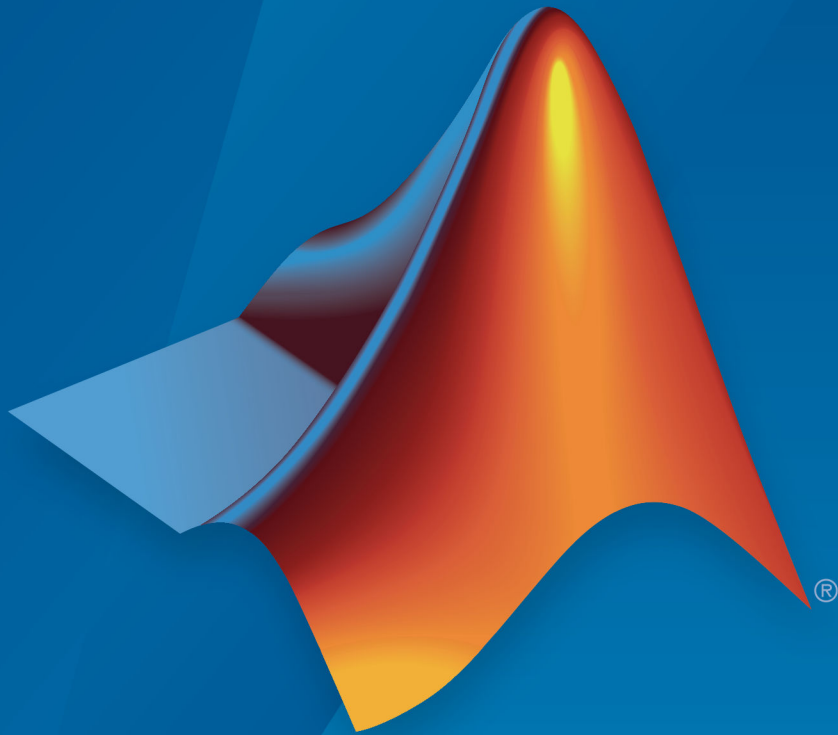

Shared Variables Mode: Run a less extensive analysis on complete application to compute global variable sharing and usage only

Summary: In R2019b, you can run a less extensive analysis on your complete application to see a list of all global variables and their sharing and usage.

In this mode, the analysis stops before the run-time error detection phase and the results contain:

- Global variables (shared, unshared, used, unused)
- Code metrics, if code metrics computation is enabled

The **Variable Access** pane shows all read and write operations on global variables.

See also `-shared-variables-mode`.

Benefits: You can now run Polyspace on your entire application to see global variable sharing and usage, and then run an analysis component-by-component for run-time error detection. Previously, global variables were reported only in the full analysis that included run-time error detection. Run-time error detection can sometimes take significantly longer for complete applications. If you want to review only the global variable sharing and usage in your complete application, you no longer require the full analysis.

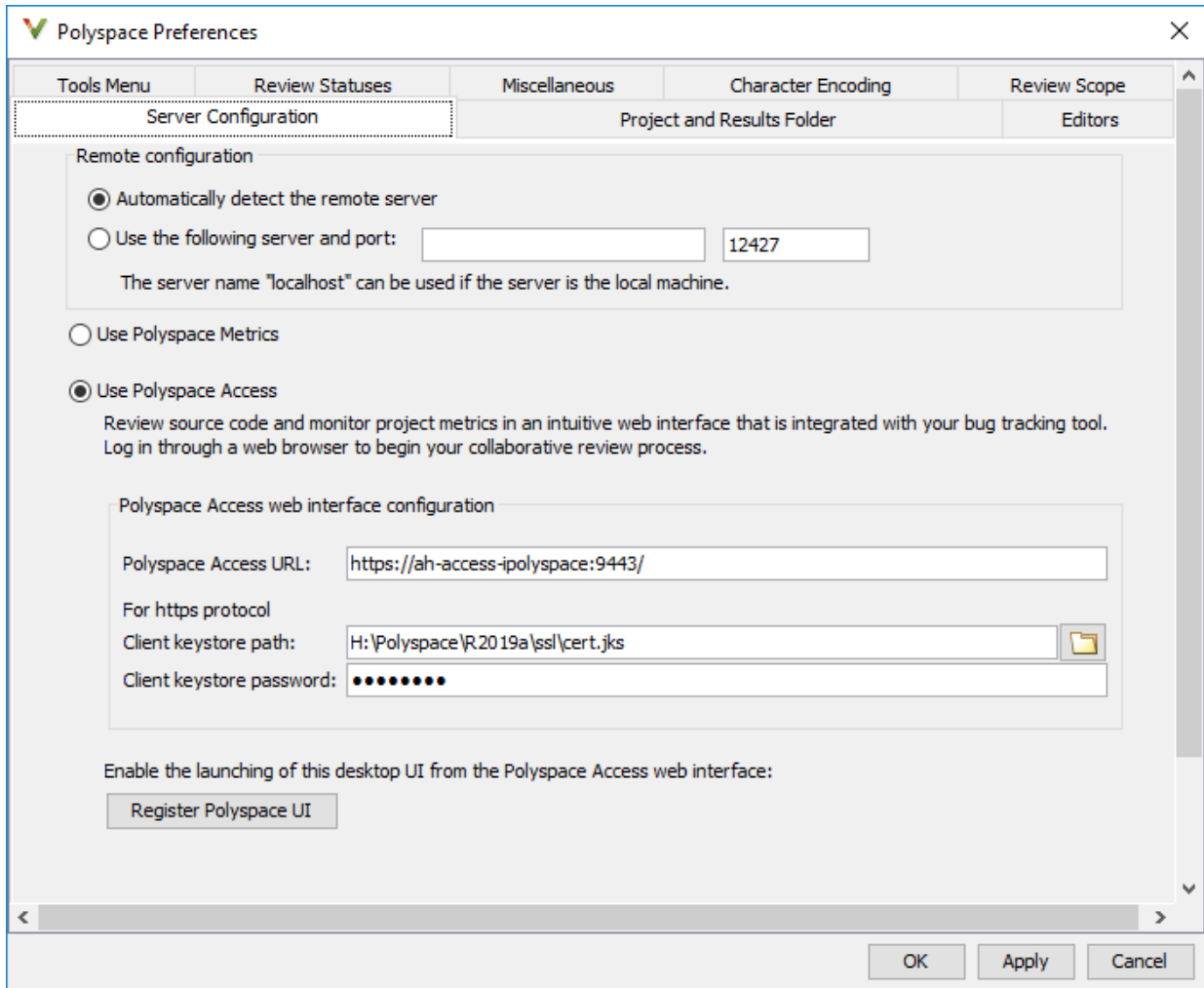

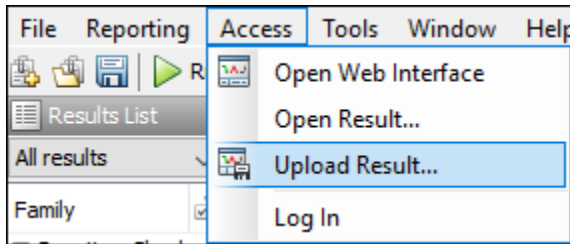
Collaborative Review Support: Review Polyspace for Ada results in web browser and share results using web links

Summary: In R2019a, you can upload Polyspace for Ada results to the Polyspace Access web interface. Developers with a Polyspace Code Prover™ Access™ license can review these results in the web interface and share the results using web links.

