New Features

Use Unreal Engine events to develop control algorithms in MATLAB and Simulink

You can use Unreal Engine® event data to develop control algorithms in MATLAB® and Simulink. The `sim3d.Actor` object and Simulation 3D Actor block communicate events in the simulation 3D environment, including when:

- You click an actor.
- An actor collides or overlaps with another actor.
- You initialize an event callback for an actor.

The `sim3d.World` object contains event information such as:

- Actors hit in collisions.
- Actors that are clicked during a simulation.

Run 3D simulations using Unreal Engine 4.27

The simulation 3D environment that comes installed with Simulink 3D Animation is an Unreal Engine application. The application has been updated to Unreal Engine 4.27. Previously, the toolbox used Unreal Engine 4.26.

Unreal Engine scenario simulation

Starting in R2022b, you can cosimulate actors controlled by Simulink and MATLAB with actors that are controlled by Unreal Engine. You can access advanced features available in Unreal Engine such as collision detection, the PhysX physics engine, and setting lighting and atmospheric conditions etc. through the MATLAB and Simulink interfaces of the Simulink 3D Animation toolbox.

- Use the `sim3d.Actor` object and the Simulation 3D Actor block to instantiate and specify the appearance of objects by defining meshes programmatically or from CAD files. Control, access and remove objects in the scene, and set visual, spatial and physical properties of the objects.
- Use the `sim3d.World` object to create user-defined virtual reality worlds and run the cosimulation using Unreal Engine. Use the `createViewPort` function of `sim3d.World` to define a perspective or view of `sim3d.sensors.MainCamera` in the Unreal Engine executable window.
- Use the `sim3d.sensors.IdealCamera` object to create a virtual camera. The object function `image` returns the virtual camera image in the 3D simulation environment.

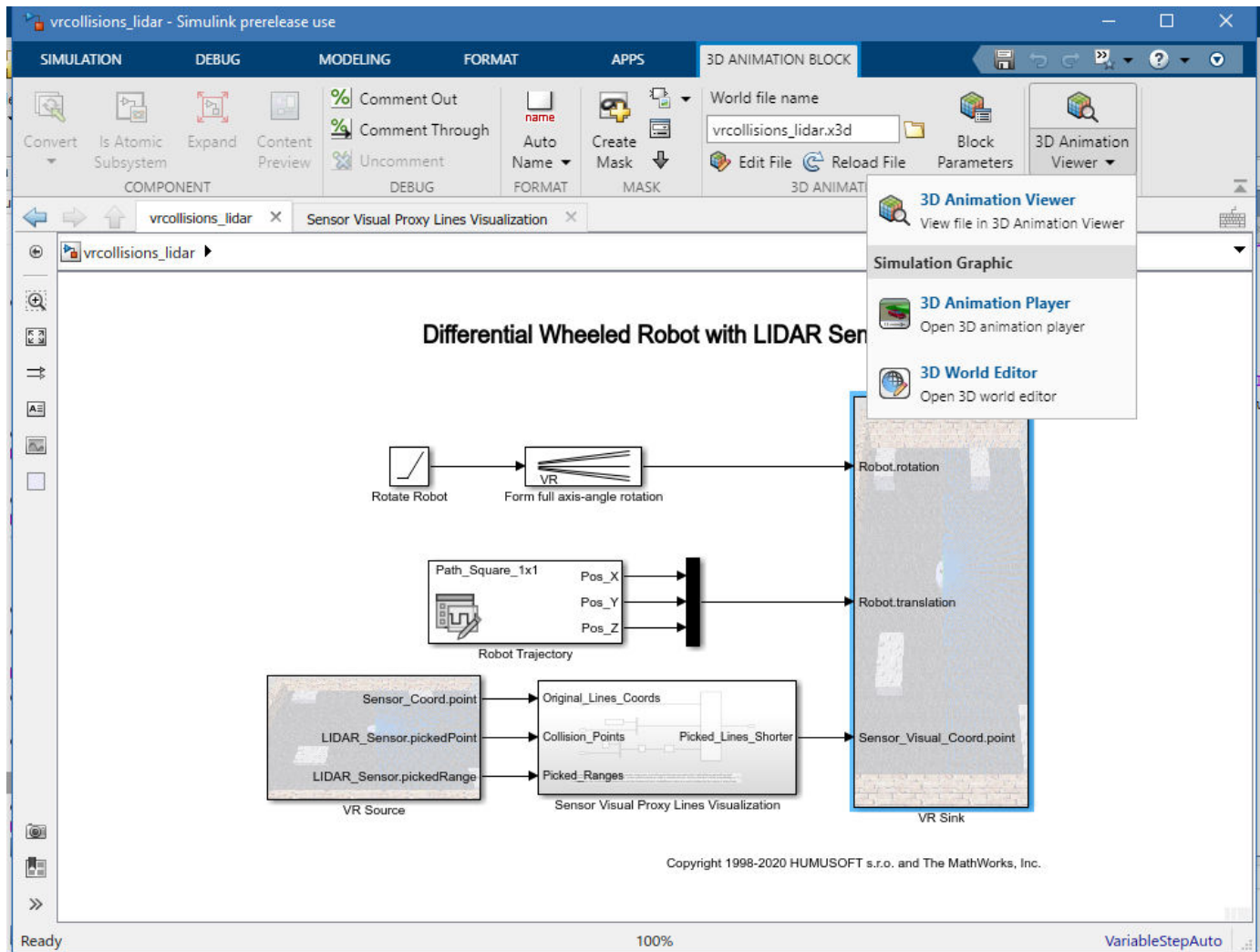

The VR Source and VR Sink block masks now show a thumbnail preview of the virtual world associated with the blocks.

Compatibility Considerations

X3D is now the default file format for Simulink 3D Animation

Virtual reality model files now use the X3D (**X**tensible **3D**) ISO standard file format by default.

