Do Not Use Database Tools to Modify Oracle Applications Data

Oracle STRONGLY RECOMMENDS that you never use SQL*Plus, Oracle Data Browser, database triggers, or any other tool to modify Oracle Applications data unless otherwise instructed.

Oracle provides powerful tools you can use to create, store, change, retrieve, and maintain information in an Oracle database. But if you use Oracle tools such as SQL*Plus to modify Oracle Applications data, you risk destroying the integrity of your data and you lose the ability to audit changes to your data.

Because Oracle Applications tables are interrelated, any change you make using Oracle Applications can update many tables at once. But when you modify Oracle Applications data using anything other than Oracle Applications, you may change a row in one table without making corresponding changes in related tables. If your tables get out of synchronization with each other, you risk retrieving erroneous information and you risk unpredictable results throughout Oracle Applications.

When you use Oracle Applications to modify your data, Oracle Applications automatically checks that your changes are valid. Oracle Applications also keeps track of who changes information. If you enter information into database tables using database tools, you may store invalid information. You also lose the ability to track who has changed your information because SQL*Plus and other database tools do not keep a record of changes.

Overview of E-Business Intelligence

In becoming e-businesses, organizations have streamlined their internal processes to win new customers and to gain a larger share of their existing customersí business. New, internet-enabled, enterprise application suites and electronic market places are reducing inefficiencies across supply chains while providing new opportunities to improve customer relationships. As organizations adopt these new solutions, the need to make decisions faster has also increased. To remain competitive, every organization must empower more people to make informed decisions, without the need for long approval or review cycles.

To meet this challenge, organizations must provide the relevant business information and analysis tools that every manager or project team needs to quickly understand what is happening, to be able to analyze alternatives, and to take action. Business intelligence applications are available to provide the data and analysis required to make these decisions, but most business intelligence products are not integrated with operational systems. Because the business processes underlying source applications are always changing, traditional business intelligence applications cannot easily gather the necessary data or transform it into useful management information.

The Oracle Embedded Data Warehouse (EDW) provides a simple and powerful framework for delivering information, from internal applications and external sources, to end-users across the enterprise. EDW unlocks the value of information, held in operational systems, by automatically collecting, aggregating and transforming source data, to provide secure access and a unified view of the entire organization. With the Business Intelligence System applications, everyone has immediate access to accurate and timely data to make faster and more informed decisions, which leads to a positive impact on bottom line results.

Overview of Embedded Data Warehouse

EDW is a foundation technology for Oracle E-Business Intelligence. This ready-to-run, end-to-end solution provides an open schema and extensible data warehousing architecture, powered by robust data warehousing tools. EDW:

- Gives users a unified view of the enterprise with its cross-functional analysis capabilities
- Leverages a common dimension model which enables seamless cross-functional analysis across the entire enterprise
- Includes fact tables from 7 intelligence areas: Financials, Projects, Purchasing, Manufacturing, Marketing, Human Resources, and Supply Chain

- Includes pre-built collections for Oracle Applications 11i and by using Oracle Warehouse Builder, customers can map non-Oracle sources
- Provides shorter time-to-benefit with its pre-defined enterprise schemas and hierarchies, and pre-built data collection and integration programs

EDW, the enabling technology of Oracle E-Business Intelligence, unleashes the power of e-business insight, not just information.

E-Business Intelligence Architecture

E-Business Intelligence is a multi-tiered architecture.

The first tier, the database tier, provides the foundation technology. The database tier can be implemented as a transactional (OLTP) or a warehouse (OLAP) schema. The transactional schema provides users with real-time report data. The warehouse schema provides users with summarized data that supports more complex reporting and decision making. The type of schema you choose determines the type of content that is available to your users.

The second tier, the applications tier, provides the load balancing and business logic. It processes requests from the third tier (client tier) and sends results from the database tier to the client tier.

The third tier, the client tier, supports user activities such as reporting from the web, and administration.

This guide assumes that you are implementing the warehouse schema.

Embedded Data Warehouse Architecture

EDW divides your data between two types of systems: one or more source systems and one target system.

A source system can be any Oracle Applications system, non-Oracle system running on an Oracle database, or legacy database application that provides data to the warehouse. You can use one or more source systems to provide data to the target system.

The target system is the runtime warehouse. There is only one target system. It integrates data from multiple source systems, transforms the data, and makes it available in a star schema design. The star schema design supports complex user reporting and decision making.

Embedded Data Warehouse Components

The following section describes the various components that reside on the source systems and the target (warehouse) system.

Source System Components

Source systems can be any Oracle Applications Release 10.7, 11, or 11i system; non-Oracle system running on an Oracle database; or legacy database application that provides data to the warehouse. Each source system must contain the following components.

- **Database links:** Database links are used to connect the source system to the warehouse and from the warehouse to the source system.
- **Interface tables:** For EDW, source system data is put into interface tables before it is pushed to the warehouse.
- **Collect programs:** Collect programs determine how to extract and transform source data for the warehouse. Collect programs use the database links to transfer data from the interface tables to the warehouse and from the warehouse to the source system.
- **Concurrent Manager:** The concurrent manager coordinates the processes generated by users' requests to run various data-intensive programs.
- Web Browser: A web browser is used with Oracle Applications 11i source systems. This is only necessary on an Oracle Applications 11i source system.

These components must be installed and set up on each source system.

Target System Components

The target system is an Oracle Applications Release 11i.3 system (or higher) with an Oracle 8i database. The target system summarizes data from the various source systems into a data warehouse (from this point forward, this document will refer to the target system as the warehouse). The warehouse contains fact tables, dimension tables, APIs, and other supporting utilities and objects. It must also contain the following components:

- Load programs: Load programs use the EDW metadata to determine how to move data into the warehouse. Load programs transfer data from interface tables to warehouse schema.
- Database Links: Database links are used to connect the source system to the warehouse and from the warehouse to the source system.

- **EDW Metadata:** The EDW metadata defines the contents of the runtime warehouse: the facts, dimensions, and other objects. The loader engine uses the metadata define how to move data into the warehouse schema. The reporting and analytical tools also use the metadata.
- Oracle Discoverer End User Layer: The Oracle Discoverer End User Layer (EUL) is a schema that sits on the warehouse database. This schema is used to access the workbooks. Workbooks and the EUL must reside on the database tier of the warehouse.
- Oracle Discoverer Workbooks: Workbooks enable users to analyze the summarized data in the warehouse. Workbooks access data through the Oracle Discoverer EUL. Workbooks and the EUL must reside on the database tier of the warehouse.
- **Oracle Warehouse Builder Repository:** The Oracle Warehouse Builder (OWB) repository resides on the database tier of the warehouse. This repository stores the EDW metadata.
- **Interface tables:** For EDW, source system data is loaded into interface tables before it is transformed into the star schema on the warehouse.
- **Concurrent Manager:** The concurrent manager coordinates the processes generated by users' requests to run various data-intensive programs.
- **Forms Server:** The Forms Server is automatically installed as part of the Oracle Applications 11i.3 (or higher) Rapid Install.
- **Oracle Discoverer 4i Web Client:** The Oracle Discoverer 4i Web Client is installed as a separate application. The client contains a web browser with the Oracle Discoverer Web Client plug-in that executes the workbooks.
- Self Service Web Applications: Self Service Web Applications is automatically installed as part of the Oracle Applications 11i.3 (or higher) Rapid Install. .
- Zip utility: This utility is used to extract compressed files.
- **Oracle Warehouse Builder Client:** The OWB client provides front-end access to the OWB repository. The OWB client must be installed on a Windows NT machine. It is the recommended tool for viewing the EDW metadata.
- **Oracle Discoverer Bridge Client:** The Oracle Discoverer Bridge client is used to create the EUL from the EDW metadata. The bridge is installed as part of the typical Oracle Warehouse Builder install. The bridge can reside on the same physical machine as the OWB client.

- Oracle Discoverer Administration Client: The Oracle Discoverer Administration client is installed as a separate application. The client is used for administration of the Oracle Discoverer EUL. You use this client to import the EUL and configure security for Oracle Discoverer. The Oracle Discoverer Administration client must be installed on a Windows NT machine.
- Web Browser: A web browser is used to view warehouse data.
- **Performance Management Framework components:** The following is a list of the components that comprise the Performance Management Framework.
 - Presentation components: The Performance Management Graph Portlet allows end users to display graphs from the Performance Management Viewer reports. Through customization of this portlet the end user can choose a report and parameters for display.

The Performance Management List portlet allows end-users to view performance information from the personal homepage. Through customization of this portlet, an end user can choose measures and parameters. The actual values will display, with red color coding if the actual value falls outside of the tolerance range. The values of the measure are calculated through the processing of Alerts.

Through the Performance Management Viewer, end users have access to a set of pre-built reports that are specifically tailored to intelligence users. These reports provide an intuitive user interface and features aimed at the novice end user. Note that previous versions of Oracle E-Business Intelligence used Oracle Reports to define and render reports. In this release, Performance Management Viewer technology is used to define and render reports.

Through Oracle Workflow, users receive notifications. Notifications alert users to out of tolerance situations for measures with targets.

 Definition components: The AK Repository is a metadata repository used for the definition of application common data. The AK Repository is used to define Performance Management Viewer reports and performance measures. This definition contains layout information for the reports and establishes the source of actual values for both the reports and performance measures.

The Performance Management Framework contains a set of forms to define performance measures and the dimension levels. These forms allow administration users to assign the dimensions, security, corrective actions and automated target retrieval. Note that a measure also needs setup in the AK repository to enable the retrieval of actual values.

 Responsibilities: The following responsibilities are used for setting up the Performance Management Framework: Performance Management Framework (Full Access), Performance Management Framework (Targets Access), BIS Super User.

The following responsibilities contain Performance Management Viewer Reports: Purchasing Intelligence - Embedded Data Warehouse, Supply Chain Intelligence - Embedded Data Warehouse, Manufacturing Intelligence - Embedded Data Warehouse.

 Data components: To construct reports and performance measures, intelligence teams have built a set of views on top of the EDW fact tables. These views are optimized for use by the Viewer Reports and Performance Measures.

The Performance Management Framework contains a set of forms for use in entering and maintaining target information on performance measures. This includes target values, tolerance ranges and target owners.

• **Processing components:** Through the Performance Management Framework, administration users can schedule alerts and target users can subscribe to the notifications. Schedule Alerts will send notifications to target owners and update data for presentation on the performance measure portlet. Note that previous versions of E-Business Intelligence applications used Oracle Alerts to achieve the alerting functionality. This release uses E-Business Intelligence alerting.

Overview of Implementing EDW

This section contains a checklist of the steps involved in implementing EDW. This checklist lists the implementation steps in a *recommended* order, not in the actual order that they must be performed. For information on implementing the Performance Measurement Framework or the Performance Management viewer, see the *Oracle Performance Management Framework and Performance Management Viewer User Guide*.

Before you create your own implementation plan, read this entire chapter. The chapter lists all of the prerequisites and dependencies between the implementation steps. Once you have read this chapter, you will be able to accurately assess your implementation needs and create your own implementation plan.

Attention: The steps in this implementation guide, unless otherwise stated, assumes that you are logged into Oracle Applications on the warehouse instance using the Global Warehouse Administrator responsibility.

Verify Prerequisites

Before you begin to install EDW, you must verify that all hardware and software prerequisites have been met.

Hardware Prerequisites

To successfully complete the installation, you must have the following hardware available.

Source Systems

For information on hardware requirements for your 11i source systems, see the installation documentation for the respective system.

Warehouse

For the hardware requirements for the database, see Oracle 8i(9i) Installation Guide.

For the hardware requirements and supported platforms for Oracle Discoverer, see *Oracle Discoverer 4i Installation Guide*.

For the hardware requirements for Oracle Applications 11i see *Installing Oracle Applications 11i*.

Administrative Client

For the hardware requirements for Oracle Warehouse Builder Client, see *Oracle 9i Warehouse Builder Installation Guide Release 9.0.3.* The OWB Client is installed into Oracle 8i home on a Windows NT/2000 machine. The Windows NT/2000 server should have at least 1 GB of RAM and 2 GB of space for installing the OWB Client and converting the OWB metadata repository.

Software Prerequisites

To successfully complete the install, you must have the following software available on the source system and warehouse servers.

Source Systems

You must have one or more of the following standard source systems. For information on the standard install for each source system, see the appropriate installation documentation.

Oracle Applications Release 11i with patch set 3 or higher

You must also have the EDW Release 4.1 mini-pack, with the source patchset (11i.EWS.C) installed on each source system. For more information see *About Oracle Embedded Data Warehouse for Release 4.1* on MetaLink.

Warehouse

You must have the following standard warehouse system. For information on the install for the warehouse system, see the appropriate installation documentation.

• Oracle Applications Release 11i with patch set 3 or higher

You must also have the EDW Release 4.1 mini-pack, with the warehouse patchset (11i.EDW.C) installed on the warehouse system. For more information see *About Oracle Embedded Data Warehouse for Release 4.1* on MetaLink.

For RDBMS 8i only, update your init.ora parameter file with the following initialization parameters:

```
star_transformation_enabled = true
bitmap_merge_area_size = 1048576
create_bitmap_area_size = 8388608
```

The *bitmap_merge_area_size* and *create_bitmap_area_size* parameters should be set to their default values. The ranges of these values are operating system dependent.

Administrative Client

The following software must be installed on the Administrative Client.

- Oracle 9i Warehouse Builder Client with Common Warehouse Metadata Transfer Wizard
- Oracle Discoverer 4i Administration Edition Client (version 4.1.46.14 or higher)
- Oracle Discoverer 4i User Edition Client (version 4.1.46)

Note: It is highly recommended to use separate Windows NT/2000 machines to install Oracle 9i Warehouse Builder Client software and Oracle Discoverer 4i Clients. In all cases Windows NT/2000 boxes with either OWB or Discoverer software installed will be referred as *Administrative Client* throughout this document.

Tablespace Prerequisites

The tablespace requirements for EDW databases are listed below. Database tablespaces must be created in the source systems and in the warehouse system. The OWB repository tablespace must be created on the warehouse system only.

OWB Repository Tablespace

Before you install EDW Oracle Warehouse Builder metadata and then generate the EDW EUL, you must create a tablespace for your EDW metadata in the warehouse. This document refers to the USER_DATA tablespace as the default tablespace for the EDW Oracle Warehouse Builder repository schema and EDW End User Layer.

The tablespace size should be at least 300 MB.

Rollback Tablespace

Before you install EDW Oracle Warehouse Builder metadata and then generate the EDW EUL, make sure you allocate enough extents to the rollback segments and you have at least 400Mb of free space in rollback segments tablespace.

Set Up Warehouse

This section describes how to set up source systems and parameters on the warehouse. It also describes how to set up profile options on source systems and the warehouse.

Set Up Source Systems on Warehouse

To implement EDW, you must set up the source systems that you want to use on the warehouse.

To set up source instances for the warehouse:

- 1. Navigate to Setup > Source Instances. The Source Instances Setup window, appears.
- 2. In the Instance Code field, enter a unique short name for the source instance. Use the source's Oracle SID as the instance code (for example, ORCLHQ). Instance codes can be up to 10 alphanumeric characters and must be upper case.

Note: Keep the Oracle SID as short as possible. The SID is concatenated to the source instance reference and takes up memory; therefore, the shorter the SID the shorter your source reference and the more efficient your system will be.

- **3.** In the Name field, enter a unique, descriptive name for the source instance (for example, Oracle Headquarters).
- **4.** In the Description field, enter a description of the source instance (for example, Vision 11i Source System). This field is optional.
- **5.** In the Warehouse to Instance Database Link field, choose a unique database link to link the warehouse to the source system.

Database links are created during the EDW install process. See the Oracle Embedded Data Warehouse Repository and End User Layer Install and Upgrade Guide for more information.

- **6.** Check the Enabled check box if you want to use the database link to populate configuration information from the warehouse to the source instance.
- **7.** Save your work.

Set Up Warehouse Parameters

Once you set up your source systems, you must set up your warehouse parameters. Warehouse parameters ensure that the data that you collect from your source systems is consistently loaded into the warehouse.

There are three different types of parameters that you can set up on the warehouse:

- Common parameters (mandatory): Set up common parameters (such as global currency and currency rate types) to ensure that your source data is consistently loaded onto the warehouse.
- Project parameters (optional): If you are using the project dimension and use project classifications, you can set up project parameters to map pre-defined project classifications to the projects dimension as a hierarchy.

For example, if you have a Industry Sector project classification, you can set up the Industry Sector project classification as a hierarchy on the warehouse. Then, you can create a report or workbook that classifies your data by Industry Sector.

Project classifications are defined in Oracle Projects. For more information on project classifications, see the *Oracle Projects User Guide*.

• Item parameters (mandatory): There are 4 category hierarchies in the item dimension. Three of these hiearchies roll up from the item level, and the other hierarchy rolls up from the item/organization level. You can populate each hierarchy with categories of category sets, which are defined in Oracle Applications on the source systems.

Item categories are defined in Oracle Inventory. For more information on item categories, see the *Oracle Inventory User Guide*.

After you set up your warehouse parameters, you must implement the parameters to your source systems. You can also freeze the parameters to prevent them from being changed.

To set up warehouse parameters:

- 1. Navigate to Setup > Warehouse Parameters. The Warehouse Parameters window appears.
- **2.** Choose the Common tabbed region and set up your common warehouse parameters by doing the following:
 - **a.** In the Master Instance field, choose the source instance that you want to serve as the master instance.

