“What’s This?” Context-Sensitive Help Available for Simulink Configuration Parameters Dialog

R2008a introduces “What’s This?” context-sensitive help for parameters that appear in the Simulink Configuration Parameters dialog. This feature provides quick access to a detailed description of the parameters, saving you the time it would take to find the information in the Help browser.

To use the “What’s This?” help, do the following:

- 1** Place your cursor over the label of a parameter.
- 2** Right-click. A **What’s This?** context menu appears.

For example, the following figure shows the **What’s This?** context menu appearing after a right-click on the **Start time** parameter in the **Solver** pane.



- 3 Click **What's This?** A context-sensitive help window appears showing a description of the parameter.

Renamed Target Floating-Point Math Environment Parameter

In this release, the Configuration Parameter setting **Target floating-point math environment** has been renamed to **Target function library**. This parameter is on the Real-Time Workshop® Interface pane. There is no change in behavior.

Compatibility Considerations

Models which were previously created with the **Target floating-point math environment** Configuration Parameter setting C99 (ISO) are automatically converted when opened, to use the new Target for Freescale MPC5xx (ISO) **Target function library** setting. The new setting references the same compiler-specific ISO function tables as the old C99 (ISO) setting.

When you create new models with the `mpc555rt.tlc`, `mpc555rt_grt.tlc` or `mpc555exp.tlc` **System target file**, the Target for Freescale MPC5xx (ISO) is automatically selected for the **Target function library** setting. If your model contains floating-point mathematical function blocks (e.g., trigonometric functions, log functions), then you should use this setting for target-optimized function libraries. External Mode

External mode is now supported via CAN. You can use either external mode or a third party calibration tool to interact with the real-time application running on the target processor. The CAN Calibration Protocol block provides a means of monitoring signals and altering the parameter values in the application code running on the target. See the demo `mpc555rt_ccp.md1`.

Real-Time Workshop GRT Target Support

Real-Time Workshop GRT target is supported for build and download, so Real-Time Workshop® Embedded Coder™ is optional.

However Real-Time Workshop Embedded Coder ERT target is required for PIL and AE.

The CAN Calibration Protocol Data Acquisition (DAQ) List mode of operation is only supported with Real-Time Workshop Embedded Coder. The CCP Polling mode of operation can be used both with or without Real-Time Workshop Embedded Coder.

Implicit Modification of PIL Input / Output Signal Storage Classes

In previous releases of Target for MPC555, PIL input/output signals with non-Auto storage classes (eg. ExportedGlobal) had their storage class implicitly modified to Auto during code generation for PIL.

Compatibility Considerations

Now, such storage classes are not modified during code generation. Instead, an error message is thrown - the error message (below) includes steps for resolution of the error. This behavior has changed because Real-Time Workshop no longer supports overriding of storage classes in the way described above.

The error message is as follows:

Real-Time Workshop Fatal: PIL Inport 1 has non-"auto" storage class "ExportedGlobal". Only signals with "auto" storage classes are supported at the PIL subsystem boundary.

To avoid this error, storage classes must be explicitly set to "auto" in the model before beginning a PIL build. Please update the model accordingly.

If non-"auto" storage classes are required for real-time deployment then modification of the model between real-time and PIL builds can be avoided by taking the following approach:

- a) For real-time deployment, provide a Simulink.Signal object that resolves to the signal requiring non-"auto" storage class in the model. Set the storage class as desired on the Simulink.Signal object.
- b) For PIL, remove the Simulink.Signal object or re-define its storage class to be "auto".

Host Side Profiling Via CAN Uses Vector "Application Channel"

You can now specify the CAN Application Channel to use with the execution profiling command, and run the Vector Informatik configuration utility to

configure the bit rate of the channel. In previous versions, CAN channels other than CANCardX 1 and CAN AC2 PCI 1 were inaccessible. The syntax to use this new argument is:

```
profile_mpc555('can','CANChannel','MATLAB 1')
```

The default is 'MATLAB 1' if no Application Channel is specified.

Compatibility Considerations

It is no longer possible to specify the CAN bit rate as an argument to `profile_mpc555`. The old syntax for specifying the bit rate, e.g.,

```
profile_mpc555('can','bitrate',1000000)
```

or

```
profile_mpc555('can','modelName','mymodel')  
% Calculates required bit-rate by inspecting mymodel
```

now returns an error. The error describes the new approach for setting the CAN bit rate.

Driver Block Pass-Through No Longer Supported

The pass-through mechanism was deprecated in Version 2.0 (R14) and has now been removed. The replacement for the pass through mechanism is shown in the demo `mpc555_fuelsys_project`. This demo illustrates current best practices in deploying a single algorithm for multiple execution applications including simulation, PIL testing, and production deployment. This new approach reduces code overhead and can be easily applied to any target.