CAD model import enhancements

The Import feature of the 3D World Editor and the `vrimport` function now optimize imported objects in order to obtain smooth surfaces

Whenever the imported model contains many isolated surface faces (typically in STL / STEP model files), these faces can be smoothed together to create a smoother 3D geometry

Functionality being changed or removed

`stl2vrm` is not recommended

Still runs

`stl2vrm` is no longer recommended to import CAD models. Use the `vrimport` function or the Import functionality of the 3D World Editor.

`vrCADCleanup` is not recommended

Still runs

`vrCADCleanup` is no longer recommended to import CAD models. Use the `vrimport` function or the Import functionality of the 3D World Editor.

`vrphysmod` function has been removed

The `vrphysmod` function has been removed from Simulink 3D Animation.

Mouse wheel navigation in the Simulink 3D Animation viewer

You can use the mouse wheel to move the camera forward and backward along the viewpoint orientation in the Simulink 3D Animation viewer and the 3D World Editor.

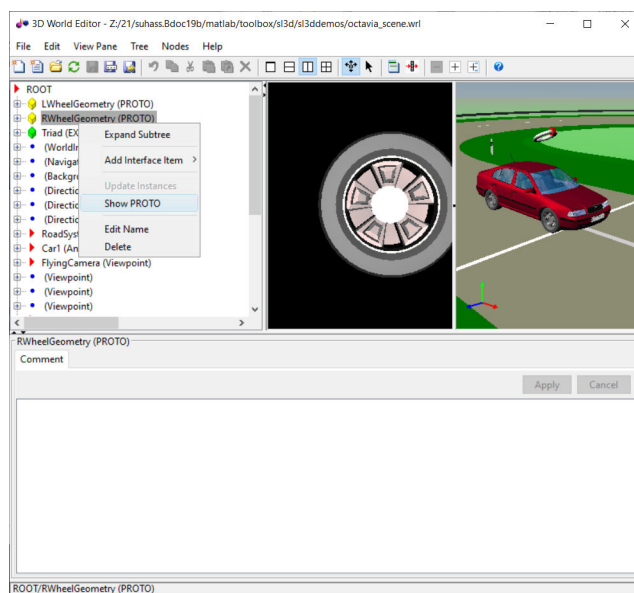
Scene consistency check in 3D World Editor

To identify valid nodes that you can add to a currently highlighted node in the tree, the 3D World Editor dims the invalid options in **Nodes > Add**.

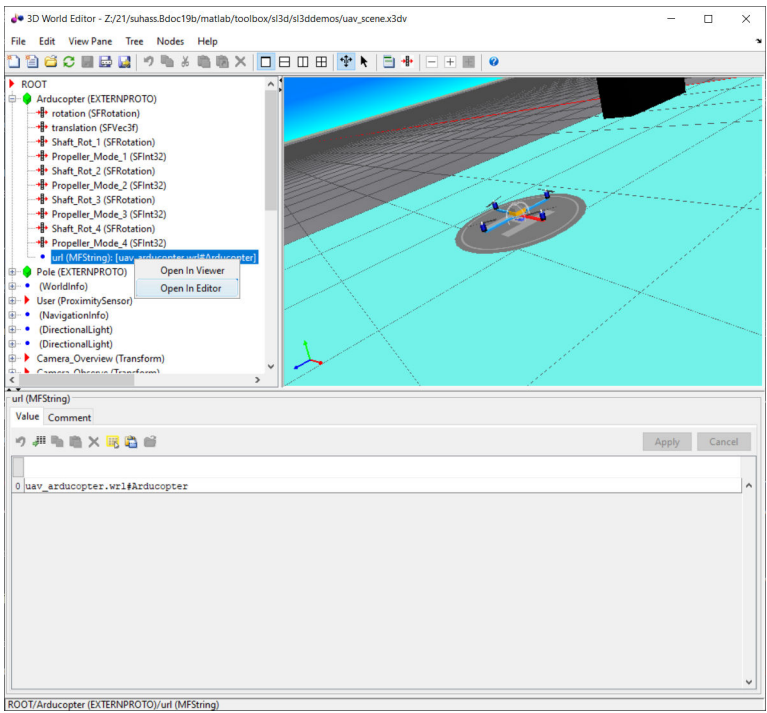
PROTO editing in the 3D World Editor

The 3D World Editor now allows you to display a PROTO node instance in a separate window pane, where you can immediately see changes made to the PROTO definition.

To view a PROTO node in the 3D World Editor, right-click it in the tree and select **Show PROTO**. You can now see changes you make to the PROTO as they are applied.



For an EXTERNPROTO node, first expand its subtree and right-click the **url** node. Select **View in Editor** to view and edit the EXTERNPROTO in a separate instance of the 3D World Editor.



Note To view the updated EXTERNPROTO in the previous instance of the 3D World Editor, you must first save the modified EXTERNPROTO and reload it.

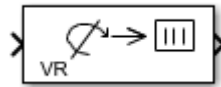

Coordinate Transformation Utilities

Simulink 3D Animation provides the following blocks in the **Simulink 3D Animation/Utilities** library:



VR Rotation to Rotation Matrix

Convert the axis-angle representation of rotations in the VR world to a Rotation Matrix.

To apply the same transformation in MATLAB, use the `vrrotvec2mat` function



VR to MATLAB Coordinates

Convert VR coordinates in $[x, y, z]$ notation to MATLAB coordinates in $[x, z, -y]$ notation.

To apply the same transformation in MATLAB, use the `vrcoordvr2m` function.



MATLAB to VR Coordinates

Convert MATLAB coordinates in $[x, z, -y]$ notation to VR coordinates in $[x, y, z]$ notation.