To upload results from the Polyspace user interface, select **Tools > Preferences**. On the **Server Configuration** tab, enter the URL of the Polyspace Access web interface and the client keystore path and password.



After setting up communication between the Polyspace user interface and the Polyspace Access web interface, the **Access** menu appears in the Polyspace user interface. You can use this menu to open the web interface, open results from the web interface in the user interface of the desktop product or upload results from the desktop product to the web interface.



For details about setting up and reviewing results in the Polyspace Access web interface, see Polyspace Code Prover Access documentation.

At the command line, after analysis with the `polyspace-ada` command, you can also upload results to the Polyspace Access web interface with the `polyspace-access` command.

Benefits:

- *Facilitate collaborative review:* The web interface streamlines the review efforts of your team. For instance:
 - During a team meeting, findings can be assessed and assigned to developers.
 - Developers can log into the web interface to review findings assigned to them, and determine whether to justify the findings or fix them.
 - A project manager can track the progress of the review by filtering the list of results for findings that are still open.
- *Authenticate client access:* The web interface is behind a login. Only users with a Polyspace Code Prover Access license and the appropriate credentials can view the results from their web browser.

Source Code Navigation: Keep result pinned while navigating through source code

Summary: In R2019a, clicking a result in the source code does not change the result selection on the **Results List** and the details on the **Result Details** pane.

Benefits: To find the root cause of a result, you have to navigate through the source code. You can keep the result pinned on the **Results List** and **Result Details** pane during this navigation.

Compatibility Considerations

Previously, if you clicked a token in the source code showing a result, the selection on the **Results List** pane and the information on the **Result Details** pane changed to the clicked result. To emulate this behavior, Ctrl-click the token in the source code or right-click and select **Select Results At This Location**.

Concurrency Modelling: View all tasks and interrupts extracted from code and Polyspace configuration in one view

Summary: In R2018a, you can see the tasks and interrupts extracted from your code and configuration in one view.

After analysis, click the **Concurrency modeling** link on the **Dashboard**.

Benefits: You can verify if Polyspace correctly detected your multitasking configuration from your code. For instance, if you know a priori that a specific function acts as an interrupt, you can spot-check whether Polyspace considers the function as an interrupt.

Variables Reporting: Export variable list to text file for automated reading

Summary: In R2018a, you can export the list of global variables in your code to a text file, along with the read and write operations on them.

Benefits: You can parse the text file by using MATLAB® or Excel® and generate graphs or statistics about your global variables that you cannot readily obtain from the user interface.

Windows Support: Run Polyspace for Ada on Windows 8, Windows Server 2012 and Windows 10

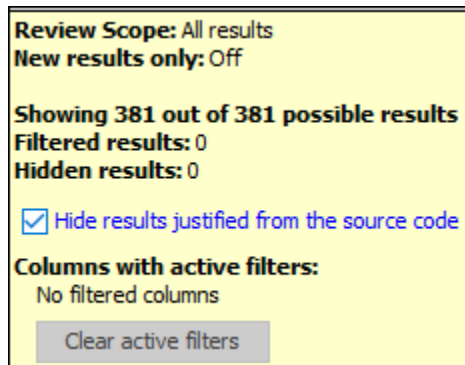
Summary: In R2017b, Polyspace for Ada is fully supported on Windows® 8, Windows Server 2012 and Windows 10.

Benefits: You can run the software on these operating systems without having to resort to compatibility mode.

Result Review Workflow: Hide results that you reviewed once and justified through source code annotations

Summary: In R2017b, if you justify a result through source code annotations, subsequent analyses do not redisplay result again. Although the result still appears in your source code, it does not appear in your results list.

If you want to revisit those justified results, you can make them visible in one-click.



Benefits: When you decide not to fix a finding, you can justify it through source code annotations. That finding does not clutter your subsequent analysis results.

Suppose the analysis flags an error-handling statement as unreachable code. You do not want to remove the statement because future code can trigger the error and make the error-handling necessary. You can justify the unreachable code and choose not to see it again.

Additional Considerations

-
- *How can I use source code annotations to justify a result?*

You can directly type source code annotations in the correct format.

Alternatively, you can copy annotations from information in the user interface.

- In Eclipse, right-click the result to insert a justification directly in the source code.
- In Eclipse and the Polyspace user interface, assign one of the statuses **Justified**, **No action planned**, or **Not a defect** to a result. Right-click the result to copy your justification and paste it in a source code editor.
- *Will the hidden results still appear in the report?*

The hidden results still appear in the report. The results are hidden from view to save review effort. The reports are meant for complete documentation of your results. You cannot hide analysis results from the reports.

Result Status: Assign statuses that directly correspond to your code analysis workflow

Summary: In R2017b, you can assign the following statuses to a result. Each status corresponds to a stage in your code analysis workflow.

- Unreviewed (default status)
- To investigate
- To fix
- Justified
- No action planned
- Not a defect
- Other

Benefits: You can follow your review progress more easily.

Additional Considerations

How can I use the statuses to follow my review progress?

You can follow your progress as follows:

- Polyspace user interface: You can filter all results that have a certain status.
- Polyspace Metrics: You can see the percentage of results reviewed and justified. If you assign a status other than Unreviewed to a result, the software considers the result as reviewed. If you assign one of these statuses, the software considers the result as justified: Justified, No action planned or Not a defect.

Can I create my own status?

You can still create custom statuses. Select **Tools > Preferences** and create your own statuses on the **Review Statuses** tab.

Compatibility Considerations

If you open results from a previous release, the statuses are automatically updated to the new release. The updates are:

- Fix or Investigate → To fix or To investigate
- Improve → To fix
- Undecided → Unreviewed.

If your source code annotations use statuses from a previous release, the software reads your annotations using the above updates. The software does not change the annotations themselves.

Code Annotations: Justify results or define your own format with a new annotation format

Summary: In R2017b, you can justify your results with the new Polyspace annotation syntax, or by using your own custom format. Polyspace also interprets existing code annotations that use a different syntax.

Benefits:

- *Easier results review:* With the new annotation format, you can provide a justification for multiple types of results on the same line. Previously, you had to enter the justification for different types of results, such as defects and coding rules violations, on different lines.

-
- *Custom annotation format:* You can use an XML file to define any annotation format and map it to the Polyspace syntax. When you analyze your code, Polyspace can interpret the annotations regardless of the format.

Polyspace still supports annotations that use the old syntax.

Run verification on .psprj file from the command line

If you already have a project created in the Polyspace Interface, you can now use that .psprj file to run from a command line.

Use the new option `polyspace-ada -generate-launching-script-for <PSPRJ FILE>` to generate the files to run the analysis from the command line. The following files are generated:

- `source_command.txt` — List of source files in the project
- `options_command.txt` — List of analysis option settings
- `launchingCommand.sh` or `launchingCommand.bat` — Script that runs the verification using `options_command.txt`, `source_command.txt`. The script can also take additional analysis options as parameters.

