.

Ubiquitous Bill is liable to turn up on any station selling all manner of products. His trade secret is a confidential manner which implies that he's letting you and only you in on a killing. He talks fast & low & furious and his products sell & sell & sell, which apparently keeps everybody happy, especially Bill with his six-figure wages.

Bill got into the pitchman dodge after spending his apprenticeship as an actor. He was born in Pittsburgh in 1923, which if you want to do some arithmetic, will show that he's only 29 years old, pretty young to be making all that dough.

His family moved when he was but a lad to Miami, Florida, and Bill went to college at both the U. of Miami and the U. of Alabama, majoring in dramatics at both schools. While still attending the U. of Miami he won an announcing job at WQAM in Miami, his radio baptism.

In 1943, the Navy grabbed him, but the Navy, sometimes knowing what to do with its personnel, kept Bill at his announcing chores. In 1945, discharged, he married Dorothy Conover of Chicago and at her insistence moved to the Windy City.

His major break came when Mike Wallace, Chicago's number one announcer at the time, departed for New York City leaving all sorts of jobs open in Chicago. Bill was tapped for several of these assignments and the word got around that he was unloading plenty of his sponsors' products. Two years and three months from the time when his only show was a midnight disk jockey show on WENR, Bill became Chicago's most employed pitchman.

One of his major accounts is C.E.T. for which he handles commercials all over radio and TV. Howard Shapiro, president of C.E.T., tells of the frantic Saturday he spent trying to monitor all his shows, listening to O'Connor on radio stations WCFL, WJJD, WIND, while watching him on WGN-TV.

The ad agencies have despaired of writing scripts for Bill. He does best when he's ad libbing, so that the ad men merely make an outline and let his fertile imagination do the rest. Works pretty well, too.

Bill claims that he is essentially an introvert, shy in crowds and quiet in conversation. But get him near a microphone and some inner compulsion hits him and before he's finished he's peddled a boatload of TV sets or whatever else he happens to be selling.

Regarding Bill's emergence into the upper income brackets, it's said that he has to make all that money to support a family in the accustomed Irish tradition. Among the O'Connor moppets are Kerry, 7, Maureen, 5, Kathy, 3, and Val, 1. At that rate, he'll have to keep adding new sponsors to keep up with new additions to the O'Connor family.

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
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"JET PILOT"



THERE'S a man over at station WNBQ named George Heinemann who at present is in grave danger of being hailed as a TV genius. George is program chief at the station and he's come up with a couple of ideas in recent months that are among the most original to come along in years. His "Faces in the Window" on which Ken Nordine reads great horror literature already has won a TV Forecast award. And his "Jet Pilot" is proving to be just the thing to wean kids away from that science fiction stuff that's all over TV.

"Jet Pilot" is just what the title implies. This is no wild adventure show. This is the real thing. Starring Commander Robert Horder of Glenview Naval Air Station and professional actors Jerry Garvey and George Cisar, it's a slick professional account of practically everything that pertains to airplanes. And it's amazing how many things do pertain to airplanes.

The first "Jet Pilot" show started off with a discussion of Leonardo DaVinci, the great Renaissance genius whose theories of flight were approximately four hundred years ahead of their time. From this the show went to Commander Horder who used a well-integrated combination of blackboard sketches and films, illustrated the theory of aerodynamics.

But wait, don't go away. To all but the scientist, science is pretty dull business. So "Jet Pilot" steers completely away from the thick scientific jargon and the terms used are strictly in kid's simple language. Better yet, some of the shots of jet planes in action will stand your hair on end. This show was designed specifically for the younger set, but there's probably just as large an adult audience on hand.

Horder, the star of the show, is a native Chicagoan, who has been slightly nutty about planes since he was a little boy. After eight years of building model airplanes, he took flying lessons when he was 17 years old. In 1941 he enlisted in the Naval Air Corps and did his flying in the Pacific where he earned three combat stars and the Air Medal.

In 1951, Bob ran into George Heinemann at a Northwestern Homecoming party and Heinemann, an ex-pilot himself asked if Bob would be interested in doing a show like Jet Pilot. Bob jumped at the chance and another fine TV show was born.

Aside from the theory of flight and matters concerning jets, the show also digs back into aviation history and shows entertaining films of early planes, gas balloons and such. The device used to keep the show from becoming stuffy is to have a three way conversation between Horder, Cisar, who plays an airplane grease monkey and Garvey as a kid who wants to find out about planes.

