Here, in the words of Robert E. Kintner, president of ABC, is the trend television programming will follow at least for the next few years:

"I think the real significance of special programs in the long run will be to expand normal programming length to 90 minutes and longer. There is nothing sacred about the half-hour and hour timing of programming; and since research seems to indicate that it is a better gamble in attracting audience and holding people to have a longer, rather than a shorter, show, it is my guess that next season will see many one-and-ahalf and two-hour programs in the daytime and nighttime on a regular basis. In effect, what the networks and producers will be attempting to do is to recreate in the home, on a regular basis, program vehicles very similar to the motion pictures and the full-length plays."

That makes it unanimous. NBC, which originated the long, elaborate, spectacular type of show, is already on record. So is CBS with its Shower of Stars, Murrow's new See It Now and Ford Star Jubilee this year, and with more spectaculars planned for next year. With ABC so firmly committed by its president, there no longer is any question about the future of television programming.

We have, on a number of occasions, encouraged the concept of special programs that bring together great casts and great scripts on a once-a-month or every-so-often basis. It is, we feel, the only way television can keep from falling into the week-in and week-out rut of nothing but half-hour shows that plagued radio. Only by continuing to offer unusual entertainment can television retain its excitement, its real variety.

NEW YORK Bob Stahl reports:

As part of a major reshuffle of its Sunday afternoon programs, CBS will revive Front Row Center, last summer's hour-long live dramatic series, in the 4 to 5 P.M. (EST) period soon after Jan. 1. Series, to be produced by MARTIN MANULIS, will originate from Hollywood as part of the network's move to put its Hollywood facilities to fuller use.

Comedian SAM LEVENSON, absent from TV for some time, set for three guest appearances on The Ed Sullivan Show . . . Following the recent successful pickup from Havana on Wide Wide World, producer NORMAN FRANK will next try to bring in a segment from the Dominican Republic via the airplane relay technique.

EVA MARIE SAINT and her TV director-husband, JEFFREY HAYDEN, planning a two-hour musical version of TENNESSEE WILLIAMS! Glass Menagerie" as a TV spectacular . . . A new news program. titled Outlook and featuring CHET HUNTLEY, slated to replace American Inventory soon Sunday afternoons on NBC.

Despite reports that CBS is cutting back on its color programming, the network is planning a new major even-ing color series, probably in the spectacular category, for next season . . . And ABC, with no spectaculars yet to its credit, planning a series of super-shows for next year--but, as of now, not in color.

NBC will stage the New York City Ballet Co.'s production of "Nutcracker Suite" on Christmas day only if it finds a sponsor. Otherwise, it will present BERLIOZ! "Christmas Oratorio" in the 4:30 to 5:30 (EST) period.

Seems that ARNOLD STANG did only a one-shot guest appearance on The Goldbergs telefilms, instead of joining the cast regularly. It's more likely that he'll join The Perry Como Show as a regular . . . Even though the football season is just ending, Producers! Showcase is working on a baseball story for next spring.

ABC, eager several weeks ago to audition several new giveaway shows, has slowed down on the project. According to one network executive, "The bloom is off the rose on jackpot shows" . . Producer SHELDON REYNOLDS signed actress EILEEN O'CASEY, daughter of Irish playwright SEAN O'CASEY, for several Foreign Intrigue telefilms.

PROKOFIEV's opera based on TOLSTOY's "War and Peace" due for its American premiere on NBC's Opera Theater Apr. 8 . . . ZIV-TV building a space satellite similar to the Government's for Science Fiction Theater.

Big-Time Color TV

Many Color Programs Are On The Air But Public Sees Them in Black And White


Is this the big year for color TV? If you mean the number and variety of color programs being telecast, the answer is yes. But if you're talking about how many color receivers will be manufactured and sold this year—the true measure of big-time color TV—the answer is no. But maybe next year.

Despite a sharp boost in the number of color shows telecast each week by NBC and CBS, the public seems content for the moment to watch these in simple, old-fashioned black-and-white. There are only about 30,000 color sets in the hands of the public now, according to latest trade estimates. With the price of color receivers ranging up to about \$900, it's unlikely that there will be a mad rush to buy them. And that seems to be the

crux of the problem: the public won't purchase color receivers until the price comes down and the price isn't likely to come down until more people buy color receivers.