To apply the same transformation in MATLAB, use the `vrcoordm2vr` function.

FBX format import

You can import FBX files as nodes into virtual reality worlds using the Simulink 3D Animation viewer as well as the `vrimport` function.

UAV Competition Example

Simulink 3D Animation ships with an example model demonstrating a typical UAV competition scenario.

Use the `sl3dex_uav` example to view a quadcopter flying a predefined trajectory through an obstacle course. You can also switch to manual navigation using a SpaceMouse by flipping the SpaceMouse/ Predefined Navigation Switch in the model.

VR RigidBodyTree block: Automate the visualization of Robotics System Toolbox rigid body tree objects in virtual reality worlds

The new VR RigidBodyTree block inserts graphical information present in the Robotics System Toolbox™ rigid body tree object into a virtual reality world and animates it based on the manipulator configuration. The same functionality is available through the Simulink 3D Animation MATLAB interface using the `vrinsertrobot` and `vrupdaterobot` functions.

Improved Collision Detection: Sense collisions of virtual world objects using point clouds, raytracing, and primitive geometries

You can use collision detection to accurately model physical constraints of objects in the real world, where generally two objects cannot be in the same place at the same time. You can use collision detection node outputs to:

- Change the state of other virtual world nodes.
- Apply MATLAB algorithms to collision data.
- Drive Simulink models.

You can use the `PointPickSensor`, `LinePickSensor`, and `PrimitivePickSensor` to model sensors such as ultrasonic, lidar, and touch sensors.

Offscreen Rendering: Use the VR to Video block as a video stream source without the need to keep the viewer window open during simulation

You can use the VR to Video block to configure a video stream. You can then close the viewer window and use the video stream elsewhere in the simulation. You no longer need to keep all the streaming windows open over the course of the simulation. Use this option in situations where you have multiple 2D video signals from virtual world synthetic cameras.

X3D Standard Format: Represent objects in a virtual reality 3D environment natively using the X3D ISO standard.

X3D is natively supported in Simulink 3D Animation. You can easily convert CAD models to X3D. To convert a `.wrl` file to `.x3d` or `.x3dv`, open it and save it with the new extension.

X3D also includes components that allow implementation of collision detection in Simulink 3D Animation. For more information, see `Picking` component.

Collision Detection: Sense collisions of virtual world objects using point clouds, raytracing, and primitive geometries

You can use collision detection to accurately model physical constraints of objects in the real world, where generally two objects cannot be in the same place at the same time. You can use collision detection node outputs to:

- Change the state of other virtual world nodes.
- Apply MATLAB algorithms to collision data.
- Drive Simulink models.

For example, you can use geometric sensors for robotics modeling.

To set up collision detection, define collision (pick) sensors that detect when they collide with targeted surrounding scene objects. The virtual world sensors resemble real world sensors, such as ultrasonic, lidar, and touch sensors. You can add these types of collision sensors:

- `PointPickSensor` - Point clouds that detect which of the points are inside colliding geometries
- `LinePickSensor` - Ray fans or other sets of lines that detect the distance to the colliding geometries
- `PrimitivePickSensor` - Primitive geometries (such as a cone, sphere, or box) that detect colliding geometries

The `isActive` output property of a sensor becomes `TRUE` as soon as a collision occurs. If you have a model associated with the virtual reality scene, you can use a VR Source block to read the sensor `isActive` property and the current position of the object for which the sensor is defined. You can use a VR Sink block to define the behavior of the object, such as its position, rotation, or color.

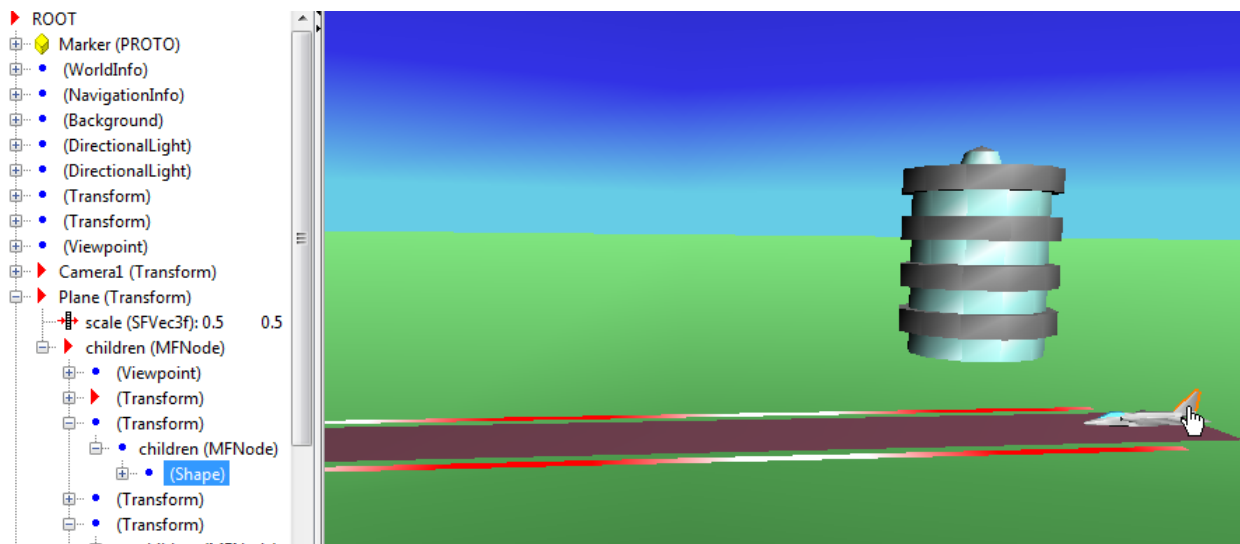

Select Mode: Select and highlight virtual world objects using mouse pointer in the 3D World Editor View pane

To select and highlight virtual world objects using the mouse pointer in the 3D World Editor view pane, use the select mode. To enable the select mode, in the 3D World Editor toolbar, click the  button. Then click an object (or **Ctrl**-click multiple objects) in the 3D World pane or a node in the tree structure pane. In the view pane, selected virtual world objects are highlighted with an orange outline. When the cursor hovers over a selectable object in the view pane, the cursor shape changes to a hand symbol. If you do not want objects to be highlighted when you select them, in the view pane right-click and clear the **Rendering > Highlight Selected Objects** option.