The *master instance* is a source instance that you want to use as the source for parameter values such as rate, type, and currency.

b. In the Rate Type field, choose the currency rate type that you want to use to convert your collected data from the transactional currency to the warehouse currency.

If you want to set up new rate types, use Oracle General Ledger on the master instance. See the *Oracle General Ledger User Guide*.

c. In the Warehouse Currency field, choose the currency that you want to use as the common currency for the warehouse. When you load data onto the warehouse, the data will be converted into this currency using the rate type you selected.

If you want to set up new currencies, use Oracle General Ledger on the master instance. See the *Oracle General Ledger User Guide*.

- **d.** In the Enterprise Calendar field, choose the calendar that you want to use as the default calendar for performing cross-functional analysis.
- e. In the Period Type field, enter the period type that you want to use.

The combination of calendar and period type, uniquely identify the Enterprise Calendar for the warehouse.

- **3.** If you are using the project dimension and use project classifications, set up your project parameters by doing the following:
 - **a.** In the Project Classification 1 field of the Project Classification tabbed region, choose a project classification that you want to use as a hierarchy.

Project classifications are defined in Oracle Projects. For more information on project classifications, see the *Oracle Projects User Guide*.

b. Repeat step a for each project classification that you want to map. You can map up to seven project classifications.

- **4.** Set up your item hierarchies to be populated from your item category sets, by doing the following:
 - **a.** In the Hiearchy 1 field, choose the item hierarchy that you want to use.

The Hierarchy 1 default value is the category set associated with the Purchasing functional area. If you override this default value, the Purchasing Intelligence workbooks may not display the correct item category data.

b. In the Hierarchy 2 field, choose the item hierarchy that you want to use.

- **c.** In the Hierarchy 3 field, either choose the item category set that you want to use, or if you want to populate the hierarchy fields using a function, do the following:
- Check the Populate from Function check box, and close the window.
- Open the EDWITCSB.pls file. This file is located at the following path: \$ENI_TOP/patch/115/sql.

Edit the EDW_ITEMCUSTOM_M_C.Get_Product_Category_Set_FK
 PL/SQL function using a text editor so that it returns the item level foreign key to the parent level in the Product Hierarchy. The default function text is shown below:

EDW_ITEMCUSTOM_M_C.Get_Product_Category_Set_FK (p_inventory_item_id IN Number

p_inventory_item_id is the internal item identifier in the source.
system

p_organization_id is the internal item's organization identifier.

p_instance_code is the short code for the source instance.

Returns NA_EDW (as a VARCHAR2).

- Save your changes.
- Compile the package on the source databases.

Note: You must provide a separate collection program to collect the product hierarchy level records. This collection program must be run after the item dimension collection program to ensure that no records are left dangling when the item dimension is loaded. In the Hierarchy 1 field of the Item/Org Category Set region, choose the item that you want to use.

d. In the Hierarchy 1 field of the Item/Org Category Set region, choose a hierarchy that you want to associate with the item/organzation category set.

The default value is the category set associated with the Inventory Item functional area. If you override the default value, the Manufacturing Intelligence workbooks may not display the correct item category data.

- **5.** Freeze the warehouse parameters by choosing the Freeze button. The Freeze button toggles to Unfreeze and the parameters are frozen. You cannot change parameters once they are frozen, unless you choose the Unfreeze button.
- 6. Save your work.

Set Up Profile Options

Once you set up your warehouse parameters, set up the profile options on the warehouse and on the source systems.

To set up warehouse profile options:

- 1. Navigate to Personal Profiles. The Find Personal Profile Values window appears.
- **2.** In the Profile Name field, enter %EDW% and choose the Find button. A list of warehouse profile options appears in the Personal Profile Values window.

4. Save your work.

To set up source system profile options:

- **1.** Log on to the source system using the Site Warehouse Administrator responsibility.
- **2.** Navigate to Personal Profiles. The Find Personal Profile Values window appears.
- **3.** In the Profile Name field, enter %EDW% and choose the Find button. The source system profile options appear in the Personal Profile Values window.

4. Edit the source profile options as required. The following table lists the source system profile options and the default values, if any.

- 5. Save your work.
- 6. Repeat steps 1 to 5 for each source system.

This completes the steps that you need to do to set up the warehouse.

Generate Business Views

This section describes how to generate business views.

You must run the EDW Generate Business Views concurrent program on each source system.

Additional Information: You only have to perform this step if you are planning to configure flexfield data using the OWB Applications Integrator BIS Configuration Assistant. For more information, see: Configure Warehouse Data on page 2-20.

To run the EDW Generate Business Views concurrent program, do the following:

- **1.** Log on to the source system using the Site Warehouse Administrator responsibility.
- 2. Navigate to Reports.
- **3.** Run the EDW Generate Business Views concurrent program as a single request. For information on how to run a concurrent program, see the *Oracle Applications User Guide*.
- **4.** Repeat steps 1 to 3 for each source system that you want to configure using the BIS Configuration Assistant.

Configure Warehouse Data

This section describes how to configure your warehouse data by mapping the flexfield segments that reside on your source system to the dimensions and fact tables that reside on the warehouse. By mapping these flexfield segments, you can configure the way your business data appears on the warehouse and perform complex data analysis on warehouse fact tables.

You configure your warehouse data using the BIS Configuration Assistant wizard. This wizard that takes you step-by-step through the process of mapping flexfield segments to the warehouse. To run the wizard, you must use Oracle Warehouse Builder (OWB) Applications Integrator. OWB Applications Integrator is a tool that enables you to modify dimensions, measures, attributes, and metadata on the warehouse.

You can use the wizard to map flexfield segments to up to 10 user-defined accounting dimensions and 50 other user-defined dimensions.

- User-defined accounting dimensions are reserved to map GL Accounting Flexfield segments. User-defined accounting dimensions can have up to 5 hierarchies (4 configurable and 1 type). Each configurable hierarchy can have up to 15 levels associated with it. Each type hiearchy has 3 levels associated with it.
- Other user-defined dimensions are reserved to map non-Accounting flexfield segments such as non-accounting key flexfields and descriptive flexfields. Each other user-defined dimension can have one hierarchy and two levels.

You can also use the wizard to modify the attributes of predefined dimensions.

• **Predefined dimensions** are the dimensions that were provided with EDW. You can use the wizard to map flexfield segments or source view columns to the user-defined attributes of the predefined dimensions.

Map flexfield segments or source view columns to the measures (for fact tables only) and attributes (for both the dimension level tables and fact tables).

Once you map your dimensions to a fact table, you can only add new segements, you cannot remove already mapped segments. To modify already mapped segements, you must un-map the dimension from the fact table, then modify the mapped segements.

Rules for Mapping Flexfields to User Defined Accounting Dimensions

When you are mapping flexfields to user-defined accounting dimensions, there are two rules you must follow. Also, you are responsible for mapping flexfields to dimensions in a meaningful way. EDW does not check for logical errors in flexfield segment mapping.

The rules for mapping flexfields to user-defiend accounting dimensions are as follows.

- 1. You can map flexfield segments from multiple chart of accounts structures.
- 2. You can only map one flexfield segment per chart of accounts structure.

Rules for Mapping Flexfields to Other User-Defined Dimensions

When you are mapping flexfields to *other user-defined dimensions*, use the following rules:

- 1. For descriptive flexfields, if you choose a segment from Global Data Elements, you cannot choose segments from other structures. For information on Global Data Elements, see the *Oracle Applications Flexfield User Guide*.
- 2. You can only map flexfields with the following value set types: None, Independent, Dependent, Table Validated. For Table Validated value set type, only those single tables without a "where" clause, and without BIND variables, are supported.
- **3.** If you choose a Dependent flexfield segment, the associated Indepedent flexfield segment will be automatically chosen as well.
- **4.** You can only map one segment from each flexfield structure to a dimension. For information on flexfield segments, see the *Oracle Applications Flexfield User Guide*.
- **5.** In most cases, only the lowest level is populated with data. However, both levels are populated if you choose a Dependant/Independant pair of flexfield segments. In that case, the highest level is the Independant segment values, and the lowest level is populated with the Dependant segment values.
- 6. You can only map one flexfield segment to a user defined dimension.

Rule for Mapping Flexfields to Attributes in Predefined Dimensions

When you are mapping flexfields to *attributes of predefined dimensions*, use the following rule.

• You can only map one source view column or flexfield segment per attribute.

Use these rule to determine how you are going to map your attributes to dimensions.

- Metadata has been imported into the OWB repository. See: Oracle Embedded Data Warehouse Repository and End User Layer Install and Upgrade Guide.
- EDW:Log File Directory profile option has been set. See: Set Up Profile Options on page 2-15.
- Business views have been generated on each source system that you want to configure flexfield data on. See: Generate Business Views on page 2-19.

Launch BIS Configuration Assistant

You must use the BIS Configuration Assistant to configure your warehouse data. The BIS Configuration Assistant is a wizard that takes you step-by-step through the data configuration process and it is launched using OWB Applications Integrator.

To launch the BIS Configuration Assistant:

- 1. Log on to Oracle Warehouse Builder (OWB).
- 2. In the Warehouse Builder Logon window, complete the following fields:
 - a. In the Username field, enter EDWREP.
 - **b.** In the Password field, enter <edwrep user password>.
 - **c.** In the Host Name field, enter the name of the machine that the warehouse instance is running on.
 - **d.** In the Port Number field, enter the port number for the instance. (Consult with your DBA for this information.)
 - **e.** In the Oracle SID field, enter the Oracle SID for the instance. (Consult with your DBA for this information.)
 - f. Choose the Logon button. The Welcome to Oracle Warehouse Builder window appears.
- **3.** In the Project Name field, choose the project that you want to work with. The OWB window appears. For more information about defining projects in OWB, see the *Oracle Warehouse Builder User Guide*.
- 4. Choose the Wizard icon, then choose the Configuration Assistant icon.

Define Sources

The first step to configuring flexfield data on your warehouse is to define the sources systems. You must repeat these steps for each source system you are going use.

To perform this step, a database link should exist between the source instance and the warehouse (see: *Oracle Embedded Data Warehouse Repository and End User Layer Install and Upgrade Guide.*). However, if necessary, you can create new database links using this tool.

To define a source system, do the following:

1. In BIS Configuration Assistant window, choose the Go button next to the Define Source option. The Define Source window appears.

Note: The source name should be the same as the source's instance code, which you defined the source's instance code in the Set Up Warehouse section, on page 2-9. Use the source's Oracle SID, for the module name, for example, ORCLHQ.

b. In the Type a display name for this module field, enter a display name for the source module. The display name can be a 2 to 30-alphanumeric character string and the first character must be a letter. Spaces are not allowed.

c. In the Select the module status field, select a status that reflects the warehouse design level: Development, Quality Assurance, or Production.

The Identify the module type field is automatically populated as Data Source.

- **d.** In the Type an optional description for this module field, enter a description for the module, if necessary. This step is optional.
- **e.** Choose the Next button to continue. The New Module Wizard: Data Source Information window appears.
- f. In the Select the application field, choose the appropriate release number for your source system.

The other fields are automatically populated based on the release number selected.

g. Choose the Next button to continue. The New Module Wizard: Connection Information window appears.

h. In the Database Link field, choose the database link that connects the warehouse to the source instance. You can either choose from the list of available database links or you can create a new link.

The list of available database links was created during the EDW install. When you select a link from the list of values, the other fields are automatically populated based on the chosen database link. For information on how to set up database links during installation, see: Oracle Embedded Data Warehouse Repository and End User Layer Install and Upgrade Guide.

If you want to create a new link at this time, do the following:

- In the New Module Wizard: Connection Information window, choose the New button. The New Database Link window appears.
- In the DB Link Name field, enter the name you want to use to identify this database link. The suggested short name is the same as the Oracle SID of the source, for example, ORCLHQ.
- In the SQL Connect String field, enter the connect string as it exists in your TNSNAMES.ORA file. Consult your Oracle administrator if you need help locating or understanding this file.
- If the connect string does not exist in your TNSNAMES.ORA file, in the Host information field, type in the host information (host machine name, port number, and Oracle server ID).
- Enable the Heterogeneous Services checkbox if you are connecting to a database using ODBC, OLE DB, or an Oracle Transparent Gateway.
- In the User Name field, enter a user name who has access to the source database. The default user name is APPS.
- In the Password field, enter the password that corresponds to the user name for the source database. The default user password is your APPS user password.
- Choose the Create and Test button to test the new database link. Test results are displayed in the Create and Test field below the Create and Test button.
- Choose the OK button. You return to the Connection Information window.
- Select the link from the list of available database links. The other fields are automatically populated based on the chosen database link.
- i. Choose the Next button to continue. The New Module Wizard Finish window appears.

- j. Verify the source information. If the information is correct, choose the Finish button. If the source information is not correct, choose the Back button, fix the information, return to this window, and then choose the Finish button. The OWB window appears.
- **k.** In the OWB window, commit your changes. A confirmation window appears. Choose the OK button to confirm the commit and close the window.
- I. Repeat steps a to k for each new source system that you want to map flexfields for.
- 3. If you want to update an existing source, do the following.

Once you set up the source systems that you want to map flexfields from, you must map those flexfields to dimensions on the warehouse. You can map flexfields to any of the following dimension types:

- User-Defined Accounting Dimensions
- Other User-Defined Dimensions
- Predefined Dimensions (to the user-defined attributes only)

Map Flexfields to User-Defined Accounting Dimensions

You can map flexfield segments on your source systems to up to 10 user-defined accounting dimensions.

To map flexfields to user-defined accounting dimensions, do the following:

- 1. In the BIS Configuration Assistant window, choose the Go button next to the Map Sources to Dimension option. The Map Sources to Dimension Welcome window appears.
- **2.** Choose the Next button to continue. The Choose Type and Dimension Window appears.

3. To create a user-defined accounting dimension, do the following:

a. Choose the Create Dimension check box, then choose the user-defined accounting dimension.

Note: You can only create a dimension if you are below the maximum number user-defined dimensions for that dimension type. Therefore, you cannot create a user-defined accounting dimension if you have already mapped the maximum number of user-defined accounting dimensions (10). The user-defined accounting object option will be grayed out if you already have 10 dimensions mapped.

- **3.** In the Available Objects region, choose the flexfield segment that you want to map, and move it to the Selected Objects region by choosing the right arrow button.
- **4.** Repeat step 3 for each flexfield segment that you want to create a dimension for . When you finish adding flexfield segments, choose the Next button to continue. The Edit Display Names window appears.
- 5. In the Edit Display Names window, enter the dimension information as follows:
 - **a.** In the Dimension field, enter the name of the dimension.

- **10.** In the OWB window, commit your changes. A confirmation window appears. Choose the OK button to confirm the commit and close the window.

To modify flexfield mappings to other user-defined dimensions, do the following:

- **3.** If you want to add a flexfield or source view column to a predefined dimension, do the following:
 - **a.** In the Level field of the Map Sources to Dimension: Choose Source Objects window, choose a dimension level.
 - b. Choose the Add button. The Map the Attribute window appears.
 - **c.** In the Display Name field, enter the display name for the user defined attribute.

The default data type is VARCHAR2. The source view columns and seeded flexfield segments for the chosen predefined dimension, are listed in the Available Objects region.

d. In the Available Objects region, drill down to the source view columns or flexfield segments that you want to map, highlight the object, then choose the right arrow button to move the it into the Selected Objects region.

Only seeded flexfield segments will be listed in the Available Object region. For a complete list of seeded flexfields, see: Appendix D, "Seeded Flexfields". **Note:** You can only map one source view columns or flexfield segments per attribute.

- **e.** Repeat steps a to e for each dimension level that you want to map attributes for.
- f. Choose the OK button. You return to the Map Sources to Dimension: Choose Source Objects window.
- **4.** If you want to edit user defined attributes that are already mapped, do the following.
 - **a.** In the Level field of the Map Sources to Dimension: Choose Source Objects window, choose a dimension level.
 - b. Choose the Edit button. The Edit Display Names window appears.
 - c. Edit the user defined attribute mapping as required.
 - d. Repeat steps a to c for each dimension level that you want to edit.
 - e. Choose the OK button. You return to the Map Sources to Dimension: Choose Source Objects window.
- **5.** If you want to remove user defined attributes that are already mapped, do the following.
 - **a.** In the Level field of the Map Sources to Dimension: Choose Source Objects window, choose a dimension level.
 - **b.** Choose the Remove button.
 - c. Repeat steps a and b for each dimension level that you want to remove.
- **6.** Choose the Next button to continue. The Map Sources to Dimensions: Summary window appears.
- **7.** Verify the dimension information, including all hierarchies and levels. If the information is correct, choose the Finish button. If it is not correct, use the Back button to return to the previous window, fix the information, then return to this window and choose the Finish button.
- 8. Repeat steps 1 to 7 for each predefined dimension that you want to map.
- **9.** In the OWB window, commit your changes. A confirmation window appears. Choose the OK button to confirm the commit and close the window.

Map Sources to Fact Tables

- **b.** In the Display Name field, enter a user-friendly name for the user-defined measure or attribute.
- **c.** In the Data Type field, choose a data type for the measure or attribute. Choose the NUMBER data type if you want to create a measure. Any column in a source view that has NUMBER as type can be mapped to this measure. Choose the VARCHAR2 data type if you want to create an attribute and accept VARCHAR2, CHAR, or DATE as source types.