RCA, which has paced the industry in manufacturing and promoting color TV, still charges \$795 for a 21-inch table model and \$895 for a 21-inch console. Brig. Gen. David Sarnoff, board chairman of RCA and NBC, says that it will be impossible to reduce those prices until increased sales lead to increased manufacturing. But he claims that RCA alone is now selling and installing about 1000 color receivers each week. Asked to predict how many color sets will be sold during 1956, Sarnoff said, "It will be more

than a couple of hundred thousand."

The NBC network, a wholly owned subsidiary of RCA, also leads the industry in color programming activity. NBC now telecasts about 10 hours of color shows each week, compared to about two hours a week last year. And there are big plans under way to boost color programming even more.

Sarnoff also announced recently that NBC's Chicago station, WNBQ, will become the first all-color TV station. Its black-and-white equipment is being replaced with color equipment, so that in addition to the network color shows, WNBQ will also telecast all its

The difference: Jack Benny as seen in color and in black and white on a recent CBS Shower of Stars. local live programs in color. The conversion to color, scheduled for completion by April 15, will cost about \$1,250,000.

"All the know-how, all the lessons we learn in this Chicago pilot operation, will be made available to other TV stations interested in advancing color TV as a regular service to the public," Sarnoff said. "I am sure that the color programs that will be originating locally in Chicago will be felt throughout the TV world. For stations all over the country will have their eyes on Chicago, and I believe will follow Chicago's lead and produce their local programs in color."

In addition, NBC has announced it will spend \$12,000,000 continued



to expand its color TV facilities in New York, Chicago and Hollywood so that up to 80 hours a month of color can be telecast.

If there are only about 30,000 color receivers sold so far, why all this emphasis on color programming now? Because RCA and NBC feel that, if enough shows are telecast in color, the public might be induced to buy sets even at today's prices. Besides spectaculars and the regular shows, the color schedule has included sports and children's shows. In other words, something for every taste. If more people buy sets, that will result in mass production of color receivers, lower prices and, in turn, still more people buying sets.

Other networks and set manufacturers have not kept pace with RCA and NBC. CBS now telecasts about twoand-a-half hours of color shows each week, compared with only about an hour and a half last year. The network, however, reportedly wary about how slowly color is progressing, has no plans to increase its color schedule this season. ABC is sitting out color entirely. According to ABC president Robert E. Kintner, "It is our intention to broadcast in color only when there is sufficient national audience for color to justify the institution of a national program service."

On the manufacturing side, CBS-Columbia, the set manufacturing division of CBS, has 21-inch color sets waiting on its shelves but is not promoting them. The sets are priced at \$795, recently marked down from \$1095. But the company believes that the big break-through in color will not occur until 1957 or perhaps early 1958, when the prices of color sets are substantially lower than they are today. "We're keeping our powder dry,"

said one CBS-Columbia spokesman. "We'll be ready to move rapidly, once we decide that the time is ripe."

Some RCA dealers still have some 15-inch color sets, manufactured about 18 months ago, which they're selling for \$395. Motorola has 21-inch color sets for \$695 and \$795 but is currently selling more of them to bars, taverns and other public places than to the public. Capehart has a 21-inch table model at \$795. Magnavox, Du Mont and Hoffman have 21-inch sets available at \$900 but have made no concerted effort to advertise and promote them. Philco is coming out with a set to be priced at \$795 or \$895, depending on the cabinet. And Chromatic TV Laboratories Corp. is currently having some experimental receivers made for use in demonstrating its 21-inch tube to possible manufacturers. With this tube, Chromatic says, sets could be made to sell for from \$350 to \$400.

It's expected that most other major manufacturers will introduce new

color models at the annual furniture shows next June and then start pushing them for fall sales. What their prices will be has not yet been determined.

Color sets are available in most big cities at discount houses, where prospective buyers can get them at about 20 percent below list cost. Any buyer, however, is almost forced to take out a year's service contract because installing a color set is still a highly critical technical job. A full year's warranty and service contract will add another \$140 to the purchase price.

The emphasis on color programming, incidentally, is drawing sharp criticism from many viewers. They complain that, despite all the publicity about color's being compatible with black-and-white TV, most color shows come in somewhat fuzzily on black-and-white receivers. RCA disputes this, claiming that if your reception on a black-and-white receiver is fuzzy,

then it must be due to faulty installation of the black-and-white set.

But NBC admits that fuzziness may exist at times. According to Robert Shelby, NBC vice president and chief engineer, the color cameras combine images from three separate pick-up tubes (one red, one blue and one green.) These images must be superimposed perfectly to achieve true color registration. Occasionally one image may slip out of alignment. When this happens, it creates color fringing on color receivers and fuzziness on blackand-whites. "But we're getting better at this all the time and that problem should soon disappear," Shelby said. "We would never short-change people with black-and-white sets. After all, they're still our bread-and-butter."