For example, with **Highlight Selected Objects** enabled, if you click the tail of the plane in this virtual world, the corresponding Shape node is highlighted.



To return to the default navigation mode, click the  button. To specify the default selection and highlighting behavior, use the new **View pane mouse behavior** and **Highlight selected objects** 3D World Editor preferences.

Unified Robot Description Format (URDF) Support: Import visual representations of robots into a virtual world

You can import robot and robot environment 3D models defined using unified robot description format (.urdf) or simulation description format (.sdf) into a virtual world in Simulink 3D Animation. The URDF and SDF files are XML files for representing a robot model. You can import visual properties of the objects present in the URDF or SDF files into corresponding hierarchical structure of Transform nodes containing IndexedFaceSet objects with textures.

URDF and SDF files use Collada DAE and STL formats to define visual properties of scene objects. In addition to existing STL format import, the new URDF and SDF import feature also supports a subset of the Collada DAE 3D file format (geometric shape objects with textures).

To import visual representation of robots, in the 3D World Editor select **Nodes > Import From**. Then select **STL File**, **Physical Modeling XML File**, **URDF File**, **SDF File**, or **COLLADA File**. From the MATLAB command line, you can use the `vrimport` function to import .urdf, .dae, .stl, and .sdf files into a virtual world.

Virtual Figure Rendering: Turn off rendering for improved performance

You can use the new `Rendering` property to turn off rendering for a `vrfigure` or `vr.canvas` object in the Simulink 3D Animation Viewer. Turning off rendering improves performance. For example, if your code performs batch operations on a virtual figure, you can turn off rendering for the duration of the processing.

You can also use the new **Simulink 3D Animation > World > Default Figure Rendering** preference (`DefaultFigureRendering`) to specify whether to render newly created virtual reality figure or canvas objects.

Virtual Figures in MATLAB Live Scripts: Include code in MATLAB Live Scripts for displaying virtual reality figures

You can now include code that results in displaying virtual reality figures and canvas objects in MATLAB Live Scripts and display the results in the Live Editor.

Saving Virtual Worlds: Suppress thumbnails

To suppress creating a thumbnail image used for virtual world preview, you can use the new `'-nothumbnail'` argument for the `vrworld/save` function.

To save a copy of all the resources (additional files) used by the world, so that the world can be transferred to a different computer, specify `'-export'` as an argument for the `vrworld/save` function. Prior to R2016b, you specified `'true'` to perform an export. R2016b supports that syntax for backward compatibility.

X3D Syntax Highlighting: Identify X3D language elements in MATLAB Editor

You can display X3D syntax highlighting in the MATLAB Editor. You can specify colors for highlighting X3D syntax. See VRML and X3D Syntax Highlighting.

STL to X3D File Conversion: Convert CAD models in STL format to X3D formats

To convert CAD models in STL format (.stl files) to X3D format (.x3d or .x3dv files) or VRML format (.wrl files), use the `stl2vrml` function.

Virtual World Previews: View virtual worlds before opening files in the 3D World Editor

In R2016a the 3D World Editor, when you save a virtual world, creates a thumbnail of the virtual world. When you open that virtual world, when you select the virtual world file you see the thumbnail preview in the file browser.

In the Simulink 3D Animation Viewer, when you select a file in the file browser, you see a thumbnail for that virtual world, if the file has been saved in R2016a.

The VR Sink, VR Source, and VR To Video blocks also provide a thumbnail preview. In the Block Parameters dialog box **Source file** parameter, selecting a file in the file browser displays a thumbnail, if available.

To generate thumbnails whenever you open a virtual world file, use this command:

```
vrsetpref('AutoCreateThumbnail','on')
```

Setting this preference to 'on' can be helpful if you download multiple virtual worlds from the web, without saving them. Creating thumbnails on file open provides thumbnails the next time someone browses through the downloaded worlds.

Compatibility Considerations

X3D standard support for XML-encoded .x3d and classic VRML-encoded .x3dv file formats

Simulink 3D Animation now supports the X3D standard format. The support includes XML encoded (.x3d) and Classic VRML encoded (.x3dv) files. X3D support is for versions from version 3.0 up to version 3.3. Support is for X3D files that contain components that comply to the Immersive profile. Nevertheless, VRML97 remains the default virtual world file format.

You can use MATLAB commands to read and save X3D files and to associate X3D files with Simulink models. For additional information about X3D support in Simulink 3D Animation, see X3D Support.

By default, the new %e file name token for animation recording and frame capture uses the same file extension (.wrl, .x3d, or .x3dv) as the extension of the virtual world that drives the animation. For details, see Define File Name Tokens.

For information about the supported X3D specification, see ISO/IEC 19775-1:2013. For information about supported X3D encoding, see ISO/IEC 19776-1.3:201x and ISO/IEC 19776-2.3:201x.

Face count statistics for IndexedFaceSet and IndexedLineSet nodes to assess model complexity

In the 3D World Editor, you can get face count statistics for nodes such as IndexedFaceSet and IndexedLineSet nodes. To get the counts, select **Nodes > Face Count Statistics**.

Removal of legacy viewer

Simulink 3D Animation no longer includes the legacy viewer (internalv4). The Simulink 3D Animation Viewer, Simulink 3D Animation Web Viewer, and Orbisnap viewer supersede the legacy viewer.