For anybody else who wants to find out about planes, this is the show to see. There is nothing pedantic about it. It's just some people who love airplanes and love to talk about them. The results, especially when films of planes in flight are shown, are jet-propelled and thrilling.

Jet Pilot is seen at 5:30 p.m. on channel 5 (WNBQ) on Saturday.







PROGRAM OF THE WEEK

Robert Montgomery Presents

Robert Montgomery, as do most producers of weekly TV dramatic programs, attempts to rotate melodrama, mystery, comedy and other basic story ideas from week to week to achieve the necessary change of pace—as much requisite to a TV show as to a baseball pitcher.

Not surprisingly, in view of his own aptitude for sophisticated comedy roles in movies before he turned to TV, he is consistently most successful when his programs lean to comedý. His Robert Montgomery Presents on NBC Monday nights, in fact, is one of the few drama series in TV able to carry off a comedy show with all the finesse of a Broadway or Hollywood production.

Homeier Scored

'Montgomery proved this point with three programs which he staged in as many weeks. The attempt to go starkly melodramatic in an adaptation of Joseph Conrad's *The Shadow Line* was saved from being completely uninteresting only by the fine acting of young Skip Homeier as the star.

The following week Montgomery achieved something of a coup by corraling the three acting Lockharts—father Gene, mother Kathleen and daughter June—for a story about a New England family at the turn of the century. With Art Carney, better known as Jackie Gleason's straight man, almost stealing the comedy honors from the Lockhart clan, this program achieved a charm which helped put Montgomery back on the right track.

The producer hit his stride the next Monday with a comedy about young love and the advertising business, deftly titled Dinah, Kip and Mr. Barlow. An original by Theodore and Mathilde Ferro, the play featured



Diana Lynn, Jack Lemmon, Vaughn Taylor and Louisa Horton. Each caught the spirit of the script admirably, with Montgomery capitalizing on their talents to present a warm-hearted story.

Melodrama Misses Fire

Montgomery returned to melodrama several weeks later and again came a cropper. In a yarn about a group of English scientists attempting to beat the Russians to the punch in developing a germ culture, the script deteriorated into a second-rate whodunit. Patric Knowles and Lisa Ferraday topped the cast in this one, titled *The Centrifuge*. None of the characters could evoke either sympathy or credibility, however, and so many phony clues were tossed at viewers that it was hardly worth the effort.

All this is not to imply that Montgomery should concentrate exclusively on comedy. But if he could achieve warmth and spirit in dramas as he does in comedies, he would have little to worry about in obtaining change of pace from week to week.


Alan Young, who alternate Sunday nights on CBS TV's Time to Smile are just managing to live up to the show's title. Smiles — yes. Chuckles,

Murray's program reflects too many things already old hat in the medium. For those who still prefer acrobats, adagio dancers, and other vaudeville acts, his show will do well. But most viewers have graduated from such viewing fare, and from Murray's file of well-seasoned gags.

There's hope, though. Ken devoted one half-hour to a film of the Call Me Madam movie premiere, and it was a definite improvement. Could be that the comic is loosening his format to offer real variety instead of just variety acts.

As for Alan Young, he has tried film and live so far but his real problem lies in the material being dished up for him. Trite situations coupled with thin plots hardly make for solid entertainment,



His success in movie roles is proof enough that he can do it.

CAPSULE CRITIQUES

PAUL—Pops to millions— Whiteman (ABC-

TV) is still happiest when turning up new talent. His TV Teen Club, unlike most talent "scout" affairs, features youngsters who haven't yet had time to hire an agent and play night clubs from coast to coast before being discovered by Arthur Godfrey or Dennis James.

Down You Go!, Du Mont's delightful quiz show originating in Chicago, is still going up in most viewers' estimation. Sparkling, sophisticated and erudite, Dr. Bergan Evans, the moderator, and Panelists Toni Gilman, Carmelita Pope, Robert Breen and Francis Coughlin combine to make the program one of the witty best of its class. Or, maybe, the attractive female panelists have us in this frame of mind.—R. S.

Red Smith

WHEN August Adolphus Busch, Jr., became president of the St. Louis Cardinals recently, there was rejoicing throughout the National and American leagues because Gussie Busch has money the way other club owners have dandruff, and money is a commodity that is held in high esteem, not to say reverence, in baseball.

