

Interactive Solution Plots: Create and explore visualizations of PDE results

With the **Visualize PDE Results** Live Editor task, you can plot and inspect results of structural, thermal, electromagnetic, or general PDE analysis using interactive controls. An interactive solution plot enables you to:

- Select which solution data to display.
- Quickly access plots for different frequencies, modes, time steps, and phases.
- · Show animated solutions.
- · Add a mesh to a solution plot.
- Adjust color limits for a colormap.
- Adjust surface transparency.

DC Conduction Analysis: Find stationary current distribution in conductors due to applied voltage

The programmatic workflow for DC conduction analysis enables you to analyze stationary current distribution in conductors due to applied voltage. Knowing stationary current distributions, you can:

- Study the concentration of current density near sharp geometric corners.
- Perform a magnetostatic analysis with a known current distribution.

For details, see ConductionResults.

Magnetostatic Analysis: Model permanent magnets

Specify magnetization using the electromagneticSource function to account for materials generating their own magnetic fields in a magnetostatic analysis workflow. For an example, see MagnetostaticResults.

Geometries: Import 3-D geometries from STEP files

Import a 3-D geometry in STEP file format using the importGeometry function. When importing from a STEP file, you can control the accuracy of the geometry import by specifying the relative sag value. For examples of the STEP files included in the toolbox, see "STEP File Import".

Electromagnetic Analysis: Solve 2-D and 3-D wave scattering and transmission problems

The programmatic workflow for a harmonic electromagnetic analysis enables you to set up, solve, and analyze time-harmonic Maxwell's equations (the Helmholtz equation). This workflow enables you to specify:

- Frequency-dependent relative permittivity, relative permeability, and conductivity of the material
- Frequency and components of the electric or magnetic field on boundaries
- Absorbing boundary conditions

For an example, see Scattering Problem.

Reduced-Order Modeling in Thermal Analysis: Approximate dynamic characteristics of a thermal model for faster execution

Finite-element discretized models can be very large. Model-order reduction techniques approximate the dynamics of the original system with a smaller system while retaining most of the dynamic characteristics.

When using the reduced-order model workflow, you can:

- Compute modes of a thermal model using eigenvalue or proper orthogonal decomposition. For details, see solve.
- Speed up computations for a transient thermal model by using the computed modes. For details, see solve.
- Generate a reduced-order model by projecting the full finite-element system onto modes. For details, see reduce.

Hysteretic Damping: Model energy loss due to internal friction

Specify hysteretic damping of a material for direct and modal frequency response models. The toolbox enables you to specify a constant hysteretic damping parameter:

- For the entire geometry
- For specified cells of a 3-D geometry or specified faces of a 2-D geometry

Electromagnetic Analysis: Solve 3-D electrostatic and magnetostatic problems

The programmatic workflow for electromagnetic analysis enables you to set up, solve, and analyze 3-D electrostatic and magnetostatic problems using natural steps and familiar domain-specific language.

For more details about the new workflow, see Electromagnetics.

Local Mesh Refinement: Set target mesh sizes around specified vertices, edges, and faces

The generateMesh function lets you specify local target mesh size around geometric vertices, edges, and faces. The function generates a mesh with the element sizes around the specified regions as close to the target sizes as possible, and gradually blends the mesh between regions with different element sizes.

Structural and Thermal Analysis: Extract sparse linear models for use with Control System Toolbox

Use the linearize function to obtain mechss (Control System Toolbox) and sparss (Control System Toolbox) models from structural and thermal models, respectively. You can also use the function to extract the finite element matrices used to obtain the mechss and sparss models. For examples, see Linear Analysis of Cantilever Beam (Control System Toolbox) and Linear Analysis of Tuning Fork (Control System Toolbox).

PDEVisualization Properties: Display or hide axes and control background color

Use PDEVisualization Properties to display or hide the axes and also change the background color.