Compatibility Considerations

You can set the DefaultViewer preference to internal or web. If in a previous release you used the vrsetpref command to set DefaultViewer to internalv4 or internalv5, starting in R2015b the value converts to internal.

Space mouse support for Mac OS X

You can use space mouse input devices on Mac OS X platforms. In earlier releases, you could use a space mouse only on Windows® platforms.

Conversion between MATLAB Patch objects and IndexedFaceSetsConversion

You can use the `vrpatch2if`s function to convert a MATLAB Patch object to a VRML IndexedFaceSet node.

You can use the `vrif`s2patch function to convert an IndexedFaceSet node to a Patch object.

Improved geometry optimization that preserves per-vertex colors of objects

The per-vertex colors of each object are now preserved.

Option to tune stereoscopic vision figure properties

You can use the `vr.utils.stereo3d` class properties to tune stereoscopic vision. For example, you can specify yellow and blue as the colors to use for the anaglyph stereoscopic effect, instead of the default red and cyan combination. You can also specify camera settings such as camera angle and camera offset.

Definition of scripts in virtual worlds in separate files

For the `url` (`MFString`) field in a `Script` node, you can now specify a path to a JavaScript® file, or you can continue to specify the script code in the `url` field, which was the only option in previous releases. For details, see [Edit VRML Scripts](#).


Browsing to specify file URLs in 3D World Editor

In the 3D World Editor, you can now use a browse dialog box to specify URLs for nodes such as `ImageTexture` and `Inline`. You can continue to specify URLs by typing the path. For details, see [Specify a URL](#).

Option to save virtual worlds to use in VRML viewers

The `vrworld/save` method now includes an optional third argument for exporting to a VRML file copies of all relatively specified resources (such as textures) for a virtual world, as well as resources from the Simulink 3D Editor library. This feature supports the use of a Simulink 3D Animation virtual world outside of Simulink 3D Animation.

Display of event fields in 3D World Editor tree pane

You can display `eventIn` and `eventOut` nodes in the 3D World Editor tree pane. You can either click the **Show Events** button  or select **Tree > Show Events**.

You can perform an IS mapping for events in a PROTO declaration.

More responsive navigation for large virtual worlds

In the 3D World Editor and Simulink 3D Animation Viewer, navigation of large virtual works is more responsive than in previous releases.

Internal viewer sound support

The following Simulink 3D Animation components now support listening to sound in virtual worlds:

- Simulink 3D Animation Viewer
- 3D Animation Player
- `vr.canvas` on a figure window

To add sound to a virtual world, use a VRML `Sound` node. See [Add Sound to a Virtual World](#).

To listen to sound for a virtual world, use a computer that supports sound. For details, see [Listen to Sound in a Virtual World](#).

The Orbisnap standalone viewer shipped with Simulink 3D Animation also supports sound.

Internal viewer stereoscopic vision support

Stereoscopic vision support allows you to view a virtual world using 3D effects, so that elements in the virtual world appear to come forward or back from the plane of the monitor. You can use either of these stereoscopic vision approaches:

- Anaglyph — Use red/cyan 3D glasses. Viewing a virtual world in this mode causes the colors to appear as almost grayscale. This approach does not require any special computer hardware or software.
- Active stereo — Use active shutter 3D glasses. This approach preserves color effects and produces more powerful 3D effects. Active stereo requires a specially configured computer and monitor setup.

The following Simulink 3D Animation components now support stereoscopic vision:

- 3D World Editor
- Simulink 3D Animation Viewer
- 3D Animation Player
- `vr.canvas` on a figure window

Improved Orbisnap standalone viewer interface

The interface of the Orbisnap standalone viewer shipped with Simulink 3D Animation has an improved look and feel.

Inclusion of `vr.canvas` objects in panels

You can now include a `vr.canvas` object as a child object in a MATLAB `uipanel` object.

Panels arrange graphical user interface components into groups. By visually grouping related controls, panels can make the user interface easier to understand. A panel can have a title and various borders.

Parameterized vrfigure constructor

You can now use the `vrfigure` constructor with name-value pairs to set property values. For example:

```
fig = vrfigure(vrlights,'Antialiasing','on')
```

Navigation panel not shown in screen captures

Screen captures of a virtual world in the Simulink 3D Animation Viewer omit the navigation panel, resulting in a cleaner image.

Blaxxun Contact VRML plug-in no longer supported

The Blaxxun Contact® VRML plug-in is no longer shipped with, or supported by, Simulink 3D Animation.

In R2014b, Simulink 3D Animation now supports sound and stereoscopic vision, features that previously required the Blaxxun Contact viewer.

Import of STL and Physical Modeling XML files directly into 3D World Editor for authoring VRML scenes

You can use the 3D World Editor to import STL and Physical Modeling XML files directly into a VRML scene. STL and Physical Modeling XML files usually originate from CAD models. You can integrate content from those files into a virtual world, converting the structure into VRML.

To import an STL or Physical Modeling XML file, in the 3D World Editor, right-click the Root or an MFNode node and from the **Import From** menu item, select either **STL File** or **Physical Modeling XML File**. For details, see Import STL and Physical Modeling XML Files Directly into a VRML Virtual World.

Polygon reduction option for scene objects in 3D World Editor for enhancing rendering performance

For a node that is, or includes, an IndexedFaceSet node, you can improve rendering speed by reducing the number of polygons in the IndexedFaceSet. Choose the polygon reduction factor that produces your desired balance of rendering performance and quality.

Improved Timing of 2D Animation Recording

AVI file playback speed now corresponds to the original Simulink model simulation time. For details, see Record Files in the Audio Video Interleave (AVI) Format.