There is, however, a small, silent minority whose enthusiasm over the news was—well, restrained. This group is composed of serious thinkers who have nothing whatever against the St. Louis braumeister, or his product, or his money, but are faintly disturbed by the spectacle of a baseball club falling into the hands of a fox hunter.

Mr. Busch is a chubby, four-eyed billionaire whose principal interest in sports has been monopolized by the Bridlespur Hunt Club in St. Louis County. His idea of good, clean fun is to spring out of bed before dawn, pull on a pink frock coat, clamber onto a horse and go plunging buckity-buckity over hedges and creeks and chicken coops at the heels of a pack of hounds chasing a terrified furpiece.

It is open to question whether he will find life compatible in a society whose members spring out of nothing at dawn except Toots Shor's and think a fox is a cigar-smoking animal with bushy eyebrows who operates as general manager of the Pittsburgh Pirates. To be sure, some club owners have been known to chase vixen, but never on horseback and never with intent to kill.

There is not, so far as is known, any active opposition to fox hunting among the baseball set. It has not been established that those club owners who can read are familiar with and would subscribe to Oscar Wilde's description of a

Hunt: "The unspeakable pursuing the inedible." It's just that baseball people and fox people travel in different orbits.

Only on one occasion have the two pastimes been joined. Several autumns ago, workmen painting and refurbishing Yankee Stadium between seasons flushed a fox out of the Presidential Box behind third base formerly occupied by Larry MacPhail. Reynard, it was discovered, had moved in during the World Series to study strategy under Casey Stengel and had just stayed on, feeding on goose liver canapes, crabmeat au gratin, galatine of capon, gin-soaked olives out of used martini glasses, and other leftovers in the kitchen of the stadium club.

Mistaking the painters for television announcers who would eat everything in the joint, the fox bared his teeth in a ferocious snarl. This terrified the workmen, who hadn't seen a fox in a New York ball park since Clark Griffith quit managing the Highlanders. A war of extinction went on for weeks before the fox was cornered and blown apart with a shotgun, spattering pate de foie gras and turkey hash about the premises.

When young Bob Carpenter, of the horsey duPont empire, became head man of the Phillies, a sordid rumor got around that he was a fox hunter but he denied the charge with spirit.

"I never shoot a fox unless he pulls a knife on me first," Mr. Carpenter dedeclared. "Ducks are my meat."

That was the last time the issue was raised in baseball until Gussie Busch arrived. Ford Frick, the commissioner, is biding his time. He does not propose to take action until Eddie Stanky, the Cardinals' manager, shows up on the coaching line wearing pinks and crying, "Yoicks, Tally-Ho," at the umpires.



Herb Shriner knows autos, jokes and people

HERB Shriner, famed Hoosier comedian, is known to millions of television fans as a countrified sort of fellow with a mop of uncombed hair and the habit of pulling his ear and saying "Anyways" as an introduction to his jokes.

Actually, he's a pretty knowing guy, just as much at home in New York or Hollywood as in any of the small towns of America. Among other things, he knows a lot about souped-up automobiles, the inner workings of humor, and ways to develop an unending source of talent for television.

No Country Bumpkin

He's no more of a country bumpkin than Will Rogers, and like the immortal Will, he has retained the small town If there's one outstanding thing about Herb Shriner that doesn't show in his television role, it's his love of automobiles and respect for the engines that make them go. While other Indiana entertainers have been known as the "Hoosier Hot Shots," Herb could well be known as the "Hoosier Hot-Rod." If it weren't for his TV and tour commitments he'd be content to spend his time with grease-stained nose, fiddling with an automobile's innards.

Heads Sport Show

Coming up this week in New York's Grand Central Palace is the International Motor Sport Show, which will display the newest—and in some cases the weirdest—of the advance guard automobiles. And moving spirit in the



touch of seeing things clearly and summing them up with a droll wit.

Take Toot Shors' big restaurant in New York, for example, where the average out-of-towner is likely to be awed by the rush of big city characters. When it came time for dessert, Herb turned to the waiter and said:

"What kind of pie do you have . . . left."

The "left" put Toot's glittering establishment back in focus with all of the small-town restaurants around the country where the late customer faces a dwindling supply of pie.

show is the same Shriner who talks lovingly of the small-town America where they yelled "Get a horse" at daring automobilists.