Note: If all the user-definable measures are mapped, or if none exist, the NUMBER data type will not be displayed. If all of the user-definable attributes are mapped, or if none exist, the VARCHAR2 type will not be displayed in the data type list box.

The source view and the seeded flexfield structures are listed in the Available Objects region.

d. In the Available Objects region, highlight source view columns or flexfield segments that you want to map, and choose the right arrow button to move to the Selected Objects region.

You can only map one source view column or flexfield segment to the attribute.

- **9.** Verify that the fact table information is correct. If the information is correct, choose the Finish button. If it is not correct, use the Back button to go back and fix the information, return to this screen, and then choose the Finish button. You return to the OWB window.
- **10.** Repeat steps 1 to 9 for all the fact tables that you want to configure for user defined attributes.
- **11.** In the Oracle Warehouse Builder window, commit your changes. A confirmation window appears. Choose the OK button to confirm the commit and close the window.

Deploy Configuration

Once you set up your sources, dimensions, and facts on the warehouse, you must deploy the configuration information to the sources.

You must deploy the configuration information to one source at a time. You must also synchronize the APPS_MRC schema before you deploy your configuration.

Note: You must deploy your warehouse configuration to the source systems before you run any collection programs.

To deploy your data configuration, do the following:

1. In the BIS Configuration Assistant window, choose the Go button next to the Deploy Configuration option. The Deploy Configuration window appears.

- 2. In the Choose source module field, choose the source that you want to deploy the configuration information to. The check boxes in the Deploy Needed column are automatically updated to indicate which object need to be deployed to the source system.
- **3.** Enable the checkboxes in the Deploy check box for each dimension and fact that you want to deploy.

- 4. Choose the OK button to deploy the configuration information to the source.
- 5. Repeat steps 1 to 4 for each source that you want to deploy the information to.

Hide Columns

You can also use the BIS Configuration Assistant to select the source view columns that you want to:

- Not load
- Hide from view (default)

Choosing to hide or not load columns can improve your EUL usability and performance. For example, users can work more efficiently if they do not have to see or wait to load columns that they do not use in analysis.

Hiding a column does not permanently hide it from users. It is only a default setting. Users can choose to view the column if they want, by unhiding it using Oracle Discoverer Administration edition.

To hide or not load columns in source views, do the following:

1. In the BIS Configuration Assistant window, choose the Go button that is next to the Hiding Attributes option. The Hiding Attributes window appears.

- **2.** In the Object Type field, choose the object type that you want to hide. You can choose either Dimension or Fact.
- **3.** In the Object Name field of the object region, choose the name of the object that you want modify. The related objects appear in the Objects region of the window.
- 4. If you do not want to load a foreign key or attribute, enable the Skip Load check box next to the object. When you enable Skip Load, the data for that column will not be loaded from the warehouse interface tables to the warehouse and the Hide check box will be automatically enabled.
- 5. If you want to load the column but hide it from view, check the Hide check box.

- **6.** If you want to reset the window and disable all of the Skip Load and Hide check boxes at the same time, choose the Reset button. You can continue to reset the columns as appropriate.
- 7. Save your work.
- 8. Choose the OK button to exit the window. The OWB window appears.
- 9. In the OWB window commit your changes.
- **10.** Save your work. You must save before you can begin to hide another object.

This completes the configuration of your warehouse data using the BIS Configuration Assistant and the OWB Applications Integrator.

After you configure your warehouse data using the BIS Configuration Assistant wizard, you must transfer this data to Oracle Discoverer and generate the end user layer (EUL).

The EUL enables users to analyze the data in the warehouse using Oracle Discoverer workbooks.

To perform this transfer and generate the EUL, you need to use the Common Warehouse Metadata Transfer Wizard, which you can launch using OWB Applications Integrator.

The Common Warehouse Metadata Transfer wizard (CWM transfer wizard) generates an ASCII export file (EEX) based on the user-defined flexfields and attributes that you configured using the BIS Configuration Assistant wizard. This ASCII file is then used to generate the EUL.

Prerequisite

Before you generate the EUL, ensure that the following prerequisite has been met:

• All of your data has been configured using the BIS Configuration Assistant. For more information, see: Configure Warehouse Data on page 2-20.

Launch the Common Warehouse Metadata Transfer Wizard

To begin the metadata transfer, you must launch the CWM Metadata Transfer wizard.

Note: The Windows NT machine that you use to launch the CWM Transfer Wizard must have at least 1GB virtual memory, 500 MB of temporary disk space, and 512 MB of RAM.

To launch the CWM Transfer wizard:

- 1. Log on to Oracle Warehouse Builder by completing the following fields in the Warehouse Builder Logon window:
 - a. In the Username field, enter EDWREP.
 - **b.** In the Password field, enter <edwrep user password>.
 - **c.** In the Host Name field, enter the name of the machine that the warehouse instance is running on.
 - **d.** In the Port Number field, enter the port number for the instance. (Consult with your DBA for this information.)
 - **e.** In the Oracle SID field, enter the Oracle SID for the instance. (Consult with your DBA for this information.)
 - f. Choose the Logon button. The Welcome to Oracle Warehouse Builder window appears.
- 2. The Project Name field is automatically populated with 'EDWPRJ'.
- **3.** Choose the OK button.
- **4.** The BIS Configuration Assistant displays automatically. Choose the Close button to close the BIS Configuration Assistant wizard window. The OWB window appears.




Figure 2–21 CWM Transfer Wizard

From the Utilities launcher, choose the CWM Transfer Wizard button. The CWM Transfer wizard widow appears.

This will bring up the CWM Transfer Wizard window, which walks you through the steps necessary to transfer metadata.

Transfer Metadata

Once you launch the CWM Transfer wizard you must transfer the metadata from the OWB Repository to Oracle Discoverer.

To transfer metadata from the OWB Repository to Oracle Discoverer, do the following:

1. In the CWM Transfer Wizard: Welcome window, choose the Next button. The Source and Target Data Locations window appears.

The From field is automatically populated with Oracle Warehouse Builder 9i.

- 2. In the To field, choose Oracle Discoverer.
- **3.** In the Description field, enter a description of the data transfer. This is an optional step.
- **4.** Choose the Next button to continue. The Data Object/File Names and Detailed Transfer Parameters window appears.

7. Verify that all of the transfer data is correct. If it is correct, choose the Finish button. The CWM Transfer wizard generates an EEX file in the location you have specified in the wizard. If the data is incorrect, choose the Back button to return to the transfer window, edit the information, return to the Confirmation window and then choose the Finish button.

This completes all the steps that you need to generate the EUL. After you transfer the EUL to Oracle Discoverer, you must Import the EUL EEX file.

Import the End User Layer EEX File

After you generate the EUL, you must import the EEX file using Oracle Discoverer Administration Edition.

Additional Information: See the *Oracle Discoverer Administration Guide* for more information on how to import the EEX file.

To import the EUL EEX file:

- 1. Copy the <filename>.eex file from \$AU_TOP/discover/US to a temporary directory on the Windows NT machine where you have installed Oracle Discoverer Administration Client.
- **2.** Logon to the Oracle Discoverer Administration Client using the EUL owner responsibility. For example, EDWEUL_US.

The following message appears: "You must upgrade your EUL tables to use this software release. Upgrading the EUL tables requires existing users to install Oracle Discoverer Plus in order to continue running queries and report".

- 3. Choose the Upgrade button.
- **4.** Connect to the EUL based on the language of EEX file selected. For example, you can connect to the US version by selecting EDWEUL_US.
- 5. Choose Import from the File menu.
- 6. Under Import Options, select Rename Existing Objects.
- **7.** In the Import Business Area window, choose the <filename>.eex file that you want to import.

If you want to enable the Purchasing Intelligence extended business area, choose the following files for import:

- poaclcsvngrfe.eex*
- poapospplrprfle.eex*
- poacntrcttfle.eex*
- poapospplrscfle.eex*
- poavlrfe.eex*
- poapospplrp01fle.eex*

- poapospplrp02fle.eex*

- **8.** Choose the Import button. The EEX files are imported to the database tier and the import EUL Log window appears.
- **9.** Choose the OK button to complete the import.

Set Up the Item Dimension

A *dimension* defines a hierarchical relationship between data for reporting purposes. The *item dimension* defines the relationship between items and their category assignments, as defined in Oracle Inventory on the source systems. The item dimension forms the basis for all item reporting in EDW.

The item dimension has six hierarchies which allow you to aggregate your product information by category. Each hierarchy has multiple category levels.




Figure 2–25 Item Dimension Structure

The item dimension permits four categories at the item level and two categories at the item/org level.

Each item in the item dimension can be classified as a master org and as a child org. For example, the same item can be classified as a "printed circuit board" in one category set, as "subassemblies" in another, or as "high volume, remove and replace" in yet another. The dimension is populated with the item classification schemes that are defined in Oracle Inventory on each source system. You must ensure that your category sets and product classification schemes are properly defined in Oracle Inventory on your source systems before you begin using the item dimension.

To set up the item dimension, you must do the following:

- Review the Implementation Considerations for the Item Dimension. See: Implementation Considerations for the Item Dimension on page 2-66.
- Create a Value Set and Define a Hierarchy on page 2-70
- Setup Warehouse Parameter on page 2-73
- Run "Collect" and "Load" Concurrent Programs on page 2-75

Once you set up the item dimension, you can review the maintenance and administration tasks for this feature. See: Maintaining and Administering the Item Dimension on page 2-75.

All of the set up and maintenance and administration tasks for the item dimension are described in detail in the following sections.

Implementation Considerations for the Item Dimension

The following sections describe how you should set up your items and product categories in Oracle Inventory before you begin using the item dimension. For more information, see the *Oracle Inventory User Guide*.

Control Category Sets at Master or Org Levels

To use the item dimension, item-level category sets must be controlled at the Master Level and item/org-level category sets must be controlled at the Org Level.

In Oracle Inventory, use the Category Sets window to define the control level for each category set.

If you are using the Product category set, it must be controlled at the Master Level.

In Oracle Applications 11.i.8 and higher, the Category Sets window prevents you from contolling the Product category set at the Org Level. However, earlier releases of Oracle Applications, do allow you to control the Product category set at either level. If you are using an earlier version of Oracle Applications, and the Product category set is not controlled at the Master Level, the "Create Categories from value set" concurrent program will complete with an error. To prevent this error, change the control level for the Product category set before you begin using the item dimension.

Do Not Assign Items to Multiple Categories

The item dimension does not support multiple item category assignment. Therefore, you must ensure that all of the category sets that you are planning to use are defined as "single assignment" in Oracle Inventory by unchecking the Allow Multiple Item Category Assignment check box.

Define Default Category Sets for Each Functional Area

You can define the default category set for each intelligence product in the Default Category Sets window in Oracle Inventory. It is highly recommended that you also define a default category for the category set.

The default category set drives the functionality of a functional area. For example, the default category set for the Purchasing functional area is used to populate purchase order lines.

If you are planning to use a category set as the default category set for a functional area, ensure that it is set up according to the reporting requirements for the functional area and the intelligence product. For example, Purchasing Intelligence uses the first hierarchy at the item level; hence, the default category set for the Purchasing functional area must be controlled at the Master Level.

Define a Value Based Hierarchy (VBH)

As of EDW Release 4.1 you can create a hierarchy of categories based on the hierarchy in the value set. The parent-child relationship defined in the value set determines the hierarchy structure. Item dimension will populate a 10-level hierarchical item category structure from the values and hierarchy defined in the value set.

Product Category Set

If you are using the Product category set, ensure that you consider the following points.

Value Set

User can define values (nodes) and establish hierarchy (parent and child relationship) in a value set. A value set can be maintained through inventory setup, by navigating to Inventory > Setup > Flexfields > Keys > Values. Once the hierarchy is created, the value set can be assigned to the Product Reporting flex structure.

Note: The Product Reporting flex structure is delivered with EDW 4.1. The flex structure must have only one enabled segment and it must be segment 1. See: *Oracle Applications Flexfields Guide*.

Once the value set has been created you can run the "Create Categories from Value Set" concurrent program to create the categories. These categories are in the Product category set. Item assignments can be made to these categories.

Item Assignment Restrictions

- You cannot assign items in the Product category set to multiple categories.
- Items in the Product category set must be controlled at the Master Level.
- Items in the Product category set, should only be assigned to LEAF (CHILD) NODES.

Note: For Oracle Application 11.i.8 and onward, item assignment form will restrict assignments being done only to leaf/child categories in Product category set. In Pre 11.i.8 application, there is no such validation.

Top Node

If you choose the value set option, set up the top node in the warehouse parameter window. Item dimension will populate item assignment information made to categories under the top node structure only.

Handling "Unassigned" in Product category set

Any item that is not assigned to a category under the top node hierarchy in the Product category set will be placed under NA_EDW.

Create a Value Set and Define a Hierarchy

When using value set option in the Warehouse Parameter, the item dimension will be populated from values and hierarchy in the value set. This will provide a multiple level hierarchy for reporting.

Note: You only need to complete this step if you are planning to use the Value Based Hierarchy feature (see: Set Up GL Value-Based Hierarchy on page 2-77).

Create Value Set

You can define categories from values defined in a value set. In the value set form, you can create values and define a hierarchy of values.

To create a new (empty) value set, do the following:

- 1. Navigate to: Inventory > Setup > Flexfields > Validation > Sets.
- **2.** Enter the Value Set name, description and maximum size allowed and save your work.

Note: If you are using the Product Category in both your Accounting Flexfield and your Item Category Flexfield, then the maximum character size of the value cannot be greater than 25.

To define values and hierarchy for a value set, do the following

- 1. Navigate to: Inventory > Setup > Flexfields > Key > Values.
- **2.** Select the value set created earlier. Under the Values, Effective tab, define the values as needed for your setup and save your work.
- **3.** Choose the Value, Hierarchy, Qualifiers tab and identify the Parent nodes by checking the corresponding check box.
- **4.** Click on Define Child Ranges for each parent node to define its child range. Child ranges are only immediate children. Specify Parent Value or Child Value for all child node.
- **5.** Save your work. You may use the button "View Hierarchies" to review the defined parent/child relationship.

Assign Value Set to Product Category Structure

Once the hierarchy is defined, the value set can be assigned to the Product Category flex structure.

- 1. Navigate to: Inventory > Setup > Flexfields > Key > Segments.
- **2.** Select 'Oracle Inventory' as the application, Flexfield title 'Item Categories' and Choose Product Categories from the Structure Codes presented and click on the Segments button.

Note:

- The Product Category flex structure must have only one segment enabled and it must be segment. See: *Oracle Applications Flexfields Guide* for more information on flexfields.
- Ensure that the Freeze Flexfields box is unchecked, you will not be able to change the value set otherwise.
- An empty value set "4 Digits" is seeded for this structure, user can change this to any other value set they have created.
- **3.** In the Value set field, select the value set to be assigned from the list of values presented.
- **4.** Save your work and Close the "Segments Summary (Item Categories)-Product Categories" form.
- 5. Check the "Freeze Flexfield Definition" flag.
- 6. Click on the "Compile" button to re-compile the structure

Create Categories from Value Set

Once the value set has been assigned to the product structure, run "Create Item Categories from Value Set" concurrent program to create corresponding categories for item assignments. The concurrent program can be run under the Site Warehouse Administrator Responsibility. These categories will then be in the Product category set.




Figure 2–29 Populating the Item Dimension from Value Set

Setup Warehouse Parameter

Item parameters (mandatory): There are six category hierarchies in the item dimension. Four of these hierarchies roll up from the item level, and the other hierarchy rolls up from the item/organization level. You can populate each hierarchy from categories in category sets or values in value sets, which are defined in Oracle Inventory on the source systems. Item categories are defined in Oracle Inventory. For more information on item categories, see the *Oracle Inventory User Guide*.

To set up item hierarchies to be populated from item category sets, do the following:

1. Navigate to Global Warehouse Administrator > Setup > Warehouse Parameters.

Note: Hierarchies 1 and 2 offer single level of aggregation above item. Hierarchy 3 allows 10 levels above item.

2. If you are defining an Item Category set, in the Hierarchy 1 field, choose the item category set that you want to use for the hierarchy. The Hierarchy 1 default value is the category set associated with the Purchasing intelligence area. If you

override this default value, the Purchasing Intelligence workbooks may not display the correct item category data.

3. In the Hierarchy 2 field of the Item/ category set region, choose a category set that you want to associate with the item category set.

4. In the Hierarchy 3 field, do the following:

Category Set Option

If you want to make Hierarchy 3 behave in the same way as Hierarchy 1 and 2 (with only one level of aggregation above item, instead of 10 levels above item), choose the Category Set option.

- **a.** In the Hierarchy 3 field, choose the item category set you want to use for the hierarchy.
- **b.** If you choose the category set option, the top node field is not available for input.
- c. Please skip setup step 2 and proceed to setup step 3.

Value Set Option

If you want Hierarchy 3 to allow 10 levels of aggregation above item, then choose the Value Set option.

- **a.** If you choose the Value Set option, the category set is automatically defined as the Product category set.
- **b.** The Hierarchy 3 field will be disabled.
- **c.** In the Top Node field, choose the category you want to use as the starting point for your hierarchy. Product hierarchy will be established from the top node downward. This field is mandatory if Value Set option is checked.
- **5.** If you are defining the Item/Org Category Set, In the Hierarchy 1 field of the Item/Org category set region, choose a category set that you want to associate with the item/organization category set. The default value is the category set associated with the Inventory functional area. If you override the default value, the Manufacturing Intelligence workbooks may not display the correct item category data.
- **6.** Freeze the warehouse parameters by choosing the Freeze button. The Freeze button toggles to Unfreeze and the parameters are frozen. You cannot change parameters once they are frozen, unless you choose the Unfreeze button.
- 7. Save your work.