Compatibility Considerations

If you try to use a legacy model containing driver blocks that are configured to use pass-through, you receive a warning similar to the following:

```
Driver block pass-through is no longer supported. The model has one or more I/O driver blocks that are configured to use pass-through, however, this feature is no longer supported.
```

```

To prevent this warning message from appearing again, run the command `mpc555_blk_compatibility('fix', 'modelName')`.

If you try to use the Download Control Panel to download an application to a target running an out-of-date boot code, you will see a boot code mismatch error message. This message instructs you to use the boot code installation **Start** menu option to install new boot code. Alternatively a download via BDM will appear to succeed but the application will fail at run-time.

Use the **Start** menu boot code installer and follow the instructions in the dialog.

To upgrade from Version 1.0.1 (Release 13) or earlier boot code you are instructed to use the alternative install method via CAN. The following

instructions describe the steps required if you have Release 13 or Release 12.1 boot code currently running on the target, and you do not have a BDM.

Upgrading from Release 13 or Release 12.1

If you have a BDM available you can download the new boot code over CAN or serial. Use the **Start** menu boot code installer.

If you have CAN but no BDM you cannot use the **Start** menu option to use the Download Control Panel. Instead you can use the upgrade model, `can_bootcode_upgrade`.

- 1** Enter `can_bootcode_upgrade` at the MATLAB command line.
- 2** Double-click the Download Protection block to unlock the model. It turns green.
- 3** Click Run in the toolbar.

Support for Latest Toolchains

Version 2.0.2 of the Embedded Target for Motorola MPC555 supports these toolchain versions:

- Wind River Systems, Wind River Compiler, version 5.2.1 (formerly known as Diab), and Wind River Systems SingleStep™ debugger of the following versions:
 - Version 7.7.3 (debug via Wind River visionPROBE) (for MPC5xx)
 - Version 7.6.2 (debug via Macraigor Systems Wiggler, Raven / Blackbird, On-board BDM) (for MPC555 only)
- Metrowerks CodeWarrior for Embedded PowerPC version 8.1 - EPPC_5XX

The full feature set (PIL, RT, and AE targets) is supported for both toolchains.

Switch Target Configuration Block

This new block runs a convenience function that configures your model and Target Preferences to one of a set of pre-defined hardware configurations. The

function can also be used as a template for setting up your own customized configurations.

New Boot Code

You must install the latest version of the boot code.

Compatibility Considerations

If you do not have the latest boot code version installed on your MPC555 processor, then interrupts will not be handled correctly, causing real-time standalone applications to fail at run-time.

If you try to use the Download Control Panel to download an application to a target running an out-of-date boot code, you will see a boot code mismatch error message. This message instructs you to use the boot code installation **Start** menu option to install new boot code. Alternatively a download via BDM will appear to succeed but the application will fail at run-time.

Use the **Start** menu boot code installer and follow the instructions in the dialog.

To upgrade from Version 1.0.1 (Release 13) or earlier boot code you are instructed to use the alternative install method via CAN. The following instructions describe the steps required if you have Release 13 or Release 12.1 boot code currently running on the target, and you do not have a BDM.

Upgrading from Release 13 or Release 12.1

If you have a BDM available you can download the new boot code over CAN or serial. Use the **Start** menu boot code installer.

If you have CAN but no BDM you cannot use the **Start** menu option to use the Download Control Panel. Instead you can use the upgrade model, `can_bootcode_upgrade`.

- 1 Enter `can_bootcode_upgrade` at the MATLAB command line.

Real-Time Target Support for Model Reference

Model reference is now supported by the Real-Time (RT) target. Processor in the Loop (PIL) co-simulation and Algorithm Export (AE) do not yet support the use of model reference.

Download Control Panel Support for Vector Application Channels

The Download Control Panel is now integrated with the Vector CAN Driver Configuration Tool, and uses the Application Channel mechanism used by the Vector CAN Blocks. This means the Download Control Panel now provides support for all CAN devices supported by the Vector CAN Driver Library. Please see the documentation for details of how to use the Download Control Panel with Vector Application Channels. Note that we support the CAN Driver Library, and not the XL Driver Library; however, certain XL boards are supported for CAN (only) by the CAN Driver Library - see Vector Informatik for further details.

QADCE Support for more MPC56x Processors

There is now support for Enhanced Queued Analog-To-Digital Converter Module-64 (QADCE) for the processors MPC561, MPC562, MPC563, and MPC564, in addition to the existing support for MPC565 and MPC566. There is continued QADC support for the MPC555.

Technical Solution Support For External (Off-Chip) Flash Memory

Serial Download

You can now download applications to a suitably prepared MPC5xx board via a serial cable, even if you have no BDM or CAN connection to the target.

Support for MPC5xx

There is now support for more processor variants:

- MPC555
- MPC561 (no Flash features)
- MPC562 (no Flash features)
- MPC563
- MPC564
- MPC565
- MPC566

You can easily switch processors using the Target Preferences settings, and Model Resource Configuration settings.

There is new support for some additional capabilities of some processor variants, as follows.

Additional capabilities of MPC565 & 566:

- 3rd TouCAN module
- 3rd TPU module
- MIOS14 support providing 4 more PWM channels