Compatibility Considerations

The `vrfigure` Record2DFPS property has a new default value of `auto`, to support this improved timing. Previously, the default was 15.

Web Viewer for remote access to virtual worlds using HTML5-enabled web browser technology

Use the Simulink 3D Animation Web Viewer to access virtual worlds with an HTML5-enabled Web browser. You can open a virtual world in Simulink 3D Animation on a host computer and then view it remotely in a Web browser on another computer. You do not need to install Simulink 3D Animation on the remote computer.

The Web Viewer supplements the Simulink 3D Animation Viewer. It also supplements the VRML plug-in Blaxxun Contact viewer and the Orbisnap viewer, which come with Simulink 3D Animation. Some benefits of the Web Viewer include:

- Multiplatform remote viewing of Simulink 3D Animation virtual worlds
 - Support for HTML5-enabled browsers on Microsoft® Windows, Macintosh, and Linux® platforms
- No additional software installation required on client computers
- Access to HTML5 browser features for creating customized pages with virtual reality visualization

Interactive setting of pivot points for examining scenes

You can set a pivot point interactively when you are in Examine mode in the 3D World Editor, Simulink 3D Animation Viewer, and the Simulink 3D Animation Web Viewer. You can use a pivot point for rotating a virtual world around, using a mouse.

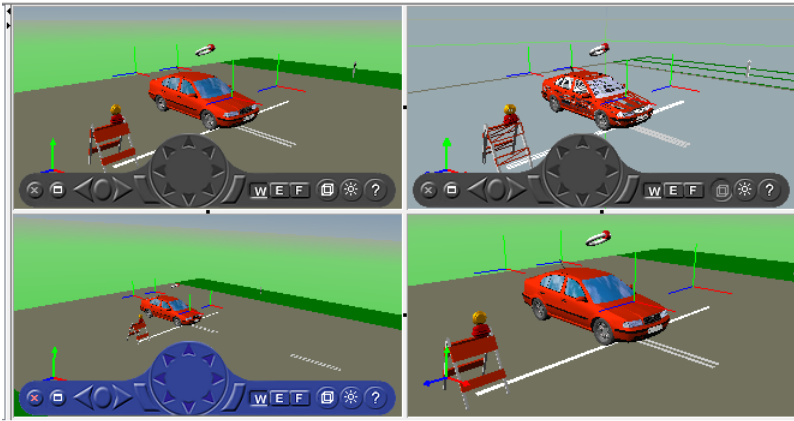

Multiple-pane grid view in 3D World Editor for enhanced scene viewing and modeling

You can view the virtual world in one pane, two horizontal panes, two vertical panes, or four panes. You can control the navigation of each pane independently. For example, you can set viewpoints, manipulate the triad, and specify some rendering techniques differently for each pane.

For example, you can select **View Pane > Grid View** and set viewing options independently:

Current-view indication and navigation-panel minimization in 3D World Editor, Simulink 3D Animation viewer, and vrplay animation viewer

The navigation panel is blue in the active 3D World Editor view pane, Simulink 3D Animation viewer, and vrplay animation viewer and is gray in the inactive view panes or viewers.

You can minimize the navigation panel. Select **View > Navigation Panel > Minimized**. The minimized navigation panel appears as an icon in the lower right corner of the viewer. For more information, see Minimize the Navigation Panel.

Compatibility Considerations

Before R2013a, the red X control on the left side of the navigation panel was a toggle button to hide or display the navigation panel. Starting in R2013a, the red X control minimizes the navigation panel.

To hide the navigation panel, select **View > Navigation Panel > None**.

You can open VRML file (.wrl) in the 3D World Editor from the MATLAB Current Folder panel using the context menu.

Option to start 3D World Editor with previous session's layout

You can specify whether the 3D World Editor starts up with the default layout of a virtual world or opens with the layout as it appeared when you exited the virtual world previously. The layout includes settings for the view, viewpoints, navigation, and rendering.

By default, virtual worlds open with the layout that was saved at exit. To have virtual worlds open using the default layout, clear the **Preferences > Simulink 3D Animation > Editor > Preserve Layout per VRML File** preference.

Expansion of subtree in the tree structure pane of 3D World Editor

You can expand subtrees for a 3D World Editor VRML node by using the **Expand Subtree** context menu item.

Multiple 3D World Editor instances

When you open the 3D World Editor using a **File** menu item, if the existing editor window has a file open, then a separate instance of the editor opens. Having multiple instances of the 3D World Editor enables you to work on multiple virtual worlds at the same time and to copy and paste from one virtual world to another.

Before R2013a, if you already had the 3D World Editor open, then when you opened another virtual world, it replaced the initial virtual world.

Blaxxun Contact viewer

Support for the Blaxxun Contact viewer will be removed in a future release. Consider using one of the other VRML viewers described in VRML Viewers.

Additional grids for Components library

The Components library includes some additional grids for more control of granularity.

vredit function for opening 3D World Editor

You can use the new `vredit` function to open a virtual world in the 3D World Editor.

MATLAB buttons for editor and animation player

You can open the 3D World Editor or the Simulink 3D Animation animation player by using MATLAB Toolstrip buttons.

From the MATLAB Toolstrip, in the **Apps** tab, click the down arrow on the right side of the tab. Scroll down to the **Simulation Graphics and Reporting** area and click either the **3D World Editor** or the **3D Animation Player** button.

Simulation Stepper support

You can use the Simulink Simulation Stepper with the VR Sink and VR Source blocks.

Note You cannot use the Simulink Simulation Stepper with the VR Tracer block.