Run "Collect" and "Load" Concurrent Programs

The concurrent program "Collect Item Dimension" will populate the staging tables from transaction tables. The concurrent program "Load Item Dimension" populates EDW star table from staging tables.

With EDW 4.1, the collection program populates the category levels with the concatenated segments of the category flexfield.

Maintaining and Administering the Item Dimension

This section captures special cases and the necessary steps to ensure proper representation in item dimension. There are 3 cases this document considers:

- Insert New Values in the Value Set
- Any Change to Value Set or Categories
- Changing Item Assignments

Insert New Values in the Value Set

Note: Cases 1 is relevant only if value set option is checked in Warehouse Parameter Form.

Before doing any item assignment to this new value, run concurrent program "Create Categories from Value Set" to create a new category. Then run concurrent program "Collect Item Dimension" and "Load Item Dimension" respectively.

Any Change to Value Set or Categories

Run concurrent program "Collect Item Dimension" and "Load Item Dimension" respectively to populate EDW star table with new changes.

Note: In Oracle Applications pre 11.5.8, item assignments can be done to disabled categories, which means either enable flag is unchecked or system date has passed the invalid-on date. From 11.5.8 and onward, item assignment form will not allow item being assigned to disabled categories. Item dimension related collection and load programs does not validate categories in this sense. It loads all the data in transaction tables into EDW star table.

Changing Item Assignments

Run concurrent programs "Collect Item Dimension" and "Load Item Dimension" respectively to populate EDW star table with new changes.

Set Up GL Value-Based Hierarchy

This section describes how to set up your GL Value Based Hierarchies. You only need to set up these hierarchies if you are configuring *user-defined accounting dimensions* using the BIS Configuration Assistant (see: Map Flexfields to User-Defined Accounting Dimensions on page 2-34).

When you define value-based hierarchies, you define which hierarchies you want to associate with which dimensions, and which root nodes you want to associate with each hierarchy.

Value-based hierarchies enable you to summarize your data up to your highest root-level node.

Attention: You cannot set up a value based hierarchy if your warehouse parameters are frozen. Ensure that you warehouse parameters are unfrozen before you begin. For more information on freezing warehouse parameters, see: Set Up Warehouse Parameters on page 2-11.

To set up the value-based hierarchy, do the following:

- Prerequisites on page 2-78
- Set Up Source Set of Books on page 2-78
- Set Up Consolidation Set of Books on page 2-80
- Set Up Equivalent Set of Books on page 2-82
- Set Up Hierarchy Root Nodes on page 2-83
- Set Up Types on page 2-86

Prerequisites

Before you set up your GL value based hierarchy, ensure that the following prerequisite has been met:

- Configure all of your *user-defined accounting dimensions* using the BIS Configuration Assistant. See: Map Flexfields to User-Defined Accounting Dimensions on page 2-34
- Ensure that your warehouse parameters are not frozen. See: Set Up Warehouse Parameters on page 2-11.

Set Up Source Set of Books

To set up your value-based hierarchy, you must choose of which set of books you want to load data from.

You cannot set up a source of books at this time if you have not already configured your user-defined accounting dimension using the BIS Configuration Assistant.

To set up the source set of books, do the following:

1. Navigate to Setup > Value-Based Hierarchy Setup > Source Set of Books Setup. The Source Set of Books Setup window appears.

2. In the Source Set of Books Setup window, choose the Populate Table in Warehouse button or query the set of books that you want to use to summarize data. A list of sets of books appears.

If you choose the Populate Table in Warehouse button, all sets of books will appear in the window.

3. Delete any sets of books that you did not map to a user defined accounting dimension using the BIS Configuration Assistant. The records from the deleted sets of books will not be loaded.

Note: For information on which sets of books you mapped to user-defined accounting dimensions, see Map Sources to Dimensions on page 2-33.

4. Save your work.

Note: You will not be able to save your work if you have frozen your warehouse parameters. If your parameters are frozen, unfreeze your parameters, then save your work. For more information on freezing your parameters, see: Set Up Warehouse Parameters on page 2-11.

5. Verify that the data was populated properly in each source system.

Set Up Consolidation Set of Books

Once you set up your source set of books, you must map the relationship between a parent and child set of books. Any set of books that has a consolidation relationship between segments should be mapped.

Note: If the relationship between a parent and child set of books has multiple consolidation rules, you can only choose one consolidation rule. For more information on consolidation rules, see the *Oracle General Ledger User Guide*.

To set up the consolidation sets of books, do the following:

1. Navigate to Setup > Value-Based Hierarchy Setup > Consolidation Set of Books Setup. The Consolidation Set of Books Setup Window appears.

- **2.** In the Instance field, choose the instance that contains the parent and child sets of books.
- **3.** In the Child Set of Books field, choose the set of books that is the child set of books. If there is only one parent set of books for the child set of books, the Parent Set of Books field is automatically populated.
- **4.** If there is more than one parent set of books, in the Parent Set of Books field, choose a set of books that you want to use for consolidation. If there is only one

consolidation rule defined between the parent and child set of books, the Consolidation Name field is automatically populated.

Note: The window will not prevent you from choosing more than one consolidation rule. If you choose more than one consolidation rule between a parent and child set of books, only the first consolidation rule will apply to the data load.

5. Save your work.

Set Up Equivalent Set of Books

If a parent and a child set of books reside in different instances, you must define an equivalent set of books.

To set up an equivalent set of books, do the following:

- 1. Navigate to Setup > Value-Based Hierarchy Setup > Equivalent Set of Books Setup. The Equivalent Set of Books window appears.
- **2.** In the Parent Instance field, choose the Parent Instance that you want to use. The Parent Set of Books field is automatically populated.
- **3.** In the Equivalent Child Instance field, choose the child instance that you want to define an equivalent set of books for. The Equivalent Child Set of Books field is automatically populated..
- **4.** Repeat steps 2 to 3 for each equivalent set of books relationship that you want to define.
- 5. Save your work.

Set Up Hierarchy Root Nodes

The next step to setting up a value based hierarchy is to assign root nodes for hierarchies.

To determine how you should define a root node for a hierarchy, you must consider the flexfield segment rollup rules, which were defined when you set up your GL Consolidation Definition. (For more information on setting up flexfield segment rollup rules, see the *Oracle General Ledger User Guide*.)

Available segment rollup rules are:

- 1. Copy value from child set of books
- 2. Assign single value
- 3. Use rollup rules from detail transfer level using detail ranges
- 4. Use rollup rules from detail transfer level using parent ranges
- 5. Use rollup rules from summary transfer level using detail ranges
- 6. Use rollup rules from summary transfer level using parent ranges

If you are using consolidation rules 1, 2, 3 or 4, you can set up your hierarchy root nodes at the parent segment value hierarchy level and it will apply to all child sets of books.

If you are using consolidation rules 5 or 6, or if no consolidation relationship exists, you must set up your hierarchy root nodes by choosing the root level node for each set of books. In this case, all of the segment values that are not mapped to one of the four top level nodes in hierarchies will roll up to NA_EDW.

Choose the highest level node whenever possible, because the data will be aggregated at that level by the defined hierarchies.

To set up hierarchy root level nodes, do the following:

1. Navigate to Setup > Value-Based Hierarchy Setup > VBH Hierarchy Root Setup. The Value Based Hierarchy Root Setup Window appears.

2. In the Instance field, choose the instance. If flexfield segment rollup rules 1, 2, 3 or 4 apply, the instance is the instance that the parent set of books resides in. If the other flexfield segment rollup rules apply, the instance is the instance that the child set of books resides in.

3. In the Set of Books field, choose a set of books.

4. In the Segment field, choose the segment. The Dimension Name field is automatically selected.

5. In each of the Hierarchy Root fields, select a node that you want to use.

You can select up to 4 nodes and each node can be from a different level. For example, in the Hierarchy 1 Root field, you can select a node which is in the lowest level (leaf level). In the Hierarchy 2 Root field, you can select a top level (root level) node. In the Hierarchy 3 Root field, you can select a middle level (branch level) node. Nodes that are not included in any of the 4 hierarchies will become orphan nodes. These nodes become individual rows outside of any of these 4 hierarchy structures.

- **6.** Save your work.
- 7. Repeat steps 1 to 6 for every segment and set of books combination.

Set Up Types

You can set up types to summarize your data on a more granular level.

Note: Do not define hierarchical relationships between types.

To set up types, do the following:

- 1. Navigate to Setup > Value-Based Hierarchy Setup > VBH Type Setup. The VBH Type Setup window appears.
- 2. In the Type field, enter the name of the type that you want to define.
- **3.** In the Instance field, choose the instance that you want to define a type for.
- **4.** In the Set of Books field, choose the set of books that you want to define a type for.
- **5.** In the Segment field, choose the flexfield segment that you want to define a type for. The Warehouse Dimension field is automatically populated based on the chosen segment field.
- 6. In the Value field, assign a value to the type.

For example, if you are defining the Revenue type, the value should be a rollup level account number that represents Revenue type. If there is more than one rollup level account number representing Revenue type, every rollup level account number has to be set up as one row in this window.

- **7.** Repeat steps 1 to 6 for each type you want to set up on each instance and set of books.
- 8. Save your work.

This completes the steps that you need to do to set up your GL value based hierarchies.

Set Up Units of Measure

This section describes how to set up units of measure (UOMs) on your source systems and warehouse.

UOMs are used by a variety of applications to express the quantity of items or terms. UOMs are not organization-specific.

Each database instance can have a different set of UOMs. Therefore, when you set up your warehouse, you must define the set of UOMs that you want to use on the warehouse instance. You must also define conversion rates between the warehouse units of measure and the source units of measure (instance UOMs).

Note: You cannot define warehouse UOMs, unless you have already defined UOMs on every source instance.

When you define your set of warehouse UOMs, you must define:

- **Base UOMs** which serve as the base unit of measurement for all related warehouse UOMs. For example a base UOM might be Gallon.
- Warehouse UOMs which express the quantity of items or terms on the warehouse across all source systems. Each warehouse UOM must be related to a base UOM. The value of a warehouse UOM is calculated using the base UOM and a conversion rate. For example, if you have a base UOM of Gallon, the related warehouse UOMs might be Pint and Quart. Since there are eight Pints and four Quarts in a Gallon, the conversion rates would be 0.125 and 0.25, respectively.

If a UOM is standard across all instances and interpreted uniformly, then you can set Global field to Y and the UOM becomes a *global warehouse UOM*.

For example, if you set up kilometer as a base UOM, you could set up meter as a related warehouse UOM with a conversion rate of 0.001.

After you define your warehouse UOMs, you must map the UOMs from the source instance (known as **Instance UOMs**) to the warehouse UOMs. Instance UOMs may or may not differ from your base and warehouse UOMs. For example, you can use inches and feet as UOMs on the source instance, but you may use centimeter and meter as UOMs on the warehouse.

If your instance UOMs are not the same as your warehouse UOMs, then you must map the instance UOMs to the warehouse UOMs and specify a conversion rate.

If the instance UOMs are the same as your warehouse UOMs, and the warehouse UOM is a global warehouse UOM, then you do not have to map the source instance.

In general, when you set up your UOMs you must do so in the following order:

- **1.** Set up base UOMs
- 2. Set up warehouse UOMs and global warehouse UOMs
- 3. Map instance UOMs to global warehouse UOMs

To successfully load data from your source instances to the warehouse, you must map the instance UOMs on each source system to your warehouse UOMs and specify a conversion rate.

If the UOM is a global warehouse UOM, you do not have to map instance UOMs to warehouse UOMs. If you have only one source instance, then you can define each of your instance UOMs as global UOMs on the warehouse and skip the instance mapping

Set Up UOMs

The first step to setting up UOMs, is to define the base and warehouse UOMs that you are going to use.

Always define your base UOMs before you define your warehouse UOMs.

To set up base and warehouse UOMs, do the following:

- 1. Navigate to Setup > UOM > Global UOM. The Find Warehouse UOMs window appears.
- **2.** To create a new UOM, choose the New button. The Warehouse UOM window appears.

- **3.** In the UOM field, enter a unique short code for the UOM. For example, KG for kilogram or FT for feet.
- **4.** In the UOM Name field, enter a unique long name for the UOM. For example, Kilogram or Foot.
- **5.** In the Description field, enter a description for the field if necessary. This is an optional field.
- 6. If you want the UOM to apply to all source instances, in the Global Flag field, enter Y. If you do not want the UOM to apply to all source instances, enter N. If you enter Y, you will not have to map the warehouse UOM to the instance UOMs.

Note: If you change the Global Flag from Y to N for a predefined UOM, the conversion rate information will be lost.

7. In the Conversion Rate field, enter a conversion rate for the UOM. If the UOM is a base UOM, enter a conversion rate of 1. If the UOM is a warehouse UOM, enter a conversion rate relative to the base UOM. For example, if the base UOM

is kilometer, and you are defining a warehouse UOM of meter, then you would specify a conversion rate of .001.

Note: You must define base UOMs before you can define warehouse UOMs.

- **8.** If the UOM is a base UOM, in the Base UOM field enter the short code for the UOM. You defined the short code for the UOM in step 3.
- 9. Save your work.
- **10.** Run the Load UOM Dimension concurrent program. The UOMs that you defined are loaded to the warehouse. For more information on running concurrent programs, see the *Oracle Applications User Guide*.

Note: You will not be able to see the UOM that you just created in the Warehouse UOM window until you run the Load UOM Dimension concurrent program.

11. Verify that the UOM definitions are correct by doing a find in the Find Warehouse UOMs window.

Map Instance UOMs to Warehouse UOMs

If your instance UOMs differ from your warehouse UOMs, you must map those instance UOMs to the warehouse UOM.

Instance UOMs are any units of measure that exist on the warehouse and that will be loaded to the warehouse.

To map instance UOMs to warehouse UOMs, do the following:

- 1. Navigate to Setup > UOM > Instance UOM Mapping. The Find Instance UOMs window appears.
- **2.** Leave all fields blank and choose the Find button. The Instance UOM Conversion window appears.

All of the UOMs from all source instances collected and not collected to the warehouse are displayed.

You can narrow the selection by choosing a value in the Instance Identifier, Inventory Item Identifier, Instance UOM, or New or Modified field.

In the New or Modified field you can choose one of the following values:

- All: Choose All if you want to display all values that were or were not collected to the warehouse.
- New: Choose New if you want to display only values that were not collected to the warehouse.
- **Modified:** Choose Modified if you want to display only values that were collected to the warehouse.

3. Choose the Warehouse UOM tabbed region.

The Instance Identifier, Instance UOM, and Warehouse Base UOM fields are all grayed out.

If an instance UOM matches a warehouse UOM and the Global Flag field for the warehouse instance is set to Y, the row that contains the instance UOM is grayed out and you do not have to map the instance UOM.

However, if an instance UOM does not match a warehouse UOM, or if it matches the warehouse UOM but the Global Flag field is set to N for the warehouse instance, you must map the instance UOM.

- 4. For each instance UOM that you must map, do the following:
 - **a.** In the Warehouse UOM field, select the warehouse UOM that you want to map the instance UOM to.
 - **b.** In the Warehouse Conversion Rate field, enter the conversion rate that you want to use to convert the instance UOM to the warehouse's base UOM.

For example, if PA-Days is an instance UOM, map the instance UOM to the warehouse UOM: Days. Then, because the Days warehouse UOM is based on the HR base UOM, enter a conversion rate of 24.

c. Repeat steps a to b for each instance UOM that needs to be mapped.

- **5.** Save your work. A reminder window appears. Choose the OK button to close the window.
- **6.** Run the UOM Conversion Fact concurrent program on the warehouse. For more information on running concurrent programs, see the *Oracle Applications User Guide*.

Note: If an instance UOM has been collected more than once, then multiple records for that UOM will exist in the Instance UOM Conversion window. To ensure that you only update one version of the record, ensure that the EDW Duplicate Records Load profile is set up properly and run before you run the UOM Conversion Fact concurrent program, see: Set Up Profile Options on page 2-15.

Set Up Base UOM Mapping

You can map base UOMs to one another so you can update inter-class conversion data. For example, if you have 2 base UOMs, Kilogram and Pound, you can map each base UOM to one another and specify a conversion rate. (This window acts on the UOM Conversion Fact table rows that have the Class Conversion Flag set to Y.)

Note that any custom collection programs that you create to populate the UOM Conversion Fact table and that include conversions between instance UOMs and base UOMs, should have the Class Conversion Flag set to N.

The information shown here is based on the inter-class data collected from the OLTP systems. You can use this window to update inter class EDW base UOMs and conversion rates at the instance and item level.