Improved method for adding source files and include folders to projects

Before R2016b, when you created a project, you added and removed source files and include folders individually. If you moved your source files or added new files to your programming project, you would need to re-add the files into your Polyspace project.

Starting in R2016b, you create a Polyspace project by using root source folders and include folders. The root folder location represents the top of the hierarchy for your source files. Polyspace represents all files relative to the root source locations. When you add a root source location, you can:

- See all source files under the root folder (and subfolders if desired).
- Exclude files and subfolders in the hierarchy to change the active list of source files to analyze.
- Refresh the source file list to see new files or folders in the root source hierarchy.
- Modify the root source folder path.
- If you use a revision control system, change the root folder location to point to different versions of your source files.

The new process is similar for include folders. Instead of adding individual folders, you add a root include folder location. Polyspace adds all include folders underneath the root

include location that contains include files. You can refresh and modify the include folder path just like the source folder path.

Writable Examples: Modify example projects and restore original versions

The examples projects found under **Help > Examples** are now easier to use. The first time you open an example project, a writable version is saved in your Polyspace workspace. In the writable project, you can test configuration options, change sources, and rerun the example. If you want to refresh the example with a clean version, select **Help > Examples > Restore Default Examples**.

Interactive Graphical Display: Click graph on Dashboard to filter checks

In R2016b, you can narrow down the scope of your review by using a graphical display of analysis results. Previously you used the **Check distribution** graph to obtain an overview of the analysis results and determine which check colors to focus on. Now you can also select a color in the graph to view only checks of that color.

Verification Objectives in Eclipse: Create review scopes to focus your review

From the Eclipse™ plugin, you can now create custom review scopes. Review scopes filter your results to only the run-time checks and code metrics that you want to see. For more information, see *Create Custom Review Scopes*.

Filtered Report: Reuse result filters for generated report

In R2016b, if you apply filters to your results, you can reuse those filters for the generated report. For instance, you can use filters to view only the following subset of results on the **Results List** pane and then reuse those filters for the report.

- View only critical checks (red, gray and critical orange) and create a report with those checks only.

- View only new results found since the last verification and create a report with the new results only.

On the **Results List** pane, you can apply complicated filtering criteria to show only the results that are most meaningful to you. You can reuse these criteria for your generated report and show only the results that you want the report reviewer to focus on. For more information on the filters, see [Filter and Group Results](#).

The report shows which filters you have applied. Another person reviewing your report can see your filtering criteria.

Results Export: Export results to text file for computing graphs and statistics

In R2016b, you can export your results to a tab delimited text file. You can parse the text file by using applications such as Excel or MATLAB and generate graphs or statistics about your results that you cannot obtain readily from the user interface. For instance, for each check type (**Division by zero**, **Overflow**), you can calculate how many checks are red, orange or green.

Improved PDF report generation

In R2016b, the generation of PDF reports is improved.

- The report generation is faster. For large results, the report generation is much less likely to cause out-of-memory errors.
- The reports use an improved visual display.

English Reports in Non-English Locales: Generate English reports on operating systems with a different language

In R2016b, even if your operating system has a display language (Windows) or locale (Linux®) such as Japanese or Korean, you can still generate English reports. See [Generate Report After Verification](#).

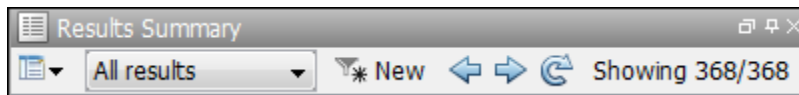

Auto-Complete for Review Comments: Type previous comments partially and allow software to enter the rest

In R2016a, the **Results Summary** or **Result Details** pane provides automatic completion of review comments. If you start typing a review comment that you have entered previously, a dropdown list shows the previous entry. You can select the previous comment from this list instead of retyping the comment again.

Simplified Variable Access: View task names instead of aliases

In R2016a, on the **Variable Access** pane, in the **Written by task** and **Read by task** columns, you see the task names. Previously, the columns contained aliases such as t1, t2, t3, . . . You viewed the task names using a legend for the aliases.

Source Code Search: Search huge applications more quickly

In R2016a, search results are produced more quickly. If you search for a string in a huge application, you can see a significant improvement in the time it takes for search results to appear.

You can search for a string in two ways:

- Enter the search string in the box on the **Search** pane.
- Right-click a word in your code on the **Source** pane and select a search option.

Project Language Flexibility: Change your project language at any time

Projects in the Polyspace interface are no longer fixed to Ada83 or to Ada95. When you create a project, you can add any files to the project. After you add files, select the language for your analysis using the Source code language option. The default language is Ada95. If you add or change the files in your project, you can change the language to reflect the most suitable analysis type.

Improved Result Display for File-by-File Verification: View Combined Summary of Results for All Files in User Interface

In R2016a, if you perform a file-by-file verification, you can see a summary of results for all files on the **Dashboard** pane. You can open the results for each file directly from this summary table. Previously, you obtained this synthesis in an external html file.

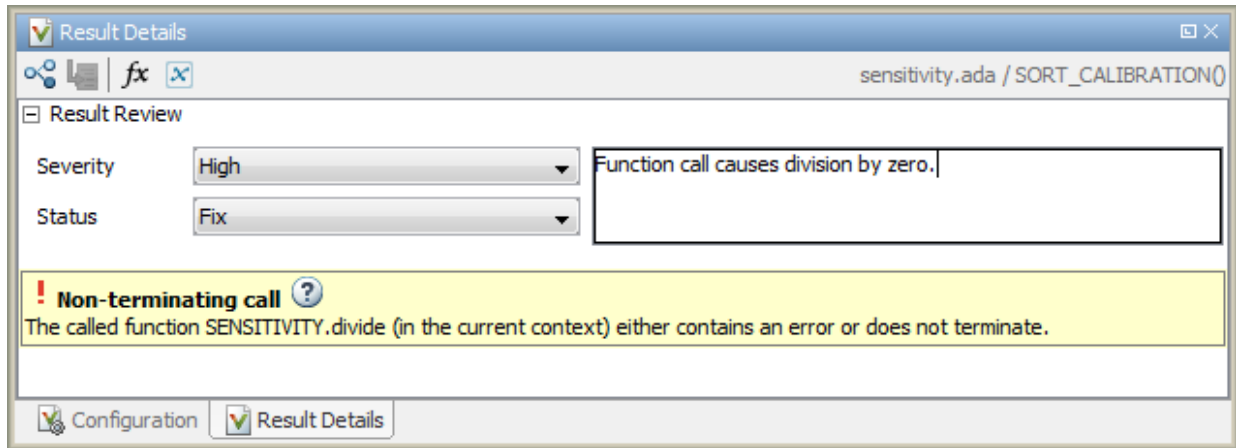

In R2015b, the **Check Details** pane is renamed **Result Details**. On this pane, in addition to viewing details about a result, you can now enter review information such as **Classification**, **Status**, and comments. For more information, see [Add Review Comments to Results](#).



Improvements in Polyspace Plugin for Eclipse

In R2015b, the following improvements have been made to the Polyspace plugin for Eclipse:

- When you select a result in the **Results Summary** view, the **Result Details** view displays additional information about the result. In the **Result Details** view, if you click the  button next to the result name, you can see a brief description and examples of the result.
- You can switch to a Polyspace perspective that shows only the information relevant to a Polyspace verification. To open the perspective, select **Window > Open Perspective > Other**.