- Simulation of haptic effects

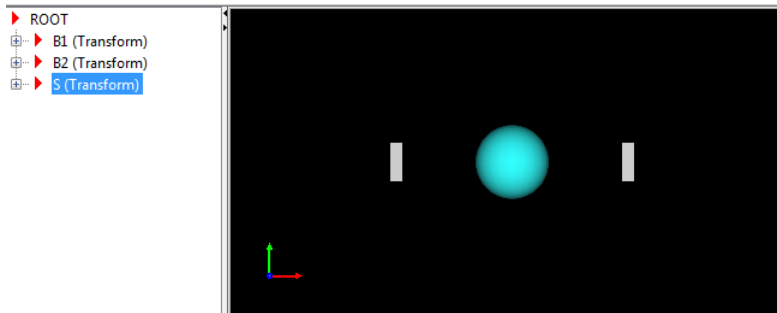
New Features

VR Source Block

The VR Source block provides access to values from virtual world fields that you specify in the Block Parameters dialog box as inputs during simulation. This functionality supports activities such as using the VR Source block to register user interactions with the virtual world. You can pass to the model those values that can affect the simulation of a model.

Triad of Coordinate Axes

To help you visualize changes in the orientation (coordinate axes) of nodes in a virtual world, the 3D World Editor **virtual world display** pane includes a triad of red, green, and blue arrows. These arrows are always parallel with global x, y, and z coordinate axes. The triad displays changes in orientation as you navigate in a virtual world.



Also, you can add a triad to the Simulink 3D Animation Viewer.

Controlling Full-Screen Mode

The Simulink 3D Animation viewer navigation panel now includes a full-screen mode toggle button () to facilitate moving in and out of full-screen display mode.

You can also enable full-screen mode using the new **View > Fullscreen Mode** menu option.

Global Coordinates for vrnnode Objects

When you read the positions and rotations of vrnnode types such as Transform and Viewpoint, you can now use global coordinates. Global coordinates are very useful, for example, when you are tracking a robot end-effector using tracers that you create independently from the VRML hierarchy of the robot. For details, see the documentation for the vrnnode function.

3D World Editor Enhancements

Template Files

The 3D World Editor includes template VRML files that you can use as a starting point for creating virtual reality worlds. Some examples of templates are the Earth, roads, sea, and terrains virtual world templates. For details, see [Template VRML Files](#).

Sensing Objects Added to Components Library

The Components library now includes sensing objects. Some examples of sensing objects are:

- 2D setpoint area

Improved VRML Script Editing

The 3D World Editor includes enhancements to make VRML script editing easier. You can:

- Add script interface elements by right-clicking a Script node.
- Edit URL code in an edit box.

Improved VRML Tree Structure Pane

The **Tree structure** pane displays icons to visually distinguish between node field types (`field`, `eventIn`, `eventOut`, and `exposedField`).

Specify a Default Viewpoint From the Command Line

You can now specify a default viewpoint at the command line, using the `vrview` function with a pound sign (`#`), followed by the name of a viewpoint. For example:

```
vrview('vrlights.wrl#Ocean')
```

New or Enhanced Examples

The new `vrcrane_panel` example uses an operator control panel to set the setpoint. The setpoint is the desired position of the load. The example uses the VR Source block.

The example previously named `vrbuttons` is now `vrdemo_panel`. The `vrdemo_panel` example uses sensing objects that are now available in the 3D World Editor Components library. You can place the example control panel in your virtual worlds. You can control a simulation or visualize certain virtual world properties by using signals from virtual world sensors in a simulation model.

Legacy Viewer

The legacy viewer is not recommended. Use the Simulink 3D Animation Viewer or other supported VRML viewer instead.

3D World Editor Accessible from the Start Menu

You can open the 3D World Editor using the MATLAB **Start** button. Select **Simulink > Simulink 3D Animation > 3D World Editor**.

Preference Options for 3D World Editor Startup Position

The Simulink 3D Animation Preferences pane includes the following two options for specifying the startup position of the 3D World Editor:

- To specify the default location for the 3D World Editor, select **3D World Editor > Position**, and specify the pixel location for the upper-left and the lower-right corners (for example, [96 120 862 960]).
- To have the 3D World Editor open in the same location where the editor was last exited, select **3D World Editor > Save position on exit**.

3D World Editor Option to Hide Default Values

To simplify the tree view in the 3D World Editor, you can hide default VRML values. To hide default values, select the **Tree > Hide Default Values** menu item. To return to viewing default values, clear the **Hide Default Values** option.

Node Fields Are Listed Before Node Children Fields in 3D World Editor

Node fields appear at the top of the list of nodes in the tree structure pane of the 3D World Editor.

In the R2010b version of the 3D World Editor, node children appeared before the node's own fields. However, virtual worlds created in R2010b do not require any changes to work in R2011a.

Setting Viewpoint Values in the 3D World Editor Based on Camera Position

You can use the current camera position to interactively specify a viewpoint in the 3D World Editor. Right-click a Viewpoint node in the tree structure pane and select the **Copy values from current camera** option.

- 1 Navigate to a position in the scene that you want.
- 2 In the **tree structure** pane, right-click a Viewpoint node .
- 3 Select **Copy values from current camera**.

Faster Texture Handling

Simulink 3D Animation renders textures more quickly than previously. The performance improvement is especially noticeable for 64-bit Windows platforms.