The networks figure that staging a live show in color costs about 10 percent more than the same show telecast in black and white. Color film production costs about one-third more. But despite the high costs of even black-and-white TV, the networks have encountered little sponsor resistance to the added costs of color. About 178 stations are now equipped to transmit network color programs.

Few of these, however, can afford to originate local color shows because the necessary equipment is so costly. A new Du Mont system, labeled the Vitascan, might obviate this problem by providing a low-cost means to originate local colorcasts. This system, costing about \$40,000, combines a light-scanning technique with a series of red, blue and green filters and furnishes color TV with regular blackand-white cameras.

Basically, the whole color situation boils down to this, in the words of one industry observer: "When there was black-and-white TV only, you had to buy a black-and-white set to watch TV. But today you don't have to buy a color set to watch TV—not at these prices. You can still watch in black and white."—Bob Stahl



The Former Notre Dame Coach Selects A Team For TV GUIDE


Earl Morrall, the man who called the plays when Michigan State cut the throat of Notre Dame this fall, heads Frank Leahy's 1955 All-American football team, selected for TV GUIDE by the former Irish coach.

Morrall, the "automatic brain" behind Coach Hugh Daugherty's powerful Michigan State attack, is Leahy's

quarterback. Earl's backfield companions are elusive Tom McDonald of Oklahoma, ground-chewing Howard ("Hopalong") Cassady of Ohio State and Big Don Schaefer of Notre Dame.



Leahy, who is perhaps the most successful college football coach of our time, turned to TV prognostication on 176 stations throughout the country this fall after 13 years as molder of men at Boston College and Notre Dame. His college teams won 107 games, lost 13 and tied nine. This year he watched scores of games, in person and on TV, and consulted 20 other gridiron authorities before selecting the stars you see here—all of whom, incidentally, have cavorted on the co-axial cable at least once this fall.

Godfrey's Substitute

THE FACTS ABOUT PETER LIND HAYES

Some day, Arthur Godfrey is going to step down as the head of one of TV's most lucrative empires, built on 82,000,000 viewers for his 5½ hours of programs each week.

Is Godfrey grooming someone to step into his shoes when he decides to do something about the wish he has expressed—sometimes despondently, sometimes in jest to "get the . . . out of" television?

Godfrey himself isn't saying. And Peter Lind Hayes, who seems right now to be Godfrey's logical successor, recoils at the very sound of a phrase like "heir-apparent."

But here are the facts: continued

Pinch-Hitter Hayes Often Called To Bat

 Under a three-year contract as Godfrey's morning show fill-in, Hayes has been called on for more and more appearances.

 He is the first Godfrey stand-by to do all three Godfrey shows in a

single week.

Godfrey's sponsors like Hayes.

 Godfrey's audience likes Hayes. (Fan mail is almost all complimentary.)

 And, presumably, Godfrey himself likes Hayes, or Hayes wouldn't have the job in the first place.

Earlier Godfrey pinch-hitters like Robert Q. Lewis and Garry Moore have appeared on the various Godfrey shows. But, according to James M. Seward, CBS vice president who serves as the network's liaison with Godfrey, only Hayes has been entrusted all of them at once.

"Peter automatically takes over the morning show when Arthur is away," says Seward. "Last month he was requested by Arthur's evening advertisers to do those shows as well."

Although Hayes has seen and chatted with Godfrey only three times since the contract was signed, Godfrey has been unfailingly friendly. And on one occasion he paid Hayes what, according to his concept of good TV, would seem the ultimate compliment: "Pete, you can talk to people."

None of this is to be construed as indication that Godfrey is planning to retire next week or next year. "Arthur is happy only when he's working," says Seward, "and we have enough trouble trying to convince him to take time off occasionally." Godfrey suggested on the air recently that he wouldn't quit until 1965. And he may not have given a moment's

thought to Hayes except as a capable vacation replacement.

A young-looking man of 40 with a crew cut and a caustic sense of humor, Hayes keeps tight rein on the quips while discussing his present job. He refuses to predict his future. He says only, "Arthur has the right to take it easy now and then."

Hayes is taking things pretty easy himself these days. His first season under the Godfrey contract, he was, he says, "the most unemployed actor on TV." He did six weeks of pinchhitting last season, and has already put in eight weeks this season. For the energetic Hayes, this is relative inactivity, but he's content.