- QADC Enhanced support - different module with different features to MPC555 version

Additional capabilities of MPC561, 562, 563 and 564:

- 3rd TouCAN module
- MIOS14 support providing 4 more PWM channels

QADC is not currently supported, but support is planned in the future.

CAN Driver Enhancements

A number of enhancements have been incorporated into the TouCAN Transmit and TouCAN Receive blocks. These enhancements include the ability to select different modes of operation depending on the requirements for each message. The benefits include higher utilization of the available CAN bandwidth and reduced loading on the MPC555 microcontroller.

The default mode for transmission of CAN messages now uses 3 hardware buffers in conjunction with an interrupt driven priority queue; this mode of operation guarantees that messages will be transmitted in order of priority, with no inter-message delay.

A dedicated buffer transmission mode allows messages to be transmitted with no interrupt servicing overhead.

A FIFO buffer transmission mode, with very fast interrupt servicing is well suited for data acquisition purposes.

For receipt of CAN messages, an additional mode has been added that uses a FIFO buffer. This mode of operation is suitable if a number of messages with different CAN identifiers should be received via a single hardware buffer. This allows more efficient use of the limited number of hardware buffers on the MPC555 TouCAN module.

Task Execution Profiling

This is a new feature that allows execution profiling data to be recorded, uploaded and displayed in the form of a MATLAB graphic and as an HTML report. Execution profiling data can be collected over serial or CAN. See the demo model `mpc555rt_multitasking`.

Temporary Task Overruns Now Permitted by the Scheduler

It is now possible for task overruns in the base rate or one of the sub- rates to occur without causing a failure. The benefit is that if it occasionally takes longer than the normally allowed time to complete a task, this is now possible without having to increase the sample time. The overrun

behavior is configurable and is illustrated by the new demo model `mpc555rt_multitasking`.

Program Prepare Downloads at Application Specific Bit Rates

Program prepare downloads now work with an application running CAN at any of the bit rates supported by the Embedded Target Download tool. Also, the application may be running at a non-default (20MHz) frequency - in this case, you will see a warning if the chosen bit rate is not suitable for program prepare downloading. This will occur if the boot code, running at 20MHz, cannot achieve the CAN bit rate used by the application.

Support for Latest Toolchains

The Embedded Target for Motorola MPC555 now supports these cross-development tools:

- Wind River Systems Diab cross-compiler (version 5.1.2), and Wind River Systems SingleStep debugger of the following versions:
 - Version 7.7.3 (debug via Wind River Vision Probe) (for MPC5xx)
 - Version 7.6.2 (debug via Macraigor Systems Wiggler, Raven / Blackbird, On-board BDM) (for MPC555 only)
- Metrowerks CodeWarrior for Embedded PowerPC (version 8.0 - EPPC_5XX)

Improved Resource Checking

There are enhancements to resource configuration to help you avoid device driver conflicts — for example, if you choose the same PWM channel for two different blocks you will be warned.

Replacement for the Pass Through Mechanism

There is a new demo which illustrates current best practices in deploying a single algorithm for multiple execution applications including simulation, PIL testing, and production deployment. See the demo model `mpc555_fue1sys_project` for the new approach.

Previously, a pass through mechanism was used. This new approach reduces code overhead and can be easily applied to any target. In general, it is not advised to use the old pass through. In a future release the pass through feature will be completely removed. The old pass through mechanism still works but will generate a warning because it is being deprecated.

Stateflow No Longer Required

Stateflow and Stateflow Coder are no longer required products, although they are recommended. This was a previous requirement for use of the CAN Calibration Protocol block.

CANdb DBC File Support

You can now use CANdb DBC and DBF files to specify the packing and unpacking of CANdb messages.

Fixed Bugs

Correct Number of Bytes Received by Serial Receive Block

When using Serial Receive block in previous versions, it was possible in some cases for extra data to be received. This problem was caused by the driver code calculating an incorrect value for the number of bytes in the receive buffer.

This problem is fixed in Release 14.

New Boot Code

Two New Demos

Streamlined SingleStep Configuration

There is no longer any need for shortcuts to SingleStep. Setup is now considerably simpler. You can remove any existing shortcuts to SingleStep.

CANdb Limitation Lifted

You no longer need to place your DBASE (.dbf) files in your working directory. You can use the CAN Message Packing (CANdb) block mask to browse to DBASE files in any directory.

Upgrade Existing Boot Code via CAN or BDM

To install the new bootcode into flash memory on the target via BDM, follow the instructions under "Downloading Boot Code" in the chapter on Generating Stand-Alone Real-Time Applications in the *Embedded Target for Motorola MPC555 User's Guide*.

You can also upgrade the bootcode over CAN (removing the need for a BDM connector). It is not possible to upgrade from a previous bootcode using the regular `candownload` utility, so if you wish to download via CAN then follow these instructions:

- 1 Open the model `can_bootcode_upgrade`.
- 2 Follow the instructions contained inside the model to download the new bootcode to the MPC555 via CAN.

Note: Once you have initially downloaded the new bootcode using the upgrade model, it will be possible to use the standard `candownload` program to download application code to RAM or flash, and bootcode to flash.