Electromagnetic Analysis: Solve 2-D electrostatic and magnetostatic problems

A new programmatic workflow lets you set up, solve, and analyze 2-D electrostatic and magnetostatic problems using natural steps and familiar domain-specific language. When setting up an electromagnetic problem, you can:

- Create a special model container for an electrostatic or magnetostatic model using the createpde function.
- Assign electromagnetic material properties, such as relative permittivity and relative permeability, using the electromagneticProperties function.
- Specify a charge density and current density using the electromagneticSource function.
- Set electromagnetic boundary conditions, such as voltage and magnetic potential, using the electromagneticBC function.

The solve function solves electrostatic or magnetostatic problems and returns the values of electric or magnetic potential, field, and flux density at nodal locations of the mesh. You can analyze the resulting solution further by using one of these functions:

- interpolateElectricPotential and interpolateMagneticPotential interpolate the electric and magnetic potential at nodes to arbitrary spatial locations.
- interpolateElectricField and interpolateMagneticField interpolate the electric and magnetic field at nodes to arbitrary spatial locations.
- interpolateElectricFlux and interpolateMagneticFlux interpolate the electric and magnetic flux density at nodes to arbitrary spatial locations.

The pdeplot function visualizes the solution by plotting the resulting potentials, fields, fluxes, and mesh.

For more details about the new workflow, see Electromagnetics.

3-D Geometries: Create a multidomain geometry by inserting one geometry into another

Combine two 3-D geometries or create void regions inside 3-D geometry using the addCell and addVoid functions. For these operations, all cells of one geometry must be contained inside one cell of the other geometry.

Geometry Extrusion: Extrude faces of a 3-D geometry to a specified height

Extrude faces of a 3-D geometry along the direction normal to all specified faces using the extrude function. You can extrude faces into multiple layers by specifying a vector height of thicknesses of the layers. All faces must be flat and must have the same orientation.

Geometry Queries: Find faces, edges, and cells based on their proximity to other geometric entities

The following functions support geometry queries. They return face and edge IDs that you can use as arguments for other functions.

- cellFaces and cellEdges find faces and edges attached to the specified cells.
- faceEdges finds edges attached to the specified faces.
- facesAttachedToEdges finds faces attached to the specified edges.
- nearestFace and nearestEdge find faces and edges closest to the specified points.

Geometry Import from STL Files: Import a geometry without creating a model

The importGeometry function now lets you create a geometry object from an STL geometry file without attaching the imported geometry to any model. The new syntax is g = importGeometry('geometryfile.stl'). This approach lets you modify and adapt the geometry to meet your requirements before attaching it to a model. It also lets you share the same geometry between models.

PDEVisualization object: Create and plot an object containing nodal data, mesh, and visualization options as its properties

The pdeviz function uses the mesh and nodal data to create a PDEVisualization object and plot the result. You can interact with the resulting plot by changing the properties of this object. For example, you can change the mesh visibility, transparency, mesh deformation, axes labels, and so on. The plot reflects the new settings without the need to plot the same data repeatedly.

Face Addition and Geometry Transformation for Analytic Geometries: addFace, rotate, scale, and translate now work with AnalyticGeometry objects

The addFace function now lets you fill void regions in 2-D AnalyticGeometry objects.

The rotate, scale, and translate functions now work on AnalyticGeometry objects.

PDE Conversion to Divergence Form: Convert PDEs into the form required by Partial Differential Equation Toolbox using Symbolic Math Toolbox functions

Partial Differential Equation Toolbox solves equations of the form

$$\mathbf{m} \frac{\partial^2 \mathbf{u}}{\partial t^2} + \mathbf{d} \frac{\partial \mathbf{u}}{\partial t} - \nabla \cdot (\mathbf{c} \otimes \nabla \mathbf{u}) + \mathbf{a} \mathbf{u} = \mathbf{f}$$

The pdeCoefficients (Symbolic Math Toolbox) and pdeCoefficientsToDouble (Symbolic Math Toolbox) functions convert PDEs into this form and extract the coefficients into a structure that can

be used by the ${\tt specifyCoefficients}$ function. For example, see Solve Partial Differential Equation of Nonlinear Heat Transfer (Symbolic Math Toolbox).