"Folks seem surprised when I want to talk about automobiles," Shriner says, "but actually I've been interested in them almost as long as I can remember."

He came by his interest naturally. Auburn, Ind., is not far from his home town of Fort Wayne, Ind., and Auburn is where the famous line of Cords and Dusenbergs was produced to show what could be done in automobile design.

"Ever since I saw them as a kid, I've never been satisfied with a standard automobile," Shriner says.

He owns three cars now. One is a 1937 Cord. The second is a 1934 12-cylinder Packard. The third is a "Playboy," a model built in Buffalo to sell for under \$1000, but a victim of the Depression Thirties.

Backs Hot-Rodders

He feels that the standardization of the big cars has left plenty of room for experimentation, even in the hands of the so-called "hot-rodders."

"The real, organized, hot-rodders are serious kids, conscious of their responsibilities," Herb says. "In California, State police are cooperating with them by setting up timing strips where they can try out their cars. It keeps them off the highways, but still gives them a chance to see what they can do.

"I think it's important. Hitler set up his Auto Union to conduct experiments just like this and gave them all the money they wanted. Now a couple of our youngsters already have come along and topped the Auto Union records.

"I think some of these kids now tinkering with automobiles in their backyards are going to be the Fords and Firestones of the future."

It was a pretty serious speech for Shriner, who prefers to talk about his "home town" where there was nothing to do on Saturday night "but go down to the barber shop and watch haircuts."

Actually, Fort Wayne, where he grew up (he was born in Toledo, O.) isn't a small town. But Shriner says he picked up his cast of characters from real people he met while playing small towns around Fort Wayne as a harmonica artist.

Although Herb is six feet two, he never played basketball, practically treason for an Indianan. But basketball started him in show business.


"I played with the school harmonica band for the basketball games," Herb recalls. "The biology teacher organized the band and there was a theory you'd better play or else."

Started in Radio

He was, as he admits, "pretty good" at it, so he continued playing the harmonica on the Fort Wayne radio station and in small-town theaters around Fort Wayne. That was when he had his name shortened.

Herb's father spelled the name "Schreiner." "But I had to shorten it for the places I played," Herb says. "The theaters was too small." In fact, his first marquee billing came out "H. Shiner."

From the small towns, he moved up to a seven-show-a-day grind vaudeville house in Detroit, which was where





he introduced his monologues.

"I had to do it to get a rest from playing the harmonica," he relates. "I was blowing the roof of my mouth off."

His act was good enough to get him an Australian booking. "I traveled halfway around the world as a harmonica player. One jump ahead of the audience." Then he bounced back to the U. S. for appearances on the Camel Caravan and the Kate Smith show.

Served in Europe

He entered the Army in 1943 and spent most of the time with a combat zone entertainment unit in Europe. "I found out one thing," he says, "some of those combat men, coming out of the front lines muddy and miserable, had the greatest sense of humor in the world. They could get off funnier lines than any pro."

Herb was tagged to do his famous monologues in the hit-show "Inside U. S. A." in 1946 and zoomed into television renown as a Godfrey replace-

ment in 1951.

Right now, he's the star of NBC's "Two For The Money" a give-away program.

"Imagine a man just standing around giving away money?" Herb says. "I don't know how President Truman can give it up."

But the format calls for Herb to do some quick-witted exchanges with contestants and the results are frequently startling.

When a Connecticut lady who bred dogs said she started her business with one dog, Herb said:

"Back in Indiana, we usually started

with two."

When a girl contestant said she was named Meredith and her sister was named Charlie, Herb commented:

"Guess your folks weren't paying nuch attention when they named you two."

When a contestant said he once had palf-a-mind to enter politics, Shriner quipped: "With half-a-mind, you was all set there."

He once said that a woman back in his home town would have been in the '400," if "we'd had that many people there."

Since the show involves no rehearsals, Herb has some free time. He's

been practically commuting to Hollywood for his role in the forthcoming picture "Main Street to Broadway."

He's making frequent personal appearances coast-to-coast. He's working on a new venture, doing the commentary for a record suite.

The rest of the time he spends at his Manhattan apartment with his wife, Pixie, and their young daughter, Indy (for Indiana).

Herb thinks his own beginnings in the entertainment world may provide the answer to television's crying need for new talent.

"The Fort Wayne station where I started used practically all local performers," Shriner recalls. "One of them was Marilyn Maxwell. Another was Rhubarb Red, now better known as Eddy Arnold. And the Hoosier Hot Shots started there.

