DDS Blockset Product Description

Design and simulate DDS applications

DDS Blockset provides apps and blocks for modeling and simulating software applications that publish or subscribe to Data Distribution Service (DDS) middleware. The blockset includes a DDS dictionary that lets you manage, create, and edit your DDS definitions in Simulink[®]. You can import DDS specifications as XML files to create a skeleton Simulink model as a starting point for developing algorithms for DDS applications.

DDS Blockset provides blocks for publishing and subscribing samples to DDS, including their corresponding Quality of Service (QoS). It fully integrates with the RTI Connext DDS and eProsima Fast DDS stacks.

DDS Blockset generates C++ code and XML files from Simulink models (with Embedded Coder®).

What Is DDS?

The Data Distribution Service (DDS) is a middleware standard that is ideal for production quality data communication. It is currently widely used in the fields of aerospace and defense, autonomous vehicles, as well as up-and-coming in robotics, medical devices, and power generation. DDS uses a publish-subscribe communication pattern to create a decentralized, architecture-independent, scalable, asynchronous network. 


Global Data Space

In DDS, the DDS network is referred to as the Global Data Space.




Domains

Within the Global Data Space, you can create a portion of the network referred to as a Domain. Domains are identified by a Domain name and a numeric Domain ID. There can be one or many Domains within the Global Data Space.




Topics

Within Domains there are Topics. Topics are categories that describe the type of data communicated on the network. For example, if you have an application that you would like to use DDS to receive information about the weather, a Topic could be Temperature. Domains can have one or many Topics. If you have the same Topic in different Domains they are considered distinct Topics.




Publishers and Subscribers

Applications that use DDS are referred to a Domain Participants because they participate in a Domain. Applications that send data are referred to as Publishers and applications that receive data are referred to as Subscribers. Domain Participants can be Publishers, Subscribers, or both.




DataReaders, DataWriters, and Data Samples

Data is sent and received on a DDS network as a Data Sample, specified by a DDS data type. A Topic registers a DDS data type, then referred to as the Registered Type, to specify the data type that must be used to communicate about that Topic. A Publisher uses a DataWriter to send data on the DDS network. A Publisher can have one or many DataWriters that publish to one or many Topics. A Subscriber uses a DataReader to receive data from the DDS network. A Subscriber can have one or many DataReaders, that subscribe to one or many Topics.



Quality of Service (QoS)

In addition to being able to send and receive data, Quality of Service (QoS), which describes the quality of the data transport, can be specified for a Topic, a Publisher or Subscriber, or specific DataReaders or DataWriters. DDS is known to have several QoS policies to help ensure exact control over data transport. You can assign individual QoS policies to these entities, or you can assign a set of QoS policies referred to as a QoS profile.



DDS Implementation

DDS is specified by the Object Management Group (OMG) standard. The standard provides specifications that explain how the DDS network must be configured and how applications should use the DDS network. The DDS standard is implemented by several different DDS vendors. Each vendor can implement the DDS standard by using a programming language of its choice. Despite varied low-level implementations, DDS vendors are interoperable (an application that uses one vendor can communicate with an application on a different vendor) because its vendors implement to the DDS standard. DDS applications, composed of the definitions previously described (for example, Domains, Topics, Data Samples, Publishers, Subscribers) can be defined in a programming language agnostic way by using XML or IDL specifications. These XML and IDL specifications provide the ability to port DDS applications between different vendors with different programming language implementations.

How does DDS Blockset Work?

The DDS Blockset enables you to create DDS applications in Simulink. If you have an application modeled in Simulink that you would like to be able to use DDS, you can use the DDS Blockset to easily connect to the DDS middleware platform. The DDS Blockset brings DDS concepts into the Simulink environment, models those concepts in your Simulink application, and then enables you to connect your application to DDS.


Conceptual DDS Blockset Workflow

You start with the DDS network and the DDS definitions required for your DDS application.




Create DDS Definitions

You then bring your DDS definitions into the Simulink environment. You can either import or create these definitions. Once the definitions are in the Simulink environment, Domains, Topics, Types, Quality of Service (QoS), and Domain Participant information is available in Simulink.




Model DDS Applications in Simulink

You can now construct or adapt a Simulink model so that it behaves as a Publisher, Subscriber, or an application that is both a Publisher and Subscriber.




You then configure the DDS interface. The DDS interface is the connection point between the application and the DDS network. Specifically, when you use the DDS Blockset, the interface is the Topic and QoS specified on the DataWriters and DataReaders for your application.



Deploy Applications to DDS Network

After you have appropriately modeled your DDS application, build the model and use the executable to deploy your application on the DDS network. Now your DDS application can communicate with other applications by using DDS.