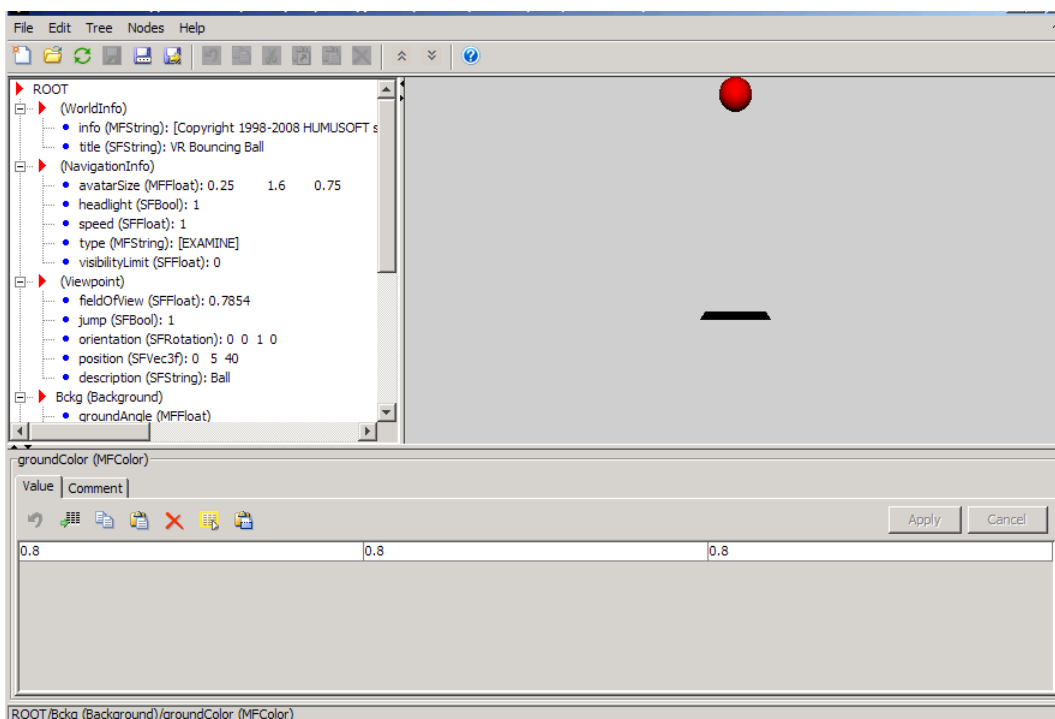
3D World Editor

R2010b introduces the 3D World Editor, which is a built-in VRML editor that works on all platforms supported for the Simulink 3D Animation product.

You can use the 3D World Editor instead of, or in addition to, the V-Realm Builder editor (which also is included with the Simulink 3D Animation product) or with another VRML virtual world editor.

The 3D World Editor includes three panes:

- Tree structure pane, which shows the hierarchy for the virtual world you are editing
- Virtual scene display pane, which reflects your edits
- Edit pane, where you can change values for node items



For details about using the new editor, see [Using the 3D World Editor](#).

Compatibility Considerations

When you install R2010b in a different location from where any previous MATLAB releases are installed, the 3D World Editor is the default editor. If you are upgrading from a previous release, then you need to change your preferences, please read this section.

The **VRML Editor command line** preference in R2010b is now ***BUILTIN**.

Also, in R2010b the **Antialiasing** preference check box is enabled. To access the **Antialiasing** preference,

If you are upgrading from a previous release to R2010b, we recommend that you reset your preferences. You can use one of these approaches:

-
- Reset all your preferences to match the default preference settings for R2010b.
 - Explicitly reset the **VRML Editor command line** and **Antialiasing** preferences.

To reset your preferences to the R2010b default settings, at the MATLAB command line, enter:

```
vrsetpref factory;
```

To set the individual preferences explicitly:

- 1** In MATLAB, select **File > Preferences > Simulink 3D Animation**
- 2** In the Simulink 3D Animation Preferences dialog box, set the **VRML Editor command line** preference to `*BUILTIN`.

This capability is most useful for advanced scene manipulations. For example, adding nodes to unnamed nodes or setting properties for these nodes. Updated vrphysmod

The `vrphysmod` function has been enhanced to automatically link multiple `SimMechanics` models imported through `SimMechanics Link` to a single virtual scene that contains these components. This means that if your model contains several VR Sink blocks that refer to the same VRML file, this function attempts to consolidate the animation signals of that virtual scene into one VR Sink block.

VR Sink Block Now Supports Setting Node eventIn Events

The VR Sink block now supports setting node `eventIn` events that do not have any field or `exposeField` associated with them. This improves the ability to control virtual scene, in particular using scripts and interpolators. For example, you can now define an object trajectory using a `VRML PositionInterpolator`. During simulation, you can define the current position of the object on the trajectory by setting the `set_fraction` `eventIn` event of that interpolator.

vrmorph Example

The `vrmorph` example has been updated to reflect support for Simulink variable-size signals.

Some Dialog Boxes Are No Longer Modal

To reactivate the legacy (former) viewer, use `vrsetpref` to set the `DefaultViewer` property to `'internalv4'`.

Note If you are running the Simulink 3D Animation software on a Linux platform, the default viewer continues to be the legacy viewer. The legacy viewer does not support MATLAB figures. If you have a Linux platform and want to access the MATLAB figure capability for the viewer, install the hardware-accelerated OpenGL® rendering engine first. Otherwise, the Simulink 3D Animation software cannot properly display the viewer window. You can then activate the new viewer by typing `vrsetpref('DefaultViewer','internalv5')` in the MATLAB Command Window.

Compatibility Considerations

The alternate mode of virtual scene viewer introduced in Version 5.0 (R2009a) is now the default viewer for all supported platforms (except for Linux platforms). At a minimum, this viewer provides the same functionality as the legacy viewer.

Support on the 64-Bit Intel Macintosh Platform

The Simulink 3D Animation software now supports the 64-bit Intel® Macintosh platform.

VRML Files Recognized in MATLAB Current Folder Browser

The MATLAB Current Folder browser now supports `.wrl` files. This support enables you to perform standard MATLAB file operations on the `.wrl` file in the Current Folder browser. For example, double-clicking a `.wrl` file in the Current Folder browser now starts the Simulink 3D Animation viewer for that `.wrl` file. In previous releases, double-clicking a `.wrl` file in the current folder browser started the MATLAB editor for that file.

Changed `vr.canvas` Units Property Default