Including options multiple times

You can now specify analysis options multiple times. This feature is available only at the command line or using the command-line names in the **Advanced options** dialog box in the user interface. Customize pre-made configurations without having to find the changed options in the options file.

If you specify an option multiple times, only the last setting is used. The user interface also follows this rule. If you specify **m68k** for **Target processor type** and **-target i386** for **Advanced options**, this counts as multiple analysis option specifications. Polyspace uses the target specified in the **Advanced options** box, **i386**.


Compatibility Considerations

If your current configuration specifies analysis options multiple times, change the configuration by either:

- Removing the unnecessary analysis options.
- Moving the desired analysis options to the end of the configuration.

Renaming of labels in Polyspace user interface

The labels associated with specifying constraints have changed as follows:

- On the **Configuration** pane, the field **Variable/function range setup** is changed to **Constraint setup**.
- On the **Results Summary** and **Result Details** pane, the field **Classification** is changed to **Severity**. You assign a **Severity** such as High, Medium and Low to a defect to indicate how critical you consider the issue.

Simplified workflow for project setup and results review with a unified user interface

In R2015a, the Project and Results Manager perspectives are now unified. You can run verification and review results without switching between two perspectives.

The major changes are:

- You can start a new verification during your results review. Previously, you started a new verification only from the Project Manager perspective.
- After a verification, the result opens automatically. If you are looking at a previous result when a verification is over, you can load the new result or retain the previous one on the **Results Summary** pane. If you retain the previous results, you can later open the new results from the **Project Browser**. The new results are highlighted.
- You can have any of the panes open in the unified interface.

Previously, you could open the following panes only in one of the two perspectives.

Code complexity metrics available in user interface

In R2015a, you can view code complexity metrics in the Polyspace user interface. Previously, this information was available only in the Polyspace Metrics web interface.

In the user interface, you can:

- Specify a limit for the value of a metric. If the metric value for your source code exceeds this limit, the metric appears red on the **Results Summary** pane.
- Justify the value of a metric. If a metric value exceeds specified limits and appears red, you can add a comment with the rationale.
- Generate a report containing the metric values and associated comments and justifications.

Combining these actions, you can enforce coding standards across your organization.

Reducing the complexity of your code improves code readability, reduces the possibility of coding errors, and allows more precise Polyspace verification.

Review of global variable usage

In R2015a, you can comment and justify global variable usage on the **Results Summary** pane. Previously, you viewed global variable usage on the **Variable Access** pane, but could not comment on them.

On the **Results Summary** pane, global variables are classified into one of the following categories.

You can still view the global variables on the **Variable Access** pane.

- To comment and justify potentially unprotected and unused global variables, use the **Results Summary** pane.

Review of latest results compared to last run

In R2015a, you can review only new results compared to the previous run.

If you rerun your verification, the new results are displayed with an asterisk (*) against them on the **Results Summary** pane. To filter only these new checks, select the **New results** box.

If you make changes in your source code, you can use this feature to see only the checks introduced due to those changes. You can avoid reviewing checks in the source code that you did not change.

Improvements in search capability in the user interface

In R2015a, the **Search** pane allows you to search for a string in various panes of the user interface.

To search for a string in the new user interface:

- 1 If the **Search** pane is not visible, open it. Select **Window > Show/Hide View > Search**.
- 2 Enter your string in the search box.
- 3 From the drop-down list beside the box, select names of panes you want to search.

The **Search** pane consolidates all the search options previously available:

- In the Project Manager perspective, the global search box allowed you to search on the **Configuration** pane.
- In the Results Manager perspective, the global search box allowed you to search on the **Source**, **Results Summary**, **Call Hierarchy**, and **Variable Access** panes.

- At the command line, the verification implicitly uses `-to pass2`. For more passes, use the `-to` option explicitly with a higher pass value.

The default verification is completed in much less time.

 - **Methodology for Ada > Moderate**
 - **All checks**

You can also use custom methodologies to restrict checks displayed.

- You can navigate the **Results Summary** view using the keyboard or GUI buttons. Both means of navigation respect the grouping, filters, and methodology used to display results.

Project configuration file extension renamed

The software saves project configuration files with the `.psprj` extension. Previously, the file extension was `.cfg`.

No generation of Excel output

In R2013b, the following features are not supported:

- Export of review comments to an Excel spreadsheet.
- Generation of Excel reports for verification results.

Starting an R2013a remote verification

If the R2013a and R2013b versions of Polyspace are installed on a client computer, submitting a R2013a remote verification from the client generates an error. For example:

Modified Polyspace installer

In R2013a:

- The Polyspace installer does not create the *Polyspace_Common* folder.
- The Polyspace product does not depend on environment variables, that is, the installer does not create POLYSPACE_* variables.
- The Remote Launcher Manager does not open automatically during the installation process. In addition, if the service or daemon was running before the installation of the new product, the service or daemon is not automatically restarted. You must manually open the Remote Launcher Manager, configure your Polyspace Server, and then start the service or daemon.

Verification uses native binary file

In R2013a, the Polyspace verification is run using the native binary file for your computer architecture. Previously, you specified a 32-bit or 64-bit verification through the option `-machine-architecture` *option_value*. Now, if you specify `-machine-architecture`, the software ignores the option and generates the following warning:

```
Option "-machine-architecture option_value" is obsolete.
Verification run using native binary file for your computer architecture.
```

Previously, the default option value (auto) specified 32-bit verification. Now, on a Linux system, the Polyspace verification is 64-bit. You may observe an increase in verification time compared to previous releases. The increase depends on the application being verified and the architecture of your machine.

Note For Linux systems, only the Polyspace 64-bit Client and Server products are supported.

Exact representation of floating point numbers

Polyspace uses the exact value of a representable floating point number during code verification. Consider the floating point value of 1.0. Previously, Polyspace represented this value as a range 0.9999 - 1.0001. Now, Polyspace uses the exact value, that is 1.0.

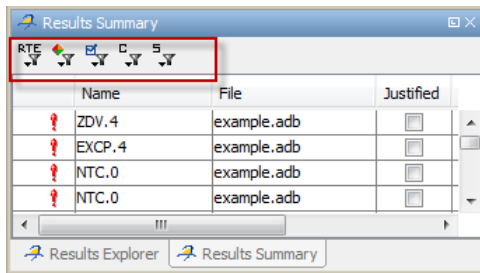

Review of verification results improvement

Check filters in results summary view

The **Results Summary** toolbar provides check filters, which previously were available only in the **Results Explorer** view.



You can apply the check filters from either view. For example, if you filter checks by color and category in the **Results Summary** view, the software also filters out these checks from the **Results Explorer** view. For more information, see [Filtering Checks](#).

Justify and comment a group of checks

You can now select a group of checks in either the **Results Explorer** or **Result Summary** view, and then justify and add review information to those checks. For more information, see [Reviewing and Commenting Checks](#).

Variable values in tooltips

The display of variable values in **Source** view tooltips is improved, providing information that narrows the range of the variable. For example, the tooltip might indicate whether the variable values are multiples of a number. The following table has examples of how tooltips display variable range values.