To map your base UOMs, do the following:

- 1. Navigate to Setup > UOM > Base UOM Mapping. The Find Instance UOMs window appears.
- **2.** Leave all fields blank and choose the Find button. The Base UOM Mapping window appears listing all of the available base UOMs.
- 3. For each base UOM that you want to map, do the following:
 - **a.** In the Instance Identifier field, choose the instance where the data comes from.
 - **b.** In the Item Identifier field, choose the item that the inter-class conversion is defined for.
 - **c.** In the From Warehouse Base UOM field, enter the base UOM that you want to convert the data from.
 - **d.** In the To Warehouse Base UOM field, enter the base UOM that you want to convert data to.
 - **e.** In the Conversion Rate field, enter the conversion rate that you want to use to convert the From UOM to the To UOM.
- 4. Save your work.
- **5.** Run the Load UOM Conversion Fact concurrent program on the warehouse. For more information on running concurrent programs, see the *Oracle Applications User Guide*.

This completes the steps that you need to do to set up your Units of Measure.

Set Up Purchasing Intelligence

If you are implementing Purchasing Intelligence, you must set up responsibilities, custom measure surveys, and profile options for that intelligence area on the source systems.

This section contains the following topics.

Set Up Purchasing Intelligence Responsibilities

Before you can set up a custom measure survey, or set up the Purchasing Intelligence profile options, you must have a Purchasing Intelligence responsibility on each source system. The available responsibilities are:

- Purchasing Intelligence Enterprise Data Warehouse: Provides the user with access to the Purchasing Intelligence workbooks without Dun and Bradstreet data. Add this responsibility to users in the warehouse.
- Purchasing Intelligence Enterprise Data Warehouse (D&B Enabled): Provides the user with access to the Purchasing Intelligence workbooks with Dun and Bradstreet data. Add this responsibility to users in the warehouse.
- **Purchasing Intelligence User:** Provides the user with access to the Manage Survey window. Users with the responsibility can create custom measure surveys. Add this responsibility to users in the source systems.
- Purchasing Intelligence Survey: Provides access to users who need to enter custom measure survey data. Add this responsibility to users in the source systems. The responsibility is accessed through Oracle Self Service Applications.

For information on how to set up responsibilities in Oracle Applications, see the *Oracle Applications User Guide*.

Set up Custom Measure Survey

The Purchasing Intelligence custom measure survey captures subjective information about supplier performance. Users can create surveys on any Oracle Applications instance. Surveys can only be given from the instance that they were created on.

You can create different types of surveys to meet your organization's specific needs. Two entities are considered when you define surveys: the operating unit that geneartes the survey response; the commodity purchased from the supplier. The survey levels are as follows:

- Global: The survey applies to all operating units and all commodities on site.
- Operating Unit: The survey is applicable to a specific operating unit which originates the survey response, for all commodities purchased by that operating unit.
- Commodity: The survey is applicable to a specific commodity purchased from the supplier for all operating units that purchase it.
- Operating Unit and Commodity: The survey is applicable to a specific commodity purchased by the operating unit.

The survey type defines the scope of the survey. This enables you to select what type of survey you want to use for the specific supplier. For example, you can measure a supplier's custom measure performance for the entire enterprise; or you can measure a supplier's performance for a commodity ordered from a particular operating unit.

You can specify the operating unit and commodity when you enter a survey response. These parameters define the scope of the survey response; whether it's a general experience with a particular supplier or limited to a specific commodity purchased from the supplier by this operating unit. Based on these parameters, the system determines which survey is applicable.

The survey level order of precedence determines which survey will be used when there is more than one survey that is applicable. There are two possible orders:

- Commodity, Operating Unit, Global
- Operating Unit, Commodity, Global

The system first tries to find a survey that is a perfect match for the survey response parameters; if none exists, it matches the survey based on the order the entities appear in the order of precedence. For example, if you set the precedence to Operating Unit, Commodity, Global and you define the following surveys:

- Survey 1 for Operating Unit 1 and Commodity 1
- Survey 2 for only Operating Unit 1
- Survey 3 for only Commodity 2
- Survey 4 for Global (no Operating Unit or Commodity specified)

The following table shows which surveys will be used for the Operating Unit and Commodity combinations specified.

Table 2–4 Commodities Example

To create custom surveys, do the following:

- 1. Log in to Oracle Applications on the source system using the system administrator responsibility and do the following:
 - Assign the Purchasing Intelligence User responsibility to anyone who needs the ability to create a survey.
 - Assign the Purchasing Intelligence Survey responsibility to anyone who needs the ability to enter survey information.
- **2.** To create the survey questions, log into Oracle Applications on the source system using any responsibility that has access to the Lookup Code window.
- **3.** Navigate to Setup > Purchasing > Lookup Codes. The Lookup Codes window appears.
- **4.** For each survey question that you want to define, enter the following information:
 - a. In the Type field, enter Customer Satisfaction Evaluation Criteria.
 - **b.** Then, in the other fields, enter the name of the question as you would like it to appear on the survey, a description of the question, and the date the question becomes inactive.

- **c.** Repeat steps a to b for each question you want to define. You can define questions for multiple surveys at the same time.
- **5.** Log in to the Oracle Applications on the source system where you want to create the survey using the Purchasing Intelligence User responsibility.
- 6. Navigate to Manage Survey. The Find Survey window appears.
- **7.** In the Find Survey window, enter the operating unit, or commodity, or both that you want to define the survey for and choose the Find button.

If a survey definition already exists for this level, it will appear in the Define Survey window. If no records appear, a survey does not exist for the level and you can define a new survey.

You can define a survey at the following levels:

- Global: Do not specify an operating unit or commodity.
- Operating Unit: Specify the operating unit, do not specify a commodity.
- Commodity: Specify a commodity, do not specify an operating unit.
- Operating Unit and Commodity: specify an operating unit and commodity.
- 8. For each question that you want to include on the survey, do the following:
 - a. Choose a question from the list of values.
 - **b.** Assign the question a minimum and maximum score.
 - **c.** Assign the question a weight. Questions should be weighted so that the total weight for all of the questions is equal to 100.
- **9.** Log in to Oracle Applications on the source system using the System Administrator responsibility.
- **10.** Navigate to Profile > System.
- **11.** Set the PO: custome Measure Precedence profile option value to set the order of precedence to determine which survey to use. You can chose one of the following options.
 - Commodity, Operating Unit, Global
 - Operating Unit, Commodity, Global
- **12.** Save your work.

Once you have defined your surveys users can enter the survey responses by logging into Oracle Self Service Applications in the source system using the Purchasing Intelligence Survey responsibility.

Set Up Purchasing Intelligence Profile Options

If you are using Purchasing Intelligence, you can set up the following Purchasing Intelligence profile options.

To set up the Purchasing Intelligence profile options, do the following:

- **1.** Log into the warehouse or source instance using the system administrator responsibility.
- 2. Navigate to Personal Profile Values. A Find window appears.
- **3.** Find the Purchasing Intelligence profile options by entering %POA% in the Find field. Choose the Find button.

4. Modify the profile option values as necessary. The following table describes each of the Purchasing Intelligence profile options

This completes the steps that you need to do to set up Purchasing Intelligence.

Configure Warehouse Security

You can set up row-level security in the warehouse. By default, responsibilities can access all rows of a fact table. However, you can define the dimension level values that a responsibility has access to. When the user logs in as this responsibility, and performs a query on a fact table, the query will return only the rows in the fact table that are associated with the dimension level values that the responsibility has access to.

You can set up a responsibility to access multiple values for a given dimension level. For example, the Time dimension has 3 values: Order Date, Ship Date, and Invoice Date. If a responsibility has access to YR2001 data, the responsibility can only access the Order Dates, Ship Dates, or Invoice Dates in the year 2001. If a transaction is ordered and shipped within year 2001, but invoiced in year 2002, this responsibility will not have the access to this transaction.

To define security for a dimension, you must define the level in the dimension that you want to grant access to, and then define the value that you want to grant access to. The responsibility will be able to access all children of the dimension level that you specify.

For example, the GL period hierarchy in the Time dimension has 6 levels. These levels are calendar day, calendar period, calendar quarter, calendar year, calendar name, and all time. If you restrict a responsibility to the calendar year level and the values 1999, 2000, and 2001, the responsibility will be able to access any quarter, period, or day, in 1999, 2000, and 2001.

If multiple dimension level accesses are granted to a responsibility, the higher-level access will supersede the lower-level access. For example, if a responsibility is granted access to 4th quarter for the year 2000, but the user already has access to the calendar year level for 2001, the user will have access to all quarters, all periods, and all days in year 2000. Because the year level privileges are higher than quarter level privileges, the 4th quarter privileges are no longer applicable.

Ensure that your security definitions simple. Depending on which Oracle database version you are using, the database limits the length of the predicate (Where clause) that is used by the security function. The maximum length of the predicate returned by security function is 2000 characters for Oracle v8.1.6x database and 4000 characters for Oracle v8.1.7.x database.

The predicate length is not affected by the number of access values in same level; however, if you define security on large number of dimensions or large number of levels within a dimension, you may exceed the maximum predicate length for your database version. Whenever you exceed the maximum predicate length, you will not be able to query data and you will get the following error in Oracle Discoverer:

```
"Failed to execute policy function".
```

The detailed error message is logged in the EDW_ERROR_LOG table. To view the error message, query the EDW_ERROR_LOG table with condition 'where object_type = 'Security Procedure'. If the predicate has exceeded the maximum length, the following message appears:

```
"Predicate length exceeds maximum allowable limit".
```

Additional Information: You can also use the Oracle Applications security features to set up security for your users and responsibilities. For more information on configuring security for users and responsibilities, see the *Oracle Applications User Guide*.

Setup Security

If you want to restrict responsibilities to certain levels and values of data in your data warehouse, you must set up row-level security.

To set up row-level security, do the following:

1. Navigate to Setup > Security. The EDW Security Setup window appears.

2. In the Responsibility field, select a responsibility, for which you want to restrict the data access. The Application field is automatically populated.

Additional Information: For information on how to create new responsibilities in Oracle Applications, see the Oracle Applications *System Administrators Guide.*

- 3. In the Dimension field, choose the dimension that you want to grant access to.
- 4. In the Level field, choose the dimension level that you want to restrict access to.
- 5. In the Access Value field, enter the value that you want to grant access to.

Note: You cannot specify a range in the Access Value field. Therefore, if you want to grant a user access to data for 3 years (for example, 1999, 2000, and 2001), you must create 3 separate entries in the EDW Security Setup window.

- 6. Repeat steps 2 to 5 for each security policy you want to set.
- **7.** Register the security policies by running the Add EDW Security Policy to Fact concurrent program. For information on how to run a concurrent program, see the *Oracle Applications User Guide*.

Note: If you want to de-register a security policy you can run the Remove EDW Security Policy from Fact concurrent program.

8. Verify that the security policies were registered properly by reviewing the error log files. Error logs relating to security issues are stored in the EDW_ERROR_LOG table. The following table lists the subject type and names that you can use to query the error logs.

Note: Ensure that your security definitions simple. Overview of Loading Data


This section describes how the data loading process works in EDW. It also provides a checklist of the steps that you must follow to successfully load your data.

To successfully load data, you must:

- Collect data from sources
- Load data to warehouse

Figure 3–1, "EDW Data Loading Architecture" below depicts the collect and load process.





To ensure that your data load is successful, you can also monitor your collect and load process by reviewing the log tables and by using the data monitoring tools that are provided with EDW.

The following sections provide high-level information about how the collect and load processes work and about how you can monitor these processes using the tools provided.

Collecting Data from Sources

To collect data, you must run the EDW collection programs on each source system that you want to collect data from. These programs extract transactional data from the source system tables using database views. Database views collect fact data from the transactional tables at the correct level of granularity for the warehouse. They also collect dimension-level data from the correct transactional tables.

Because the collection process decouples the source systems from the warehouse, you can:

- Collect data from multiple source systems at the same time
- Collect data from different source systems at different times

Loading Data to Warehouse

Once you collect data from the source systems, you must load data to the warehouse by running the EDW loader programs. These programs move the data from the interface tables to the fact, dimension and dimension level tables.

When you load data, keep the following rules in mind.

1. How much historical data do you want to load?

For each time period, how much historical data do you want to load from the source systems into the warehouse. If the volume of data is large, plan on dividing the history load into smaller time periods.

2. How frequently do you want to load data?

For each fact and dimension-level table, determine how often incremental data should be loaded to allow for an effective warehouse. Some facts and dimensions may need to be loaded on a daily or hourly basis, and others may need to be loaded on a weekly or monthly basis.

3. Are there any dependencies between dimensions and facts?

For each fact and dimension-level table, determine if the fact is dependent on any dimensions. If a dependency exists, then if a fact needs to be loaded every day, then all the supporting dimensions need to be loaded every day, before the fact data is loaded. When you load data, you must load it in the following order:

- Dimensions, including Dun and Bradstreet dimensions
- Facts

Loading data in this order prevents problems with dangling records.

Loader Engine

When you run the loader programs, the loader engine processes the records, and checks the data for errors such as dangling foreign keys and other data integrity problems such as duplicate rows. If the data is error-free, data is loaded into the facts, dimensions, and dimension-level tables in the warehouse.

If the loaded data has errors, such as duplicate records, dangling records, or other errors, the loader engine will change the status of the records in the interface tables. You can use the Status Viewer to monitor progress of the load.

Monitoring Collect and Load Processes

You can monitor the success of your data collect and data load processes by using the Status Viewer and Interface Table Manager tools, or by reviewing the log tables on the warehouse.

The *Status Viewer* enables you to view the results of collections and loads from each of the source instances in the interface tables. The status viewer displays the number of records collected and loaded for each fact and dimension from each source instance. You can also use this status viewer to find out how long each collect and load process took.

You can also use the status viewer to monitor the progress of the load. The Load Progress monitor is constantly updated as new activities are started.

The *interface table manager* enables you to query the interface table entries for the facts and dimensions that were collected.

The log tables store information about the collect and load process, such as the time data was collected and loaded, the number of rows that were collected and loaded, and whether or not the collect and load processes were successful.

It is good practice to periodically verify the validity of the data collected from the source systems and loaded to the warehouse.

Validate Data

Once you collect and load your data, you must validate the data in the interface tables to ensure that you did not have any errors due to dangling or duplicate records.

Dangling Records

When data is loaded from interface tables to the star tables on the warehouse, the loader engine validate the foreign key reference. If the record's foreign key has an invalid value, the loader engine will not transfer the record into its related star table. This record will be left in the interface table and the collection_status field will be updated to 'DANGLING'.

There are two types of dangling records that can occur.

- **Dimension level dangling**: An invalid foreign key reference exists from child dimension level record to parent dimension level record.
- **Fact to dimension dangling**: An invalid foreign key reference exists from the fact record to dimension record.

There are two major causes for the dangling records.

1. **Missing date range:** For dimension level dangling, if the child level data of a specific dimension is collected into the interface table while its related parent level data which might be created earlier is not included in the collection date range, when the loader engine validate the child record it could not find its parent in the interface table, the record will be marked as dangling.

For example, for Trade Partner dimension, the Trade Partner is the parent level of Trade Partner Location. One Trade Partner value could be created in 1999 while its location value is created in 2000. If for some reason, you only collected the trade partner dimension for the year 2000, all the Location records would be marked as dangling since their foreign key reference to their parent level data Trade Partner are invalid.

2. Transaction data corruption: Sometimes, even your collection date range covered all the possible data, you still find dangling records. That could be caused by the transaction data corruption.

For example, one transaction record was created in 2000, but due to the Y2K problem the last_update_date was updated as 1900. In this case, the user should fix the corrupted transaction data before they proceed recollecting the data.

Tips for Avoiding Dangling Records

 To avoid dimension level dangling, always collect/load dimesion data forward and not backward.

For example, your company started at 1960, you should collect all your dimensions from 1960 to current date.

 To avoid fact to dimension dangling, always collect and load all dimensions before you collect and load facts.

Duplicate Records

Duplicate record errors will occur if you set the EDW:Duplicate Records Loaded profile option to No. If you have this profile option set to No, then the loader engine will reject any duplicate records that are loaded to the warehouse. See: Set Up Profile Options on page 2-15.

To fix duplicate record errors, you must either fix the problem on the source systems, or you must modify the data in the interface tables. For more information on how to modify data in the interface tables, see: Use the Interface Table Manager to Monitor and Update Data on page 3-16.

Test Collect and Load Process

Use a small set of data to test the collect and load process before you try to collect and load all of your data. This test will ensure that you have set up your source and warehouse information correctly.

To perform the test, follow the instructions in Collect and Load Data on page 3-9, and use a small data set that includes dimensions, Dun and Bradstreet dimensions (if applicable), and facts.

Use the Status Viewer and the Interface Table Manager to monitor the progress of your test collect and load and ensure that the data has loaded correctly.

Attention: Ensure that the instance UOMs and warehouse UOMs are set up before you load your data. See: Set Up Units of Measure on page 2-87.

Collect and Load Data

Collect your data first. Then, load your data in the following order:

- Dimensions, including Dun and Bradstreet Dimensions
- Facts

Collect and Load Dimensions

Dimensions are the first objects that must be collected and loaded to the warehouse.

If you are using the DUNS and UNSPSC dimensions, you must collect and load your Dun and Bradstreet data separately from your other dimensions. Collect and load Dun and Bradstreet data after you collect and load dimensions, but before you collect and load facts to the warehouse.

To collect and load Dun and Bradstreet data, you must export your supplier and item data into text files and send the files to Dun and Bradstreet for processing. Dun and Bradstreet will then return a text file containing information about your suppliers and items. Once you receive the file from Dun and Bradstreet, you can load your data to the warehouse.