Taking things even easier is Peter's wife, Mary Healy, who has been his show-business partner ever since their marriage in 1940. (They have appeared together on stage, night-club floor and TV, and co-starred in a 1953 movie, "The 5000 Fingers of Dr. T.") Since Hayes signed his contract as Godfrey's stand-by, Mary and Peter have confined their mutual appearances to night-club engagements and

an occasional television program.

"The only stipulation in my contract
with Godfrey," Peter explains, "is
that I work alone."

"Being essentially a lazy Southern girl," says Mary, "I immediately became ecstatic."

Peter has been in show business since 1933, when he teamed with his mother, vaudeville headliner Grace Hayes. He and Mary and their two children, Michael, 6, and Kathy, 4, live comfortably in Westchester, N.Y.

At home, Peter and Mary play golf, sail their 28-foot cruiser, "The Queen Mary," write special material for their infrequent night-club appearances and listen to Peter's taped recordings of his Godfrey telecasts.

The typical Godfrey fan still awes Hayes. "One day, I mentioned that I didn't know what to do about my daughter's thumb-sucking. I got 500 letters and 500 remedies. Incredible!"

Even more overwhelming was the reaction to the "Hayes Hatrack." "I put a few hats on a rack to use as props for my characterizations, and soon hats started pouring in by the

hundreds. One woman even used all our sponsors' products to make one!"

For this much affection, Peter is willing to change his approach to humor. He used to be a "devil"—satirical, aggressive, even snide. But for the Godfrey clientele, he is "sweet." Mary points out, "Now he closes his shows reminding people of his favorite four letter word, 1-o-v-e."

Peter explains it this way. "In clubs, you get people who read a lot. They've been around and satire appeals to them. But satire is caustic and I can't be caustic with the Godfrey Friends, because they've been Friends longer than I have."

Peter reads his fan mail carefully to gather bits of "folksy humor" and tries to think up provocative questions to ask the Little Godfreys. His favorite: "What do you remember about your first date?" When he finds extra time, he adds to a book he hopes to publish someday, "Hayes' Seed."

Peter watches Godfrey frequently and closely, taking notes. "Arthur is slow," he observes. "Very slow. He once asked me, 'What's your hurry? You have an hour and a half!' [combined radio and TV time]. I grew up in night clubs where you have 15 minutes in which to make it or lose out. There, every second counts."

The "Ironing Board Brigade," as he calls the housewives who are unswervingly loyal to the Godfrey programs, also take time to caution Hayes. One woman complained, "You're too demanding of my attention. I have housework, so slow down."

When it comes to advice, however, Peter attributes the best to Godfrey. "My natural reaction is to be funny," says Peter, "but Arthur said, 'When someone in the cast says something terribly funny, let it ride. Don't try to top him.' And I don't!"

A Fourth For TV

IDA LUPINO JOINS TRIO OF STARS IN FILM SERIES

Ida Lupino, who this season is the fourth permanent star—with Dick Powell, Charles Boyer and David Niven—on CBS' Four Star Playhouse, likes to refer to herself as "the guest who came to dinner."

She did a one-shot for Four Star two years ago. Then she did another. Then another. "I just stuck around," she says laconically, "and I'm still here." This season she is doing eight half-hour dramas for the program.

At her admitted 35, Miss Lupino retains a remarkably trim "figgah," as her British relatives like to call it, although she bewails the fact that she currently weighs 122 pounds. Frank Lloyd Wright himself, however, couldn't have arranged them better. The "figgah" is topped by an equally trim mind that, at least in the ways of business, works like a man's. Which is also why she works as a regular on Four Star.

"A dame," says outspoken Dick Powell, "can stop to powder her nose at the wrong time and \$3000 goes down the drain. 'Lupey' knows when to powder and when not to powder."

Lupey, in fact, knows just about everything there is to know, as far as the making of pictures is concerned, and this includes an acute understanding of the budget.

"Miss Lupino," states Four Star di-



rector Roy Kellino in clipped British tones, "is a professional. She is a trouper. She is never late. She always knows her lines. She knows how to improvise. And she will stand all day on a recently broken ankle because she knows that if the picture goes into another day of shooting, it will cost more money. I admire Miss Lupino tremendously."

So, in point of fact, do a number of other people. Her former husband, Collier Young, is her partner in Arc Productions, an independent movie company. He also produced and helped write the pilot of her proposed TV film series, Mr. Adams and Eve. Her present husband, actor Howard Duff, is also her partner in Arc Productions and her co-star in Mr. Adams and Eve. Joan Fontaine, Young's present wife, recently starred in a picture which was directed by Miss Lupino. The four are jolly good friends as well as business associates.