The DDS Blockset provides out-of-the-box support for the DDS vendors RTI and eProsima.

DDS Blockset workflow

To use the DDS Blockset tools to complete these conceptual steps:

- **1** Use the DDS Application Quick Start to import or create DDS Definitions.
- 2 View or edit DDS definitions in the DDS Dictionary.
- **3** Use DDS Blocks to model a Publisher or Subscriber.
- **4** Use the Code Mappings editor to configure the DDS interface (the Topic and QoS properties of DataReaders and DataWriters).

5 Build the application executable to deploy the application on DDS network.

Create DDS Applications in Simulink

DDS Blockset enables an easy way to configure applications modeled in Simulink to use DDS.



DDS Workflow

The general workflow to create a DDS application is the following:


- **1** Create DDS definitions.
- 2 View and edit DDS definitions.
- **3** Construct the Simulink model as a DDS Publisher or Subscriber.
- 4 Configure the DDS interface.
- **5** Build and deploy the application to the DDS network.

Create DDS Definitions

DDS Blockset enables applications modeled in Simulink to use DDS by bringing DDS concepts such as Domains, Topics, Types, and Quality of Service (QoS) into the Simulink environment. To bring these concepts into Simulink, you can use the DDS Application Quick Start to import DDS definitions from XML, use previously defined definitions stored in Simulink, or create default definitions from the application model. For this example, you can create DDS definitions from the application model.

1 Open the model shapesdemo.




- 2 Open the DDS Blockset app. In the Apps Gallery, click **DDS Application Designer**.
- **3** When you start the DDS Blockset app, the DDS Application Quick Start opens. Walk through the Quick Start steps:
 - **a** Specify the DDS application name and vendor. Leave the application name as its default, which is the name of the application model, **shapesdemo**. Select the DDS vendor that you want to use for your application. For this example, select eProsima.

• To wrap up the transition from DDS to Simulink, click **Finish**. When you finish the DDS Application Quick Start, the app creates your DDS application, associates it with the DDS Dictionary, and configures it appropriately for eProsima.

View and Edit DDS Definitions

After the DDS Application Quick Start creates your default DDS definitions, these definitions are stored in the DDS Dictionary. You use these definitions to configure the DDS aspects of your application. You can view and edit these definitions at any time.

To view your recently created DDS definitions:

- **1** Open the DDS Dictionary. To open the DDS Dictionary, on the **DDS** tab, click **Code Interface** and select **DDS Dictionary**.
- 2 View your created default DDS Types. In the open **Types** pane, click the **TypeLibrary** to view the DDS data types. Click each DDS data type to view the equivalent Simulink data type in the **Details** pane.



Construct Simulink Model as Publisher and Subscriber

To publish and subscribe to the DDS network, the application model for the Shapes Demo has already been configured as a top model that meets the necessary modeling aspects:

- 1 The model has inports and outports that are set to DDS data types.
- 2 The model has message blocks, specifically the Write DDS Sample and Take DDS Sample blocks, that send and receive messages from the DDS network. These blocks convert between DDS and Simulink data types to enable the model to publish and subscribe to the DDS network.
- **3** The model itself contains the DDS application logic. The logic portion of the model is independent of the middleware. It uses the data communicated from the middleware in a Simulink compliant form to run the application algorithm.



To explore the publish and subscribe aspects of the application model:

- 1 Click the inport and view its DDS data type.
- 2 Click the Take DDS Sample block that converts the DDS data type to the Simulink data type.
- **3** Examine the logic component of the application model. The logic component uses the Simulink data types to compute the logic of the DDS application.
- 4 Click the Write DDS Sample block that converts Simulink data types to a DDS data type.
- **5** Click the outport and view the DDS data type on the port that sends the data to the DDS network.

Configure the DDS Interface

The DDS interface is the connection point between your DDS application and the DDS network. Specifically, the connection point for a DDS application is the specification of the Topic and Quality of Service (QoS) for the DataReaders and DataWriters of the application.

To configure the DDS interface for the Shapes Demo:

1 Open the Code Mappings editor. On the **DDS** tab, click **Code Interface** and select **Individual Element Code Mappings**.

- 2 Configure the Topic, Reader, and QoS for the inport that acts as a DataReader. In the Code Mappings editor, click the **Inports** tab:
 - a Select the Topic. For the **Topic**, select the Square Topic specified in the drop-down options by its path (ShapesDomainLibrary/ShapesDomain/Square).
 - **b** Select the DataReader. For the **Reader XML Path**, select Auto to have DDS Blockset automatically generate a reader for the application.
 - **c** Select the Quality of Service (QoS). For the **Reader QoS**, select from the following list of options:

- You can leave the QoS policy as the default. The default QoS profile is the default provided by your target DDS vendor, eProsima
- You can select from built-in QoS profiles. The built-in QoS profiles automatically appear when you use the Quick Start default dictionary option.
- You can select from QoS profiles imported from XML. Imported QoS profiles also appear as options in this drop-down.