To collect and load dimensions, do the following:

- 1. In the source system that you are collecting data from, ensure that the concurrent manager has write privileges to directory APPLTMP.
- 2. Run the collection programs. The collection programs collect data from the source system and move it to the interface tables on the warehouse. For a complete list of the collection programs provided with EDW, see: Appendix B, "Concurrent Programs".
- **3.** On the warehouse, use the Status Viewer tools to monitor the progress of the collection. For more information, see: Use the Status Viewer to Monitor Collect and Load Status on page 3-13.
- **4.** Run the load programs to load the data from interface tables into the dimension tables. For a complete list of the load programs provided with EDW, see: Appendix B, "Concurrent Programs".
- **5.** On the warehouse, use the Status Viewer tools to monitor the progress of the load. For more information, see: Use the Status Viewer to Monitor Collect and Load Status on page 3-13.

- 6. On the warehouse, use the Interface Table Manager to view and manage the data that was loaded. For more information, see: Use the Interface Table Manager to Monitor and Update Data on page 3-16.
- **7.** Repeat steps 1 to 6 for each source that you want to collect and load dimensions from.

To collect and load Dun and Bradstreet dimensions, do the following:

- 1. In the warehouse, run the following concurrent programs:
 - Generate Item List
 - Generate Trading Partner List

The following files are generated and stored in the directory where your concurrent request output files are stored.

- <user name>.<concurrent request id for Generate Item List>
- <user name>.<concurrent request id for Generate Trade Partner List>

Note: The user name is determined by your Oracle Applications login. The concurrent request ID is assigned by the application when the concurrent request is submitted.

- 2. Rename output files using the following format:
 - EDW_ITEMS_<Dun and Bradstreet account number>.csv
 - EDW_TRPR_<Dun and Bradstreet account number>.csv
- 3. Send these files to Dun and Bradstreet.

Dun and Bradstreet will add their data to these files and send them back to you.

4. Place the data files that you receive from Dun and Bradstreet into the directory where log files for the target warehouse concurrent processes are stored.

Note: You must register the warehouse as a source before you load the Dun and Bradstreet dimensions (see: Set Up Source Systems on Warehouse on page 2-10). Otherwise, the collection programs will fail.

5. Run the following concurrent programs as single requests in the order listed:

- Upload DUNS Dimension
- Upload UNSPSC Dimension
- Collect DUNS Dimension
- Collect UNSPSC Dimension
- Load DUNS Dimension
- Load UNSPSC Dimension

Existing records in the Purchasing Intelligence fact tables, that have trading partner or item information, are updated when the loader requests are run.

- 6. On the warehouse, use the Status Viewer tools to monitor the progress of the collect and load process. For more information, see Use the Status Viewer to Monitor Collect and Load Status on page 3-13.
- 7. On the warehouse, use the Interface Table Manager to view and manage the data that was collected and loaded. For more information, see: Use the Interface Table Manager to Monitor and Update Data on page 3-16.

Collect and Load Facts

After you have loaded your dimensions and your Dun and Bradstreet dimensions, load your facts to the warehouse.

Before you start to load your facts, ensure that:

- Test load was successful and any problems with profile options, UOMs, or flexfields have been resolved
- All dimensions were successfully loaded

To load facts, do the following:

- 1. In the source system, run the fact collection programs. The programs collect fact data from the source system and move it to the interface tables on the warehouse. For a complete list of the collection programs provided with EDW, see: Appendix B, "Concurrent Programs".
- **2.** Use the Status Viewer to ensure that the data was successfully collected. For more information, see: Use the Status Viewer to Monitor Collect and Load Status on page 3-13.
- **3.** On the warehouse, run the load programs to load data from the interface tables to the fact tables. For a complete list of the load programs provided with EDW, see: Appendix B, "Concurrent Programs".
- **4.** Use the Status Viewer to ensure that the data was successfully collected and loaded. For more information, see: Use the Status Viewer to Monitor Collect and Load Status on page 3-13.
- **5.** Use the Interface Table Manager to ensure that all of the data was correctly loaded. For more information, see Use the Interface Table Manager to Monitor and Update Data on page 3-16.
- **6.** Repeat steps 1 to 5 for each source that you want to collect and load dimensions from.

Use the Status Viewer to Monitor Collect and Load Status

Use the status viewer to view the status of your collect and load processes.

To view the status of a collect or load, do the following:

1. Navigate to Administer > Status Viewer. The Status Viewer window appears.

Status Viewer Window Reference

This section describes the regions and fields in the Status Viewer window.

Collection Status Tabbed Region

Instance Name: The instance from which the object was collected.

Object Type Region: The object type for the collection.

Object Name: Name of the object collected.

Collection Status: Status of the object collected. The status can be Error, Success, or Partial.

Number Collected: The total of the number of records collected.

Execution Time: The total time for the collection in HH:MM:SS format.

Message: The message that was generated by the collection. Usually, it is the error message, if any.

Start Date: The date and time the collection started.

End Date: The date and time the collection ended.

Start Period: The start date of the time range for the collection.

End Period: The end date of the time range for the collection.

Concurrent ID: The concurrent request ID for the collection.

Load Status Tabbed Region

Object Type Region: The object type for the load. The object type can be either Dimensions or Facts.

Object Name: The name of the object loaded.

Status: The status of the object load. The status can be Partial, Success, or Error.

Number Processed: Total number of records that were successfully loaded.

Execution Time: The total time for the load in HH:MM:SS format.

Loader Message: This field displays the load status for each of the records. The following is a list of some possible messages:

- **Ready records:** the number of records that were collected and ready to be loaded prior to load program execution.
- **Processed records:** The number of records that were successfully processed by the load program.
- Actually Collected: The number of records that were successfully loaded by the load program.
- **Dangling records:** The number of records in a fact table that have dangling foreign keys.
- **Duplicated records:** The number of records that have duplicated primary keys.
- **Error records:** The number of records that could not be loaded due to errors.

Start Date: The start date and time for the load.

End Date: The end date and time for the load.

Concurrent ID: The concurrent request ID for the load.

Progress button: Choose this button to open the Load Progress window. For more information, see the Load Progress Window Reference.

Load Progress Window Reference

This section describes the Load Progress window.

Object Name: The name of the object currently selected on the Load Status window.

Load Progress: The action performed by the loader engine.

Start Time: The start date and time of the loader engine action.

End Time: The end date and time of the loader engine action.

Duration: Duration of this action in HH:MM:SS format.

Refresh Data button: Choose this button to refresh the contents of the Load Progress window.

Use the Interface Table Manager to Monitor and Update Data

Use the Interface Table Manager to monitor and update the dimension and fact data in the interface tables. You can use the Interface Manager to view the data in the interface tables before running the load programs. If necessary, you can also use the Interface Table Manager to update the data.

Monitor and Update Dimensions

You can use the interface table manager to enable verifications for dimensions, create filters for a specific dimension column, update the value of a dimension column, or delete a dimension.

To use the interface table manager with dimensions, do the following:

- 1. Navigate to Administer > Interface Table > Manager. The Manager window appears.
- 2. Choose the Dimensions tabbed region.
- 3. In the Dimension field, choose the dimension that you want to view.
- **4.** In the Level field, choose the dimension level that you want to view. The first 15 records for the specified dimension and dimension level appear.
- **5.** If you want to view more records for the selected dimension, choose the Next Set button. The next set of 15 records appear.
- 6. If you want to enable verification for dimensions, do the following.
 - a. Choose the Columns button. The Choose Columns window appears.

- **b.** If you want to remove a column from the fact verification process, disable the check box next to column. Choose the OK button to save your changes and close the Choose Columns window. The Manager window appears.

- **b.** In the Column field, choose the column that you want to update.

Validate Collect and Load Data

Once you collect or load your data, you can validate the data in the interface tables and check your data for dangling and duplicate records.

You must also fix any dangling or duplicate record problems that you may have.

Note: Only validate base facts. Do not validate derived or summarized facts. The validation concurrent programs check against interface tables and only base facts are collected into interface tables. No interface tables exist for derived/summarized facts since they are populated from base facts.

Valdiate Collect and Load Data

Once you collect and load your data, it is good practice to check the validity of the dimension and fact data using the data validity tools provided with EDW.

Checking Dimension Data Validity

1. Navigate to Administer > Interface Table > Data Validity. The Data Validity window appears.

- 2. Choose the Dimensions tabbed region.
- **3.** If you want to validate the dimension against the parent level tables and it is not the first time you are populating the interface tables, enable the Check Against Level Tables check box in the Options region.

Note: As a rule, do not use the Check Against Level Tables check box the first time you populate the interface tables with data. There will be nothing in the parent level tables to check the dimension against. Use this option only for subsequent data collections.

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- 4. If you want to generate a printed report that lists sample values of dangling and duplicate keys, enabled the Detailed Report check box in the Options region and specify the number of sample values that you want to print in the Sample field below. If you do not check the Detailed Report check box, the report will generate a count of the records with problem keys.

Fix Dangling Records

After you collect and load data, you can check your data validity to find and fix any dangling records that you may have.

To fix dimension level dangling data, do the following:

- **2.** Read the validity checking report to find the dangling level.
- 3. If the dangling record is caused by data corruption, fix the corrupted data.
- **4.** If the dangling record is caused by missing date range, find the missing date date range.
- 5. Recollect the missed and fixed data for the dimension.
- 6. Manually update the dangling records from previous load from 'DANGLING' back to 'READY' by updating the <dimesion level interface table name> as shown.

- 8. Repeat step 2 to 8 until all dangling records are fixed.

To fix fact to dimension dangling, do the following:

- 2. Read the validity checking report to find the dangling foreign key to dimension.
- 3. If the dangling record is caused by data corruption, fix the corrupted data.
- **4.** If the dangling record is caused by missing date range, find the missing date date range.
- 5. Recollect the missed and fixed data for the dimension.
- **6.** Manually update the dangling records from previous load from 'DANGLING' back to 'READY' by updating the <fact interface table name> as shown.

- 7. Reload the data for the fact.
- 8. Repeat step 2 to 8 until all dangling records are fixed.

Fix Duplicate Records

Duplicate record errors will occur if you set the EDW:Duplicate Records Loaded profile option to No. If you have this profile option set to No, then the loader engine will reject any duplicate records that are loaded to the warehouse. See: Set Up Profile Options on page 2-15.

To fix duplicate record errors, you must either fix the problem on the source systems, or you must modify the data in the interface tables. For more information on how to modify data in the interface tables, see: Use the Interface Table Manager to Monitor and Update Data on page 3-16.

Congratulations! After you validate your dimension and your fact data and you fix any dangling data problems, you are now ready to run the loading concurrent programs.

Purge Interface Tables on Warehouse

As a regular maintenance task, you should purge the interface tables on the warehouse after you have completed the data loading process.

To purge interface table information, run the following concurrent programs in the warehouse:

- Purge Fact Interface Table
- Purge Dimension Interface Table

These programs delete records in the interface tables that have been successfully loaded into the warehouse. For more information on running concurrent programs, see the *Oracle Applications User Guide*.

The interface tables that reside on the source systems are automatically purged after the data is collected to the warehouse interface tables.

4 Tuning EDW

Overview of Tuning

Tuning is the process of adjusting the configuration and modifying parameter values to optimize the performance of your EDW system. You can start to tune your system once you have completed the installation and implementation steps. However, you should read this section completely *before* you complete those steps because tuning can impacts the entire EDW system from installation to implementation. This section describes all of the factors that you must consider when you tune EDW and how to tune EDW accordingly.

Performance in an EDW system is affected by many things: the way you plan to install your Operation System (OS) for optimal I/O performance; the way you plan to install your file system for optimal I/O performance; and the way you plan to locate your Oracle database files (database files, redo logs, rollback segment files). For example, you can choose to spread your database files across volumes and minimize your disk I/O contention or you can install a middle tier component. For EDW, it is particularly important to plan the location of your intelligent product data and index tablespaces (for example, FIID and FIIX, or HRD and HRX) and to spread your data files across volumes to minimize disk I/O operation contentions.

When data is collected and loaded into EDW, interface tables are created for each product schema to collect data from the source OLTP system. Therefore, to optimize performance and to avoid disk contention, during the data collection process for a product schema, you should place the data and the index tablespaces (for example, HRD and HRI) on different file system volumes. Also, to minimize contention with the dictionary table space, you should ensure that locally-managed tablespaces have a uniform extent size (PCT_INCREASE = 0). These steps can help to prevent tablespace free space fragmentation.

Suggestion: Create separate tablespaces for large tables (facts, dimensions).

To tune EDW, you must identify all of the factors that affect your performance and modify them. The typical process for tuning EDW is as follows:

- Identify performance bottlenecks
- Gather and analyze statistics
- Set up optimal values for Oracle database init<SID>.ora and EDW-specific parameters
- Set up optimal parameters for database structures.

The following sections provide tips on how to tune your EDW system.

Required Skills Set for Tuning

This guide is not intended to replace the Oracle 8i Performance Tuning Guide, however it does contain some helpful compiled information specifically for tuning EDW. This guide assumes that person who is doing the EDW system tuning has the necessary basic DBA skills, and is familiar with the basics of Oracle Database 8i performance tuning. For more information on how to tune systems, see: *Oracle 8i Performance Tuning Guide*.

Tuning EDW

EDW uses a "star" schema and a number of Oracle 8i features to improve performance, including: bitmap indexes, Star Query Transformation, Parallel Query Option, and Partitioning.

The process of tuning EDW consists of two parts:

- Initial loading
- Evaluating the performance of executing ad-hoc queries (response time) for Discoverer users.

This guide cannot provide all of the parameter values that you will need to obtain acceptable performance for all-possible cases. It does provide suggestions for how to set your parameter values; however, your performance level will also depend on your existing Oracle Applications installation, the number of concurrent users, the amount of data, and other factors.

The process for tuning EDW is closely related to processes for configuring servers and file systems. EDW uses the parallel query option to configure Oracle 8i. Oracle Sever utilizes massively parallel processing (MPP) to execute SQL in a parallel way and start shadow (slave) processes, which speed up the excecution of SQL queries and reduce the overall elapsed time for requests.

When you install EDW you must plan the installation carefully. You must estimate the size of OLTP database, estimate the daily inserted (updated) data, and plan the file systems configuration. The file systems configuration has a significant impact on disk I/O operations.

The initial load process also has an extremely significant impact on I/O. The initial load extracts data from the source system and inserts it into the LSTG tables to:

- Clean data
- Transform data(using LCT tables)

Create dimension tables

The most resource consuming operations that occur during the initial load are select, insert, and sorting (caused by indexing of table columns). The Oracle parameters that directly affect the select, insert, and sorting operations are:

- sort_area_size
- hash_area_size
- shared_pool
- db_block_buffers

Two EDW-specific parameters have a significant impact on overall system performance during the initial load:

- EDW: Degree of Parallelism
- EDW: Loader Engine Commit Size

Six other Oracle parameters impact the overall performance of the database:

- db_block_size
- db_file_multiblock_read_count
- sort_multiblock_read_count
- sort_area_size
- hash_area_size
- shared_pool

Each of these parameters are discussed in futher detail in this section.

The size of the *db_block_size* parameter is specified when you create an Oracle database. The typical value for this parameter is 8192 bytes. For EDW systems, you must set this parameter to 16 KB.

If the *db_file_multiblock_read_count* parameter has a large value it will improve your raw and direct I/O throughput. When you set this parameter, consider the physical layout of the configured file system. If you are using the volume manager to create the striped volume, then the stripe lace size should be ideally:

(Stripe lace size) = (db block size) * (db file multiblock read count)

When you perform the initial load, data is extracted into the LSTG, LCT, <Dimension>_M, <Fact>_F tables using the Oracle Warehouse Builder (OWB)

repository. The initial load process causes a large volume of I/O operations along with intensive sorting (for the creation of indexes). To obtain acceptable performance, you must set up correct parameter values for the *sort_area_size* and the *hash_area_size* parameters. A small sort_area_size parameter value can cause disk sorting, and result in performance degradation.

If you want to monitor disk sorting, use the following script:

```
select * from v$sort_usage;
select * from v$sort_segment;
select * from v$sysstat where the name is like "%sort%"
```

The EDW loader engine uses dynamic SQL, so you should set up the *cursor_sharing parameter value* to equal FORCE. This parameter enables a more effective usage of the Library cache.

Note: In this case, any histograms that have been created to improve selectivity for some table columns, will be not used by the Cost Based Optimizer (CBO).

The initial load process is actually a sequence of "select" and "insert" SQL statements. These statements cause a number of redo log writes to occur. To decrease the time impact of these redo log writes on your overall system performance, start the initial load process in the NO ARCHIVE log mode. Then, during the initial load, you can check the switching time of the redo log files.

In the *init<SID>.ora* file, the following set of parameters affect the database redo log activities:

- log_buffer_size
- log_checkpoint_interval
- log_checkpoint_timeout

During the initial load, it is important to monitor log activity analyzing statistics from sys.v\$system_event, sys.v\$session_event, sys.v\$session_wait, sys.v\$waitstat and sys.v\$log_history.

The events log file sync, and log file parallel write are inevitable, and are initiated by LGWR I/O operations to provide data consistency. The event log buffer space indicates waiting for free space in the redo log buffer. You can reduce this wait by increasing the value for the *log_buffer_size* parameter or by optimizing the performance of the log writer. The size of log buffer for OLTP systems is typically about 382 to 1024 KB. For EDW, it can be between 3 to 5 MB. To optimize log writer performance you can increase the size of redo log files (usually up to 100 MB). The log file switch (checkpoint incomplete) event indicates that the next redo log cannot be used because of a checkpoint that commenced when the log that was last switched has not completed. By default, the value of the *log_checkpoint_timeout* parameter is 1800 (30 min) and the value of the *log_checkpoint_interval* parameter is the number of redo log blocks flashed into the redo log file after Oracle switches redo log files. (The size of a redo log block is platform specific [for example, for Solaris it is equal to 512 Bytes].)