"Now the Hot Shots are so popular in the mid-West that when they're coming to a town, people have children just so they can see them."


Herb believes that if local television and radio stations were putting as much emphasis on young talent today, the stars of the future would be assured.

Herb Shriner, it becomes clear, isn't just a comedian. He thinks things through like, well, like Will Rogers.

Top Stars tell "What has taught me"



ARTHUR GODFREY: "It used to be that a man might make a couple of hundred friends in. his lifetime. Television taught me—and all the little Godfreys—there need be no limit to the number if we remember that friendship is built on mutual honesty. That's what we try for on our shows."



DAVE GARROWAY: "The past year on "Today" has taught this old head a few things about pacing out my life. During this year I've been having reveille at 3:30 a.m. I feel it has been worth it, though, because I'm the boy who wakes up folks with good cheer."



RED BUTTONS: "I had to learn for example to gait myself to a kind of pressure I never knew existed, because TV is more taxing, physically and mentally, than any other kind of show business."



JACKIE GLEASON: "I never forget that I'm in somebody's house and I behave as though I'm a guest. I try, and I hope I succeed, to achieve humility."



MILTON BERLE: "Television has made me realize that Mr. and Mrs. American audience have a much higher IQ than they are credited with having. I've learned TV is a great way to reach millions of people—who, luckily, can't reach me."



ED SULLIVAN: "I never believed you had to 'play down' to an audience. I always was certain their good taste and perception was far in advance of those who catered to it. TV has confirmed that conviction over and over again."



IMOGENE COCA: "Working for Max Liebman in "Your Show of Shows" has taught me the wonderful lesson of how to entertain 20 million people at one time."



SID CAESAR: "I have learned a great deal about human nature, for the feeling of intimacy between the performer and viewer brings an unbelievable response by mail and in person. These written and spoken observations are one of the most rewarding by-products of our tough grind."



JOAN ALEXANDER

Joan Alexander, feminine panelist of ABC-TV's The Name's The Same, is one of New York's busiest radio and television actresses, wife of a prominent surgeon and mother of a six-year-old daughter, Jane.

Trade-marked by the light sunbleached streak through her brown hair, she matches wits with Abe Burrows and Meredith Willson in trying to identify guests with such names as Will Kick, Bunker Hill and A. Green Lemon.

Joan broke into the parlor game business by accident. She replaced Arlene Francis on What's My Line in 1950 when Arlene went to Europe.

IN THE GAST

After that, Joan was a guest on Who Said That? Then she was picked for the present panel.

An auto accident in 1939 turned her from a movie career to radio. Born in St. Paul, Minn., and educated at St. Angelus Hall, Brooklyn, and St. Joseph's Academy, Brentwood, L. I., she made her stage debut at 16.

Joan is an expert horsewoman. One wall of her apartment is lined with trophies and ribbons. Her pet peeve is people who think the panel show is fixed. She asks them to pick a name, then pops questions and guesses it.

She says modestly that if the show were fixed, she'd be out of a job. "The producers wouldn't need anybody who can play the game," she explains. "They'd hire some 20-year-old beauty with the face and figure of an angel to handle my place on the panel."

Her worst moment on the show was with a contestant named A. Maiden. Joan thought the name was an article of furniture, asked if it had "drawers."

Take your color hint for Spring from the color format of motion picture and television photography.

A sharp contrast in clothing is taboo since the main emphasis of photography centers on the face. Instead of the combination of stark black and frosty white, television and motion pictures use "off-blacks" and "off-whites." And this has given the fashion world a new pattern for color schemes for Spring.

Technically speaking, "off-blacks" in the vernacular of television and motion pictures is any dark subtle shade such as dark blue, mossy green, deep red, dark violet. "Off-whites" are actually the palest pastels such as ice blue, delicate pink, pale lavender. These softer shades eliminate denseness. They give the effect of a less poster-like look and generally give an overall effect of greater femininity.

Rosemary Clooney has translated these fashion hints into her personal wardrobe. Her blouses, short washable gloves, her collars and cuffs and even her handkerchiefs are dyed pastels. With her charcoal grey shantung suit she wears a pale pink blouse instead of a white one. With her spruce green linen she wears the palest lemon yellow. With her Spring navy suit she wears an ice blue blouse.