Ida Lupino is probably the only actress in Hollywood, if not in the entire world, whose theatrical geneology can be traced back some 500 years to the days when jugglers and strolling players were all the rage in England. Many of them were named Lupino. Her parents, Stanley Lupino and Connie Emerald, were performers of no little note in England, and little Ida's backyard playhouse was literally that—a miniature theater.

Despite the Lupino history of stage activity, however, little Ida made her public debut as a bit player in a movie back in 1932. This was somewhat to the consternation of the older members of the Lupino clan, but with the hearty approval of her father. She has been appearing in or directing or writing films ever since.

Lupey fell into directing back in 1949, when she and Collier Young were

producing their first picture together, "Not Wanted." The director became ill on the first day of shooting and Lupey, who had had a hand in the script, was rushed into the breach.

"Directing is much easier than acting," she explains. "The actor deals in false emotions, produced on cue. The director has his problems, but they're all normal. He doesn't have to smile into a camera while suffering

through an early morning grouch."

Lupey dismisses live TV with characteristic frankness: "I don't want to get into Forest Lawn cemetery before my time."

Duff lost eight pounds while doing his first live TV show on *Climax!* last season and the memory of his skeletonized figure continues to serve her as a horrible example.

The Duffs live a far piece out Sunset Boulevard, just beyond Brentwood, Cal., in a hidden-from-the-tourists neighborhood. They have one child, Bridget, who is now 3. Given any spare time, Duff likes to play chess and Lupey is devoted to fishing. Their marriage has lasted in spite of it.

REVIEWS

Alfred Hitchcock Presents

To put first things first, the best feature of the new Alfred Hitchcock Presents series is Hitchcock himself.

As program host, the rotund British director of movie suspense tales reveals a bewitchingly pixy-like personality. Unfortunately, he occupies the screen only a few minutes each week; the filmed stories he introduces on CBS take up the rest of each half hour. They are disappointingly routine, bearing few traces of the suspense and eeriness associated with his feature-length efforts.

On the show, Hitchcock has labeled his yarns "situation tragedies" and "little fairy-tales for grown-up children." He's jesting, of course, but most of the stories "telegraph" their endings so blatantly, they're almost as predictable as "and they lived happily ever after." And, when you can't guess a story's outcome, you'll probably find the ending falls flat, anyway. TV's old Suspense and Danger shows generated more excitement and surprise.

Since he is an acknowledged master of suspense, Hitchcock's special talents are occasionally reflected in the program. A story of two youthful Western gunmen, each trying to goad the other into drawing his gun first, for instance, was a first-rate mixture of suspense and macabre humor. "Breakdown," concerning an accident victim in the morgue and able to move only one finger, was also an exception. Perhaps Hitchcock fears to tread on TV's production code, but a few shockers would be welcome.



It might be pointed out that, despite announcements that the program "for the most part" would be directed by the great man himself, thus far only three shows have actually been his.

Some fine actors have been featured on the show, among them Ralph Meeker, Sidney Blackmer, Darren McGavin, Vera Miles and Hitchcock's young daughter, Pat. But best of the lot has been Hitchcock.

His subtle digs at TV generally, his tongue-in-cheek introductions to the commercials, and his descriptions of each week's story are masterpieces of humor. The way he delivers these little gems, with a sly grin on his cherubic face, makes them doubly beguiling. Perhaps Hitchcock should take over some starring roles himself.

The People's Choice

The producers of NBC's The People's Choice, in a desperate effort to snag laughs, have thrown everything from a talking dog to a mad Frenchman into their show. But despite such expedients and the presence of Jackie Cooper and Patricia Breslin in the starring roles, the program emerges as just another situation comedy.

Cooper plays a Government naturalist who lives in a trailer camp with his aunt. Although he would rather track wild birds, his conniving girl friend has succeeded in getting him elected a city councilman. But what, in this offbeat situation, should be funny, too often emerges as ridiculous.

Cooper is an engaging actor who tries hard, but the scripts rarely give him a chance. Miss Breslin, pretty and

vivacious as his girl friend, is similarly bogged down, as are Margaret Irving, Leonid Kinskey and Paul Maxey. The funniest lines often go to the dog—Cleo, a sad-eyed basset.—R.S.

It was fiesta time in Havana, or, as they say in the U.S., they were Havana ball.