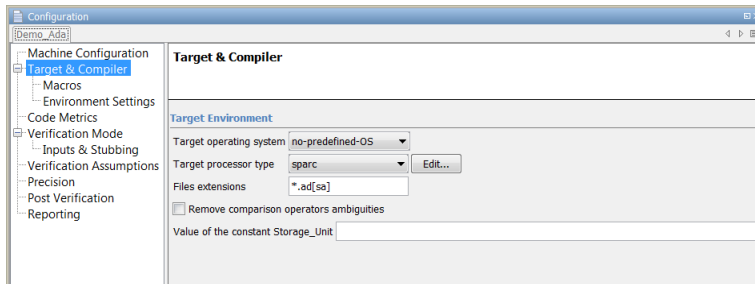
This enhancement might affect the contents of the text file *Your_Project_Variable_View.txt* file, which your verification generates in the ... \results\Polyspace-Doc folder. Instead of only an interval list for a variable, you might see, for example, the following conventions in the file:

- multiples of (a constant) in (the interval list)
- even values in (the interval list)
- odd values in (the interval list)

Reorganized Configuration pane

The Project Manager perspective of the Polyspace verification environment provides a reorganized **Configuration** pane that allows improved management of verification options.

The configuration process for code verification consists of different parts, for example, specifying your target environment and compiler behavior. The **Configuration** pane contains a tree with nodes that represent different parts of the configuration process. For example, to choose your target environment and compiler, select the **Target & Compiler** node and then specify your options.



You can specify the following option from the command line or through the **Configuration > Machine Configuration > Non-official options** field.

Polyspace plug-in for Eclipse with GNATbench

The Polyspace plug-in for the Eclipse IDE now supports Ada projects generated by GNATbench.

You can run verifications for Ada projects from the Eclipse IDE. However, Polyspace settings are not extracted from the Eclipse project.

Report content filtering

Previously, you used the MATLAB Report Generator software to apply filters to report templates through only the **Run-time Check Details Ordered by Color/File** component. The software provides a new component, **Report Customization (Filtering)**, which allows you to apply filters from any point of the report hierarchy.

Parent folder for verification results

You can now specify a parent folder for your verification results through the **Project and result folder** tab of the Polyspace Preferences dialog box. If you do not specify a parent folder, the software uses the active module folder as the parent folder. For more information, see Specify Parent Folder for Results.

Support for relative paths

The Polyspace Project Manager now supports relative paths outside the project hierarchy. For example, paths for source files in a folder above the project location. Previously, relative paths were supported only for subfolders of the project.

Absolute paths are still supported.

Intermediate verification level support

From the Polyspace verification environment, you can no longer specify the value CDFA or “Control and Data Flow Analysis” for the option `-to`. If this value is specified in a project configuration file (`.cfg`), the software replaces the value with `compile` or “Source Compliance Checking”. However, from the command line, you can still specify CDFA or “Control and Data Flow Analysis” for `-to`.

Automatic import of comments and justifications

You can specify the batch option `-import-comments` *polyspace_results_folder_path* to automatically import comments and justifications from a previous verification. For more information, see Batch Options.

Storage of temporary files

If you specify the new option `-tmp-dir-in-results-dir`, Polyspace does not use the standard `/tmp` or `C:\Temp` folder to store temporary files. Instead, Polyspace uses a subfolder of the results folder. If the results folder is mounted on a network drive, this action might affect processing speed. Use this option only when the temporary folder partition is not large enough and troubleshooting is required.

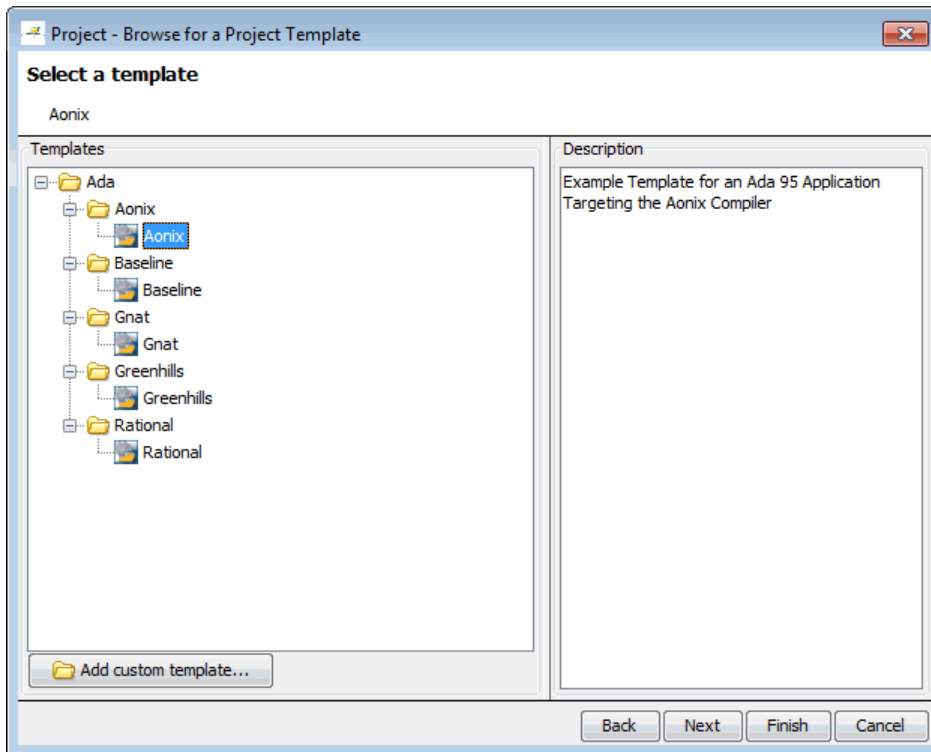

Suppression of NTC, NTL and UNR Checks Caused by Red Checks

Previously, the software would generate red NTC and NTL checks that were a consequence of other red checks. Now, the software does not generate these red checks. However, the software still gives the information that these red checks provided. The software highlights the corresponding call or loop identifier by applying a dashed underline to the identifier.

If the cause of the problem is known, the software provides this information in a tooltip for the underlined call or loop identifier. In addition, when you right-click the identifier, the context menu provides a **Go to Cause** item. Selecting this item takes you to the red check that is the cause.

The software:

- Does not generate gray UNR checks if the cause is a red check
- Still generates red NTC, NTL, and K-NTC checks for a call or loop identifier if the corresponding code contains orange checks.
- Does not generate NTC checks for the statements `exit` and `abort`, but provides tooltips for these statements. For example, `abort`, which does not correspond to an error, prevents the execution of a sequence of statements.

Compatibility Considerations

As a result of this new feature, you might observe a significant reduction in the total number of red and gray checks when compared to previous versions of the software.

Redefinition of Successful Verification

Previously, if a Polyspace verification failed, for example, during `pass1` (Software Safety Analysis level 1), the software communicated the failure through log messages and the **Project Browser**. However, if you clicked the `xx_LAST_RESULTS.exe` file within the **Project Browser**, the software displayed any results (colored checks) that had been generated by the verification. Now, the software deems a verification successful provided some results have been generated.