If you want to monitor redo logs, use the following script:

```
Select * from v$loghist where first_time >= sysdate order by first_time desc;
SELECT SUM (DECODE (name, 'redo blocks written', VALUE, 0)) "Block Writes",
SUM (DECODE (name, 'redo entries', VALUE, 0)) "Entries",
SUM (DECODE (name, 'redo size', VALUE, 0)) "Size",
SUM (DECODE (name, 'redo log space requests', VALUE, 0)) "Space
Requests",
SUM (DECODE (name, 'redo synch writes', VALUE, 0)) "Synch Writes",
SUM (DECODE (name, 'redo writes', VALUE, 0)) "Synch Writes",
SUM (DECODE (name, 'redo writes', VALUE, 0)) "Writes"
FROM v$sysstat;
```

If you want to monitor the time between redo logs switching, use the following script:

```
SELECT MIN (b.first_time - a.first_time) * 1440 * 60 seconds
FROM sys.v_$instance i,
    sys.v_$log_history a,
    (SELECT sequence#, first_time
        FROM sys.v_$log
        WHERE status = 'CURRENT'
        UNION ALL
        SELECT sequence#, first_time
        FROM sys.v_$log_history) b
WHERE i.startup_time < a.first_time
    AND a.first_time < b.first_time
    AND a.sequence# + 1 = b.sequence#</pre>
```

If you want to know the session ID for the concurrent request, use the following script:

```
SELECT session_id
FROM apps.fnd_concurrent_processes p
WHERE process_status_code = 'A'
AND concurrent_process_id =
```

```
(SELECT controlling_manager
  FROM apps.fnd_concurrent_requests
  WHERE request_id = <id>);
```

There is a lot of information available about the importance of the *db_block_buffers* parameter for database performance. The typical value for this parameter for EDW is hundreds of MB. The proper size of the db block buffer cache is estimated by the hit ratio, and is calculated from statistics that are reported in V\$SYSSTAT. Those statistics are as follows: consistent gets, db block gets, and physical reads. When the hit ratio is ~ 93-99%, it is assumed that the db_block_buffers parameter value has been set correctly. For EDW systems with a significant amount of data, the scan hit ratio is lower. In another word buffer, cache misses are unavoidable. For a large db block buffer a sufficient number of db_lru_latches is required.

To determine the hit ratio for the dictionary cache, use the following script:

SELECT round(sum(gets)/(sum(gets)+ sum(getmisses)) * 100,2) from v\$rowcache;

To determine the hit ratio for the library cache, use the following script:

```
SELECT namespace name, gets, gethits,
    ROUND (gethitratio * 100, 2) "GetHit Percentage", pins, pinhits,
    ROUND (pinhitratio * 100, 2) "PinHit Percentage", reloads,
    invalidations
    FROM v$librarycache
    ORDER BY 1
```

You can also use the Oracle Parallel Query Option (PQO) to significantly speed up the process of data collection. EDW uses the *EDW: Degree of Parallelism* parameter to specify the degree of parallelism for the data loading operation. The the following set of PQO-related parameters are contained in the *init<SID>.ora* file:

- parallel_max_servers
- parallel_min_servers (depends on the number of CPUs)
- parallel_execution_message_size
- large_pool_size

Each of these parameters is described in greater detail below.

The *parallel_max_servers* parameter value depends primarily on the number of CPUs, and the configuration of the I/O subsystem. Oracle assumes, by default, the

number of threads per CPU equals 2, so the appropriate value for the parameter should be 2 x (number of CPUs).

For the *parallel_min_servers* parameter, set up the value equal to the number of CPUs. The most important value for PQO is not the number of CPUs, but the configuration of file system. Therefore, even if you have a couple of logical volumes and a bunch of CPUs, you can get poorer result for queries using PQO.

The *parallel_execution_message_size* parameter determines the size of the message for the parallel execution (PX) processes exchange. By default, the value of this parameter is 4192 bytes.

The *large_pool_size* parameter indicates the size of large pool heap that is used for exchanging messages between the parallel processes. It is a derived parameter that depends on the *parallel_max_servers*, *parallel_min_server*, and *parallel_execution_message_size* parameter values. If you do not have enough space for exchanging messages between the Parallel Query Coordinator (PQC) and the slave process, set up the *parallel_automatic_tuning = true* value in the *init<SID>.ora* file, and increase the values for the *large_pool_size* and *parallel_execution_message_size* parameters.

To monitor PQO, you can generate statistics for parallel operations downgrades by using the following script:

```
SELECT n.name, s.class, s.VALUE
FROM gv$sysstat s, v$statname n
WHERE s.name LIKE 'Parallel operation%'
AND s.statistic# = n.statistic#;
SELECT STATISTIC, VALUE
FROM v$pq_sysstat;
SELECT * FROM V$PX PROCESS SYSSTAT WHERE STATISTIC LIKE 'Buffers%';
```

The following parameters are important to start the query transformation that is used by EDW to efficiently execute queries against a large amount of data:

- Bitmap_merge_area_size
- Create_bitmap_area_size
- Star_transformation_enabled

Each of these parameters is described in greater detail below.

The *bitmap_merge_area_size* parameter is used to set up the heap size for merging bitmap indexes that have been created for fact tables. The default value for this parameter is 1024 Kbytes.

The *create_bitmap_area_size* parameter is used to set up the heap size for creating bitmap indexes for fact tables.

The *star_transformation_enabled* parameter is used to direct Oracle to create/not create temporary tables during the process of merging bitmap indexes. The recommended value for this parameter is *star_transformation_enabled=true*.

Note that the *Loader Engine Commit Size EDW* parameter value has an impact on system performance. It indicates the number of rows that have been inserted into the LCT and the dimension/fact tables after commit. A large value for this parameter can cause buffer cache misses and performance degradation.

Item Class

In Oracle Discoverer, an object within a folder is called an "item". An item class is a component of the End-User Layer (EUL) that groups together related (by common business purposes), items from different folders. Item classes are used to support features such as List of Values (LOV), Alternate Sorts, and Drill-to-Details. Item classes can be created in the Oracle Discoverer Administration edition, or in the Oracle Warehouse Builder (OWB).

The item class featured in the OWB serves to enable the OWB/Discoverer bridge to automatically generate item groupings each time the EUL is regenerated and/or refreshed. This appendix covers the following Item Class topics:

- Implementation Benefits
- Item Class Conventions by Intelligence Area
- Creating Item Classes

Implementation Benefits

In general, item classes are designed to provide users with a fast access to the required item(s), and related data. Furthermore, item classes provide users an LOV when creating or applying conditions and/or parameters to Discoverer workbooks. Finally, item classes provide users an easy mechanism to drill down to related items.

For example, from the revenue of the YR2000 worksheet, users can drill down to the expenses of YR2000 worksheet, without having to again regroup all months in YR2000.

Item Class Conventions by Intelligence Area

The following section describes the item class conventions used by each intelligence area in EDW.

Creating Item Classes

Item classes can be temporarily created in the Oracle Discoverer Administration Edition, or permanently in OWB.

Note: If Item classes are created in OWB, the OWB/Discoverer bridge creates the item classes in the EUL, within Discoverer.

To create temporary item classes in the Oracle Discoverer Administration Edition:

- 1. Log into the Discoverer Administration Edition.
- 2. Select the Business Area in which you want to create Item Classes.
- **3.** If hidden, unhide the Administration Tasklist, by navigating to Menu > View > Tasklist.
- **4.** Choose the Create item classes option. The Item Class Wizard appears. The Item Class Wizard will walk you step-by-step through the process of creating an an item class.

Additional Information: For more information about item classes, see the *Oracle Discoverer Administration Guide*.

Caution:: When the EUL is refreshed from OWB, the item classes will be deleted. If you want to create permanent item classes you need to log into OWB (see below).

To create permanent item classes in OWB:

 Use OWB to add an attribute set called, "DISCOVERER_ITEM_CLASS_LOV," in the Detail Mapping for the star dimension table. An Item class will be generated on whichever item is pulled into the attribute set.

Please refer to the OWB User's Guide for more information on item classes.

EDW Hidden Column

A "column", is the fact table or dimension table attribute which appears as an object in an Oracle Discoverer folder.

Note: When a column is hidden in the Oracle Warehouse Builder (OWB), it is grayed out in the Oracle Discoverer Administration Edition, and will not be visible in the Oracle Discoverer End User Edition.

When a column is not loaded in the Oracle Warehouse Builder (OWB), the data held in that column will not be loaded to the warehouse. By default, marking a column as skip loaded will also cause it to be marked as hidden.

Note: Please refer to the *Oracle Discoverer User Guide* for more information on the EUL.

Implementation Benefits

Hiding columns allows users to view only relevant information. To minimize the number of attributes in a Discoverer folder, objects that are not relevant, such as primary keys and foreign keys, are hidden.

Skip loading data in a column improves the performance of data loads, and the performance of workbook queries, because less data is being handled.

Implementation Trade Offs

If you wish to view a folder object that is hidden in OWB, you will need to go to the Discoverer Admin edition to unhide the applicable object(s). However, this manual effort of recovering hidden columns will be overwritten each time the EUL is refreshed and/or regenerated by the OWB/Discoverer Bridge.

If you wish to not skip load a column, you will need to go into OWB and uncheck the box for that column. The meta data will need to be regenerated, and the EUL refreshed. This could be a time consuming process.

How to Unhide Columns

There are two ways to unhide columns: temporarily, or permanently. To unhide a hidden column temporarily, do so in the Discover Administration Edition. To permanently unhide hidden columns, log into the OWB.

Steps to unhide columns in Oracle Discover Administration Edition:

- 1. Logon to the Discover Administration Edition.
- 2. Select the Business Area in which you want to unhide columns.
- **3.** Select the folder for the desired dimension or fact table.
- 4. Select the gray (hidden) column.
- 5. Right click with your mouse, choose Options.
- **6.** In the Options window, select the "Visible" option to the "User", and change the "item" from No to Yes.
- **7.** Refresh the EUL. The unhidden column will now become visible in the Discover End User edition.

Caution: When the EUL is refreshed from the OWB, the column will become hidden again. If you want to unhide the column permanently, you need to logon to OWB.

Steps to unhide the columns that have been hidden in OWB:

- 1. Logon to the OWB.
- 2. Select your Project.

- 3. Choose Mappings under your Logical Tree Tab.
- 4. Select the desired dimension or fact table.
- 5. Open the Mapping editor by double clicking on the fact table or dimension.
- 6. Select the Mapping Object.
- 7. From the Menu Edit > Edit Object. The Detail Mapping Editor opens.
- 8. Select the fact or dimension table (See the TRM for Physical Names).

Hint: All fact tables are _F, and all dimension tables are _M.

From the Menu View > Display Options > Entity Attribute Sets. The Attribute Editor opens.

Select the desired Attribute Set. At the bottom of the window you will see a list of columns that belong to the selected attribute set. If the column is checked, then it is not visible in the EUL. Select the column you want to unhide, and uncheck the box.

Hidden Column Conventions by Intelligence Products

In general, only measures and attributes meaningful to the end user, or those used in provided workbooks are not hidden. For dimensions, only columns such as "Name" or "Description" are kept.

Financials Intelligence

Financials Intelligence hides all Standard Who, such as Creation Date and system IDs. It also hides unused hierarchy levels. It hides all columns, except the dimension name.

- 1. "PK" columns (all PK, PK_KEY, FK_KEY)
- 2. User_attributes
- 3. User_measures
- 4. User_FK_KEY

When the dimensions are reloaded, you must run the hide columns program again.

Supply Chain Intelligence

Supply Chain Intelligence uses the same hidden columns strategy as Financials Intelligence.

Manufacturing Business Intelligence

Manufacturing Business Intelligence uses the same hidden columns strategy as Financials Intelligence.

Purchasing Intelligence

Purchasing Intelligence uses the same hidden columns strategy as Financials Intelligence.

Projects Intelligence

Projects Intelligence uses the same hidden columns strategy as Financials Intelligence.

Marketing Intelligence

Marketing Intelligence uses the same hidden columns strategy as Financials Intelligence.

Column Ordering

A column is a fact or dimension table attribute that appears as an item in an Oracle Discoverer folder.

You can use Oracle Discoverer Administrator Edition or OWB, to change the order of columns.

Implementation Benefits

Column ordering provides quicker access to a specific folder item by designating a logic to the order. Columns can be ordered two ways:

- Alphabetically: Enables users to see all attributes within a folder in an alphabetical format.
- **Logically:** Enables users to see a group of attributes grouped logically, depending on the subject area.

Once the folder contains certain column ordering, the users can easily scroll up and down within the folder. In certain situations, if the ordering logic is not obvious to the user, the column ordering may make it even more difficult for the user to find the item.

The following is the ordering logic that is used by each intelligence area.

Financials Intelligence

Financials Intelligence uses alphabetical ordering strategy within each folder.

Supply Chain Intelligence

Supply Chain Intelligence orders columns using a logical grouping. Items are ordered alphabetically with those logical groupings. For example, all Quantity measures are grouped and sequenced as they are all named, "Quantity, Quantity Booked, Quantity Cancelled, Quantity Returned, Quantity Shipped".

Manufacturing Intelligence

Manufacturing Intelligence orders columns alphabetically within each folder.

Purchasing Intelligence

Purchasing Intelligence orders columns using a logical group ordering. Items are alphabetically listed withing those groupings.

Projects Intelligence

Projects Intelligence orders columns alphabetically and frequency. For example, Project Dimension has the Project level information first, followed by Top Task, and Lowest Task.

Marketing Intelligence

Marketing Intelligence orders columns using a purely logical grouping ordering. Items are not alphabetized within each grouping.

Changing Column Ordering in OWB

Use OWB to change the order of columns in your workbooks.

For more information on changing column order in OWB, see the *Oracle Warehouse Builder User Guide*.

Use the following steps to order columns in OWB:

- 1. Log into OWB.
- 2. Select your project.
- 3. In the Logical Tree tabbed region, choose Mappings.
- 4. Choose the dimension or fact table.
- 5. Double click on the fact table or dimension to open the Mapping editor.
- 6. Select the Mapping Object.
- 7. From the Menu Edit > Edit Object. The Detail Mapping Editor opens.
- 8. Select the fact or dimension table.

Note: All fact tables use the suffix _F, and all dimension tables use the suffix _M.

- 9. From the Menu Edit > Edit Object. The Dimension Editor opens.
- **10.** From the Menu Edit > Table Properties. The Table Properties window opens.
- **11.** Choose the Column tabbed region. To order the columns, in the Position field, enter a position number for the column. For example if you want the column to appear first, enter 1; if you want it to appear second, enter 2. Any columns that do not have a numeric order specified will be listed alphabetically, following the numbered columns.

- EDW Generate Business Views: This program runs from an individual source system which has flexfield configuration work that has been done in the Application Integrator.
- OPM Inventory Daily Base Summary: This program is used to populate initial loading of Oracle Process Manufacturing Inventory Daily Summary Table. There are no default parameters for this report.
- OPM Inventory Daily Summary: This program summarizes delta changes in OLTP system to be moved to EDW. There are no default parameters for this report.
- Purge Fact Interface Tables: This program purges all facts in the interface table that have the status Collected.
- Purge Dimension Interface Tables: This program purges all dimensions in the interface table that have the status Collected.

- Purge OPM Inventory Daily Summary Table: This program purges data in Oracle Process Manufacturing Inventory Daily Summary Table. You can choose a Purge type for the program: purge the whole table, or up to a given date. There are no default parameters for this report.
- Remove EDW Security Policy from Fact: This program removes an EDW security policy from a fact table. In the Parameter window, enter the name of the fact cube that you want to remove the policy from using the following format: <fact_table_name> VARCHAR2(50).
- Import Data Warehouse Dimensions: The Performance Management Framework is seeded with a list of the dimensions and dimension levels that ship with the OWB metadata. If this data is customized in OWB run this program to populate this data into PMF. This concurrent request is available from the BIS Super User responsibility when submitting a new request.

De-duplication Solution

This appendix describes the agreed approach for de-duplication of dimensions or facts or both that are received from both a legacy and one or more Oracle Applications instances.

De-duplication Solution

Currently, EDW handles the same record from multiple sources as shown in the figure below.




Figure C–1 Same Record from Multiple Sources

If the customer does not want to have two same records loaded into the STAR schema, you can modify the client extension package EDW_COLLECTION_HOOK

and add logic to remove the duplicate record from staging tables into the pre_dimension_coll and pre_fact_coll procedures.

These two procedures will always be called by loader engine before loading data from staging tables to level tables or fact tables. The following sample code shows how to use the client extension:

Glossary

Actual

The calculated value for a performance measure. Alerts will calculate the actual value based on the dimensions specified in the setup of targets in the Performance Management Framework. This actual value will display on the Personal Homepage and on Notification messages.

Alert

A process that runs for a performance measure, delivering notifications for out of tolerance situations to target owners and subscribers. It also updates the data used in the Performance Measure portlet.