For this example, select Default.

- **3** Configure the Topic and QoS for the outport that acts as a DataWriter. In the Code Mappings editor, click the **Outports** tab:
 - a Select the Topic. For the **Topic**, select the Circle Topic specified in the drop-down options by its path (ShapesDomainLibrary/ShapesDomain/Circle).
 - **b** Select the DataWriter. For the **Writer XML Path**, select Auto to have DDS Blockset automatically generate a reader for the application.
 - **c** Select the Quality of Service (QoS). For the **Writer QoS**, select from the following list of options:
 - You can leave the QoS policy as the default. The default QoS profile is the default provided by your target DDS vendor, eProsima
 - You can select from built-in QoS profiles. The built-in QoS profiles automatically appear when you use the Quick Start default dictionary option.
 - You can select from QoS profiles imported from XML. Imported QoS profiles also appear as options in this drop-down.

Build and Deploy Application to DDS Network

DDS Blockset enables out-of-the-box support for your previously selected vendor, eProsima. To use this out-of-the-box support, build your application model and deploy your generated executable in your development environment:

- **1** Ensure that your model is configured correctly. Verify that the model ports are configured and mapped appropriately for DDS.
- 2 Set up your build environment. Verify that a C++ compiler is appropriately set up for your platform. For eProsima, no additional setup is required (If you had selected RTI, you would need to install RTI Connext).
- **3** Build the Shapes Demo application model. On the **DDS** tab, click **Build**.
- 4 Run the generated executable.

DDS Blockset Limitations and Considerations

DDS Blockset does not support the following import, modeling, simulation, and deployment capabilities:

- Import DDS Blockset does not directly support IDL import for eProsima. To import IDL for eProsima, you must convert IDL to XML and import the XML equivalent files.
- Modeling DDS Blockset requires that all ports for an application model must map to DDS. If you have ports that do not map DDS, the model does not simulate or build correctly.
- Simulation DDS Blockset does not support Rapid Accelerator mode simulation, external mode simulation, software-in-the-loop (SIL) testing, or MAT- file logging for DDS applications.
- Deployment DDS Blockset does not support compiling the code generated from a DDS application model for a non-DDS application.

To get started by using RTI within MATLAB, you can use the provided file exchange version of RTI Connext compatible with your version of DDS Blockset. To download and install, see RTI Connext® DDS connectivity framework for DDS Blockset - File Exchange .

eProsima

DDS Blockset supports DDS out-of-the-box with the eProsima product Fast DDS version 2.3.4+. No additional setup is required. For product information, see Fast DDS.

DDS Blockset Shapes Demo

This example shows how to import, configure, and deploy the Shapes Demo provided by DDS vendors to introduce DDS concepts. In the demo there are various shapes - Circles, Squares, and Triangles - that you can subscribe to watch their location as they move around a canvas. In this version of the demo, DDS Blockset provides an application that subscribes to a Square and then publishes the location of a Circle.

Import DDS Definitions

To get started with the Shapes Demo, the DDS definitions of Domains, Topics, Types, and Quality of Service (QoS) have been imported from XML. To view the XML specifications, open shapesexample.xml.

View and Edit Definitions


To view these DDS definitions in the DDS Dictionary, open the dictionary and view the **Types**, **Domains**, and **QoS** tabs.

In the Simulink model for the Shapes Demo, view how the DDS blocks, Take DDS Sample and Write DDS Sample, are used to subscribe to and publish the location of the shape.

- **1** Click the Bus Element In block and view the DDS data type of the shape.
- 2 Click the Take DDS Sample block that converts the DDS data type to the Simulink data type.
- **3** Examine the logic component of the application model. The logic component uses the Simulink data types to compute the logic of the DDS application.
- 4 Click the Write DDS Sample block that converts the Simulink data types to a DDS data type.
- 5 Click the Bus Element Out block and view the DDS data type to send the shape position to the DDS network.

Also, note that root level output logging is unset for this model to use Bus Element Out block with virtual bus representing the DDS Publisher.

- **1** Open the Code Mappings editor. On the toolstrip, click **Code Interface** and select **Individual Elements Code Mappings**.
- **2** To view the imported Topics and DataReaders, click on the **Inports** tab.
- **3** To view the imported Topics and DataWriters, click on the **Outports** tab.