Polyspace Report Generator Enhancements

Review Orange Checks that are Potential Run-Time Errors

Previously, there were two modes in which you could review verification results — manual and assistant. For the manual mode, you set the Assistant slider to **Off** and the software displayed all orange checks (in addition to the red and green checks) . With the assistant mode, there were three levels of review — corresponding to settings 1, 2, and 3 of the Assistant slider. You could specify the number of orange checks to display through the **Assistant Configuration** tab in the Polyspace Preference dialog box.

Now, Polyspace allows you to review results at five different levels. You can set the Review slider to **0**, **1**, **2**, **3**, or **All**:

- **0** — Display red and gray checks. In addition, display orange checks that are potential run-time errors. On the **Polyspace Preference > Review Configuration** tab, you can specify the type of potential run-time errors that you are interested in. You have the option of not displaying any orange checks.
- **1**, **2**, and **3** — This functionality is unchanged. Display red, gray, and green checks. In addition, display orange checks according to values specified on the **Polyspace Preference > Review Configuration** tab.
- **All** — Display red, gray, green, and all orange checks.

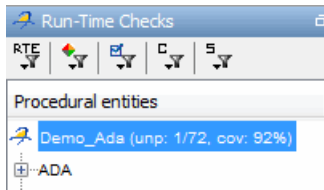
The **Assistant Configuration** tab is renamed the **Review Configuration** tab.

No Gray Checks in Unreachable Code

The only gray checks that Polyspace generates now are UNR checks for unreachable branches of code. In addition, Polyspace generates the UNR check only at the highest level of a branch. You no longer see nested UNR checks , that is, UNR checks in sub-branches.

In addition, the software displays two new metrics for the project in the procedural entities view:

- **unp** — Number of unreachable procedures (functions) as a fraction of the total number of procedures (functions)
- **cov** — Percentage of elementary operations in executable procedures (functions) covered by verification



These metrics provide:

- A measure of the code coverage achieved by the Polyspace verification.
- Indicators about the validity of your Polyspace configuration. For example, a large unp value and a low cov value may indicate an early red check or missing function call.

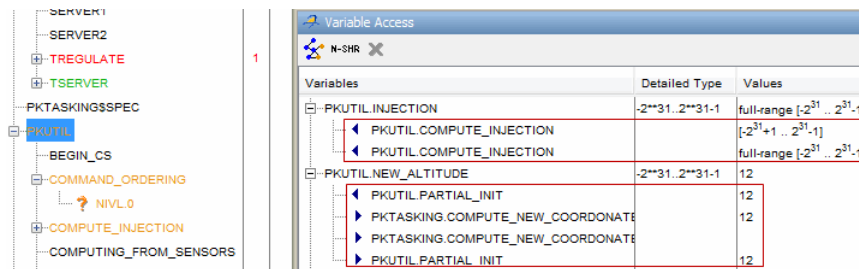

Compatibility Considerations

Due to the removal of non-UNR gray checks and nested UNR checks, verification results may change when compared to previous versions of the software.

Global Variable Range Information


In the **Variable Access** pane, Polyspace displays range information for read and write access operations on global variables within each source file. Previously, the displayed value was the union of all access operations on the global variable within a file. The software did not display range information for individual operations. Now, for global variables that are signed or unsigned integers, Polyspace also provides range information for the individual access operations from which the union value is obtained.

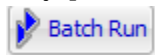
Read and Write Access in Dead Code

If a read or write access operation on a global variable lies within dead code, then Polyspace colors the operation gray in the **Variable Access** pane. When you examine

verification results, you can hide these operations by clicking the new filter button . See Variable Access Pane.

Run All Verifications in Project

You can have many verifications within a project, each verification being associated with an active configuration. Previously, you could only run one verification at a time from the Polyspace verification environment (PVE). Now, if you select a project and click the button



, Polyspace will run all verifications in the project. See Running a Verification.

Green NIV check for Unchecked_Conversion Function

Previously, the software produced an orange NIV check for each call to an instance of the Ada generic library function `Unchecked_Conversion`. Now by default, the software produces a green NIV check for each call. If you want to revert to the previous behavior, run your verification with the option `-D POLYSPACE_UNCHECKED_CONVERSION_NO_INIT`.

Running Multiple Verifications Simultaneously

If you purchase more than one license for a Polyspace server, you can now configure the server to run multiple verifications at the same time. This can improve the performance of server verifications.

To configure your server to run multiple verifications, open the Remote Launcher Manager, then set the **Number of Polyspace verifications that can run simultaneously on this server** to the number of licenses you have activated for your server.

If you configure your server to run more than one verification simultaneously, the server will not be able to run verifications using older versions of the software.

File Modules with Quality Levels

If you have projects with two or more file modules in the Polyspace verification environment, by default Polyspace Metrics displays verification results using the same module structure. However, Polyspace Metrics also allows you to create or delete file modules. You can group files into a module and specify a quality level for the module, which applies to all files within the module. This feature allows you to specify different quality levels for your files in the review of verification results. See *Creating a File Module and Specifying Quality Level*.

Enhanced Graphs and Charts

Polyspace Metrics displays enhanced graphs and charts.

If you specify a range of project versions:

- On the **Summary** tab, **Run-Time Defects** are plotted as separate categories, High, Medium, and Low.
- On the Run-Time Checks tab:
 - Under **Confirmed Defects**, you see separate plots for the defect categories, High, Medium, and Low.
 - Under **Run-Time Findings**, you see separate plots for red checks, NTC checks, and gray checks.

If you specify a single version of a project, Polyspace Metrics displays file defect information, ordering the files according to the number of defects in each file. Use the new **# items** field to specify the maximum number of files for which information is displayed. See Displaying Metrics for Single Project Version.

Previously, when you saved your project (**Ctrl+S**) after a review of results from Polyspace Metrics, the software would save your comments and justifications both locally and in the Polyspace Metrics repository.

Now, if you save your project (**Ctrl+S**), the software saves your review to a local folder

only. A new button  is available on the Run-Time Checks toolbar. If you click this button, the software saves your comments and justifications to a local folder *and* the Polyspace Metrics repository.

This feature allows you to upload your review to the repository only when you are satisfied that your review is, for example, correct and complete.

You can still configure your software to display the previous behavior.

Support for Rational and Aonix Compilers

The software now provides support for the IBM Rational Apex and Aonix® compilers. For more information, see Operating system target for Standard Libraries compatibility in the Polyspace Products for Ada Reference.

Multi-Core Support

On multi-core computers, you can reduce verification time by specifying the use of core processors simultaneously to perform the verification. The software provides a new command line option `-max-processes`, which uses a default value of 4. You can specify any value between 1 and 128. For more information, see Number of processes for multiple CPU core systems in the Polyspace Products for Ada Reference.

Generated Main with Explicit Tasks and Accept Statements

If you select the option `Generate a main` and there are explicit tasks in the source code, then task bodies are verified like subprograms and `accept` statements are not executed. After verification, code associated with the `accept` statements is gray. For more information, see `Generate a main` in the Polyspace Products for Ada Reference.

Compatibility Considerations

Previously, if there were explicit tasks and `accept` statements in the source code, a verification run could have generated red, green, or orange checks for code within the `accept` statements. Now, verification colors the code within these `accept` statements gray.