Extrude a planar geometry along the *z*-axis to obtain a 3-D geometry. For details, see 3-D Multidomain Geometry from 2-D Geometry and extrude.

Finite Element Matrices for Custom Workflows: Assemble FE matrices for time-dependent and nonlinear models

The assembleFEMatrices function, which returns global finite element matrices for structural, thermal, and general PDE models can now:

- Assemble a subset of matrices, such as updated load only or stiffness only, to save computation time
- Assemble matrices using input time or solution for a time-dependent or nonlinear model, respectively

Axisymmetric Analysis: Speed up simulations by simplifying 3-D solids of revolution by analyzing only the 2-D axisymmetric sections

Simplify 3-D structural and thermal problems to 2-D using their symmetry around the axis of rotation. The toolbox now supports an axisymmetric analysis for linear elasticity and heat transfer problems and enables you to:

- Create an axisymmetric 2-D model for a structural or thermal problem. See createpde.
- Set up an axisymmetric problem and analyze the results in cylindrical coordinates. In particular, you can specify the enforced displacement for a structural axisymmetric model. See structural BC.
- Model the effect of a spinning axisymmetric structure by specifying a centrifugal load. For details, see structuralBodyLoad.

For a heat transfer example, see Heat Distribution in Circular Cylindrical Rod.

Multidomain Geometry: Split cells and fill voids to create multiple domains with different properties

Use the addFace function to create new geometric faces in 2-D and 3-D geometries. Adding a new face lets you modify a geometry:

- In a 2-D geometry, a new face fills a void region. The new face can have its own properties, such as thermal or structural material properties, or become an internal heat source.
- In a 3-D geometry, a new face splits a cell into two cells. Splitting cells lets you convert a single domain geometry (created by importGeometry, for example) to a multidomain geometry. Each cell (domain) can have its own properties.

Geometry Transformation: Manipulate geometries to preferred orientation and size by rotation, scaling, and translation

The toolbox supports these geometry transformations:

- Rotation around an arbitrary axis using the rotate function.
- Scaling up or down along each Cartesian axis independently with respect to a reference point using the scale function.
- Translation in any direction using the translate function.

Modal Damping: Include damping in modal transient and frequency response simulations

For modal transient and modal frequency response models, specify damping as a percentage of critical damping for a selected vibration frequency. The toolbox enables you to specify the modal damping parameter as:

- Constant modal damping ratio for all modes
- Frequency-dependent modal damping ratio using a function handle

See structuralDamping and Dynamics of Damped Cantilever Beam.

pdegplot, pdemesh, pdeplot, and pdeplot3D Functions: Improved performance for plots with many text labels

The PDE plotting functions show faster rendering and better responsiveness for plots that display many text labels. For example, this code shows about a 3x increase in speed:

generateMesh(model)
pdemesh(model, 'NodeLabels', 'on')
```

Reduced Order Modeling: Approximate dynamic characteristics of a structural model for faster execution

The toolbox now supports the Craig-Bampton component mode synthesis workflow for structural mechanics.

Finite-element discretized models can be very large. Model order reduction techniques approximate the dynamics of the original system with a smaller system while retaining most of the dynamic characteristics.

When using the reduced-order model workflow, you can:

- Specify structural superelement interfaces. See structural SEInterface.
- Reduce a structural analysis model to all modes in the specified frequency range and the interface degrees of freedom. See reduce.

Simscape Multibody Models: Generate dynamic substructure for flexible multibody simulations

You can use results obtained with the model order-reduction technique to provide data for $Simscape^{TM}$ MultibodyTM flexible body block.

Simscape models expect the connections at all joints to have six degrees of freedom, while Partial Differential Equation Toolbox uses two or three degrees of freedom at each node. To interface with Simscape joints, set multipoint constraints by using the structuralBC function. Setting a multipoint constraint ensures that all nodes and all degrees of freedom have a rigid constraint with the geometric center of all specified geometric regions together as the reference point. The reference location has six degrees of freedom.

To recover a full-model transient solution from reduced-order model results and Simscape solution, use the reconstructSolution function.

For an example of a Simscape Multibody workflow that uses a reduced order model, see Model an Excavator Dipper Arm as a Flexible Body (Simscape Multibody).

Frequency Response Analysis: Determine dynamic response of a structure in the frequency domain

Determining the dynamic response of a structure under various forms of excitation is a common task in structural analysis. This problem can be formulated over time domain (in which case it is called transient response analysis) or frequency domain (called frequency response analysis or sometimes harmonic analysis).

In addition to the transient dynamic analysis, the toolbox now supports the frequency response analysis for structural models. When setting up a linear elasticity problem, you can:

- Create a special model container for a frequency response structural analysis. See createpde.
- Specify a boundary load, for example, pressure. See structuralBoundaryLoad.
- Solve the problem and obtain displacement, velocity, acceleration, and solution frequencies at nodal locations of the mesh. See solve.

• To speed up computations, you can use modal analysis results for frequency response analysis. The ModalResults argument triggers the solve function to use the modal superposition method.

Structural Analysis: Set concentrated boundary conditions at arbitrary locations on geometry surfaces

Use addVertex to create new vertices at any points on boundaries of a 2-D or 3-D geometry represented by a DiscreteGeometry object. Then use structuralBC or structuralBoundaryLoad to set concentrated boundary constraints and loads at these vertices.

For an example of applying a point load on a geometric boundary, see Reduced-Order Modeling Technique for Beam with Point Load.

Eigenvalue Solver Options: Specify parameters for Lanczos algorithm

Solvers for structural modal analysis problems and reduced-order modeling use the Lanczos algorithm. Use PDESolverOptions to specify the maximum number of Lanczos shifts and the block size for block Lanczos recurrence.

Structural Analysis: Set boundary constraints and loads on edges and vertices

The workflow for structural analysis problems lets you specify an enforced displacement and the 'free' and 'fixed' boundary constraints on vertices and edges for both 2-D and 3-D models. To specify boundary constraints and a displacement, including spatial components of displacement, use the structuralBC function. The previous versions of this function let you specify the displacement and boundary constraints values only on edges for 2-D models and faces on 3-D models.

You can specify concentrated force at a vertex by using the structuralBoundaryLoad function.

Structural Analysis: Compute transient response by using the modal superposition method

By default, the solve function uses the direct integration approach which can be slow. To speed up calculations, transient dynamics analysis can be performed using modal analysis results. The new ModalResults argument triggers the solve function to switch to the modal transient solver instead of using the direct integration approach.

Finite Element Matrices: Assemble global finite element matrices for thermal and structural models

The assembleFEMatrices function accepts thermal and structural models with time- and solution-independent coefficients.

Thermal Load: Evaluate thermal stress and thermal expansion in static structural analysis

The programmatic workflow for static structural analysis problems now lets you account for thermal loading. When setting up a static structural problem, you can:

- Specify a coefficient of thermal expansion as a structural material property. See structuralProperties.
- Specify a thermal load as a body load. Use a constant temperature to specify a steady and uniform thermal load or use previously obtained results of thermal analysis to specify a nonuniform thermal load. See structuralBodyLoad.
- Specify a reference temperature. This temperature corresponds to the state of the model at which both thermal stress and strain are zeros. See StructuralModel.

The solve function solves a static structural analysis model accounting for mechanical and thermal effects. The function returns a displacement, stress, strain, and von Mises stress induced by both mechanical and thermal loads.

For an example of the new workflow, see Thermal Deflection of Bimetallic Beam.

Structural Analysis: Solve linear transient dynamic problems using direct time integration

The programmatic workflow for structural analysis problems now lets you set up, solve, and analyze dynamic linear elasticity problems using a familiar domain-specific language. Most steps correspond to the similar steps for setting up a static linear elasticity problem. Additional options for a dynamic linear elasticity problem include:

- Specifying proportional (Rayleigh) mass and stiffness damping parameters. See structuralDamping.
- Specifying initial conditions. See structuralIC.
- Specifying time-dependent boundary loads by using function handles. Also, you can specify the
 form and duration of the pressure pulse and the frequency and phase of sinusoidal pressure by
 using the corresponding name-value pair arguments. See structuralBoundaryLoad.
- Specifying time-dependent boundary conditions by using function handles. Also, you can specify the form and duration of x-, y-, or z-component of the enforced displacement and the frequency and phase of sinusoidal displacement by using the corresponding name-value pair arguments. See structuralBC.

The solve function solves a dynamic structural analysis model and returns displacement, velocity, and acceleration at nodal locations of the mesh. You can analyze the resulting solution further by using one of these functions:

- evaluateStress evaluates stress at nodal locations for all time steps.
- evaluateStrain evaluates strain at nodal locations for all time steps.
- evaluateVonMisesStress evaluates von Mises stress at nodal locations for all time steps.
- evaluateReaction evaluates reaction forces on a specified boundary.
- evaluatePrincipalStress and evaluatePrincipalStrain evaluate principal stress and strain at mesh nodes.
- interpolateDisplacement interpolates displacements at arbitrary spatial locations.
- interpolateVelocity interpolates velocities at arbitrary spatial locations.
- interpolateAcceleration interpolates accelerations at arbitrary spatial locations.
- interpolateStress and interpolateStrain interpolate stress and strain at arbitrary spatial locations.
- interpolateVonMisesStress interpolates von Mises stress at arbitrary spatial locations.

Modal Analysis: Find natural frequencies and mode shapes

The programmatic workflow for modal analysis problems lets you find natural frequencies and mode shapes of a structure. Use the same steps for creating a modal analysis model and specifying materials and boundary constraints as for static linear elasticity problems. When solving a modal analysis model, the solver requires a frequency range parameter and returns the modal solution in that frequency range. See Vibration of Square Plate.

Mesh Analysis: Assess element quality, measure element area or volume, and find nodes and elements

The findElements and findNodes functions return collections of mesh elements and nodes associated with a particular geometric region (edge, face, and so on), located within a bounding box or disk, or located close to a specified point or node. These functions return node or element IDs that you can use as arguments for other mesh query functions or plotting functions.

The meshQuality function lets you assess shape quality of mesh elements of an entire mesh or a particular group of elements. Using this function, you can analyze the shape quality of each element of a 2-D or 3-D mesh, locate the elements of low quality, and adjust you mesh-generation parameters accordingly.

The area and volume functions measure areas and volumes covered by individual elements and groups of elements of 2-D and 3-D meshes, respectively.

The pdemesh, pdeplot, and pdeplot3D functions accept node and element IDs as input arguments, which lets you highlight particular nodes and elements on mesh plots.

Geometry from Mesh: Create multidomain geometry from nodes and elements

The geometryFromMesh function creates a geometric model from a triangulated mesh, including planar, volume, and surface triangulation that bounds a closed volume. This function lets you create a multidomain geometry by specifying the subdomain ID for each element of the mesh. You can retain the original mesh or generate a new one by using the generateMesh function.

A new programmatic workflow lets you set up, solve, and analyze static linear elasticity problems using a familiar domain-specific language. When setting up a static linear elasticity problem, you can:

- Create a special model container for a static structural analysis. See createpde.
- Assign structural properties of the material, such as Young's modulus, Poisson's ratio, and mass density. See structuralProperties.
- Specify a body load for a structural model. See structuralBodyLoad.
- Specify pressure, surface traction, and translational stiffness for a particular boundary. See structuralBoundaryLoad.
- Specify enforced displacement and boundary constraints for a particular boundary. See structuralBC.

The solve function solves a static structural analysis model and returns displacement, stress, strain, and von Mises stress at nodal locations of the mesh. You can analyze the resulting solution further by using one of these functions:

- interpolateDisplacement interpolates displacements at arbitrary spatial locations.
- interpolateStress and interpolateStrain interpolate stress and strain at arbitrary spatial locations.
- interpolateVonMisesStress interpolates von Mises stress at arbitrary spatial locations.
- evaluateReaction evaluates reaction forces on a specified boundary.
- evaluatePrincipalStress and evaluatePrincipalStrain evaluate principal stress and strain at mesh nodes.

The pdeplot and pdeplot3D functions let you visualize the solution by plotting the resulting displacements, stresses, and strains.

Planar STL Geometry: Import and mesh planar STL geometries

importGeometry can import a planar STL geometry and convert it to a 2-D geometry by mapping it to the X-Y plane. To mesh the resulting 2-D geometry, use generateMesh.

Meshing: Improved mesh generation

The mesh generator, generateMesh, now:

- Uses new mesh generation algorithm for 2-D geometries.
- Lets you specify mesh growth rate for both 2-D and 3-D meshes. To specify mesh growth rate, use the Hgrad argument of generateMesh.

Compatibility Considerations

Resulting meshes can differ from meshes generated in previous releases. For example, meshes generated with the default size controls can have fewer elements than before.

Also, generateMesh creates quadratic meshes for 2-D problems by default. In previous releases, the default mesh for 2-D geometries is a linear mesh. For both 2-D and 3-D geometries, you can specify whether you want to use linear or quadratic mesh by using the <code>GeometricOrder</code> argument of <code>generateMesh</code>.

Thermal Analysis: Solve conduction-dominant heat transfer problems with convection and radiation occurring at boundaries

A new programmatic workflow lets you set up, solve, and analyze conduction-dominant heat transfer problems using natural steps and familiar domain-specific language. When setting up a heat transfer problem, you can:

- Create a special model container for a steady-state or transient thermal model. See createpde.
- Assign thermal properties of the material, such as thermal conductivity, specific heat, and mass density. See thermalProperties.
- Specify internal heat sources of the geometry. See internalHeatSource.
- Set temperatures on boundaries, specify insulated boundaries, heat fluxes through boundaries, convection coefficients, radiation emissivity coefficients, and ambient temperature. See thermalBC.
- Set initial temperature or initial guess for temperature. See thermalIC.

The solve function solves steady-state and transient thermal models and returns temperatures and temperature gradients at nodal locations of the thermal model mesh. You can analyze the resulting solution further by using one of these functions:

- interpolateTemperature interpolates resulting temperatures to arbitrary spatial locations.
- evaluateTemperatureGradient evaluates temperature gradient for a transient thermal solution at arbitrary spatial locations.
- evaluateHeatFlux evaluates heat flux of a thermal solution at nodal or arbitrary spatial locations.
- evaluateHeatRate evaluates integrated heat flow rate normal to specified boundary.

The pdeplot and pdeplot3D functions let you visualize a thermal model solution by plotting the resulting temperatures, and temperature gradients, and mesh.

There is a new featured example showing heat transfer in a transient 3-D model, Heat Conduction in a Spherical Multidomain Geometry with Nonuniform Heat Flux.

3-D Multidomain Geometry: Create geometries consisting of stacked or nested cuboids, spheres, or cylinders

The multicuboid, multicylinder, and multisphere functions create 3-D geometries formed by several cubic, cylindrical, and spherical cells, respectively. With these functions, you can create stacked or nested geometries. You also can create geometries where some cells are empty, for example, hollow cylinders, cubes, or spheres.

All cells in a geometry must be of the same type: either cuboids, or cylinders, or spheres. These functions do not combine cells of different types in one geometry.

Flux of PDE Solution: Evaluate tensor product of c-coefficient and gradient of PDE solution for 2-D and 3-D problems

The evaluateCGradient function computes the tensor product of c-coefficient and gradients of the PDE solution, $\mathbf{c} \otimes \nabla \mathbf{u}$, at nodal or arbitrary locations in 2-D or 3-D geometry.