Analysis Workbook

A display of enterprise information in a graphical and tabular format. The Analysis Workbook uses Discoverer to allow the user to modify the selection criteria, drill into dimension hierarchies or link to other data elements.

Ask Oracle

A component of E-Business Intelligence that allows users to find reports that answer business questions. Ask Oracle uses a natural language search engine and a repository of questions associated with the E-Business Intelligence reports, to provide the reports that are relevant to a specific question.

Business Plan

A grouping of performance measure targets. Within the Performance Management Framework, the user can create different business plans, each with a set of performance measures and targets. Users of reports can choose the business plan for comparison and alerts can select the business plan for determination of out of tolerance situations. For example, a user may want to setup a set of targets based on a favorable economic scenario and a set of targets based on an unfavorable economic scenario.

Business View

Component of the application database that sorts underlying applications data into an understandable and consolidated set of information. By masking the complexity of the database is tables, Business Views provide a standard set of interfaces to any tool or application that retrieves and presents data to the user.

Account Type

In the Embedded Data Warehouse, users can assign business meanings to an individual account number (or other segments in an Accounting Flexfield) called an Account Type. It can be assigned to the lowest level account number, or to the parent account number. If it is assigned to a parent account, all children beneath the parent account bear the same business meaning. (See Flexfield Segment.)

Attributes

Attributes are usually text fields, and they usually describe a characteristic of a tangible thing.

Balanced Scorecard

A business practice that uses a set of Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) to create an enterprise scorecard in order to monitor its own corporate performance. This "holistic" methodology stresses that, in addition to financial indicators, the non-financial indicators, such as employee skills, customer satisfaction, or internal business process, need to be tracked, and they ultimately equate to the financial success of a company. A Balanced Scorecard is often implemented during an analysis of the industry situation, and an enterprise's strategic and tactical goals.

Base Unit of Measure (UOM)

The standard Unit of Measure upon which its related unit of measures are based. Each Warehouse unit of measure is tied to a base unit of measure. A conversion rate is required for warehouse-to-base UOM mapping. For example: If a gallon is the base unit of measure, related units of measure could include the quart (1/4 gallon) and the pint (1/8 gallon).

Collection

These are concurrent programs, defined in Oracle Applications, identified as data sources for the Warehouse. A collection extracts data from source tables, based on

an EDW source view definition, and loads the data into Interface Tables that reside in the warehouse. These concurrent programs are under the Site Warehouse Administrator responsibility in each source application.

Consolidation Set of Books

This is the parent set of books in any consolidation definition in General Ledger. This set of books maps the relationship between a parent and its child Set of Books.

CWM Bridge

One of the utilities provided in the utilities drawer of the Oracle Warehouse Builder. When chosen, it brings up the Oracle Common Warehouse Metadata (CWM) Transfer Wizard window, which walks through the steps necessary to transfer Metadata.

Data Cleansing

The mechanism utilized to improve the quality of data loaded into the Warehouse. The current data cleansing mechanism, provided by EDW, is to remove duplicate records, and to remove records with dangling foreign keys.

Derived Fact Table

The Derived fact table sources data from base tables, instead of source systems. Derived fact tables can be calculated from one or more base fact tables. Or, a Derived fact table can be expressed at a different granularity than the base fact itself.

Dimension

Dimensions are used to calculate and monitor performance measures. Some of the dimensions are organization, geography, time, sales channel, geography and product.

Dimension Hierarchy

The parent/child relationship within dimension levels that facilitates the up and down drilling capability in query tools.

Dimension Hierarchy Level

Individual levels in a dimensional parent/child hierarchical relationship. There is a dimension level table associated with each corresponding hierarchical level.

Dimension Level

Dimension levels establish granularity for a dimension. For example: in E-Business Intelligence Suite, within the organization dimensions; set of books, legal entity, operating unit, and inventory organization, are the different dimension levels.

Dimension Level Combination

Used with the Performance Management Framework to identify the dimension level associated with a specific target setup. For example: in setting up a target for the Inventory Turns performance measure, the target level might be Organization and Time.

Dimension Table

Each dimension is defined by its primary key, which serves as the basis for referential integrity with any given fact table to which it is joined. Most dimension tables contain many textual attributes (fields) that are the basis for constraining and grouping within data warehouse queries.

Discoverer

An Oracle Tool that allows users to retrieve data from a database. Discoverer provides a user-friendly method for creating database queries and displaying information.

Discoverer Bridge

The Oracle Warehouse Builder has the ability to transfer metadata to other Oracle products using the "Oracle CWM Bridge". The components utilized to transfer metatata between OWB and Discoverer are: the Oracle Warehouse Builder Bridge, the CWM Bridge, and the Oracle Discoverer Bridge. The three components combine, from a user perspective, into simply running a "Transfer Wizard".

Discoverer EUL

A metalayer that contains data about other tables in a database. Conceptually, the End User Layer shields the end user from the complexity of the database. The database tables are modified by the Administration Edition of Discoverer, and the OFS Discoverer/Integrator. Business Areas are defined within the EUL, and then used with the End User Edition of Discoverer. The End User Layer supports Oracle Applications security by recognizing applications user ids, passwords, and responsibilities.

Discoverer Analysis Workbook

A display of enterprise information in a graphical and tabular format. The Analysis Workbook uses Discoverer to enable the user to modify the selection criteria, drill into dimension hierarchies, or link to other data elements.

Drill Down Report

A report run by drilling down within a report. Generally, this drill down generates a report in greater granularity, at a lower dimension level. For example: in a Resource Utilization report, a drill down allows viewing utilization for a specific department.

EDW

Embedded Data Warehouse.

EDW Warehouse Parameter

A set of parameters that are required to prepare the Warehouse so that it may receive data from heterogeneous sources. Examples are: identify source instances, identify currency type, and global Unit of Measure, along with associated conversion rates, etc.

End User Layer

Component of BIS that translates business view column names into industry standard terminology, and provides links between related data tables. Discoverer accesses information through the End User Layer (EUL). The End User Layer supports Oracle Applications security by recognizing applications userids, passwords, and responsibilities.

Enterprise Calendar

EDW provides various time dimension hierarchies to accommodate different business requirements. For example: EDW provides GL period hierarchy for accounting use. EDW also provides a 4-4-5 week hierarchy for manufacturing oriented use. For a global point of view, in order to enable a consistent reporting mechanism on time, EDW provides an additional hierarchy -- enterprise calendar hierarchy -- to enable data from various sources to be presented in a single time hierarchy.

Equivalent Set of Books

This is a dummy parent set of books mirrored in the child instance, as instructed by the GL Global Consolidation System.

Fact Table

A set of simultaneous measures at a particular granularity. Most of these measures are numeric, but not necessarily so. Every fact table contains a set of two or more foreign keys that joined to their respective dimension tables.

Favorites

A customizable portlet on the Personal Homepage that allows users to specify their favorite BIS intelligence reports, analysis workbooks, or external web sites.

Flexfield Segment

A flexfield segment is a single sub-field within a flexfield. You define the appearance, and meaning, of individual segments when customizing a flexfield. A segment is represented in your database as a single table column.

Flexfield Value Set

A flexfield value set contains a group of predefined valid values for a specific flexfield segment. System validates data entry for this flexfield segment against the associated value set. Single value sets can be assigned to one, or more than one, segment. A flexfield value set can also be shared among different flexfields.

Global Warehouse Administrator

A responsibility defined in the Warehouse. This responsibility manages the warehouse parameter setup, concurrent program requests, and load process monitoring.

Graph

A portlet on the Personal Homepage that displays graphs relating to the enterprise performance.

Incremental Data Load

This is an extract of the new or modified transactions that occurred since the last extract run. It is detected by reviewing the last update date/time stamp in source systems.

Intelligence Report

A display of enterprise information in a graphical and tabular format, based on a set of parameters, that addresses a business area. BIS reports are viewed on a browser, and accessed through the Personal Homepage. As opposed to transaction level reports that provide detailed information on the business operations, Intelligence Reports focus on a high level view of enterprise performance.

Interface Table

This serves as a staging area between source systems and the target Warehouse. The Interface Tables in EDW are a set of tables with identical schema, such as target fact tables, or dimension tables. The purpose of an interface table is to reserve a temperate area for data transformation.

Load Program

These are concurrent programs, defined in warehouse, to load data from interface tables into fact tables and dimension level tables. The EDW load program also performs some data cleansing and transformation. These current programs are under the Global Warehouse Administrator responsibility in the warehouse.

Logical Data Model

For BIS, this is a representation of the Business Views in the database and folders in the End User Layer. Available in a readable format, the Logical Data Model gives the relationship between these entities, allowing a Discoverer user to determine the data elements needed for a specific analysis.

Master Instance

A dedicated instance which provides seed date for selections in warehouse parameter forms like rate type, warehouse currency, and enterprise calendar.

Metadata

Data about data. Metadata describes how, and when, and by whom, a particular set of data was collected, and how the data is formatted. Metadata is essential for understanding information stored in data warehouses.

Navigation

A region on the Personal Homepage that displays the menu set for the user, allowing drill down to the intelligence reports.

Notification

A component of Oracle applications that notifies a user of an event. Within BIS, the Performance Management Framework will generate notifications to users on out of tolerance situations. These notifications can appear on the Personal Homepage, and be sent as an E-mail.

Oracle E-Business Intelligence Suite (E-Business Intelligence Suite)

A Web-enabled Oracle Applications product that allows customers to measure, monitor, and manage enterprise performance in order to make better, more timely decisions across the enterprise. E-Business Intelligence Suite is a user-friendly, intuitive, pre-packaged decision-support system, completely integrated with Oracle Applications.

Other User-Defined Dimension

Based on business requirements for non-Accounting Key Flexfields, and Descriptive Flexfields defined in a user's Oracle Applications, EDW can accommodate up to fifty dimensions mapped from these Flexfield Segments.

OWB

Oracle Warehouse Builder.

OWB Applications Integrator

The OWB Applications Integrator is a utility provided by OWB to tightly manage EDW Metadata that resides in the OWB repository. It enables users to map GL Accounting Flexfields, other Key Flexfields, and Descriptive Flexfields in Oracle Applications, to dimensions in the Warehouse. It also allows users to configure user-definable measures and attributes in an EDW Schema.

OWB Bridge

The Oracle Warehouse Builder has the ability to transfer metadata to other Oracle products using the "Oracle OWB Bridges". The components utilized to transfer metatata between OWB and Discoverer are: the Oracle Warehouse Builder Bridge, the CWM Bridge, and the Oracle Discoverer Bridge. The three components combine, from a user perspective, into simply running a Transfer Wizard.

OWB Metadata Loader Windows

The OWB Metadata loader windows are used to import or export OWB metadata between OWB repositories. This process requires saving OWB metadata to and from files, which are then imported from or exported to OWB repositories.

OWB Metadata Repository

EDW metadata resides in the OWB metadata repository, which is an object in the warehouse.

Performance Management Framework

The BIS component that allows implementation of performance measure tracking. The framework is composed of: forms to identify and store the performance measure targets and tolerances, alerts to calculate actual values, and workflows to take action on out-of-tolerance situations.

Performance Measure

A metric used to determine enterprise performance and success. A company will identify relevant performance measures based on the dynamics of the industry, and the company's strategic and tactical goals.

Period Type

Period type is set up in GL, with standard data types of month, quarter and year. A period type is used to define an accounting calendar. An accounting calendar can have multiple period types. In order to uniquely identify an enterprise calendar used in the EDW Warehouse, period type setup is required as one of the parameters.

Personal Homepage

The web-based starting point for BIS access. The Personal Homepage (PHP) includes graphs, key performance indicators, an "Ask Oracle" search engine, workflow notifications, navigation to intelligence reports, a link to analytical workbooks, and links to other web sites.

Portlet

An area on the homepage that holds a specific BIS component. BIS has regions for graphs, performance measures, an "Ask Oracle" search engine, workflow notifications, navigation to BIS reports, a link to analytical workbooks, and a favorites section for links to frequently-used sites.

Predefined Dimension

The Embedded Data Warehouse provides a comprehensive list of predefined dimensions that enable users to perform generic business analyses out-of-box. For example: time dimension, geography dimension, etc.

Project Classification

Project classification is used to group projects according to predefined categories. The definition of these categories is done within Oracle Projects.

Project in OWB

A Builder Project in OWB is a high-level repository structure that stores and organizes the formal descriptions that define a data warehouse. These definitions include descriptions of data sources, target warehouse objects, mappings of source data to various targets, transformation operations, and configuration parameters. OWB generates and stores numerous scripts in a Project.

Related Report

A report run from a link on another report. Generally, related reports are also menu level reports. This contrasts with a drill-down report and a view-by report. For example: from the Inventory Turns report, Production Efficiency is a related report.

Responsibility

A security feature of Oracle applications that groups forms and procedures under the user application. A responsibility is associated with a window's menu, a data group, and a concurrent request set. Within BIS, the responsibility is used to determine access to menu items, trends, notifications, performance data, report data, and Ask Oracle questions.

Rate Type (Warehouse Parameter)

To identify one conversion rate type to be used in the Warehouse. The conversion rate type is defined in Oracle General Ledger. It is used to automatically assign a rate to convert foreign currency journal amounts to functional currency equivalents.

Schema

A loader of related database objects, usually grouped by a User ID. Schema objects include tables, views, and database links.

Slowly Changing Dimension

A dimension within which certain attributes have tendency to change with time. One example is the martial status of an employee in the employee dimension. The status may change from single, to married, to divorced, to married again. OWB enables users to identify a dimension as slowly changing, and to mark certain attributes in a dimension to be traced over time. In EDW, every change to the dimension attribute creates an additional record in the dimension table, and it also keeps the previous record. Any new transaction related to that dimension will point to the new record in the dimension table, while existing transactions still point to old records.

Source Instance

These are the database instances in which the source systems that feed data into the EDW Warehouse reside.

Source Set of Books

If a user chooses to create dimensions from GL Accounting Flexfield segments, and complete the mapping process in the OWB Applications Integrator, the selected chart of accounts and its associated set of books will be display in the Value-Based Hierarchy Setup window as a source set of books.

Source System

A database that feeds data required for business analysis into a warehouse. For EDW, the source system can be either Oracle Applications, other ERP systems, or legacy systems.

Summary Fact Table

The Summary fact table sources data from base tables instead of source systems. It expresses the same group of data in a different granularity than the base fact table.

Target

The value specified for a specific performance measure at a certain dimension level, and a specific dimension. For example: the target value of 12 might be set for the performance measure Inventory Turns, for the target level of Organization and Time, and the specific dimensions of U.S. Manufacturing and calendar month.

Target Tolerance

The levels set on a specific performance measurement target, outside of which a workflow will be triggered. BIS allows setup of three pairs of target tolerance levels. For example: with a target of 12, a user might have 11,13 as the first set of tolerances, 10,14 as the second set, and 5,20 as the third set. A different workflow can generate for each out-of-tolerance situation.

Time Stamp

A specially defined date-and-time format field that tracks when a data record has been created, deleted, or changed in any way.

Type Hierarchy in Value Based Hierarchy

A mechanism to group data, based on account type assigned in EDW. It is used to present all transactions with the same account type from all source set of books together. There are no hierarchical relations between these transactions, even though the terminology is Type Hierarchy.

Unit of Measure

The unit in which the quantity of an item is expressed. For example: resource utilization might have a percentage unit of measure, while revenue has a currency unit of measure.

User-Defined Accounting Dimension

There are ten dimensions, reserved in the EDW Schema, to accommodate GL Accounting Flexfield segments that have been defined in a user's Oracle Applications. There are five hierarchies, and fifteen levels, for each hierarchy that has been predefined for these dimensions.

User-Defined Attribute

These are user-definable attributes, reserved in EDW fact tables and dimension level tables to enable configuration on the predefined EDW objects. The OWB Applications Integrator is the tool to use for configuration. The Data type for a user-defined attribute is VARCHAR2.

User-Defined Measure

There are user-definable measures reserved in EDW fact tables to enable configuration on the predefined EDW fact tables. The OWB Applications Integrator is the tool to use for configuration. The Data type for a user-defined measure is NUMBER.

Value Based Hierarchy

Within a value set for a GL Accounting Flexfield segment, you can define values which have a parent/child relationship. A parent value is that value which has one or more child values associated with it. This parent/child relationship turns into a dimensional hierarchy -- the Value Based Hierarchy. This is only applicable to GL Accounting Flexfield segments.

Value Based Hierarchy Root

The very top parent node in the parent/child relationship for an individual GL Accounting Flexfield segment.

View-By

A report run by changing the view-by parameter. The view-by parameter provides the dimension for categorization of the measure, and the corresponding x axis. For example: a Resource Utilization report allows view-by of organization, time, geography. and product. Changing the view-by will keep the set of data, but change in what categories the data will display.

Warehouse

In contrast to source systems, that feed data into warehouse, warehouse is the target system that receives the data load. There are various Schemas in the warehouse, such as fact table, dimension level table, etc. The warehouse metadata repository also resides in the warehouse.

Warehouse Currency

One selected currency that is to be used in the warehouse so that all reports can provide consistent information. This is the mechanism which manages the currency issue that can occur due to heterogeneous data sources.

Warehouse Unit of Measure (UOM)

A set of unit of measures (UOM) defined in the warehouse setup process. This set of unit of measures is used to trace or measure values in a warehouse that have been sourced from various systems in a consistent manner. Quantities from individual source system are converted into warehouse UOMs.