Enhancements in Run-Time Checks Perspective

Within the source code view, you can investigate checks with tooltips that provide range information about variables.

In addition, when you click a check, the software provides information about the check in the Review Details pane.

Compatibility Considerations

Because of these enhancements, the IPT and VOA checks are no longer required, and the software does not generate these checks anymore.

UOVFL and UNFL Checks Removed

The software no longer generates UOVFL and UNFL checks, but generates OVFL checks in place of these checks.

Compatibility Considerations

Due to the replacement of UOVFL and UNFL checks by the OVFL check, the number of green checks may decrease when compared with previous versions of the software. For example, a combination of an orange OVFL and a green UNFL generated by a previous version may be replaced by a single orange OVFL.

NIV Checks for Universal Constants

The software now generates NIV checks for read operations on universal constants. If the constants are used in your code, the NIV checks are green. If the constants are in unreachable code, the NIV checks are gray.

Compatibility Considerations

This enhancement may change the check metrics and selectivity of the verification. The number of green and gray checks may be higher compared to the number generated by previous versions of the software.

Variable Range Inconsistency between Variable Access Pane and Tooltips

The range given for a variable in the Variable Access Pane (Variables View) can differ from the range given by tooltips on the reads of a variable in the Source code view. The range provided by the tooltip will be wider than the range given in the Variables View.

This difference is due to imprecision in the tooltip. The Variables View provides the correct range for the variable.

For example:

- Variables View states that variable *X* is in range [0 . . 4000]
- Tooltip on a read of *X* states that the range is [0 , 7000].

In this case, [0 . . 4000] is the correct range. The tooltip range is caused by imprecision that may be fixed in future releases.

Verification Time Limit

You can now specify a time limit for verifications using the `-timeout` option. If the verification does not complete within the specified time, the verification fails.

Automatic Addition of Specifications for Selected Source Files

When launching a verification from the Eclipse IDE or the Polyspace Verification Environment, the software automatically searches for the package specifications associated with the selected source files, and adds them to the set of sources to verify.

As a result, the verification may contain more source files than you select.

Stubbed Tasks

Programs with stubbed tasks, such as those using Ada rendezvous, previously caused compilation errors. These programs can now be verified.

Scaling Issue for Large Applications with Nested Structures/Arrays

With R2011a, you may experience scaling problems for large applications that manipulate strongly nested structures or arrays. When verifying such applications, the verification may fail during the “Software Safety Analysis Level 0” phase. No verification results are generated, although the data dictionaries (Variable View and Call-Graph View) are accessible.

With previous releases, such applications could be verified, but the verification required several days to complete, and produced results with very low selectivity.

If you experience this problem, try performing a unit-by-unit verification. For more information, see *Running Verification Unit-by-Unit in the Polyspace Products for Ada User's Guide*.

Compatibility Considerations

Verification may fail for code that was previously verified with an earlier version of the product.

Product Name Change in Files and Folders

The Polyspace product name has changed from “PolySpace” to “Polyspace” in R2011a. This change impacts the name of all files and folders created by the software.

For example:

- PolySpace-Doc folder has changed to Polyspace-Doc
- PolySpace_XXXX.log file has changed to Polyspace_XXXX.log

Compatibility Considerations

If you have existing folders that use the previous product name (for example, PolySpace/PolySpace_Common) the R2011a installation will continue to use these existing folders. However, files or folders created during or after installation will use the new name.

If you have shortcuts or scripts that are case-sensitive, you should update them to use the new name.

License Manager Support

The License Manager for Polyspace products has been upgraded to FlexNet® 11.9.

You may need to upgrade your FlexNet server and daemon.

There may be less write accesses with protected objects that have defined entries when you use the option `-main-generator`.

NIV for Variables Initialized at Declaration

In previous releases, there is no NIV check when a variable is initialized at the declaration.

In R2011a, verification always puts NIV checks on variables and constants. OVFL checks are not put on constants.

The total number of checks may change when compared with previous releases.

Range Error with greenhills OS Target

In previous releases, verification could report a false red when using `Ada.interrupts.Interrupt_ID` in source code designed for the greenhills compiler.

In R2011a, when you use the type `Ada.interrupts.Interrupt_ID`, and set the `-OS-target` to `greenhills`, the bounds of the type `Interrupt_ID` have changed.

Verification results may change when compared to previous versions of the software. Some checks may change color, and the Selectivity rate of your results may change.

UOVFL and UNFL Checks Removed

The software no longer generates UOVFL and UNFL checks, but generates OVFL checks in place of these checks.

The number of checks may decrease compared to previous versions of the software.

NIV Checks for Universal Constants

The software now generates NIV checks for read operations on universal constants. If the constants are used in your code, the NIV checks are green. If the constants are in unreachable code, the NIV checks are gray.

Verification results may change when compared to previous versions of the software. The number of green and gray checks may be higher compared to the number generated by previous versions of the software.

Constants Defined in Package System

In previous releases, constants defined in package system were ignored.

For example:

In R2011a, values of constants defined in the package system that are used in the program to be verified are taken into account for the verification. This may impact the results.

Initialization of Variables Declared and Assigned in Specs

In previous releases, verification could incorrectly report a red ZDV check for a variable of a type with default values, when the variable is global.

In R2011a, when using the option `-main-generator`, components with initial values of global variables of composite types that are not initialized are considered full range.

Verification results may change when compared to previous versions of the software. Some checks may change color, and the Selectivity rate of your results may change.

Parameterless Protected Procedure as Entry Point

In previous releases, when a parameterless protected procedure is used as an entry point via the option `-entry-points`, the verification fails.

In R2011a, parameterless protected procedures applied to a global object are now accepted as values of the option `-entry-points`.