Boundary Conditions: Set an individual boundary condition for each equation in a PDE system, query boundary condition assignments

The applyBoundaryCondition function can set an individual boundary condition for each equation in a system of PDEs in one function call. For example, in a system of two PDEs, one applyBoundaryConditions call can set the Dirichlet boundary condition for the first equation, and the Neumann boundary condition for the second equation.

The function uses clear precedence rules to decide which condition to use for every geometric region.

The findBoundaryConditions function returns the currently used boundary condition assignment for a geometric region.

Compatibility Considerations

The new syntax requires explicit specification of the boundary condition type as 'dirichlet', 'neumann', or 'mixed'. For example, in previous releases you used the following syntaxes to apply the Dirichlet boundary condition on edge 1 and Neumann boundary condition on face 2.

Update them to specify the boundary condition types.

Previously, to set the Dirichlet boundary condition for one equation in a PDE system and the Neumann boundary condition for another, you used two function calls to applyBoundaryCondition.

Now, set both boundary conditions in one function call by specifying the boundary condition type as 'mixed'.

Nodal Initial Conditions: Set nodal initial conditions using the result of a previous simulation

The setInitialConditions function sets initial conditions at the mesh nodes by using the solution from a previous analysis on the same geometry and mesh.

Geometric Initial Conditions: Set initial conditions on vertices, edges, faces, and cells

The setInitialConditions function sets initial conditions on faces, edges, and vertices for both 2-D and 3-D geometries, and on cells for 3-D geometry. You can set initial conditions on particular vertices, edges, faces, and cells or set global initial conditions on all vertices, edges, faces, or cells in the geometry.

Mesh and Solution Plots: Set transparency, display node and element labels

The FaceAlpha argument of pdegplot, pdemesh, pdeplot, and pdeplot3D lets you set the plot transparency.

The ElementLabels argument of pdemesh, pdeplot, and pdeplot3D lets you display element labels.

The NodeLabels argument of pdemesh and pdeplot lets you display node labels.

The VertexLabels and CellLabels arguments of pdegplot let you display vertex and cell labels.

Compatibility Considerations

The argument SubdomainLabels is no longer recommended. Use FaceLabels for 2-D geometries instead.

3-D Geometry Import from STL Files: Improved quality of the resulting geometry

When importing an STL geometry for a 3-D problem, importGeometry can recognize and reconstruct more geometric vertices, edges, and faces of the original CAD geometry in some instances. In these cases, the resulting geometry is a closer match to the original CAD geometry.

Compatibility Considerations

Detailed geometries can now contain more faces and edges than in previous releases. As a result, in rare instances, the new faces and edges can cause renumbering of the existing ones. If your code imports an STL geometry, visually check the geometry to ensure that you are assigning boundary and initial conditions to the intended regions.

Equation coefficients and boundary conditions for 3-D problems

To specify problem coefficients or boundary conditions in 3-D geometry, you can use strings with a syntax similar to that of a 2-D problem. There is a new way of writing functions for coefficients in 3-D geometries. For details, see PDE Coefficients and Boundary Conditions.

Compatibility Considerations

To accommodate both 2-D and 3-D geometry, the format of boundary condition objects changed from that introduced in R2014b. The new object is BoundaryCondition Properties, and calling pdeBoundaryConditions now warns that it will be removed in a future release. If you saved a pdeBoundaryConditions object in an R2014b-format MAT file, then loading that file in R2015a can produce an error. Additionally, the syntax for specifying nonconstant boundary conditions has changed. Functions written in the previous syntax continue to work for now.

Performance and robustness enhancements in meshing algorithm

The meshing (geometry triangulation) functions in initmesh and adaptmesh provide an enhancement option for increased meshing speed and robustness. Choose the enhanced algorithm by setting the MesherVersion name-value pair to 'R2013a'. The default MesherVersion value of 'preR2013a' gives the same mesh as previous toolbox versions.

The enhancement is available in pdetool from the Mesh > Parameters > Mesher version menu.

pdesmech shear strain calculation change

The pdesmech function now calculates shear strain according to the engineering shear strain definition. This has always been the documented behavior. However, the previous calculation was performed according to the tensor shear strain calculation, which gives half the value of the engineering shear strain.

Compatibility Considerations

pdesmech now returns shear strain values exactly twice as large as before.