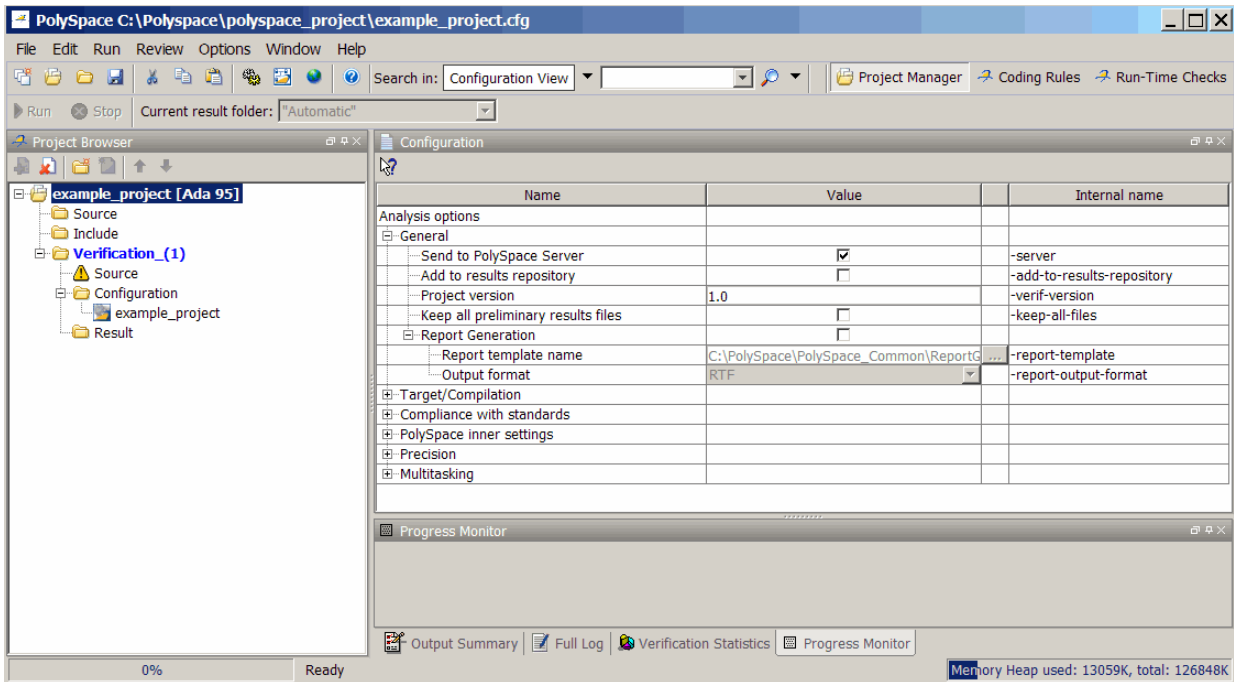

The Run-Time Checks perspective allows you to review verification results, comment individual checks, and track review progress.

The Data Range Specifications (DRS) feature allows you to set constraints on data ranges using a text file. With this text file, you can specify data ranges for global variables, stubbed functions and procedures, and function call inputs.

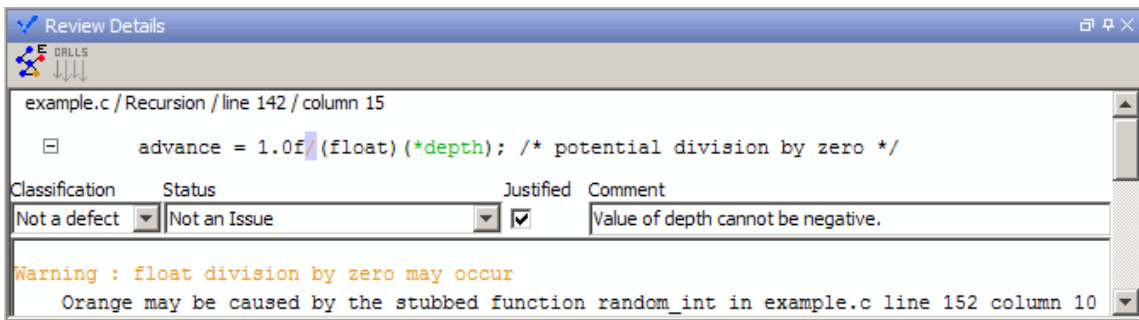

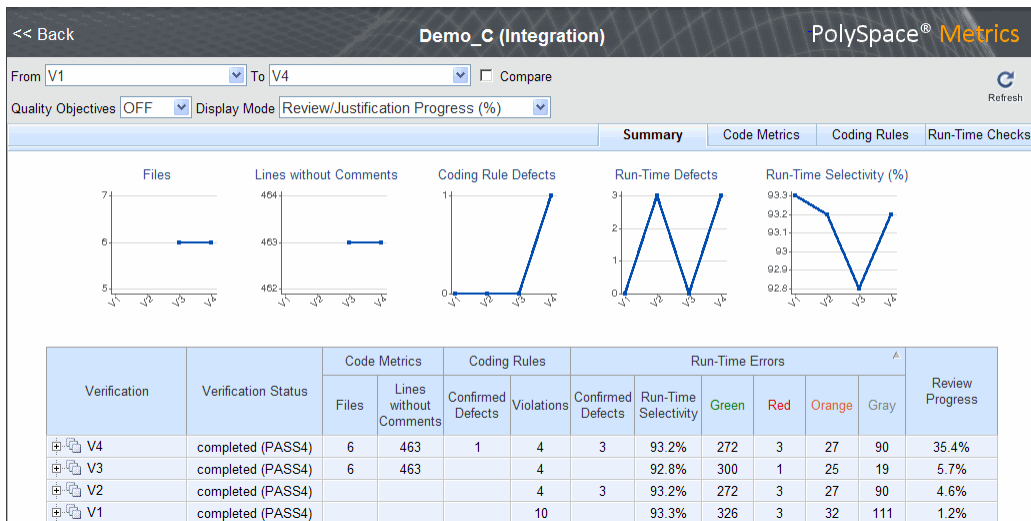

- View defect numbers, run-time reliability of the software, review progress, and the status of the code with respect to software quality objectives.



In addition, if you have the Polyspace Client for Ada product installed on your computer, you can drill down to run-time checks in the Polyspace verification environment. You can review these run-time checks and, if required, classify these checks as defects.

Previously, these variables were considered initialized (green NIV) with full-range values. This behavior made interpretation of results easier and allowed verification to continue. However, the software now considers these variables uninitialized (red NIV) and stops verification at this point. This new behavior is more accurate with respect to the actual initialization state of the variables. You must correct the code before verification can continue. Alternatively, you can use the option `-continue-with-all-niv`.




Uncalled Package-scope Procedures/Functions are Considered Unreachable

Procedures and functions that are declared in the package but not called by code within the package body provided for the verification will now be considered unreachable (gray).

Previously, all procedures and functions in a package were considered for verification and subsequently colored. The argument for this behavior was that these functions and procedures could be called by code inside the package that had not been provided for the verification. Now, the software considers this code unreachable (gray) unless there is a path of execution that leads to it.

Functions/Procedures Declared at the Spec Level are Called Only Once

Functions or procedures declared at the specification level are called only once.



Note This behavior changed in Release 2010a. In R2010a or later, the main generator can call a function several times.

Uninitialized Spec Level Variables are Considered Possibly Uninitialized

Uninitialized variables declared in a package specification will now be considered possibly uninitialized (orange NIV). Previously, these variables were considered initialized (green NIV) with full-range values.

The software now considers uninitialized variables that are declared only in the package *body* as uninitialized (red NIV). However, for uninitialized variables declared in a package *specification*, it is possible that packages that use these variables may initialize these variables. The software now recognizes this possibility and generates orange NIV checks for uninitialized variables declared in a package specification.

This behavior is not changed if you use options `-init-stubbing-vars-random` or `-init-stubbing-vars-zero-or-random` to initialize uninitialized variables. Specification-level variables will still be considered possibly uninitialized (orange NIV), because the packages that use these variables can alter the variables, even to the extent of uninitialized the variables.

Compatibility Considerations

Changes to the main generator may result in differences in your verification results, when compared with earlier versions of the software. If you verified your code with previous versions of the software (for example, R2009a), be aware of these changes, how they affect your colored results and the way you interpret the results.

Global Data Graphs

New Graphs (similar to concurrent access graphs) available for all global data.

You can display the access sequence for any variable that is read or written in the code. The access graph displays the read and write access for the variable.

Unit-by-unit Verification

When verification is complete, you can download and view results for the entire project, or for individual units. When downloading a verification group, all the unit results are downloaded and a summary of the download status for each unit is displayed.

Note Unit by unit verification is available only for server verifications.
